ORDER SETTLING THE BOUNDARIES OF A DISTRICT TO BE STYLED THE DISTRICT OF DALTON-IN-FURNESS, IN THE COUNTY OF LANCASTER.

WHEREAS a Petition has been presented to the Local Government Board from owners and ratepayers resident within the parish of Daltonin-Furness, in the county of Lancaster, praying for the settlement of boundaries of a district to be styled the district of "Dalton-in-Furness," for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858: And whereas the said Petition set forth the proposed boundaries of the district, and was signed by one-tenth of the ratepayers resident within such boundaries, and inquiry has since been made as to the genuineness of the said Petition, and the propriety of the proposed boundaries, by Arnold Taylor, Esq., the Inspector appointed by the Local Government Board for that purpose:

Now, therefore, we, the said Local Government Board, after consideration of the matter, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in us by the Local Government Act, 1858, and the Local Government Board Act, 1871, make order:—
