From Saxany we are advertifed that the Elector has laten 1: given our Conmiflions for railing, a confilerable force. That a great Alemliy is to be fpeedily held at Brunfwich between che Painces of the -ircles of Weftphalia and Kbine, to renew an ancient Leigue between them : that at Strajbourgh they are s ifing forces, and that the Prince Electar Palatine has already lourt oufand Foot and 1002 Horle in readineis.

Paris, Mrart. 3. The 28tb paft, the Parliament, the Chanber of Accounts, ma the Courts of Aids and Mo--peys, attended His Majefty ar St. Germaines ca Layc, to complement him upon his late fuccels in Frazche comtc. The Sieur du Pleffis Secretary of State, and she Sieur de saintof, Alafter of the Ceremonies, receiving them at the place appointed for ther meatiog, and thenceconducting them to their Audience.

The next day the Great Council made the fame Adrefles to $\mathrm{Hr} \mathrm{M}_{1}$ elty, all the forreign Miniters having alfuatteended His Majefty upon the fame account.

The Count de Vefq re, Captain of the Guar's to the Duke of Savoy, who was uefigned to baye attended His Majelly in Franolec come upon the fams Ceremeny of Congratula. tion, being prevented by His fudden deturn, is now aniived here in poft u,on the fame errand.
This day the Envoys foom the Princes of Germany, are to hawe thair Aulience, in whi b the Envoyefrom Saxon', is choien to $\mathrm{pe} k$ in the name of the reft.
Letters of the s gich patt fom Ville Fiancle neer the Pypena,ins, inform us that a party of 300 Spaniards, inicvenge of an inroad formerly made into their Territories by the Sieur de Foucault, had mar hed intoour Quareers lading themielves with a confidetable plunder ; but the Ccuntrey people taking the Allarm, and getting into arms, encouraged by the addition of fome Troops quartered amongit them, had fallen upon them in their retreat, balling many of them upon the place, taking feveral prifoners, and am noft them about twenty Office $s$, which theg lent afterward into Ville Francbe, and recovering all thei booty.
From St. Sebaftian we are told that Don $\ddagger u$ un of Aun firia is fuddenly expected there, where preparation is making for his Imbarcation with the forces which are to attend, and be rranfported with him for oftend.
Monfeur do Ecaufort is lafely arrived at Breffe, where he is raking care for the futing out our Fleet to Sea. His Majenly intends tote eanly this Spring in the Field, and that the Army Olall meet at a General Rendezvo sat $A m i$ exs the 1 sth of April, and immediately emp loy themfelves upon fome conliderable adtion, if the Peace provent chem not.

The Marefhall de Schulembergh, Governour of Berry, is lately deceated at one of his Countrey Houles, and 'ris Ggid, las by his laft Will and Teftament left His Majefty his Heir.

The Ceremony for the Bapitm of the Dauphix, will be fuddenly folemnized, but His Mejelly is not yet relolved whether in this City or at St . Gcrrearns

The Sieur de Verjus is departed from hence, intending with all diligence to embark himfe'f for Lisbon.

The Jefuits in the Diocels of Pamiers having refufed Obedience to the Bifhop of that place, and contemned his Orders fent to them; His Majefty upon complaint made, has given leave to the Biftop to proceed againft them by Excommunications according to the Priviledges of the Gallicane Church, which he has already began to pur in prattice. The Bifhop of Sens having allo lufpended them from all Funcions, forbidding them either to preach, teach, or confefs any perfons withit his Diocels, cenfuring their DoArines as pernicious and dangeious, for the corrupting and perverting the younger and more unwary people.

Bruges Mar. 4, About threc days fince arrived at Dflend thiree Spanifh ohips with about 1000 Souldiers from spain, nil of them in gcod condition, and under the comman. of good Officers; yefterday the $\ddagger$ reateft part of them marched Cy chis place.for, Ghent. This poorning weare advifed of a
great hody of the French forces that are now marching about Bernem, 'tisfuppoled they 11 da delign to have intercepted the faid Spaniaris in thei paltage, and to make their way imo the Ealt part of the Countrey, but we hope have failid in the fi ft, and may probably be daveried from the iecon. Yefterday they plundered the horfes of all fuch coumtrey peop e as not being under their Contribution, they could End pafling to or from this Market. Tle oftend and Glent boars have now their protediors from His Moft ChriItian Majelty for their fee paftage with People and Goodes excepting always Souldiers and Arms. We iuddenly expeet the arrival of bon fuan, who has by his Leters already writt $n$ to the $S$ at s tuincourage them to improve their inteIft; to the utmolt for the def.uce of thofe Countreys. The Quecn h ving alio by her Lecteers to the Prince de Ligny and Count de drarcine, confirmed them in there C arges.

From $I$ ills we have incelligence that grear quantities of Anmunition bave been late'y $j$ (ppordthfrom Lille in Carts preft out of the Co nerey, but for what imployment is not faid.

Th: Marquis de Catel Rodrigo is ieturned from Anteverp to Brujfis, as are alfo the Deputies fom the States General of the United Provinces, to whoni his Excellency has giyen Audince. This weck feveral pifo ers were brought it Bruffels, who pretendius tiemfelves to be enemies, had fitied on feverel of the Inhabitants, zud furced cherm to a ranfom ; they have been already examined, and theis Piocefs wil is little time be formed for their due puniftmont.

Bruffclls, March 6. All Military Officers are by his Excellency the Marquifs de Cafich Rodrigo's Orders to repair forthwith to their refpective Charges, under pain of being difplaced.
The gth in tant two French Spies were feifed on, as they were privately furveying the Works, and rblerving the firength of this place The fame day near 40 French were brought it Pri oner, lately taken by fome party we had lene abroad: The Body of their Army cominues between Lifle and Tournay, but their delign fill concealcd.

Porifmouth, Feb. 27. On Tu-dday laft Sit Tbomas Ale len with his fyuad on a rive' at St. Ellens Road, where he mutwich Monfecur dede Rackes and another man of war and hts Company, pafing from Coxes, and going out to kea, whom, (afier ite sfual falueation and Ceremoni s upon fuch occasions) Sir Tl:omas commanded abuard him, and prevailed with him to difmifs an Oftender, whom fome days before lie had irregularly taken out of Torbay, and to dií charge above an hundred Eng ifh which he had aboard him, afrer which, they came all together to an anchor at spithead, where they are now riding.
