PRESENT :

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two.

2. This Order may be cited as The Schleswig and Holstein Cattle Order of 1872.

3. This Order extends to Great Britain only.

4. In this Order—

The Act of 1869 means The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869 :

A defined part of a port means a part of a port defined by a special Order of the Privy Council in pursuance of Regulation 2 of the Fourth Schedule to the Act of 1869 :

Landing-place for slaughter means a landing-place within a defined part of a port :

Master includes any person having the charge or command of a vessel :

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1869.

5. Notwithstanding anything in The Foreign Animals Order of 1871, the regulations in the Fourth Schedule to the Act of 1869 shall not apply to cattle brought from a port in either of the parts of the Empire of Germany respectively known as Schleswig and Holstein.

6. Cattle brought from a port of Schleswig or Holstein shall not be landed elsewhere than at a landing-place for slaughter, unless and until the owner, agent, or charterer of the vessel in which they are brought has received the special permission of the Privy Council to employ the vessel in the importation of such cattle.

7. The landing of cattle brought from a port of Schleswig or Holstein, elsewhere than at a landing-place for slaughter, shall be subject to the following conditions :—

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within three months before taking them on board, had on board any cattle exported from any port in any part of the Empire of Germany, other than Schleswig or Holstein, or from any port of any of the countries comprised in the Second Schedule to The Foreign Animals Order of 1871, other than the Empire of Germany, or from any port in a country from which importation of cattle into Great Britain is prohibited.

Secondly. That the vessel has not, since taking on board the cattle imported, entered any such port as aforesaid.

Thirdly. That the cattle imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any cattle exported from any such port as aforesaid.

Fourthly. That the cattle imported are accompanied by a declaration and certificates such as are indicated in the forms set forth in the Schedule to this Order or to the like effect.

8. Further, cattle brought from a port of Schleswig or Holstein shall not be landed elsewhere than at a landing-place for slaughter, unless and until—

(1.) The owner, agent, or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in Great Britain, has entered into a bond to Her Majesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing conditions in relation to cattle to be landed under this Order from the vessel ; and

(2.) The master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of cattle therein satisfied the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs, or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that none of the cattle then imported therein have been exported from any port in any part of the Empire of Germany, other than Schleswig or Holstein, or from any port of any of the countries comprised in the Second Schedule to The Foreign Animals Order of 1871, other than the Empire of Germany, or from

any port in a country from which importation of cattle into Great Britain is prohibited, and that the foregoing conditions have been observed in relation to all the cattle then imported therein.

9. If the Veterinary Inspector of the Privy Council is of opinion, on the examination of any cattle imported under this Order, that the declaration accompanying the cattle is untrue in any particular, as regards any one of the cattle in the vessel, then all the animals in the vessel shall be detained and dealt with in accordance with the instructions from time to time given by the Privy Council.

10. If the declaration accompanying any cattle imported under this Order is untrue in any particular, as regards any one of the cattle to which it relates, the master of the vessel shall be guilty of an offence against this Order, unless he shows to the satisfaction of the Justices before whom he is charged, that he did not know of the same being so untrue, and that he could not with reasonable diligence have obtained such knowledge.

11. Subject to the provisions of this Order all the provisions of The Foreign Animals Order of 1871 shall continue to apply to cattle brought from a port of Schleswig or Holstein.

THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs copies of two Decrees of the Portuguese Government, dated the 5th ultimo, imposing import duties of 10 reis (0.53d.) per kilogramme on iron chains and cables that are not applicable to the fitting out, &c., of ships ; of 150 reis (8d.) per kilogramme on canvas and sail cloth applicable to other purposes than that of being made into ship's sails ; and of 30 per cent. ad valorem on buttons made of any vitrified substance or mass, and not included under manufactured articles either of glass or crystal, or of porcelain.

All these articles have hitherto been unenumerated in the Portuguese Tariff.

AWARD OF FOREST OF DEAN MINING COMMISSIONERS OF 1871.

To all to whom these presents shall come, &c.

WHEREAS, in accordance with the provisions of an Act passed in the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth year of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act to make further provision respecting the opening and working of Mines and Quarries in Her Majesty's Forest of Dean, and in the hundred of Saint Briavels, in the county of Gloucester, and for other purposes connected therewith," the Honourable Evelyn Ashley, Barrister-at-Law, Alfred Buckley, Esquire, Merchant, and John Taylor, Esquire, Mining Engineer, having received their appointments under the hands of the Lord Chief Justice of the Queen's Bench, the President of the Board of Trade, and the Lord Chancellor respectively, were duly appointed Commissioners for carrying the purposes of Part I. of the said Act into execution, and it was enacted that the said Commissioners should be styled the Forest of Dean Commissioners of 1871, and whereas the said Commissioners duly proceeded to carry into effect the powers and directions in the said Act contained, and to hold sittings at Newnham, in the county of Gloucester, and to hear Her Majesty's Commissioners of Woods, and all such free miners and galees, as desired to be heard and to take evidence about the matters in question.

Now, therefore know ye, that we, the above-named Evelyn Ashley, Alfred Buckley, and John Taylor (the Forest of Dean Mining Commissioners of 1871), do hereby make our award, and by this our award in writing under our hands and seals, do ascertain and declare as follows:—

1. The true meaning, construction, effect, and operation of Rule 4, in the second schedules annexed to the awards of coal and iron mines, made by the Dean Forest Mining Commissioners in 1841, is, that all persons now, or at any time hereafter, holding any unopened gale or gales of coal or iron ore, who shall not bonâ fide commence opening the same within the space of five years from the date of the grant thereof respectively, or within such extended time as hereinafter mentioned, are, and shall be liable to be, evicted therefrom by Her Majesty, her heirs, and successors, as might be done on the forfeiture of a lease for breach of condition, and that the receipt of rent, or the registration of any transfer of any gale after default made in observance of the rule is no waiver of the Crown's future right of re-entry should a breach of condition continue:

Provided nevertheless, that in the event of any unavoidable and unforeseen mining accident or impediment occurring, or other reasonable cause of delay being proved to the satisfaction of the gaveller, to prevent the opening of such works within the said period of five years, then the time may be extended at the discretion of the gaveller by some writing under his hand, according to circumstances. And the true meaning and construction of the words "shall bonâ fide commence opening the same," is that pits, shafts, levels, or other openings down to or towards the seams of coal or beds of iron ore, shall have actually been commenced and continued towards completion.

But, whereas it appears to the Forest of Dean Mining Commissioners of 1871, that it is advisable that a new rule should be made in place of, and in substitution for, Rule 4 in the said schedules respectively.

2. Now, know ye, that we, the above-named Commissioners, award and declare that in substitution for the rules numbered 4, as in the aforesaid schedules set out, the following shall stand

and appear and be read as Rule 4, and that its true meaning and construction shall be in accordance with what has been already declared in this our award to be the true meaning and construction of the former Rule 4:

All persons now or at any time hereafter holding any unopened gale or gales of coal or iron ore shall bonâ fide commence opening the same within the space of five years from the date of this award as regards gales now held by them, and as regards all other gales or new grants of surrendered or forfeited gales within five years from the date of the grant thereof respectively:

Provided, nevertheless, in the event of any unavoidable and unforeseen mining accident or impediment occurring, or other reasonable cause of delay being proved to the satisfaction of the gaveller, to prevent the opening of such works within the said period of five years, then the time may be extended at the discretion of the gaveller, by some writing under his hand, according to circumstances. But if any dispute shall arise between the gaveller for the time being and any person or persons entitled to any gale respecting the extension of time for the said opening, or any dispute as to whether there has been a bonâ fide commencement of the opening of any gale, then, in such case, the matter in dispute shall be referred to the decision of an arbitrator to be appointed in all respects as the arbitrator is directed to be appointed in the Acts of 1838 and 1861 relating to the Forest of Dean, in cases of dispute as to the amount of new galeage rents and royalties to be paid by galees on the cesser and determination of the old rents and royalties; and the costs of the said arbitration shall be paid in the same manner as is provided in section thirty-seven of "The Dean Forest (Mines) Act, 1871."

3. The true meaning, construction, effect, and operation of Rule 14 in the second schedules annexed to the awards of coal and iron mines made by the Dean Forest Mining Commissioners in 1841, is that the galee, or other person holding through or under him, shall have the liberty of making up the short-workings of any year or years in any succeeding year or years, so long as he continues in the occupation of the gale, paying the proper rents and royalties to the Crown, and duly observing the conditions under which he holds; the meaning of the word "holding" not being limited to any defined period, but being co-extensive with the occupation of the gale by the galee, his heirs and assigns, until the gale is surrendered or forfeited to the Crown.
