### Whitehall, Novemb. 10.

I S Majefty has received the following Letter from the Lords Archbishops and Bishops of the Kingdom of Scotland.

May it pleafe Your Moft Sacred Majefty,

E prostrate our felves to pay our most devote Thanks and Adoration to the Sovereign Majesty of Heaven and Earth, for preferving Your Sacred Life and Perfon, fo frequently exposed to the greatest hazards, and as often delivered, and You miraculously prospered with Glory and Victory, in De-fence of the Rights and Honour of Your Majesties August Brother, and of these Kingdoms; And that by Hn Merciful Goodness the Rayings of the Sea, and Madness of Unreasonable Men, have been stilled and calmed ; and Your Majefty, as the Darling of Heaven, peaceably feated on the Thrones of Your Royal Anceftors, whole Long, Illustrious, and Unparallell'd Line, is the greatest Glory of this Your Ancient Kingdom.

We pay our most humble Gratitude to Your Majefty for the repeated Affurances of Your Royal Protection to our National Church and Religion, as the Laws have Established them; which are very juitable to the Gracious Countenance, Encouragement and protection Your Majesty was pleased to afford to our Church and Order whilft we were happy in Your Prefence among ft us.

We magnific the Divine Mercy in Bleffing Your Majesty with a Son, and is with a Prince, whom me pray Heaven may bless and preferve to fivay Your Royal Scepters after You, and that he may Inherit, with Your Dominions the Illuftrious and Heroick

Virtues of bu August and mest Screne Parents. We are amazed to bear of the Danger of an Inva-fion from Holland, which excites our Prayers for an universal Repentance to all Orders of Men, That God may yet spare his People, preserve Your Royal Per-jon; and prevent the Effusion of Christian Blood, and to give fuch Success to Your Majesties Arms, that all who Invade Your Majesties just and undoubted Rights, and difturb or interrupt the Peace of Your Realms, may be disappointed and cloathed with frame, fo that on Tour Royal Head the Crown may Still flourifh.

As by the Grace of God we shall preferve in out As by the Grace of God the Ihall prejerve in out felves a firm and unshaken Loyalty, so the shall be careful and zealous to promote in all Your Subjects an intrepid and stedfast Allegeance to Your Majesty, an Essential Part of their Religion, and of the Glory of our Holy Profession, not doubting but that God in his great Mercy, who bath so after prefer-wed and delivered Your Majesty; will still preferve and deliver You; by giving You the Hearts of Your Subjects and the Necks of Your Enemies. So pray we, who in all Humility . are,

May it please Your most Sacred Majefty Your Majefties moft Humble, moft Faithfut, and most obedient Subjects and Servants.

The following Address has been prefented to His Majefty, which He received very Graciously.

### To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of the Mayor, Alderman and Bur-gelies of Your Majeftics Antient Corporation of Portf mouth.

Dread S.I.R.

Dread SIR! W E Your Majefties most Loyal and Dutiful Sub-jests, do in all Humility lay at Your Majesties Feet, our Hearty Thanks for Your Majesties Gracious refloring to us our Antient Charter, which wa hall not fail to make such sie of, as shall be to the utmost advantage of Your Majesties Service; and we hope and pray that this great Coudescension, and Your Majesties other timiumerable Royal Asts of Grace, will (together with us) jo affect the Hearts of all other Your Majesties Subjects, shart Your rash and any of Euromies; may be Cloathed with Shame and Coustion, and that upon Your Royal Head the Imperial Grown may for ever Flourish. In Testimony whereof we have hereunto fet our Hands, and affixed the Common Seal of the fail Burrough the Seventh Day of November, in the Fourth Year of Your Majesties Reign.

Venice, Offcb. 25. We have advice by a Veffet come from Corfu, that the Gallies. of Tufcany arrived there the 14th Inftant in their return from Negrepont, from whence they parted eight days be-fore, having left there the two Regiments, which the Great Duke fent at the beginning of the Campagne to the affiltance of the Republick, and the Veffels that transported them. The City of Negrepont was at their departure almost entirely ruined with the Bombs and Cannon of the Befiegers, who were preparing leveral Mines, with a refolution if they fueceeded; to give a General Affante. And And

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the Garifon through the great loffes they had fufrained during the Siege, was reduced to fo finall a number, that they could not defend the place much longer. The laft tetters from Dalmaria, gave an account, that the Proveditore General Cornaro was gone towards Narenta : "and that the Sieur Janco was returned from an Incursion into the Turkish Territories, with a great number of Slaves, and a confiderable Booty of Cattle. The Master of a Veffel who came from Constantinople the fourth of the laft Month, reports, that the News of the taking of Belgrade had occasioned there new diforders; that the Grand Signior was retired to Adrianople with 10000 Men; and that the Vifier had fent fome Troops to Sophia with Cannon and Ammunition to The Sedefend that place in cafe it was attackt. nate have ordered the Statue of the late Count de Coningsmark, to be fet up in the great Court of the Palace, in Memory of his Noble Actions, and the Signal Services which he hath rendred the Re-publick during this War. The Duke of Parma arrived here incognito the 24th Inftant. The Prince of Harcourt continues at the Lazaret to be cured of the Wounds he received at the Siege of Negrepoht.

Warfaw, Octob. 21. The King is returned to Jawarew, where a great Council will be held to confult about the preparations for the next Campagne. The Troops in the mean time are gone into their Winter Quarters; Those of Poland in Ruffia; and those of Lithuania in the Upper Vol-hinia. We hear from Lemberg, that Sultan Nuradin was returning home with his Troops, which were very much haraffed by their late continual Marches. The Mofcourtes are likewife gone home after having finished their Forts on the River Samara, and left great Garifons in them.

The 2d Inftant the Francfort, Novemb. 10. Baron de Monclar invefted Manheim; And the 4th the Dauphin arrived with the whole Army before, that place, which is now formally befieged. We are here putting our felves into a pofture of defence, 1000 Saxons are coming hither to reinforce this Garifon, and 1000 more will be fent to Nuremberg ; And befides thefe, the Elector himfelf is on his march with 13000 Men.

Humburg, Novemb. 10. From Stockholme, we are informed that the King of Sueden hath gratified Monfieur Leyonbergh his Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of the King of Great Britain, with the Honor and Dighty of a Baron of that Kingdom. The Lunenburgh Troops are on their march towards the Rhine. They write from Berlin, that the Elector of Brandenburgh has given out Commissions for the raifing of 14 New Regiments.

The Letters from Hamburgh, Novemb. 12. Leypfig of the 7th Inftant, give an account that the Elector of Saxony was paffed by that place with an Army of 13000 Men in his march towards Franck-With these will joyn 2000 Brandenburgers, fort. 7000 Lunenburgers, 1500 of Saxe Gatha, and 2000 of Heffe Caffel. The Duke of Hanover has fent an Envoy to Copenhagen.

Cologne, Novemb. 12. We hear from Heydelberg, that the Dauphin made his Entry on the 10th Infast into that City. The French Troops Commanded by the Marquis de Boufflers are retired from before Coblentz.

Paris, Novemb. 17. The 15th Inftant an Express arrived here with the News of the Surrender of Manheim. And that the Dauphin was marched from thence to attack trainkenda'. The Marquis de Boufflers is retired from Coblentz, after having flot a great many Bombes into the p ace, and has put his Troops into Quarters of Re-fieldment in that Neighborhood. The Marquis de Nefle, Holborn, thall have 151. Reward.

Exeter, Novemb. 6. The Prince of Orange marching towards this City, and we being in no condition to oppole him, the Right Reverend Father in God, the Lord Bishop of this Diocess thought it requisite to leave this Place, being gone to London to pay his Duty to the King, and to receive His Majeftics farther Commands.

Whitehall, Novemb. 11. We have an account from the West, that the Enemy seizes all the Kings Mony, and have taken three Hundred Pounds from the Collector of the Excife at Exeter, and keep him in Cuftody. And that not one Perfon of Quality is yet come in to them.
