From Tarin we are informed that the Cornival being now out, wherein were not wanting any Diversions that could be thought of for the satisfaction of the Duke and Duches; the said Duke is since gone to take a view of the Fortifications of Verceil and other; laces of strength upon the Frontiers, and to give order for the spee y furnishing them

with all things necessary for their desence.

Hambourgh, Feb. 28. We are here making preparations for the Reception of the young Prince of Tuscany, daily expected in this city. Late Letters from Warsaw, inform u., that the Diet there assumed, still continue their retolution for the dimission of the French Ambassador from the Court; having also desired the retinement of all other tenvoyés and Ministers of Forreign Princes: It having been also moved in the Diet that a Law be made, by which for the future no Forreign Minister shall have liberty to make a longer Residen e in that Court, or to make a longer stay in that City, then what shall be thought necessary for the dispatch of their business onely; and that Cautions may be taken, to prevent their Insuences upon the Governmen, to the disturbance of the Publick.

The City of Danizick have sent two Deputies to assist at the Dirt, but with Orders to press had for the Prefervation of their Priviledges, in which if they find any difficulties, they are to return home again with all speed, and not to attend the Conclusion of the Diet.

There are also arrived two Ambassadors show the Cossacks, the princip I buse ess of their Ambassy being to attend the Diet, for the Russication of the Treaty late y concluded with them, proteiting the simmers of their Resolution for the strict Observation thereof. They have given His Majesty an ample relation of their late Incursions into Crim Tartary, from whence they released above ten thousand Christian Copieses; and that they have left in that Countrey great marks of their tury, having put all their old men to the Sword, and made threes of an incredible number of young men and women, carrying off a I their Cattle, with great shore of Plunder.

"Tis faid that the Circles of Wellphaly and the Rhine, have by their Deputies allembled at Brunswick, agree I upon a League for their mutual defence and succours, and that his Majesty of Swedeland is sending thither his Minister, with intention to enter also into the same Agreement.

From Heidelberg we are informed that there are lately arisen some misunder tandings between his Highness the Prince Elector Palatine and the Bishop of Wormes, occasioned by some abuses committed by the Bishops Offi ersupon the Processant Inhabitants of Hemspach, and that the said Prince Elector is making great Preparation for War, buying great numbers of Armes and Horses, and has already a considerable force in readiness.

From Frankfort, they tell us that the Emperors Drums are there beating up for SoulJiers, which come in with much cheerfulnels, the Officers which encouraging them by the affurance

of more than ordinary pay.

Bruffels, Mar 3. The Enemy still continues foraging and spoiling the Countrey, forcing all places within his reach into contribution, which keeps us still upon our Guards, and to the intent that all our forces may be in greater readiness to oppose them, still order is given to all our Officers to repair to their respective Commands, and so attend the motion of the Enemy.

In the mean time His Excellency the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo, to shew his readiness to comply with the Mediators for the composure of the differences between the two Crowns of Spain and France, has been pleased to accept of the Alternative as it was proposed, is willing to accept of a Truce and Cessation of all Ass of Hostility during the Moneths of March, Apr 1, and May following, and bath nominated the Baron of Bergeyck to be tent with sufficient Powers and Instructions to Aix la Chapelle to assist at the

Treaty, and conclude (if proffibly he may), a happy Peace.
