the Post Office Acts, or any of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order and direct as follows:—

1. On every book packet, or pattern or sample packet, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any place in Egypt, except Alexandria and Suez, and transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to Egypt, there shall be charged the rate or rates of postage hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Every packet transmitted by the post, viâ Italy, by British packet boat, under the authority of this Warrant, shall be subject to the regulations and conditions now in force applicable to similar packets authorized, by certain Treasury Warrants dated respectively the 11th day of March, 1865, the 16th day of March, 1865, the 18th day of June, 1866, and the 6th day of June, 1868, to be transmitted from the United Kingdom to Alexandria and Suez in the closed mail, via Marseilles, and by British packet boat; and every packet transmitted by the post, via Gibraltar, by British packet boat, under the authority of this Warrant, shall be subject to the regulations and conditions now in force applicable to similar packets authorized, by certain Treasury Warrants dated respectively the 3rd day of February, 1860, the 17th day of February, 1864, the 18th day of June, 1866, and the 6th day of June, 1868, to be transmitted from the United Kingdom to Alexandria and Suez, viâ Southampton, by British packet boat.

3. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.
