Harwich, January 30.

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He Four Convoy ships from Hamburgh, (which weie for some time missing) viz. The Monke, the Amity, the Breda, and the Guist, were discerned about Sunday noon, going to Anchor at Oasley Bar, where at present they remaine.

Dublin, Jan. 27. On Tuessiay last the Court of Claimes

fate, heard some morions, appointed daies of hearing several causes, and adjourned the Court till the 31 instant. Two Gaboards were funck in this Harbour, and a Ship laden with Canary wines bulged, of which, it is feated, little can be re-

Kingsale, Jan. 23. On Saturday last here arrived 2 great Ships from the Barbadoes, the Daniel of London, Captain Samuel Randall Commander, of 12 Guns, and the Adventure of London, Capt. Etherton Commander, of 14 guns, the latter of which meeting with a Flushinger, killed and wounded 22 of them, as we are affured by feveral Veffels, and more particularly by that Ships Company, who (as you were lately told) regained their Veffel, after they had been in the power of this Flushinger. Five other Barbadoes Ships were in fight with a Flushinger of 36 guns, one of which was taken, and 4 escaped. A Ship of London from Bermulas, Capt. Bargrave Commander, and a Ship from the Mederas ceme in this day.

Marseilles, fan. 19. The St. Malo Ships are now at Toulon, attending Monsieur de Beauforts Order for their departure, whole Fleet being intended to carrene, it is thought they will be disappointed of their Convoy, in regard they cannot be ready in a Moneth, and what course they will then

mke, most conceive is yet unresolved.

This day came in a Ship of this Town from Alexandria, in 25 daies, who adviseth, that the Grand Signor has stopt several Ships for his service to carry Men and Provisions for Candia.

Legorne, fan. 16. On the 12 instant the Tunis Merchant arrived here, coming from Algier in 11 daies, who adviseth that an Algier Ship had burnt the Charity of Hamburgh, bound hither from Archangel, with 106 packs of Hides, &c. He faies farther, that the Algier Men had funck a Dunkerke Fregor with 300 Soldiers coming from Spaine and Naples, and several Dutch and French. The Peace which Naples, and several Dutch and French. the French have concluded with Tunks, is reported here with much dishonour to the French; and the Italians understand it so, the humor of Tunis being cniefly to follow Trade, in which they found themselves so much debarred, that they were in consultation to deliver up the French Captives gratis; and indeed they might have been brought to any termes, had the French not been so forward to patch up a Peace with them. Since Genoua made their Agreement with the Grand Signor for Traffique, they are endeavouring to make all forts of Cloth to fend for Smyrna and Constantinople: The Grand Duke hath for some time been deteined by an Imposthume at Florence, from whence he is weekly expected, with the Court at Fisa.

Cleve, Jan. 26. Monsieur Beverling is arrived here, and Monsieur Colbert shortly expected, who brings with him a rich Furniture of a Chamber, as a present from the King of France to the Electres. Beverling has been offered as is reported, to be put into the States General for his life, and to be made Burgomaster of the Town of Targo, but excuses all upon pretence of his want of health to undergoe thole employments; though it is suspected he hath other reasons for not mixing in the present Government.

Hamburgh, Jan. 13. The Swedes are now in earnest upon their march over the Eluc, and the Country people

about us, though they have no cause for it, are so jealous of fuffering from the Soldiery, that yesterday they sent into this City above 200 Waggons, laden with Housholdstuff for security. Some would have it that Bremen is not yet fully agreed, but they cannot but fee the necessity of falling into the Swedes hands, if they should offer to oppose them. Some further lefign, 'its certain they have in hand, supposed to beliege Embden, and we have received from a very good hand, that the Swedes have fent to the Duke of Lunenburgh to confider well how he engages, or disposes of his Forces against the Prince of Munjier, or in aid of the Hollanders. And furely there is something more then ordinary in it, at least, those of Munster apprehend it so; for in the Prince of Munster's Court, in their general Healths, 'tis observed, that, next to that of His Majesties of Great Britain, they remember the King of Sweden's, and then Genell rangels.

Warsham, fan. 7. We are now againe at a stand, to judge what will be the end of the Assair with Lubomirshi, who instead of sending his Plenipotentiaties to the Treaty, according to his promise, on the 15 of December, has in his Letter follicited that the High Marelchal, the Master of the Horse, and the Referendarius of the Crown, might be sent as Commissioners to the Frontiers of Silesia to Treat with him: This Proposition is not accepted by His Majesty, but referred to the Lord Bishop of Cracan, who has all along treated with Lubomirski, to confer farther with him concerning it, according to the Declaration, published in Rawa and Palezin.

Rome, Jan. 16. In the Consistory held the 11 instant, his Holynels represented to the Cardinalls the great apprehenfions he had, that Christendome would break out again into Warrs, and defired the affiftance of their Prayers for preventing them. The Cardinal Corrado, the Datary, took the Popes chiding, you heard of, so much to heart; that he is now reduced almost to the last gaspe. Here are come to this Town a company of Ordinary Players, who acted a play Entituled Scaramuccia foldato a Gigiri controi Mori, which reflecting upon the Frenches late dilgrace there, Monsieur de Burlement, who acts here for the French King, complained to the Popes Neph, wof this deligned insolence and Nationall dishonour, as he called it; upon which the poor Players are laid by the heeles, which the Town takes very ill, as being in this time of Recreation denied the contentment of a peice of mirth, which was acted it feems at Florence, and other parts of Italy, with great applause. Here is in Town the Prince of Baviere, Brother to that Elector, the younger Brother of the Duke of Longueville, and a fon of the Count of Harcourt, who came to see the curiofities of this City.

Durham, Jan. 27. Wednesday last was buried here Mr. Anthony Pearsons man particularly noted in these parts, for having passed heretofore through all the degrees of Separation and Phanaticism, in all of which he was ever observed as a principal leader; but having lived to see his Error sometime before his death, he himself, with his children and family, had received Episcopal confirmation, and did now at last upon his Deathbed very solemnly confess his former Errors, and the party that first seduced him into them, declaring that he now dyed a true Son of the Church of Eng-

Falmouth, Jan. 27. A Vessel of about 80 Tuns arrived here from Dublin, bound, with Tallow, Hides, and provision, for Cadiz, which proves so leaky, that she was forced to run ashoare here, and appears to be so unable to performe her voyage, that the Mafter will be obliged to fell Ship and Goods. Several of the Ministers, &c. of this County have made their subscriptions required by the late Act of Parliament.

Smyrns, Dec. 9. The four English General ships, viz. The Royal Katharine, Sampson, &c. are yet in Harbor, and in expectation of Convoy. A Jew is lately returned hither (born and bred in this place) from Ferufalem, win pretends to be the Messias; for which imposture, he was banishe! hence five or fix years ago. He is about 35 years of age, and is grown to that credit, that no Jew dare open his mouth against him, for fear of the multitude, being reverenced and adered by the Chacams and chiefest of the Jews. That which contributes much to this delufion, is a confederacy of about 30 persons, who take upon themselves the gift of Prophecy, and Point at him as the Messias. Many strange feats they say to hath done, and that he hath promited in their Synagogue within a few days to raile a dead man from the Grave.

Hague, Feb. 1. How severe soever the Province of Holland hath been in prohibiting the Printing or Dispersing the Copies of the King of Great Britains late Letter by Van Goch; yet we finde some numbers of it, have been brought in, and verfeed here by a private hand, who, it is faid, received them And fince the people have looked into it, and from Cleve. feen the disposition of the King of England, to give a Peace upon just and reasonable terms, they cry out much against the Province of Holland, as an enemy to it, having endeavored to avowedly to stifle this Letter, by which alone they could be undeceived from the falle opinion they were in of the King of Englands aversion to all terms of Peace and Accommodati-

Amsterdam, Feb.1. We fear much the credit of the Genezality will ere long fail; for they as well as the several parti-cular Provinces, begin to call upon that of Holland, to support and fortifie their credit, which they of Holland have as

plainly refused to do. The Brandenburgh Envoyes press hard to be received in their new Character, but no answer is yet found for them. The Sieur Beverling hath found greater rubs in his first address at Cleve than were imagined. 1. The Elector demands restination of the Tolls at Genrep. 2. A regulation of Quarterings and Musters through his Countreys. 3. He will offer Model of an Agreement for the Bishop. 4. Instead of Twelve thousand he talks of but Ten thousand men.

All the hope Isbrands gives us from Sweden, after all our great brags, is, If we can obtain by the means of France, that they may but stand Neuters.

We cannot yet finde our Treaty with Denmark concluded, some parts remaining, it seems, yet unagreed, especially that of the extent of the Alliance.

Paris, Febr. 6. Since the War is declared, several places must be strengthened, and our Ports better provided. find our neighbors arm, and must now look about us. If we look one way we finde Naples raising 1200 men, 4000 out of sardinia, 6000 out of Flanders and Brabant, and the King of Spain giving out Commissions and Money to that purpose, and sending 150 M. Crowns out of Catalonia, for the immediate fertifying of those places. If we look the other way, our Garilons feem too weak to receive such atraques as may well be expected; and to that purpole Monsieur de Navilles sends for more Forces, and wonders there is any difficulty made of dispatching to him 6000 men, declaring, that he could not answer for the security of Rockel, Bronage, and the Isles of Rhe and Oleron, without such Sup-Montieur de Beaufort is to be hastned to Sea to joyn with the Dutch, and the Count de Vivonne to depart speedily with the Galleys, and all this hurry to hazard a Trade we have but newly begun, and amidst the Wars, can have but small hope to carry on to any purpole.

Newcastle, Fan. 30. On Sunday last, three small Vessels came into this Halbor, two laden with Corn from Eerwick for this Port, the other from the same place for France; but fince upon better information, both altered that resolution. They did lie a long time in Holy Island, forced in thither by a Holland Man of War, whom they saw every day till Weanesay last, when they suppose he was driven off the Coails without any purchase. Last night the most part of the laden Coal Plest fee fail, the rest intend is this night, if the wind ftand fair.

Bridgemater, Jan. 30. Just now we hear of two Earls cast away, coming from Eristal to this Post.

Flymouth, Jan. 30. The Richmond is gone again to Sea with tome other Men of War, and Merchantmen in company. The Adventure is come in hither, having crackt his Main-Mast and Fore-Mast. A French ship of 40 or 50 Tuns is put inte St. Ives in Cornwal, laden with Herrings. This Evening came in a Vellel laden with Canaries, bound for Ostend,

Bristol, Jan. 31. We have the news of a Duch Coper call away in this Channel, but have not yet the particulars. The George Fregor hath been in very great danger, being after many extremities, fun ashore near Padstow in Cornwal; but she being already eated of her Guns, and other weighty parts of her burthen, there is hope of bringing her off next tide. The last week arrived two ships from Guiney, which touched at the Barbadees, laden with Elephants Teetles &c. for the account of the Royal Company, as is faid. One from Virginia with Tobacco and Bevers and one from New-England with Fish. Two ships are this day come in from Bourdeaux with Wine; one from Oftend with Hors, &c. And about seven from several Ports in Ireland.

Lime, Fan. 31. Yesterday arrived a small Vessel of this place, who being put into Dartmouth by the late stormes, brings news that a French Vessel laden with Linnen, arrived there from Roscoe, a place neer Morlaix in Britany, and that he came thence but 3 daies fince 5 which confidence we somewhat wonder at, after the Declaration of a War with

England.

York, Jan. 31. Sir Thomas Clifford His Majesties Envoy Extraordinary to the Crowns of Sweden and Denmark landed at Scarborough, and came hither last night, intending to go Post hence for the Court this afternoon.

Harwich, Febr. 1. On Tuelday, about noon, the Plymouth receiving Orders to go for Portsmouth, let fail from Oasely Bay, and making towards the Downs, met with fixteen Holland Wen of War, of which two were Flag Ships. Two of the Holland Ships gave chase to the Plymouth, the other fourteen backing them, who when they found the Plymouth joyning with four other English Men of War there, being those Ships that returned from convoying our Merchant Men to Hamburgh, they durst not edventure an attaque; but, after firing about twenty Gans at the Plymouth, fneak'd away in the night.

Deal, Febr. 2. Sir Christopher Minnes lies in the Downs with a Squadron of twenty five flout Ships, whither some other Ships are ordred to repair to him, so that, in a short time, we may expect a fair account of the Dutch, if they shall have

the hardine's still to keep their station.

White-Hall, Febr. 2.
