

The Bankruptcy Act, 1861.**Notice of the Granting of Order of Discharge.**

The Bankrupt hereinafter named has had an Order of Discharge granted as hereinafter mentioned, by the Court acting in prosecution of the Bankruptcy, and such Order will be delivered to the Bankrupt unless an appeal be duly entered against the judgment of the Court, and notice thereof be given to the Court :—

John Clegg, of Britannia, near Bacup, in the county of Lancaster, Innkeeper, adjudicated bankrupt on the 31st day of May, 1866. An Order of Discharge was granted by the County Court of Lancashire, holden at Bacup, on the 6th day of August, 1872.

UPON reading the report of the Trustee of the property of the above-named bankrupt, dated the 19th day of

July, 1872, reporting that a First and Final Dividend of fifteen shillings in the pound, offered by William Hanson, of Werneth-road, Oldham, Cotton Spinner, had been accepted by the Trustee, with the sanction of the creditors present at a General Meeting held for that purpose, on the 28th day of May last, as appeared by the special resolution duly passed by them, filed in this matter, and that in consideration of the payment of such dividend and the costs of the said proceedings by the said William Hanson, the trustee was by such resolution authorized and empowered to sell and transfer the property and effects of the said bankrupt to the said William Hanson, and also that the trustee had duly advertised and declared the said dividend of fifteen shillings in the pound, and had, at the date of the said report, paid the same to all the creditors, with one exception, of the said bankrupt who had proved their debts, as shown by the schedule annexed to the said report, and the Judge having since approved of the said special resolution, and this Court, being satisfied with the said report, doth order and declare the bankruptcy of the said George Williams has closed.—Given under the Seal of the Court this 2nd day of August, 1872.

In the County Court of Gloucestershire, holden at Gloucester.

In the Matter of George Harman, of Puckshole Mill, near Stroud, in the county of Gloucester, carrying on business in copartnership with Timothy Harris Adey, as Cloth Manufacturers, a Bankrupt.

UPON reading a report of the Trustee of the property of the bankrupt, dated the 24th day of January, 1872, reporting that the whole of the property of the bankrupt has been realized for the benefit of his creditors, and a Dividend to the amount of one shilling and a halfpenny in the pound has been paid, the Court being satisfied that the whole of the property of the bankrupt has been realized for the benefit of his creditors, and a dividend to the amount of one shilling and a halfpenny in the pound has been paid, doth order and declare that the bankruptcy of the said George Harman has closed.—Given under the Seal of the Court this 24th day of January, 1872.

A Warrant of Protection has been granted to the Bankrupt till the meeting for election of Trustee.
