REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to

The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

GREAT YARMOUTH.

REMOVAL OF SHINGLE PROHIBITED.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the 54 Geo. III, cap. 159, that "in order to prevent damage being done to the shores or banks of the ports, harbours, or havens in this Kingdom, no person or persons shall take any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks of any port, harbour, or haven of this Kingdom, from which the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom for the time being shall find it necessary, for the protection of such port, harbour, or haven, or the works thereof, by order under their hands, or the hands of any three of them, or the hands of his or their Secretary, and published in the London Gazette, shall prohibit the taking or removing of such shingle or ballast, upon pain of forfeiting for every such offence the sum of ten pounds."

And whereas it is further enacted by "The Harbours Transfer Act, 1862" (25 and 26 Victoria, cap. 69), "that from and after the 31st day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, sections fourteen and sixteen of the Act of the fifty-fourth year of King George the Third (chapter one hundred and fifty-nine), 'for the better regulation of the several ports, harbours, roadsteads, sounds, channels, bays, and navigable rivers in the United King-

dom, and of His Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, wharfs, moorings, and stores thereon, and for repealing several Acts passed for that purpose,' and all provisions in the said Act contained relative thereto, shall be read and construed as if the Board of Trade were named in the said sections instead of the Admiralty :"

And whereas the Board of Trade have found it necessary, for the protection of the port of Great Yarmouth, to prohibit the taking or removing of any shingle or ballast from the shores or banks hereinafter specified :

Now the Board of Trade do hereby, by this Order, under the hand of their Secretary, prohibit all persons from taking or removing any description of shingle or ballast from the shore or banks, or from any portion of the shore or banks, of that part of the port of Great Yarmouth which extends south of the harbour of Great Yarmouth to the northern part of the parish of Corton, in the county of Suffolk.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 41.)—ENGLAND—EAST COAST.

Light Vessel near Inner Dowsing Shoal.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 17, dated 15th February, 1873, on the intended establishment of a light vessel, for the purpose of indicating the position of the Inner Dowsing Shoal, and facilitating the general navigation of the eastern coast of England :—

The Trinity House, London, has given further notice, that the light vessel is now in position, near the north-east end of the shoal.

The light is a *green revolving* light showing a flash *every twenty seconds*, elevated 38 feet above the sea.

The light vessel is moored in 10 fathoms at low water springs, with the following bearings and distances, viz. :—

North Inner Dowsing Buoy, S.W. by W., one mile.

South Dowsing Buoy, S.S.W., $5\frac{5}{10}$ miles.

North Races Bank Buoy, S.E. by S., 8 miles.

Dudgeon Light Vessel, S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., $13\frac{5}{10}$ miles.

These bearings and distances place the light vessel in lat. $53^{\circ} 19' 20''$ N., long. $3^{\circ} 34' 20''$ E.

The light vessel has the words *Inner Dowsing* on her sides, and in order to render her readily distinguishable in the day from the other light vessels in the vicinity, two globes are shown on the mast, one above the other.

In thick or foggy weather a gong will be sounded.

(No. 42.)—SOUTH AUSTRALIA—SPENCER GULF.

Sunken Rock near Dangerous Reef.

THE Colonial Government of South Australia has given notice, that a sunken rock has been discovered in the passage between Dangerous Reef and the mainland forming the western side of the entrance of Spencer Gulf.

The rock has 9 feet water on it at low water springs, with from 7 to 8 fathoms round it at the distance of one cable. It lies about one-third the distance between Dangerous Reef and Taylor Island, and from it the same islet off Cape Donnington bears N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., and the highest part of Dangerous Reef N.E. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles.

These bearings place the sunken rock in lat. $34^{\circ} 50' S.$, long. $136^{\circ} 10' E.$
