

**Frankfort, Novemb. 7.** There is now in this City a Garison of 3000 Men; We expect 1500 more. And are told that the Elector of Saxony and the Duke of Hanover are marching this way with an Army of 25000 Men. The French Forces commanded by the Marquis de Boufflers continue before Coblenz, and have raised Batteries against the Town: There is in the place a Garison of 4000 Men. They write from Ratisbonne, That the Marquis de Baden, the Emperor's Chief Commissioner, was returned thither from Vienna, with the Answer of that Court to the French Manifesto, which he had communicated to the Dyet.

**Colome, Novemb. 9.** The Sieur de Heron, the French Minister returned hither on Friday last from Bonne; and parted the same day again from hence to confer with the Marquis de Sourdis at Nuis. The Letters from Coblenz of the 7 instant tell us, That the French had made themselves Masters of a small Redoubt that cover'd the Bridge over the Moselle: That they had begun to Bombard the Town; and that the Elector of Trier was retired from thence to his Castle of Hermanstein. We hear from Dufeldorp that they are laying a Bridge over the Rhine near that place; and that the Duke of Juliers had given out Commissions for new Levies.

**Hamburg, Novemb. 9.** This day 8000 Luncenburgers began their March to joyn with 13000 Saxons, which the Elector intends to conduct in person towards Frankfort. The Count de Bielke, Governor-General of the Swedish Territories in Germany, is gone to Stade, to draw together the 6000 Swedes that are designed towards the Rhine: They will, it's said, begin their March about the 25th instant. The Elector of Brandenburg went the 4th to Spandau to take a Review of his Troops that are quartered on that side: Six Companies of his Regiment of Guards are ordered to march from Berlin with 10 Field-pieces.

**From the Camp before Manheim, Novemb. 5.** The 31th past, the Dauphin Detached the Baron de Monclar with 1200 Horse to invest Manheim on the North side of the Necker: The first instant he passed by Hydelberg, and encamped the second at Keffertthal, about a League from hence. The same day the Dauphin began his March from Philipsburg with all the Foot and 12 Squadrons, and arrived here the 4th, after having commanded the Marquis de Joyeuse to block up the place with 1200 Horse on the West side of the Rhin. The Artillery is brought hither by the Rhine, not being able to pass by Land, by reason of the badness of the Ways. We are making two Bridges of Communication, one on the Rhine, and the other on the Necker. It's said there is in Manheim a Garison of 1200 Men.

**Brussels, Novemb. 12.** The French Troops continue about Huy under the Command of the Sieur de Bulonde. The Prince of Liege has given out Commissions for the raising four new Regiments. The Garison in the Citadel has been reinforced with 400 Men more. The sixth instant, the King of Spain's Birth-day, when he entred into his 28th year, was observed here with much Solemnity.

**Paris, Novemb. 13.** The King returned yesterday with the whole Court from Fontainebleau to Versailles. Manheim is not yet taken.

**Dartmouth, Novemb. 5.** This Morning being very Hazy and Foggy, and full of Rain, it cleared up about 9 of the Clock, at which time the Dutch Fleet appeared, consisting of about 4 or 500 Sail, as near as we can guess, all standing to the Eastward with the Wind at W. S. W. a moderate Gale. The Capital Ships are off of Torbay, about 4 Leagues

from the Shore; and the small Ships and Fly-boats betwixt the Start and this place, about a League and half off.

**Brixham, two Miles from Dartmouth, Nov. 5.** About 300 Sail of the Dutch Fleet are come into Torbay, several of which came directly into Brixham-Key, and Landed Soldiers, and the rest are sending Soldiers ashore in Boats. There may be about 5 or 600 ashore already, and others are Landing. It is said the Prince of Orange is come ashore.

**Whitehall, Novemb. 7.** On Monday last in the Evening Captain Hastings, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Woolwich, took, below Hole-Haven, a small Pink and a Fishing-boat with 24 Horles, which were separated from the Dutch Fleet, and sent them both to Deptford.
