REGULATIONS FOR HER MAJESTY'S DIPLOMATIC SERVICE.

Revised and confirmed by Earl Granville,
December 16, 1872.

1. *Nomination, Qualification, and Examination of Candidates for Attachés.*

CANDIDATES nominated for Attachés in the Diplomatic Service must pass an examination before the Civil Service Commissioners; and at the time of presenting themselves

for it they must have completed the twentieth year of their age, and must not have exceeded the twenty-sixth. They must be prepared to present themselves for examination within three months from the date of their nomination.

Candidates, subject to the exceptions hereinafter stated, must satisfy the examiners in respect to the following points:—

1. Orthography.
2. Handwriting.
3. Précis writing.
4. That they are well grounded in Latin grammar, and are able to construe and parse a portion of some good classical Latin author, and to give the derivation of words.
5. That they are acquainted with the first four rules of arithmetic and decimal fractions, as given in Colenso's arithmetic, and with the first book of Euclid.
6. That they have a general knowledge of geography.
7. That they have a general knowledge of French grammar, that they can converse fluently in the French language on ordinary topics, and translate correctly from French into English, and from English into French.
8. That they have a general knowledge of the constitutional history of England, to be acquired from Blackstone's "Commentaries" (Ker's edition, 1862), and Hallam's "Constitutional History of England."
9. That they have a general knowledge of the political history of Europe, and of the United States of North America, from the Treaty of Paris, in 1815, to the Treaty of Villafranca, in 1860, comprising an acquaintance with the most important international transactions during that period.
10. That they have a general knowledge of Political Economy, to be acquired from Adam Smith's "Wealth of Nations" and Mill's "Political Economy."
11. That they are generally intelligent, as evinced by the manner in which they acquit themselves under examination, and specifically by the quickness they may show in seizing the points in papers read by them, or read over to them, once or twice.

2. *Candidates who may be exempted from part of the Examination.*

Candidates who, after statutable residence, have taken a degree in one of the Universities of the

United Kingdom, will be exempted from examination in all the above-mentioned subjects, except Handwriting, Précis, and French.

Candidates who have passed the first public examination in Classics at one of the Universities in Great Britain or Ireland, or at the Royal Academy at Woolwich, or one of the public examinations for the Army or Navy, will be exempted from being examined in Latin; but candidates claiming this exemption must, on going up for examination, exhibit to the Civil Service Commissioners a certificate from the duly constituted authorities, examiners, or others under whom they have been examined, that they have passed the first public examination in Classics, in whatever manner that examination may have been conducted, and to whatever point directed.

3. *Period of Service of Attachés.*

The services of Attachés will reckon from the date of the certificate granted by the Civil Service Commissioners, and will be considered as probationary for two years from that date, during which period the Attachés must have been employed for six months in the Foreign Office, and must also have actually resided at one of Her Majesty's Embassies or Missions abroad; or have been actually employed in the Foreign Office for such a time as in the aggregate will make up a further period of eighteen months, exclusive of any leave of absence, during either period. The time, however, necessarily employed in journeys to and from Missions out of Europe, will be allowed to count towards the completion of the required term: If these conditions as to employment and residence have not been fulfilled at the expiration of two years from the date of the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, the probationary period will be prolonged until they have been fulfilled.

4. *Commission as Third Secretaries; 5. And a salary of £150 a year.*

Commissions as Third Secretaries under Her Majesty's Sign-Manual will be granted to Attachés on the termination of the probationary period, and on the fulfilment of the conditions specified in the present Regulations, together with a salary at the rate of £150 a year; provided that their general character and conduct, during the time they have served, have been satisfactory; and that the Minister under whom they have last served certifies that, as far as he has the means of forming an opinion, they understand and speak French well, and also one other foreign language.

6. *Allowance of £100 a year for Knowledge of Public Law.*

Third Secretaries who may after examination satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they possess a competent knowledge of public law, will receive while serving in that class an additional allowance of £100 a year.

7. *Second Secretaries.*

Second Secretaries will constitute an intermediate Class between Third Secretaries and Secretaries of Legation. They will receive a minimum salary of £300 a year, increasing by £15 a year, till it reaches a maximum of £450 a year. But Second Secretaries at those posts to which a higher salary than £300 a year is assigned, will not receive this annual increment until they shall be entitled by length of service to a salary greater than that so assigned.

8. *Employment and Designation of Second and Third Secretaries.*

Secretaries of the Second and Third Classes may, at the discretion of the Secretary of State, be appointed indiscriminately to serve either in an Embassy or Mission, without reference to their previous employment in one or other of them. They are to be designated as Third or Second Secretary in the Specific Embassy or Mission in which they may at that time be employed, but not as Third or Second Secretary of Embassy or Legation.

9. *Special Allowance of £100 a year for Languages.*

Any Secretary of Embassy or of Legation, Second or Third Secretary or Attaché on probation, who shall be reported by the head of the Mission in which he is employed, to possess a competent knowledge, colloquial or otherwise, for ordinary purposes, of the Russian, Turkish, Persian, Japanese, or Chinese language, while serving in any country where such language is vernacular, shall receive a special allowance of £100 a year over and above any other salary or allowance which he may be in receipt of.

10. *Rules as to pensions of the Fourth Class.*

In virtue of Her Majesty's Commissions, the service of Second and Third Secretaries will count for their pensions, under the Act of 32 and 33 Vict., cap. 43, from the date of the issue of their first Commission; but the amount of pension to be assigned to them will be calculated, so long as they remain Second or Third Secretaries, for each year that has elapsed since the date of their first Commission at one-thirtieth part of the last salary of which they were in receipt at the time of the pension being granted; provided that no pension shall continue to be issued to a person not incapacitated by ill-health, medically certified, who may decline active service before he has reached the sixtieth year of his age, after which age no person shall be required to serve as Second or Third Secretary.

11. *Period of Service in the same Embassy or Mission.*

Second or Third Secretaries and Attachés, as a general rule, will not be employed for more than two years in the same Embassy or Mission, exclusive of the periods during which they may have been absent on leave. But the Secretary of State reserves to himself full power to extend the term beyond two years in every case in which he judges that there are special public reasons for so doing.

12. *Salary of Secretary of Legation.*

The minimum Salary of a Secretary of Legation will be 500*l.* a year.

13. *Travelling Expenses.*

Secretaries of Embassy or Legation, Second and Third Secretaries, and Attachés, will, on their first appointment, or on any subsequent removal for promotion or other public reason, be allowed their actual travelling expenses by land, or the actual amount of their passages by sea, either from England to their post, or from one foreign post to another; and in the case of Secretaries of Embassy or Legation, and of Second Secretaries, the like expenses will be allowed to them for one servant, if they have one; and they will further be allowed subsistence money for themselves, but not for their servant, at the rate of one pound a day, while travelling by land, and by sea if sub-

sistence is not included in the passage money. In the event of a passage being afforded to Secretaries or Attachés on board one of Her Majesty's ships of war, the allowances made will be in conformity with the Admiralty Regulations. But the travelling expenses and subsistence of the families of Secretaries or Attachés will not be allowed.

No allowance will be made to Members of the Diplomatic Service for journeys undertaken for their own convenience, in pursuance of leave of absence.

14. Secretaries and Attachés may be required to carry Despatches.

In the case of any journey of which the expense is to be allowed, all Secretaries and Attachés will be bound to take charge of despatches, if required; and in that case they will be expected to perform the journey without delaying on the road.

15. Members of the Diplomatic Service to go to any Posts to which they may be appointed.

It is to be distinctly understood that, in future, all the Members of the Diplomatic Service will be expected to take their turn in whatever part of the world their services may be required, and that, except as regards Teheran and Peking, where no accommodation can be procured for married men, every Secretary or Attaché, whether married or unmarried, must be prepared to go to the post at which the requirements of the Public Service demand his presence, and to which he may be appointed.

16. Interchange of Employment between Second and Third Secretaries, and Junior Clerks in the Foreign Office.

The Secretary of State, should he see occasion, will, for the advantage of the Public Service, allow Second and Third Secretaries, and Attachés, to interchange for a time their duties with Clerks of the three Junior Classes in the Foreign Office; the several parties being bound, for the whole period through which the interchange extends, in every respect to perform the duties and to submit to the obligations attaching to the situation which they may temporarily occupy.

The Secretary of State will, moreover, if he sees reason to do so, direct such temporary interchange of duties to be made, irrespective of the wishes of the parties, between Second or Third Secretaries, or Attachés, and Clerks in the Foreign Office; or he will direct such persons to be employed for a time, at home or abroad, without any interchange, making in either case any allowance to such parties that he may consider just and reasonable.

In the case of temporary interchanges between Secretaries and Clerks, they will respectively rank, in the Embassy or Mission, and Foreign Office, as the case may be, during the period for which the interchange shall last, after the Junior in the class of Secretaries or Clerks to which either of them belongs.

A First-Class Junior Clerk who may be permanently transferred to the Diplomatic Service, will receive a Commission as Second Secretary; a Second or Third Class Junior Clerk will similarly receive a Commission as Third Secretary.

Junior Clerks in the Foreign Office temporarily employed in a Special, or in an Ordinary Embassy or Mission, will in like manner receive, according to their class, Acting Commissions as Second or Third Secretaries.

17. Annual Reports on conduct of Junior Secretaries and Attachés.

Heads of Missions will be required to report annually, on the 1st of January in each year, to the Secretary of State the mode in which during so much of the preceding year as they shall have served in such Mission, each Second and Third Secretary and Attaché in his Mission has discharged his public duty, and such reports will be duly considered before any promotion or increase of pay or promotion is accorded to the persons to whom they apply. These reports will be considered to be strictly confidential, and it will rest with the Secretary of State to determine as to extenuating circumstances when they are unfavourable.

18. Promotion and Appointments to high Diplomatic Posts.

The Secretary of State reserves to himself the power to recommend to the Queen to name any person, even though not in the Diplomatic Service, for the higher and more responsible posts in it, and, generally, in regard to all promotions whatever in the Diplomatic Service, the Secretary of State will not be restricted by claims founded on seniority or membership of the profession from making any such selection as on his own responsibility he may deem right.

19. Duration of Appointments of Heads of Missions.

The duration of the appointments of Heads of Missions at foreign Courts shall not exceed, though it may be less than five years; and, at the expiration of five years, the question of reappointment, though in that case not involving fresh credentials, or of transfer to another Mission shall be open for consideration.

20. Deductions to be made from Salaries of Heads of Missions on Leave of Absence.

With a view to relieve the Heads of Missions on leave of absence on private grounds, the deduction to be made from their salaries will in future be limited, for a period not exceeding sixty days from the date of their departure from their posts, to the sum required to provide for the allowances of the Acting Chargé d'Affaires according to the Regulations which may be in force at the time being; on the expiration of which period the deductions will be at the rate of one-half of their salaries. Such period of sixty days may either be one of sixty consecutive days, or of sixty days occurring at intervals in the course of one year beginning on the 1st of January, and ending on the 31st of December. As regards, however, Heads of Missions whose continued residence abroad may have extended over several years, and also as regards Heads of Missions in non-European countries, the Secretary of State will be prepared to consider whether some extension of the period of exemption from being placed on half-pay beyond sixty days may not be recommended to the Treasury.

21. Addresses of Members of the Diplomatic Service. Notice to be given of Addresses of Persons on Leave of Absence, and in the case of Junior Members, of intended Departure for their Posts.

Members of the Diplomatic Service of all ranks on leave of absence must leave with or send to the Doorkeeper of the Foreign Office an address to which letters may be sent for them; and Secretaries and Attachés, previously to leaving England

to proceed to or return to their posts, must notify the time of their intended departure to one of the Under-Secretaries of State.

22. Allowances during War or Interruption of Relations.

Should an Ambassador, Minister, or Secretary of whatever class, by reason of war or other interruption of Diplomatic relations, be withdrawn from active service before his services shall have qualified him for a Diplomatic Pension of the class under which he would otherwise come, the Secretary of State will, as he may see fit, recommend that a temporary allowance should be assigned to any such person who cannot otherwise be immediately employed, calculated on the rate of pension which he would have earned if he had continued to reside in such capacity, regard being had to the length and general character of his services; such allowance, however, to be strictly subject to the condition in regard to employment specified in the XIth Section of the Act of 32nd and 33rd Vict., cap. 43, and to cease from the date of the ratification of a Treaty of Peace or the renewal of Diplomatic relations.

These Regulations will take effect from the 1st January, 1873.

THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, copies of Notices issued by the Portuguese Government, stating that the ports of Egypt and of the Black Sea are declared free from cholera morbus since the 21st November last; that the ports of Taganrog and of the Sea of Azof which were declared "infected" with cholera morbus pass to the category of "suspected" since the 23rd November last; that the ports of the Austro-Hungarian Empire are declared "infected" with cholera morbus since the 17th November last; and that Bahia is declared free from yellow fever since the 16th October last.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Madrid, inclosing the following translation of an Official Notice respecting the sanitary treatment of vessels arriving in Spain, by reason of force majeure:—

Extract from the Madrid Gazette, December 24, 1872—

In consequence of various reclamations on the part of maritime commerce as to the sanitary treatment, which some special directions apply to ships, which, under certain circumstances, put into our ports, the King has been pleased, confirming the Royal Order of May 27 of 1858, to order that those ships which may have left a foreign clean port, for another foreign port, and enter the ports of the Peninsula and adjacent Islands by force majeure, on account of any of the reasons set forth in the commercial code, shall be admitted to free pratique, provided such reason be well established, if they arrive with a clean bill of health, in a satisfactory hygienic condition and without any accident on board of a

suspicious nature, even if, as is natural, those ships not having been destined for Spain, should not be provided with the visé of the Spanish Consul.
