THE FAIRS ACT, 1871.

ABBOTSBURY FAIR.

IN pursuance of the above-mentioned Act, I, the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one

of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, hereby notify as follows:

1. A representation has been duly made to me by the Justices sitting in Petty Sessions for the Dorchester Division of the county of Dorset, that a Fair has been annually held on the 11th day of July, in the parish of Abbotsbury, in the said division of the said county, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that such Fair should be abolished.

2. On the 3rd day of July, 1873, I shall take the aforesaid representation into consideration, and all persons are to intimate, before that day, any objection they may desire to offer to the abolition of the said Fair.
