PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the "burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burial-ground or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued, subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that, from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions, or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial-grounds or places of burial affected by such representation shall be situate, or on some other conspicuous places within the part or parts of the Metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month at the least before such representation is so considered; provided always, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk of the parish hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials therein should be discontinued, in the

undermentioned parish with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fifth day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the seventeenth day of June instant, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the above-recited Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows, viz. :—

St. LUKE's, MIDDLESEX. — Forthwith wholly under the church and in the churchyard of St. Paul's, Bunhill-row, in the parish of St. Luke's, Middlesex.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the "Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning "the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial ground or places of burial should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within

such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fifth day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the seventeenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz. :—

WORKINGTON.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Workington, in the county of Cumberland; and, on and after the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, also in the churchyard of the said parish, except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of entire bones, to be used only for the burial of the widowers, widows, parents, or unmarried children, of those already buried therein; and except in vaults and walled graves existing on the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stone-work or brick-work properly cemented.

CODNOR-CUM-LOSCOE.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Codnor-cum-Loscoe, in the county of Derby; and, on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, also in the

churchyard of the said parish, except in now existing walled graves, and except also in other graves which can be opened without the disturbance of remains or the exposure of coffins; every coffin to be enclosed by stone-work or brick-work properly cemented, or by concrete not less than six inches in thickness.

WINKLEIGH.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Winkleigh, in the county of Devon, and within three yards of the walls of the said church.

FROME, SOMERSET.—Forthwith in the burial-ground of Christ Church, Frome, in the county of Somerset, except in graves and vaults which can be used without baling out water, every coffin which is not separately enclosed by stone-work to be covered by at least four feet in depth of soil.

BATH.—Forthwith wholly in the Lady Huntingdon Burial-ground, Julian-road, in the parish of Walcot, Bath.

HAILSHAM.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Hailsham, and in the churchyard, except in existing vaults and walled graves.

CHARLTON (BY DOVER).—Forthwith wholly in the church and churchyard of Charlton (by Dover), except in now completed family vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stone-work or brick-work properly cemented; and in earthen graves to be used for the burial of the widowers and widows of those already interred in the churchyard.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-ground hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in such churchyards and burial-ground be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty by and with the advice aforesaid is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-ground be postponed as follows:—

In the churchyard of Monk Frystone to the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

In the churchyards of Saint Mary and Saint Cuthbert, and in the Independent Burial-ground Pateley Bridge, all in the parish of Ripon, to the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications, viz. :—

WALTHAMSTOW.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Walthamstow, in the county of Essex, and also in the original part of the churchyard of the said parish, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, each coffin buried in which shall be separately entombed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and also in the remainder of the said churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and in such as can be constructed in ground not previously buried in, which shall not exceed thirty in number, and except in earthen family graves, to be used only for the burial of the widowers, widows or parents of those already buried therein.

WESTON, NEAR BATH.—On and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, in the churchyard of the parish of Weston, near Bath, in the county of Somerset, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, or in such as can be constructed without the disturbance of soil that has been buried in, and except in earthen graves to be used only for the burial of widowers, widows, or parents of those already buried therein.

ST. COLUMB MINOR.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of St. Columb Minor, in the county of Cornwall, and also with the following exceptions on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in the churchyard of the said parish; namely, except for the burial of the widowers or widows of those previously interred in the said churchyard.

LEWISHAM, CHRIST CHURCH, FOREST HILL.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Christ Church, Forest Hill, in the parish of Lewisham, and that any coffin buried in the burial-ground of the above church shall be entombed by concrete not less than six inches thick,

and that no water shall be baled out of any grave.

FRESHFORD.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Freshford, and forthwith in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, each coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stone or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves, to be used for the burial of the widowers or widows of those already buried therein.

PENRITH.—Forthwith wholly in Christ Church, Penrith, and in the churchyard, except in existing vaults and walled graves, in which every coffin shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

STAFFORD.—Forthwith wholly in Christ Churchyard, Stafford, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately entombed by stone or brickwork property cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the eleventh day of August next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said eleventh day of August.

WHEREAS the Governing Body of Winchester School, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by "The Public Schools Act, 1868," and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, did, on the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, make certain Statutes for the Government of that School.

And whereas the said Statutes have been submitted to and approved by the Special Commissioners appointed by the said Act, and have been this day laid before Her Majesty in Council, the same are published in the London Gazette, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act.

And notice is hereby given, that it is lawful for the bodies or persons authorized so to do, in that Act, within two months from the date of the publication of this notification, to petition Her Majesty in Council to withhold Her approval from the whole or any part of such Statutes.

STATUTES made by the Governing Body of Winchester School, otherwise called Winchester College.

Whereas by "The Public Schools Act, 1868," and the Acts amending or affecting the same, the Governing Body of any School to which the Acts apply may make Statutes as therein mentioned, and may consolidate and amend any existing Statutes or Regulations relating to such School, and may repeal any Statutes or Regulations which have in the opinion of that Body become obsolete or incapable of observance:

And whereas the Saint Marie College of Winchester, otherwise called the College of Saint Mary of Winchester, near Winchester, otherwise Winchester College, is a School to which the said Acts apply :

And whereas in the exercise of their powers the Governing Body have determined to amend the existing Statutes, and to consolidate with the amendments to be so made all such parts of the existing Statutes as are not deemed by them to have become obsolete or to be repugnant to the said amendments, and to repeal all the other parts of the said Statutes which, being so deemed to be obsolete or repugnant, it is not thought fit to retain in force :

Be it enacted as follows :—

I.

INTERPRETATION.

In these Statutes the following terms shall have the meanings hereinafter respectively assigned to them, that is to say :—

“The Governing Body” shall mean the Members for the time being of the Governing Body of Winchester School, elected under the Statute dated the 28th of July, 1871, and made in pursuance of “The Public Schools Act, 1868.”

“Masters” shall mean all those who take part in the teaching of any of those subjects of instruction which are required for the ordinary examinations of the School.

“Commoners” shall mean the boys in the School not Scholars.

“Month” shall mean a Calendar Month.

II.

VISITOR.

The Visitor of the College shall be the Bishop of Winchester.

III.

CONSTITUTION.

The Foundation of the College shall consist of—

- (1) A Warden and such persons as under the provisions hereinafter contained shall for the time being be the Fellows of the College ;
- (2) A Head Master ;
- (3) Such number of Scholars and Exhibitioners as the Governing Body shall from time to time determine ; but the number of Scholars shall be not less than seventy.

IV.

WARDEN.

Appointment.

1. The appointment of the Warden shall be vested in the Warden and Fellows of the College of Saint Mary of Winchester (otherwise and hereinafter called New College), in the University of Oxford.

2. Immediately on the occurrence of a vacancy in the office of Warden, the Sub-Warden shall notify the same to the Warden and Fellows of New College.

3. If the Warden and Fellows of New College shall not duly elect a Warden within a month and two days from the day on which the occurrence of a vacancy in the office of Warden shall have been notified to them as aforesaid, the appointment of a Warden shall for that time only lapse to the Visitor.

4. The Warden Elect shall be forthwith presented to the Visitor, who shall confirm him as Warden ; but if the Visitor do not so confirm him, the Warden Elect shall, at the expiration of five days after the day on which such presentation shall have been so made, become Warden as effectually as if he had been so confirmed.

Qualification, Duties, and Emoluments.

5. The Warden shall be a member of the Church of England, and a person distinguished in literature or science, or eminent for other public services.

6. He shall discharge such duties in respect of the property and affairs of the College as the Governing Body shall by their Regulations from time to time determine.

7. He shall reside eight months at least in the year, and attend all meetings of the Warden and Fellows, unless prevented by illness or other urgent cause.

8. He shall have a stipend of £1,700 per annum, but no other allowances.

9. The Warden's House shall be rent free. It shall be kept for him in substantial repair, and all rates and taxes thereon shall be paid out of the income of the College.

Incapacity.

10. If the Warden shall at any time become incapable of performing the duties of his office, the Governing Body, on being satisfied thereof, shall, at a meeting convened after due notice of the purpose of such meeting, and with the consent of two-thirds at least of the members there present, have power to appoint some person to act in the Warden's place during such his incapacity, and to assign to the person so appointed such a residence, and such portion, not exceeding one-third, of the Warden's stipend, as they shall think fit.

11. The person who shall be appointed to act in the Warden's place shall be called “Pro-Warden.” He shall retain his office and residence, and shall receive the portion of the Warden's stipend which shall have been assigned to him until the Warden shall be reinstated in his office, or shall cease to be Warden ; and so long as he shall continue in office, he shall exercise and perform all the functions and duties, and have all the powers and authorities of the Warden, and shall be bound to residence in the same manner, and be liable to deprivation from the same causes and in the same manner as the Warden ; provided that the office of Pro-Warden shall not constitute a right of membership of the Governing Body.

12. If the Pro-Warden die, or resign his office, or become incapable of discharging his duties, the Governing Body shall have the like power of appointing another person to be Pro-Warden in his room, and of assigning a salary to such Pro-Warden.

13. If the Warden shall, at any time after the appointment of a Pro-Warden, again become capable of performing the duties of his office, the Governing Body, on being satisfied thereof, shall have power at a meeting convened, after due notice of the purpose of such meeting, and with the consent of two-thirds at least of the members there present, to reinstate him in his powers and functions, and in the receipt of his whole emoluments.

Power of Removal.

14. If the Warden shall secede from the Church of England, the Visitor shall proceed to inquire into the fact, and if, after due inquiry, of

which the Warden shall have had notice, the fact be established, the Visitor shall deprive the Warden of his office, and the office of Warden shall thereupon become vacant.

15. If the Warden shall have been convicted by a Court of competent jurisdiction of any crime, of whatsoever nature or description, the Visitor, on receiving information thereof, shall proceed to inquire into the fact of such conviction, and, if the fact be established, may, if he shall think fit, deprive the Warden of his office.

16. If the Governing Body shall prefer to the Visitor a charge against the Warden, either of disgraceful conduct, or of malversation in his office, or of grave neglect of his duty, the Visitor shall proceed to inquire into the facts of the case, and, in the event of the charge being established, shall deprive the Warden of his office.

V.

FELLOWS.

1. The Members of the Governing Body for the time being (other than the Warden of Winchester College) shall be Fellows of the College, and shall have, as members of the Collegiate Body, the same status therein as the Fellows elected before the passing of "The Public Schools Act, 1864;" but shall not have, as Fellows, any pecuniary interest or share in the income of the College.

2. The Right Reverend Charles Wordsworth, Bishop of St. Andrews, shall enjoy, as a Fellow of the College, the same pecuniary interest as well as the same status therein as the Fellows elected before the passing of "The Public Schools Act, 1864."

3. On the avoidance of his Fellowship by any one of the Fellows existing at the date of the approval of these Statutes by Her Majesty in Council, and not a member of the Governing Body, such Fellowship shall not be filled up, and the emoluments thereof shall not be added to the fund distributed among the other existing Fellows, but shall fall into the income of the College; and so *toties quoties*.

4. Upon the occurrence of any vacancy in the Governing Body, the Warden of Winchester College shall forthwith notify the same to the person or persons in whom the appointment is vested.

VI.

OFFICERS.

1. A Sub-Warden shall be chosen annually by the Governing Body from among the Fellows.

2. A Bursar may, if the Governing Body from time to time think fit, be appointed annually by the Governing Body, whether from among the Fellows or not.

3. The Governing Body may appoint such Officers, and make such other provision as they may from time to time think fit, for the due performance of Divine Service in the Chapel.

4. The Governing Body may appoint a Secretary or Clerk, and from time to time create any other offices which they shall think necessary for the more efficient management of the affairs of the School. Such offices may be suppressed by the same authority, and the holders of such offices shall be removable from them at the pleasure of the Governing Body, and shall not be entitled to claim any compensation for such suppression or removal.

5. The appointment and dismissal of all officers not otherwise provided for, and of all Servants, shall be subject to the directions from time to time of the Governing Body.

6. It shall be lawful for the Governing Body to assign any duties and emoluments which they may think fit to the Sub-Warden, Bursar, and any other officer, and to vary the same from time to time.

VII.

ADMINISTRATION.

Buildings.

1. Except as herein otherwise provided, all the houses and buildings of the College shall be used and occupied as the Governing Body shall from time to time direct.

Meetings of the Warden and Fellows.

2. There shall be at least two General Meetings of the Warden and Fellows in every year on such days as the Warden and Fellows shall from time to time appoint.

3. A Meeting of the Warden and Fellows shall also be held as often as the Warden shall deem it necessary, or as often as a written request for the same shall have been preferred to the Warden, signed by any three of the Fellows.

4. There shall be given at least seven clear days' notice of any General Meeting, and at least three clear days' notice of any other meeting of the Warden and Fellows, except in cases of emergency not admitting of delay; and every such notice shall contain a printed or written statement of the business to be transacted thereat.

5. The Warden and three Fellows, or, if the Warden be absent, four Fellows, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.

6. All questions brought forward at a meeting shall be decided by a majority of the votes of those present. In case of an equality of votes, the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

7. A Minute Book and proper Books of Account shall be provided, and Minutes of the proceedings shall be entered in such Minute Book, and signed by the Chairman at the next meeting.

College Seal.

8. The College Seal shall not be affixed to any writing or document, except in pursuance of a Resolution passed at a meeting of the Warden and Fellows, and in the presence of the Warden or one of the Fellows; and a copy of every such writing or document shall be entered in a register to be kept for that purpose.

Auditor.

9. The Governing Body shall appoint an Auditor. He shall receive such a salary as they think fit, and shall hold his office during their pleasure. The Auditor shall annually examine and verify the accounts of the College, and the vouchers thereof, and ascertain the balances which may be due. He shall sign such accounts if found correct, and shall report whatever may appear to require amendment or observation.

10. A General Statement of the Receipts and Payments, arranged in such manner as the Governing Body may deem requisite and sufficient, shall be made and submitted annually to the Governing Body.

VIII.

HEAD MASTER.

1. The Head Master shall be appointed by and hold his office at the pleasure of the Governing Body.

2. He shall be continually resident, except during the School Holidays, or except for some

urgent cause, to be signified by him in writing to the Governing Body.

3. He shall be responsible for, and superintend the general discipline and the instruction of all boys admitted to the School.

4. He shall have a House rent free. The House shall be kept in substantial repair, and all rates and taxes thereon shall be paid out of the income of the College.

5. He shall receive a stipend derived from the fees paid by or on behalf of the boys admitted to the School. The amount of such stipend shall be determined from time to time by the Governing Body.

IX.

ASSISTANT MASTERS.

1. The number, position, rank, salaries, and emoluments of the Assistant Masters shall be subject to the directions from time to time of the Governing Body.

2. Subject as aforesaid, all the Assistant Masters shall be appointed by and hold their offices at the pleasure of the Head Master; but in case he dismiss a Master, he shall forthwith notify the fact and the reason for it to the Governing Body.

3. The Governing Body shall have power to assign out of the income of the College such emoluments as they may from time to time think fit to such Master or Masters (if any) as shall be required to assist in the domestic care and discipline of the Scholars, and to assign rooms to such Master or Masters.

X.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

Election.

1. The Election to the vacant Scholarships shall take place annually at such time as the Governing Body shall from time to time determine.

2. Thirty days at least before the day of Election notice of such intended Election shall be given by the Warden of Winchester College in such manner as the Governing Body shall deem best adapted to ensure publicity.

3. The Election shall be vested in the Governing Body, who shall elect after an Examination conducted by Examiners appointed by them, and after receiving from the Examiners a Report of the result of the Examination.

Subjects of Examination.

4. The Examinations shall be conducted in such subjects and in such manner as shall be determined by Regulation.

Qualification.

5. Any boy may be a candidate for a Scholarship who, one month before the Election shall have attained 12 and not have exceeded 14 years of age. Every candidate shall produce evidence satisfactory to the Electors of the date of his birth.

Tenure and Privileges.

6. Subject to good behaviour, and subject to such Regulations as the Governing Body may from time to time make with respect to the attainment by every boy of a position in the School commensurate with his age, a Scholarship shall be tenable until the end of the School Term in which the Scholar attains the age of 18 years; but the Governing Body may make such regulations as they may from time to time think fit for permitting a Scholar to retain his Scholarship

until the end of the School Term in which he shall attain the age of 19 years.

7. Every Scholar hereafter elected shall pay the annual sum of £21. Subject to such payment, the Scholars shall be maintained during their residence at School out of the income of the College.

8. There shall be paid out of the income of the College an entrance fee and a fee for instruction on behalf of every Scholar at the same rate as the fees paid by Commoners.

9. In the case of the grave misconduct of any Scholar or Exhibitioner, the Head Master shall have power to suspend his Scholarship or Exhibition, or to expel such offender, and shall at once report to the Governing Body any such case of suspension or expulsion, and the reason thereof; and every such case shall be subject to an appeal to the Governing Body.

XI.

EXHIBITIONS.

Tenable at the School.

1. There shall be established under this Statute:—

(a.) Exhibitions, each of the value of £50 per annum, to be held by Commoners during their residence at School, and of such number, being not less than eight, as the Governing Body, having regard to the income of the property of the School at their disposal, may from time to time determine. Any such Exhibition shall be vacated upon the Exhibitioner being elected to a Scholarship.

(b.) Exhibitions, each of the value of £21 per annum, open to all boys in the School between 15 and 16 years of age, and tenable, subject to good behaviour, with a Scholarship or with any other Exhibition.

2. All these Exhibitions shall be subject to a competitive Examination, to be conducted by Examiners appointed by the Governing Body, in such subjects and in such manner as shall be determined by Regulation.

Tenable after quitting the School.

3. The Chernocke Fund (established by the will of Justinian Bracegirdle), the Superaunuates Fund (instituted in the year 1729), and the Bedminster Fund (established by deed of the 8th of April, 1742), shall be consolidated into one Exhibition Fund. The proceeds of this Fund shall be applied to the creation from time to time of Exhibitions to be given to boys quitting the School, under such conditions as the Governing Body shall from time to time determine. Such Exhibitions shall be limited to purposes of preparation for a future profession; but it shall not be a necessary condition that a holder of such an Exhibition shall proceed to an University.

4. The proceeds of the Cobden Fund (established by the will of Edward Cobden) shall be applied towards an Exhibition to be given to a boy quitting the School, under such conditions as the Governing Body shall from time to time determine; but such Exhibition shall be tenable only by a member of the University of Oxford or Cambridge.

XII.

EXAMINATIONS.

The Governing Body shall make such provisions as they may from time to time deem expedient for the Examination of the whole School and for a report of the results of such Examination.

XIII.

RETIRING PENSIONS FOR MASTERS.

It shall be lawful for the Governing Body to award a Retiring Pension to any person who shall have filled the office of Head Master, or who shall have served for at least 20 years as an Assistant Master, but in special cases such length of service may be dispensed with by vote, in which at least two-thirds of the Governing Body shall concur. The amount of each Pension shall be fixed with due regard to the circumstances of the case; but no such Pension shall exceed £400 per annum, nor shall the total amount of Retiring Pensions exceed at any one time £1,500 per annum in the aggregate.

XIV.

SUBORDINATE SCHOOLS.

1. The School known as the Choristers' School shall be maintained until the Governing Body shall determine otherwise. So soon as the income of the College will permit, the Governing Body may, if they think fit, establish and maintain a Subordinate School or Subordinate Schools in connection with Winchester College; and with that view they may, if they think fit, extend, remodel, or abolish the Choristers' School.

2. The Governing Body may, if they think fit, found Exhibitions, to be competed for in such Subordinate School or Schools.

XV.

ECCLESIASTICAL PATRONAGE.

1. Saving the pecuniary interest belonging to or capable of being enjoyed by the Warden or any Fellow elected before the passing of "The Public Schools Act, 1864," in the ecclesiastical patronage of the College, the Governing Body shall make every appointment to any ecclesiastical benefice, the patronage of which was at the date of the passing of "The Public Schools Act, 1868," vested in the then existing Governing Body as such.

2. Every Fellow existing at the date of the approval of these Statutes by Her Majesty in Council, and not a member of the Governing Body, shall have an equal voice with a member of the Governing Body in making any such appointment.

XVI.

GOVERNING BODY.

Meetings.

1. There shall be at least two meetings of the Governing Body in each year, on such days as the Chairman shall from time to time appoint.

2. On any request in writing from three Members at least of the Governing Body, the Chairman, or, if need be, the Deputy-Chairman, shall call a Special Meeting for any purpose specified in such request, giving not less than a fortnight's notice thereof.

3. Provided that the notice convening every Special Meeting shall state the subjects which shall then be brought forward, and no other subject shall be decided at such meeting, unless with the unanimous concurrence of those present, being a majority of the whole Governing Body.

4. A Minute Book and proper Books of Account shall be provided, and Minutes of the proceedings of the Governing Body shall be entered in such Minute Book, and signed at the next meeting by the then Chairman.

Expenses.

5. All expenses incurred by or on behalf of the Governing body previously to the date of the approval of these Statutes by Her Majesty in Council, shall be defrayed out of the income of the College.

6. From and after the date of such approval, every Member of the Governing Body (other than the Warden of Winchester College) attending a meeting of the Governing Body or of the Warden and Fellows, or of a Committee appointed by the Governing Body or by the Warden and Fellows, shall be entitled to an honorarium of three guineas.

7. Provided that no member attending more than one of such meetings on the same day shall be entitled to more than one honorarium of three guineas in respect of such meetings.

8. In all cases the honorarium shall be in lieu of all expenses incurred for travelling and otherwise in attending a meeting.

9. Provided also that if any such meeting be held at any other place than at Winchester, the Warden of Winchester College shall be entitled to the travelling expenses incurred by him in attending such meeting.

Seal.

10. The Seal of the Governing Body shall not be affixed to any writing or document except by the order of the Governing Body, and in the presence of one member at least of the Governing Body; and a copy of every such writing or document shall be entered in a register to be kept for that purpose.

XVII.

DISPOSAL OF INCOME.

1. Besides as hereinbefore provided, fees of Examiners, expenses of providing scientific apparatus, and of fitting up rooms for the same, certain minor customary expenses, and all expenses consequent on the discharge of the duties imposed on the Governing Body under these Statutes, shall be defrayed out of the income of the College.

3. The Governing Body shall from time to time invest any residue of the income of the College, and the interest, dividends, or income resulting from any such investments, in any of the securities which may from time to time be sanctioned by the Court of Chancery for the investment of cash under the control of the Court; and the Governing Body may from time to time sell any such investments and apply the proceeds thereof as income of the College.

XVIII.

CONSTRUCTION OF STATUTES.

As often as any question shall arise in regard to the construction of any Statute of the College, it shall be lawful for the Warden and Fellows or the Governing Body to refer the same to the Visitor; and it shall be lawful for the Visitor to declare what is the true construction of such Statute.

XIX.

REPEALING STATUTE.

All Statutes and Regulations relating to the College, and existing at the date of the passing of "The Public Schools Act, 1868," shall, from

and after the approval of these Statutes by Her Majesty in Council, be repealed.
