THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby revoke The Schleswig and Holstein Cattle Order of 1872 : Provided that nothing herein shall invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order before this Order takes effect, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, (in this Order referred to as the Act of 1869,) and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

Subject to the provisions contained in the Orders of Council relating to the ports of Granton and Leith, dated the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and in the Order of Council relating to the port of Southampton, dated the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, all the regulations in the Fourth Schedule to the Act of 1869 shall apply to sheep and goats brought to Great

Britain from any place in the Empire of Germany, and landed in Great Britain, and all such sheep and goats shall be slaughtered within ten days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto William Henry Bullock, of Westley, in the county of Cambridge, Esquire, Her Royal licence and authority that he and his issue may, in compliance with a clause contained in the last will and testament of John Hull, late of Six Mile Bottom, in the said county of Cambridge, Esquire, General in Her Majesty's Army, and Colonel of the 19th Regiment of Hussars, deceased, take and use the surname of Hall only, in lieu and instead of that of Bullock, and that he and they may bear the arms of Hall quarterly with his and their family arms ; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the College of Arms, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect :

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
