By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT :

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, (in this Order referred to as the Act of 1869,) and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the nineteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two ; and words in this Order have the same meaning as in the Act of 1869.

2. Cattle brought from any place in the dominions of the Emperor of Russia shall not be landed at any port or place in Great Britain.

3. The following articles brought from any place in the dominions of the Emperor of Russia shall not be landed at any port or place in Great Britain ;—

Manure ; or hay.

4. The following articles brought from any place in the dominions of the Emperor of Russia shall not be landed at any port or place in Great Britain, except at the ports at which foreign animals may be landed, and shall not be removed from the place where landed without a certificate of an Inspector of the Privy Council, certifying that such articles are not likely to introduce any contagious or infectious disease ;—

Meat ; hides ; fat ; hoofs ; or horns.

5. Subject to the provisions contained in the Orders of Council relating to the ports of Granton and Leith, dated the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and in the Order of Council relating to the port of Southampton, dated the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, all the regulations in the Fourth Schedule to the Act of 1869 shall apply to sheep and goats brought to Great Britain from any place in the dominions of the Emperor of Russia, and landed in Great Britain, and all such sheep and goats shall be

slaughtered within ten days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing : Provided nevertheless, that cattle, sheep, or goats being or having been on board any vessel at the same time with any cattle brought from any place in the dominions of the Emperor of Russia, shall not be landed at any port or place in Great Britain.

6. Notwithstanding any Order of Council to the contrary, no sheep or goats brought from any place in the dominions of the Emperor of Russia, and landed within the port of London, shall be moved alive out of any part of the port defined as a part within which foreign cattle may be landed for slaughter.

An Act to amend the Act of the Session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, intituled "An Act to authorize the payment of retiring pensions to Colonial Governors.

An Act for the amendment of the Act of Uniformity.

An Act to enable the Local Board for the district of Hindley, in the county of Lancaster, to purchase the undertaking of the Hindley Gas, Coke, Meter, and Fitting Company Limited, and to supply gas within the said district and the neighbourhood thereof, to erect waterworks, and to confer other powers in relation to gas and water on the said Local Board; and for other purposes.

An Act for authorising additional works in connection with the Holborn Valley and Farringdon Market Improvements; and for other purposes.

An Act for making and maintaining a general market, on or near to the site of the old Newport Market, and certain new streets and improvements in connection therewith, in the parishes of Saint Ann, Soho, and Saint Martin-in-the-Fields.

An Act for conferring additional powers upon the Furness Railway Company for the construction of works, and the raising of money, and otherwise in relation to their undertaking; and for other purposes.

An Act for authorising the Furness Railway Company to provide and use steam and other vessels on Windermere Lake and Coniston Lake; and for other purposes.

An Act for embanking and reclaiming certain mud or slob lands in the county of Wexford.

An Act for making a railway from the Belfast and Northern Counties Railway at Ballymena to Cushendall and Redbay; and for other purposes.

An Act for vesting the undertaking of the Brighton, Hove, and Preston (Constant Service) Waterworks Company in the Corporation of Brighton, and for extending the limits for the supply of water to certain neighbouring places; and for other purposes.

An Act for conferring additional powers on the London and North Western Railway Company in relation to their own undertaking and the undertakings of other Companies; and for other purposes.

An Act for making a railway from Newton Stewart to Whithorn and a tramway to Garliestown, in the county of Wigton; and for other purposes.

An Act for authorising the Wainfleet and Firsby Railway Company to extend their railway from Wainfleet All Saints to Skegness; and to raise further moneys; and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Burry Port and Gwendreath Valley Railway Company to construct further works at Burry Port, in the parish of Pembrey, in the county of Carmarthen; and for other purposes.

An Act for the sale and transfer of the undertaking of the Hoylake Railway Company, and for enabling the Hoylake and Birkenhead Tramway Company to make and maintain tramways from the Hoylake Railway to Woodside Ferry and other places in Birkenhead, in the county of Chester, and for other purposes.

An Act to revive and extend the powers of the several Acts relating to the "Kilrush and Kilree Railway and Poulmasherry Reclamation Company," passed in the years 1860, 1861, and 1865; and for other purposes.

An Act for making railways in the counties of Lanark and Stirling, to be called "The North Monkland Railways;" and for other purposes.

An Act to empower the South Devon Railway Company to extend and improve their Sutton Harbour Branch Railway; to confer upon them further powers in relation to their own undertaking and the undertakings of other Companies; and for other purposes.

An Act to alter and amend the provisions of "The Limerick Markets Act, 1852," and "The Limerick Markets Act, 1862," with reference to tolls, and to give further powers to the Limerick Markets Trustees; and for other purposes.

An Act for authorising the Sutton Harbour Improvement Company to construct tramways and other works, and to raise further moneys; and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Witney Railway Company to borrow further moneys; to confer powers with reference to traffic, and other arrangements, on the Witney Great Western and East Gloucestershire Railway Companies; and for other purposes.

An Act for making a railway from Truro to Perran, in the county of Cornwall; and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the mayor, aldermen, and burgesses of the borough of Leeds to make new and improve existing streets; to make further provision with respect to streets and buildings; to raise further moneys for the providing of parks; and for the further improvement and better government of the said borough; and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the trustees of the River Weaver Navigation to make a communication at Anderton, between their navigation and the Trent and Mersey Canal, and for other purposes with respect to the same trust.

An Act to confer further powers upon the Great Northern Railway Company.

An Act for abolishing the compulsory metage on grain imported into the port of London, and for commuting the metage dues received by the Corporation of the city of London into a fixed due, and for creating thereby a fund to be applied towards the preservation of open spaces near London, and for other purposes connected therewith.

An Act for enabling the Local Board of Health for the district of the borough of Warwick to execute works for the improvement of the water supply of their district; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorize the Hemel Hempsted and London and North-Western Railway Company to extend their railway at Boxmoor, to divert and alter the line and levels of their extension to Harpenden; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the construction of railways between Canterbury and Herne Bay, in the county of Kent; and for other purposes.

An Act to extend the limits of the jurisdiction of the Rhyl Improvement Commissioners, and to enable them to make new and extend existing roads, to construct works for sewerage and sewage utilization, to acquire the undertakings of the Rhyl Bridge Company, and the Rhyl Promenade Pier Company Limited, and to make further provision with respect to new streets and buildings, and the improvement and government of the town of Rhyl.

An Act for securing the purification and preventing the pollution of the water of the Trent and Leen in and in the neighbourhood of the town of Nottingham; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the construction of a railway from Waterford to Dungarvan and Lismore, in the county of Waterford, to be called the Waterford, Dungarvan, and Lismore Railway; and for other purposes.

An Act for empowering the Local Board of Health for the district of Haworth, in the parish of Bradford, in the West Riding of the county of York, to make and to supply gas, and for confirming an agreement between them and the Haworth Gas Company Limited for the purchase of that Company's undertaking, and for conferring powers on the Local Board in relation to the regulation of buildings, streets, slaughter-houses, and other matters; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the Local Board of Health for the district of Keighley to construct additional waterworks; to confer upon them further powers with respect to works heretofore authorised to be constructed; to make fresh regulations with respect to streets and buildings; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the construction of a railway from the South Wales Railway, in the parish of Lydney, across the River Severn, to Holly Hazle Brook, in the parish of Berkeley; with branches; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the construction of the Louth and East Coast Railway.

An Act for the amalgamation of the Greenock and Ayrshire Railway Company with the Glasgow and South Western Railway Company; and for other purposes.

An Act to define and extend the powers of the Corporation and of the Local Board of Health of Darlington in relation to Gas and Water Supply, and other matters; to extend the boundaries of the borough; to authorise the construction of river diversions; bridge improvement; gas-works, and other works; to amend the Acts in force within the borough; to borrow money; and for other purposes.

The Narberth Road and Maenclochog Railway.

Certificate of the Board of Trade for the Construction of the Railway.

Preamble.

WHEREAS Edward Cropper, of Swaylands, Penshurst, in the County of Kent, Esquire, the promoter of the Narberth Road and Maenclochog Railway, has contracted for the purchase of the lands required for the railway and the works connected therewith, and has complied with the requirements of "The Railways Construction Facilities Act, 1864," and the "Railways (Powers and Construction) Acts, 1864, Amendment Act, 1870:"

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade do, by this their Certificate, in pursuance of the said Acts, and by virtue and in exercise of the powers thereby in them vested, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, certify as follows:

Short Title.

1. This Certificate may be cited as "The Narberth Road and Maenclochog Railway Certificate, 1872," and the railway authorized by this Certificate shall be called "The Narberth Road and Maenclochog Railway."

Interpretation.

2. The expression "the Railway," used in this Certificate shall mean and include the railway and undertaking authorized by this Certificate, both before and after the completion thereof; and, unless the context forbids, shall also include all powers for the making, maintaining, and working thereof, or otherwise incidental thereto, conferred by this Certificate. The expression "the said Edward Cropper," in this Certificate, shall mean and include the said Edward Cropper, his heirs and assigns, or other the person or Company, other than a lessee, for a term of years, and other than a mortgagee who has not entered into possession or into receipt of tolls and profits from time to time entitled to the possession or to the receipt of the tolls and profits of the railway. The expression "The Agreement" shall mean the agreement set forth in the second part of the schedule to this Certificate, and intended to be confirmed by this Certificate.

Name of Proprietor.

3. Subject to the provisions of this Certificate the said Edward Cropper may, on the lands purchased by him, make and maintain in the lines, and according to the levels shown on the deposited plans and sections, the railway and works shown on the deposited plans and sections, and the said Edward Cropper shall be empowered to take by agreement lands for extraordinary purposes.

Description of Railway.

4. The railway authorized by this Certificate is a railway about 7 miles and 4 furlongs in length, and commences at a point on the Great Western (South Wales) Railway, in the parish of Egremont, in the county of Caermarthen, about 67 yards west of the 265th mile-post on the line of the Great Western Railway, and terminates in the parish of Maenclochog, in the county of Pembroke, at a slate quarry called the Rosebush Quarry, in the occupation of Joseph Babington Macaulay, Esq., on the south side of a certain slate shed, numbered 95 on the deposited plans.

Confirmation of Agreement with Great Western Company.

5. The agreement, dated the 3rd day of July, 1871, made between Edward Cropper of the one

part, and the Great Western Railway Company of the other part, set forth in the second part of the schedule to this Certificate, is hereby confirmed and made binding on the parties thereto respectively, and full effect may and shall be given thereto, and the expression "the said Edward Cropper" in the said agreement, shall have the same meaning as in this Certificate.

Powers to Proprietor.

6. The said Edward Cropper may appoint a secretary, treasurer, or any other servant or functionary usually necessary or employed for the carrying on the business of a railway; and any Act, which in the case of a Railway Company can only be or is usually done under the seal of the Company, may be effectually done by any writing under the hand of the said Edward Cropper or his duly authorized agent.

Borrowing Powers.

7. The said Edward Cropper may borrow on mortgage on the security of the railway, any sum whatever, at any time, and any Company in whom the railway may become vested may borrow money on the said security, subject to the provisions of the 29th section of "the Railways Construction Facilities Act, 1864," provided always that proof that one-fifth of the capital authorized to be raised by this Certificate has been expended for the purposes of this Certificate shall be substituted for the proof required to be given under paragraph 1 of the said section. For the purposes of this section the capital authorized to be raised by this Certificate shall be deemed to be £42,247.

Leasing.

8. The said Edward Cropper shall have power to lease the railway when completed to any person or Company, either with or without any rights or powers conferred on the said Edward Cropper by the agreement, and with or without any exceptions or reservations for any term of years, and after the grant of any lease and possession taken by the lessee thereunder, the said Edward Cropper shall, subject as by this Certificate otherwise provided, be free from all liability on account of the working of the railway and otherwise with reference thereto, incurred subsequently to time of possession having been so taken, and during the continuance of the lease, and such liability after possession taken by the lessee and during the continuance of the lease, shall, subject as aforesaid, attached to and be borne by the lessee alone, in like manner as the same would have attached to and been borne by the said Edward Cropper if the lease had never been made.

Sale.

9. The said Edward Cropper shall have power to sell and convey the fee-simple and inheritance of the railway, or any part thereof, or share therein, either with or without any rights or powers conferred on the said Edward Cropper by the agreement, to any person or company, and after a conveyance of the fee-simple and inheritance of the whole railway and possession taken thereunder by the person or Company to whom the same is conveyed, the person or Company making the conveyance shall, subject as by this Certificate otherwise provided, be free from all liability on account of the working of the railway, or otherwise with reference thereto incurred subsequently to the time of possession having been so taken, and such liability, after possession taken as aforesaid, shall, subject as aforesaid, attach to and be

borne by the person or Company to whom the railway may be conveyed in like manner as the same would have attached to and been borne by the person or Company making the conveyance in case no conveyance had been made.

Power to devise.

10. The said Edward Cropper may by will dispose of the railway and all rights and powers conferred by the agreement in like manner as he might dispose of the fee-simple and inheritance of land.

Effect of devise or Intestacy.

11. A devise by will and possession taken by the devisee, or a descent on intestacy and possession taken by the heir-at-law, shall have the same result and effect as regards liability as a conveyance to such devisee or heir-at-law and possession taken thereunder would have had.

Liability of Person having Estate less than a Fee.

12. Every person entitled by conveyance, devise or otherwise, to the possession of the railway, and having taken possession thereof in right of an estate of freehold less than an estate in fee shall, from the time of possession taken and during the continuance of his estate, subject as by this Certificate otherwise provided, be liable in like manner as a person seised in fee.

Liability of two or more Persons in Possession.

13. When, and if this railway or any term or estate therein shall become vested in possession in two or more persons, they shall be jointly and severally liable on account of the working of the railway and otherwise, with reference thereto.

Gauge.

14. The gauge of the railway shall be that of 4 feet 8½ inches, but the said Edward Cropper may make and maintain an additional line or additional lines of railway of any narrower gauge not less than 2 feet upon any part of the lands purchased by him.

Level Crossings.

15. Subject to the provisions in "The Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845," and in part I. (relating to construction of a railway) of "The Railways Clauses Act, 1863," contained in reference to the crossing of roads on the level, the said Edward Cropper may construct the railway with a single line of rails only whilst the railway shall consist of a single line, or with a double line of rails across and on the level of the roads next hereinafter mentioned (that is to say)—

16. In altering for the purposes of this Certificate the roads next hereinafter mentioned, the

Tolls.

17. The said Edward Cropper may demand and take in respect of the use of the railway, and the portion of the Great Western (South Wales) Railway over which running powers are conferred on him by the agreement, any tolls not exceeding those set forth in the first part of the schedule to this Certificate, provided always that the regulations set forth at the end of part III. of the schedule to the "Railways Construction Facilities Act, 1864," shall be incorporated in and considered to form part of the first part of the schedule to this Certificate.

into contracts or arrangements with respect to the following purposes or any of them, that is to say:—

"The management, use, working or maintenance of the railway, or of any part or parts thereof.

"The supply of any rolling or working stock, or of officers and servants, for the conduct of the traffic on the railways.

"The payments to be made and the conditions to be performed with respect to the matters aforesaid.

"The interchange, accommodation, conveyance and delivery of traffic coming from or destined for the undertaking of the contracting persons or companies, and the fixing and division by the said Edward Cropper and the Great Western Railway Company of the receipts arising from such traffic."

Contracting Powers.

18. The said Edward Cropper on the one hand, and the Great Western Railway Company on the other hand, may from time to time enter

Traffic arrangement with Great Western.

19. During the continuance of any agreement made under the provisions of the last preceding clause of this Certificate, the railway and that portion of the Great Western Railway over which running powers are conferred on the said Edward Cropper by the agreement, shall for the purposes of tolls and charges be considered as one railway, and in estimating the amount of tolls and charges in respect of traffic conveyed partly on the railway and partly on the before mentioned portion of the Great Western Railway or either of them, for a less distance than six miles, tolls and charges may be charged as for six miles.

Rights of Edward Cropper over Great Western Line.

20. Subject to the provisions of the agreement and to all rights, otherwise vested in the Great Western Railway Company, all the rights, powers, and remedies of the said Edward Cropper in respect of the railway and the working thereof, or otherwise with reference thereto vested in him by virtue of this Certificate, including the making and enforcing of bye laws shall extend and may be exercised in respect of that part of the Great Western Railway, over which running powers are by the agreement conferred upon him in like manner as such rights, powers, and remedies extend to, and may be exercised in respect of the railway authorized by this Certificate.

Ecclesiastical Commissioners to be at liberty to enter on certain Land, if Railway not worked for two years.

21. If the railway shall remain unworked for a period of two years after the completion thereof, the Bishop of St. David's, and his successors, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and their successors, shall respectively be at liberty to re-enter upon the lands in the said parish of Llanycefn, numbered 1 to 50 upon the deposited plans, lying in or near Llanycefn Parish, and contracted to be sold by them respectively to the said Edward Cropper, and to have them as of their former estate.

One Train each way per day to stop at Station on Commissioners' land.

22. When and so soon as the railway shall be opened for public passenger traffic then and thenceforward the said Edward Cropper shall cause one up train and one down train, on every day except Sunday, to stop at or near the point marked X, in a field in the parish of Llanycefn, numbered 38 on the said plans, at or near which point the said Edward Cropper has agreed with the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to erect a station and accommodation works.

Arbitration Clause.

23. If any dispute shall arise between the said Edward Cropper and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, their successors or assigns; or the Bishop of St. David's, his successors or assigns, in respect of the premises, the same shall be referred to an arbitrator to be appointed by the Board of Trade.

Notice of person in possession to be fixed at Stations.

24. Before the Railway shall be opened for public traffic there shall be fixed and after such opening there shall continue to be kept fixed in each station of the railway in a conspicuous

position a notice painted in proper legible letters, at least one inch in length, stating the name and place of residence of the person in possession of and working the railway; and on the change from time to time of the person in possession of and working the railway, such notice shall be altered accordingly, and shall be dated on the day when the alteration is made.

Liability to continue till Notice altered.

25. The person named in any notice required by the last preceding clause of this Certificate, or if the person so named be dead, his real and personal representatives estate and effects in due course of law shall for all purposes, and notwithstanding any other clauses in this Certificate remain liable on account of the working of the railway and otherwise with reference thereto for the period during which his name may continue to appear in such notice, and notwithstanding any other clauses in this Certificate, the person from time to time named in such notice, or if he be dead, his real and personal representatives, estate, and effects shall cease to be so liable only from the time when another name shall have been duly substituted in such notice pursuant to the provisions of this Certificate. But as between the person from time to time named in such notice and any other person who in substitution may have become entitled to the possession or to the receipt of the tolls or profits of the railway the person named in such notice shall be entitled to be recouped and indemnified in respect of any liability incurred, and all costs in reference thereto by the person who shall have so become intitled in substitution.

Notice to be altered only by order of Justice.

26. A notice as to the person in possession of and working the railway when once fixed as required by this Certificate shall not be altered, except upon an order made by a Justice of the Peace for the County of Carmarthen, and any such Justice is hereby authorized to make an order directing an alteration in such notice upon production of a statutory declaration by the person whose name is sought to be substituted in the notice to the effect that by virtue of the deed, will, or other means to be shortly referred to in such declaration he is duly entitled to the possession of the railway, and is about to take possession of and work the same, or that he is already duly in possession of, and is working the railway.

Order of Justice to be deposited with the Board of Trade.

27. Every order of a Justice made under the last preceding section, and the statutory declaration whereon the order is grounded shall within fourteen days after the date of such order be deposited with the Board of Trade.

In case of default Tolls not recoverable.

28. If default shall be made in duly fixing and keeping fixed as required by this Certificate at any station of the railway, the notice as to the person in possession of and working the railway, or in depositing with the Board of Trade any Justice's order or statutory declaration required to be deposited by the last preceding clause then all tolls and charges authorized by this Certificate, and which, but for this present provision, would have become due during the period of default shall absolutely cease to be demandable, payable, or recoverable.

Forms in Schedule.

29. The notice order of a Justice and statutory declaration referred to in the preceding clauses of this Certificate may respectively be in the forms contained in the third part of the schedule to this certificate with such variations as the circumstances of the case may require.

Provision in case of a Company entitled.

30. In case any Company shall be about to take possession of and work the railway, any declaration or other Act required by this certificate, but not capable of being made or done by a body corporate may be made or done on behalf of the Company by the Secretary or by the Chairman of the Directors of the Company.

Provision in case of Great Western Railway Company becoming entitled.

31. If at any time the fee-simple and inheritance of the railway should become vested in the Great Western Railway Company or other Railway Company duly incorporated by Act of Parliament or Certificate then and thenceforth the provisions contained in this Certificate with reference to fixing notice of the person in possession of and working the railway, and all consequential provisions shall cease to have effect.

PART II.

The Agreement, dated the third day of July, 1871, and made between Edward Cropper of the one part, and the Great Western Railway Company of the other part, referred to in the foregoing Certificate.

Agreement made the 3rd day of July, 1871, between Edward Cropper of Swaylands, Penshurst, in the County of Kent, Esquire, of the one part, and the Great Western Railway Company of the other part.

WHEREAS the said Edward Cropper intends to construct a railway, hereinafter called "the Railway," from or near to a point adjoining the Great Western Railway, about one mile and one furlong westward of the Narberth Road Station on that railway, to Maenclochog, in the county of Pembroke, and for that purpose is about to apply to the Board of Trade for a Certificate, according to the statute in that behalf provided, and the Great Western Railway Company have agreed to lay down on their existing railways, between the

commencement of the said intended railway and the Narberth Road Station, a third line of rails, and it has accordingly been agreed between the said parties hereto and their executors, administrators, successors, and assigns respectively, as follows:

1. Subject as hereinafter provided, the Great Western Railway Company shall, in case the said Edward Cropper, within two years from the date hereof shall give them notice to that effect, within twelve calendar months after receiving such notice from the said Edward Cropper, such notice to be in writing, and to be served on the Secretary of the Great Western Railway Company at his office at the Paddington Station, and to be so served at least twelve calendar months before the intended opening of the railway for public traffic, lay down on their railway a third line of rails on the narrow gauge from their Narberth Road Station to a point marked A on the plan annexed hereto, where the said railway to be made by the said Edward Cropper, shall commence, so that with the third line of rails to be

laid down by the Great Western Railway Company as aforesaid, and the railway to be made by the said Edward Cropper, there shall be one continuous line of rails from the said Narberth Road Station to Maenclochog aforesaid. Provided always that the said Edward Cropper shall not give such notice before the construction of the said railway to be constructed by him has been commenced.

2. The said third line of rails shall be and remain the property of the Great Western Railway Company, and that Company shall, after the completion of the said third line of rails, maintain the same in good working order and condition, and shall afford to the said Edward Cropper all proper and necessary facilities for the passage thereon of engines, carriages, and waggons, properly constructed or adapted for passing over railways on the narrow gauge.

3. The said Edward Cropper may pass over and use with his engines and carriages properly constructed and for the purposes of traffic of all kinds arising on the railway to be constructed by him, or any part thereof, and destined for the Narberth Road Station, or arising at that station and destined for the said railway or any part thereof, (hereinafter called local traffic), and also for traffic of all kinds to be interchanged with the said Great Western Railway Company (hereinafter called through traffic), the said third line of rails on the said Great Western Railway, and the said Edward Cropper may fix the fares, rates and charges for local traffic, not exceeding those mentioned in the said Certificate to be granted by the said Board of Trade, and in the schedule thereto for such traffic passing or intended to pass over the said third line of rails to or from the railway to be constructed by the said Edward Cropper or any part thereof, but should the Great Western Railway Company object to any of the fares, rates, and charges fixed by the said Edward Cropper for traffic passing over the said third line of rails, the same shall be settled by arbitration as hereinafter provided.

4. The powers of user of the said third line of rails and station hereby conferred on the said Edward Cropper, shall not be exercised in any way hostilely to the Great Western Railway Company, or to compete for traffic with that Company, but this provision shall not apply to any railway which may hereafter be constructed or worked by the Great Western Railway Company to or in the direction of Fishguard.

5. The Great Western Company shall accept as the proportion of the receipts applicable to the said third line of rails, for traffic passing over the same, a mileage proportion of the fares, rates, and charges charged or made in respect of such traffic and the length of such third line of rails shall for such purposes be calculated at one and a half miles.

6. The said Edward Cropper shall pay to the Great Western Railway Company, for or in respect of the laying of the said third line of rails, the sum of £2,700 in monthly payments, according to the work constructed, and the certificate of the engineer of the Great Western Railway Company, and the engineer of the said Edward Cropper, or their umpire in case they disagree, shall be taken as conclusive with respect to such work. The first payment shall be made at the end of the first month after the work has been commenced, and the other payments monthly as the work progresses thereafter.

7. The Great Western Railway Company shall as hereinbefore provided, maintain at all times in an efficient and serviceable condition the said third line of rails to be laid down by them as

aforesaid, and the said Edward Cropper shall out of the first gross receipts of the said third line of rails at the end of each half year from the opening of the said third line of rails for traffic, repay to them the amount of the cost of such repairs and maintenance, the first payment to be made on the 30th day of June, or the 31st day of December, whichever shall first happen after the opening of the said third line of rails for the proportionate time during which the same shall have been opened. Provided always that such third line of rails shall not be used by the said Great Western Railway Company so as to interfere with the proper and convenient user of the said third line of rails by the said Edward Cropper, and that if the said third line of rails shall be used by the said Great Western Railway Company they shall contribute a share of the expense of such repairs and maintenance proportioned to the amount of their user thereof.

8. All the tolls, rates and charges annually earned upon the said third line of rails shall be paid and disposed of in order of priority, in manner following:—

1. A sum equal to the amount annually paid to the Great Western Railway Company by the said Edward Cropper for and in consideration of the maintenance by the said Great Western Railway Company of the said third line of rails, shall be annually paid thereout to the said Edward Cropper.

2. A sum of £20 per cent. upon the gross amount of such toll shall be annually paid thereout to the said Edward Cropper, as a compensation to him for the working expense thereof.

3. A sum of £135 thereout shall annually be paid to the said Edward Cropper.

4. After payment to the said Edward Cropper of the three several sums hereinbefore mentioned, the whole residue of the said tolls, rates, and charges earned upon the said third line of rails, shall belong and be payable to the said Great Western Railway Company.

9. The said Edward Cropper shall keep true and perfect accounts of all traffic, and of the receipts from all traffic carried on or over the said third line of rails, and the accounts to be so kept shall be kept with such details and vouchers as are proper and sufficient for the full elucidation and for ensuring the correctness thereof, and for showing how the receipts from the traffic passing on or over the said third line of rails have been paid or disposed of; and the accounts and vouchers so kept shall be open at all reasonable times for the inspection and transcription of the accountants of the Great Western Railway Company; and the said Edward Cropper will afford all proper facilities for the inspection and transcription of such accounts; and such accounts shall be made up to the 30th day of June and the 31st day of December in each year.

10.
