

**THE FAIRS ACT, 1871.**

**CLEY-NEXT-THE-SEA FAIR.**

IN pursuance of the above-mentioned Act, I, the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, hereby notify as follows:

1. By Memorial, dated the 4th day of May, 1872, a representation has been duly made to me by the Justices sitting in Petty Sessions for the Holt Division of the county of Norfolk, that a Fair has been annually held on the last Friday and Saturday in the month of July, in the parish of Cley-next-the-Sea, in the said division and county, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that such Fair should be abolished.

2. On the 1st day of August, 1872, I shall take the aforesaid representation into consideration, and all persons are to intimate, before that day, any objection they may desire to offer to the abolition of the said Fair.

**CHAPPEL FAIR.**

WHEREAS a representation has been duly made to me, as Secretary of State for the Home Department, by the Justices sitting in Petty Sessions for the Winstree and Lexden Division of the county of Essex, that a Fair has been annually held on the Tuesday and Wednesday after the 11th day of June, in the parish of Chappel, in the said division and county, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the said Fair should be abolished:

And whereas notice of the said representation, and of the time when I should take the same into consideration, has been duly published in pursuance of "The Fairs Act, 1871:"

And whereas on such representation and consideration it appears to me that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the said Fair should be abolished:

And whereas it appears that there is no lord or owner of the said Fair, and the tolls thereof:

Now therefore, I, as the Secretary of State for the Home Department, in exercise of the powers vested in me by "The Fairs Act, 1871," do hereby order that the Fair which has been annually held on the Tuesday and Wednesday after the 11th day of June, in the parish of Chappel, in the Winstree and Lexden Division of the county of Essex, shall be abolished as from the date of this order.

**LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.**

**NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ACT BY THE DISTRICT OF STOW-ON-THE-WOLD, IN THE COUNTY OF GLOUCESTER.**

WHEREAS a resolution for the adoption of the Local Government Act, 1858, was, on the 28th day of March, 1872, passed by the owners and ratepayers of the district of Stow-on-the-Wold, in the county of Gloucester, the boundaries of which district were settled by order of the Secretary of State for the Home Department, dated the 22nd day of October, 1864; and notice of such adoption has been given, in writing, to

the Local Government Board, by the persons required to give the same:
