LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ACT IN THE PARISH OF LECKHAMPTON, GLOUCESTERSHIRE.

WHEREAS a resolution for the adoption of the Local Government Act, 1858, was, on the 23rd day of November, 1872, passed by the owners and ratepayers of the parish of Leckhampton, in the county of Gloucester; and notice of such adoption has been given, in writing, to the Local Government Board by the persons required to give the same:

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 3.)—MEDITERRANEAN—ITALY.

(1.) *Harbour Light at Gallipoli.*

THE Italian Government has given notice, that a light is now exhibited from the extremity of the mole, recently completed, at Gallipoli, Gulf of Taranto.

The light is a *fixed red* dioptric light, elevated 21 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 2 miles.

NOTE.—Vessels entering the port should keep to the north-eastward of the light.

(2.) *Alteration in New Mole Light, Naples.*

Also, that in consequence of the fall of the lighthouse on the extremity of the new mole at Naples, a lighter has been temporarily placed at the same position, from which two lights are

exhibited, vertically; the upper, a *white* light, and the lower, a *red* light: they are elevated about 26 feet, and should be seen from a distance of 2 miles.

ADRIATIC—LISSA.

(3.) *Fixed Red Light on Hoste Island.*

Also, that a harbour light is now exhibited on Hoste Island, entrance of Port S. Giorgio, Lissa Island.

The light is a *fixed red* light, elevated 72 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 5 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the sixth order.

The tower, built of white stone, is 30 feet high, octagonal shaped, and is attached to the keeper's dwelling. Position, lat. 43° 4' 30" N., long. 61° 12' 15" E.

(4.) *Leading Light at Brindisi.*

Information has been received through an Austrian notice, that a *fixed red* light is exhibited from the minaret tower standing on the quay of the town, to guide vessels mid-channel between the outer and inner harbours.

(5.) *Harbour Light at Cotrone.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 99, dated 4th November, 1872, on the establishment of a white harbour light at Cotrone, notice has been received that the colour of the light is changed to *red* to distinguish it from the lights of the town.

GUAYAQUIL RIVER.

Fixed and Flashing Light on Amortajada.

INFORMATION has been received that a new light is now exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Amortajada, or Santa Clara Island, entrance of Guayaquil River.

The light is a *fixed and flashing* white light, showing a *flash of four seconds' duration, every half minute*, elevated 256 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 24 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the third order.

The tower is white, and stands on the summit of the island. Position, lat. 3° 10' 45" S., long. 80° 24' 30" W.
