Hereas the Prince of Orange and his Adherents, " who design for thirth to Invade Our Kingdoms, in order thereunto have contrived and framed feveral Treasonable Papers and Declara-

tions, hoping thereby to Seduce Our People, and (Vif it were possible,) to corrupt Our Army, a very great Number whereof being Printed, leveral Persons are sent and employed to disperse the same throughout Our Kingdoms: And although all Persons (as well in Criminal as in other Cafes,) are bound to take Notice of the Law at their Peril; Yet to the intent that none may think to escape due Punishment, cr to excuse themselves when they shall be Detelled, by pretending Ignorance of the Nature of their Crime : pretending ignorance of the Nature of their Crime; We are Generically pleafed by this Our Royal Procla-mation, and the Advice of Our Privy Council, a present and admonifs all Our Subjects, of what Deferse or Quality foever, that they do not Publish, Differse, Repeat or Hand about the faid Treasfonable P apers or Declarations, or any of them, or any other Paper or Papers of Juch like nature, nor prefume to Read, Receive, Conceal or Keep the faid Treafonable Papers or Declarations, or any of them, or any other Paper or Papers of fuch like nature, without Difcovering and Revealing the fame as speedily as may be, to some of Our Privy Council, or to some of Our Judges, Justices of the Peace, or other Publick Magistrates, upon Peril of being profecuted according to the utmost Severity of Lam.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Second day of November, 1688. In the Fourth Year of Our Reign.

Constantinople, August 31. The Removal of the Court to Adrianople being, as you have been already told, refolved on, the late Sultan Mahomet, his Sons and Brother, and the Sultana Valide or Queen-Mother, went, the 24th inflant, privately out of Town to the Camp, conducted by a Guard of only 200 Boftangees. The 25th the Grand Signior (having performed the ufual Ceremonies at the Molque done by killing Sheep and diffributing them among

the Poor, in order to the obtaining properous Succets of their Voyage, and other Enterprizes,) went out of Town in a Solemn Cavalcade to the Cantp near Daout Pacha, a Seraglio of the Grand Signior. a League from hence, about which their Tents are pitch'd; He usually lying at his Palace, and in the Afternoon coming to his Tent : But this Cavalcade had nothing of that Splendor and Magnificence which the former Sultans uled to thew on the like Occasions: The Advices we have here from Hungary are fo uncertain, that it is hard to know the Truth of what paffes on that fide. It is reported, that Teghen Baffa has had a Quarrel with the Budziack Tartars and with Teckeley, about dividing fome Plunder they got in the Country by Demir Capee! a confiderable Pafs on the Danube ; That Teckeley is thereupon gone from him with his Party; That the Tartars are removed to Nicopolis; And that Yeyben is come this way as far as Sophia. There are Orders fent from hence to raife the Nefiran (or Arrierban) to join with him, but this being composed of unexperienced undifciplined People, proves generally a great Burthen to the Country, and of fmall Benefit to the Publick. It's faid likewife, that the Vifier will go and Winter at Sophia; But this is supposed to be given out at prefent only to keep the Minds of the People, and effectially of the Soldiery, quiet, till they are got to Adrianople. Omir Bacha, the new Caimacan, entred upon his Office as foon as the Vifier left this City. To morrow the Grand Signior fets out from the Camp for Adrianotile.

Cadiz, Octob. 11. Don Matheo Olaya, who failed from hence with 7 Men of War the beginning of the laft month, to meet the New Spain Fleet that's expected home, is returned into this Port, 'and is now taking in Men and Provisions for the Relief of Oran. And Vice-Admiral Papachino is going with fix Ships to look for the laid Fleet. The Marquis de Chasteau Renaud is now in this Bay with fix French Men of War. The Galeons are fitting in order to their departure for the West-Indies the beginning of the next Year.

The Master of a Vessel ar-/ Venice, Octob. 23. tived from Corjon, from whence he parted the 27th paft, reports, That he met off of Cafoppo the Gallies of Tulcany returning home from the Siege of Negrepont ; And that one of the Commanders of the faid Gallies did inform him, that at their deparof Youb, by making Corban or Sacrifice, which is ture from Negrepone, the Beliegers were advanced done by killing Sheep and diffributing them among to the Ditch of the Place; That they had made three large Breaches in the Ramparts, and that fo foon as the Mines they were preparing were ready, they would make a general Allault. We have advice from Dalmatia, that the Morlaques had made an Incustion into the Province of Arcigonia, from whence they had brought back a great deal of Booty. The Dake of Mantua arrived here the 20th Inflant in his return from Hungary.

Warfate, Octob. 20. The Letters from Lemberg confirm the News of the retreat of the Polifh Army from before Caminicc, and of the Tartars having put a great Convoy of Provisions into that place. The Provincial Dyets are to meet the 20th of the next month, in order to the choosing the Deputies that compose the General Diet of this Kingdom, which is to meet at this place the 15th of December. The Troops are feparated and gone into their Winter-quarters.

Vienna, Octob. 24. We have an Account from Belgrade, that General Caprara, after having given the necessary Orders for the Security of the Conquets on the Danube and the Savie, and implyed the Rakians with Arms and Ammunition, was gone to his Government of Waradin. And that they expected every day to hear of fome Action between General Heuffer and Techen Balla, who was, about Niff. with a finall Body of Horfe and Foot. Prince Louis of Baden has Leave to return hither. And the Count de Piccolomini (who is made Lieutenant-General,) is to Command in Bolnia this Winter. General Veterani is returned from the Frontiers of Valachia to Transfilvania, and has put his Troops into Winter-quarters. The Blockade of Great Waradin is continued by the Troops under the Command of the Count de Corbelli : We hear from thence, that 200 Men of that Garifon, being fent to fetch in Provisions, the Count de Corbelli ordered a Detachement of Germans and Hullars to go and look after them, who meeting the Enemy, and charging them, the Spahi's, about 40 in number, preferitly fied, and the Imperialists purfuing them, took 10 Prifoners, and killed 14 or 15; But at their return, they found the Janifaries had entrench'd themelives within their Wagons; And the Germans begin-ning the Attack, Count Strozzi, who commanded them, was immediately fhot dead upon the place, and 2 or 3 Subaltern Officers wounded : This did not diffourage our Men, who made a fecond Affault, and were again beaten of; But the Germans and the Hungarians alighting from their Horses the third time, forced the Enemy after a very their Fiones the third thirt, forest the antiny most a very obfinate Defence, they being all cut in pieces; except 23, who were taken Pritoners; Of which number was the Deputy-Governor of *Waradin*. Hamburgh, Oftop. 29. There has been lately a Meeting of the Electors of Saxony and Brandenburgh; the Duke of Hanouer, and the Landtgrave of Helfe; at Magdebourg. The 27th inftant arrived here the Baron Bielke, who is to command the Suedifh Troops that are to march towards the Rhine. The King of Denmark has given Orders for the raifing 2000 Foot and 3000 Horfe to augment his Standing Forces.

Hamburgh, Novemberg. The Lumenburgh Forces are on their march to join with those of Saxony, which are marching towards Francfort; They will be likewise joined by tome Troops of Brandenburgh and Hesse Cassel.

Francfort, Novemb. 4. The French Army commanded by the Dauphin began to march the fecond inftant towards Manheim. The Elector of Saxing is coming this way with the Confederate Forces.

Bruffeis, Novemb. 9. Philipsbourg was furrendred the first inftant, the Governor and Garifon marching out with Arms and Baggage; and four pieces of Cannon. The Dauphin does now beliege Manheim. And Monfieur de Boufflers is before Coblentz. The Elector of Saxony is arrived with 22060 Men in the Neighborhood of Francfort. They write from Vienna, that the Troops of Bavaria, 10000 ftrong, were paffed by that place in their march homeward. And that the Emperor was fending 12000 Men towards the Empire.

Paris, Novemb. 10. On Monday last Te Deum was lung here for the taking of Philipsbrurg. There is a report that Manheim is likewile taken. The Court will return to Verfailles on Friday next.

Dover, Novemb. 3. This day between 10 and J1 a Clock, about half Seas over, we different the Dutch Fleet, which was very numerous; And about 5 this Afternoon they were all part by this place, fleering a Channel-Courfe Weitward; The Wind at E. N. E. a very frefh Gale.

Deale, Novemb. 3. His Majefties Ship the Smallow, Captain Aylmer Commander, has brought into the Downs a Flyboat, one of the Tenders of the Dutch Fleet, having on Board four Companies of Foot of Colonel Babington's Regiment commanded by Major Collambine. The Prince of Orange is with the Fleet, which fet fail from Goree on Thurfday laft in the Afternoon, and is gone Weftward.
