Salisbury, Novemb. 14.

ON Monday last, the Lord Cornbury pretending to have received Orders from His Majesty, caused the Royal Regiment of Horse, the Royal Regiment of Dragoons, whereof he was Colonel, and the Duke of St. Albans's Regiment of Horse commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Langston, to march from hence to Dorchester, where they refreshed themselves, and then went on to Bridport and Axminster. Several of the Officers apprehending some Treachery, asked my Lord Cornbury *Whither they were going?* who answered, *To beat up the Enemies Quarters at Honiton*; but finding the Royal Regiment of Horse, and several Officers of the Dragoons did more and more suspect the Treason, he marched with the Officers and Dragoons that would follow him towards Honiton, Lieutenant Colonel Langston marching before with the Regiment of St. Albans. And the Royal Regiment of Horse, and the rest of the Dragoons marched back towards Bridport, being very much wearied by their long Marches, and put into some disorder by so great a Treachery. The Earl of Feversham, Lieutenant General of his Majesties Forces arrived here Yesterday.

Salisbury, Nov. 15. All the Royal Regiment of Horse, both Officers and Soldiers, are returned hither, except one Lieutenant and two Cornets and some few Troopers who are still missing. The Regiment of St. Albans commanded by Langston, and the Lord Cornbury with part of the Dragoons marched directly into Honiton, the Enemies Quarter. Sir Hugh Middleton, a Captain in the Regiment of St. Albans, having made his Escape, is likewise returned, and declares that all the Dragoons are come off,

except an Advanced Detachment consisting of eight out of each Troop; And that such Officers and Troopers, of those that were betrayed into the Enemies Quarters, as would not take Service with them are stript, and their Horses taken from them. Capt. Smith of the said Regiment, did not march with it from hence, being lame. Major Littleton, Major of the Royal Regiment of Horse, is just now arrived here, and assures us, there are not 10 Troopers wanting of the said Regiment, which sufficiently shews how firm they are in their Fidelity to His Majesty. And about 50 Troopers of the Regiment of St. Albans are come back. The Earl of Feversham sent this Morning a Party to Blandford, and another to Warminster.

Florence, Octob. 29. The Marquis Corsini Ambassador Extraordinary from our Great Duke to the Elector of Bavaria, parted from hence yesterday for Munick, to make the solemn Demand of the Princess Yolande Beatrix, for the Prince of Tuscany, and to conduct her hither, where she is expected about the end of December. The Officers of her House will begin their Journey the next Week to receive the Princess at Mittenwaldt, on the Frontiers of Bavaria.

Venice, Octob. 30. A Vessel is arrived here from Corfu, which met the Gallies of Malta in their return home. The last advice from Negrepont is, that all things were ready for a general Assault.

Vienna, Novemb. 4. The last Letters from Belgrade inform us, That General Capara had been again to visit Semandria; That Major-General Hensler was still in the Field with the Troops under his Command, to secure the Country-People against the Excursions of the Turks, who continue to raine the Frontiers, that the Imperialists may not draw from thence any Forage or Provisions for their Subsistence; That Teckley was with a small Body of Turks

Turks and Hungarians near *Nicopolis*; and that it was reported that the Grand Visier was come to *Sophia* with 16 or 12000 Men. Prince *Louis of Baden* continues his Progresses in *Bosnia*, having made himself Master of *Czernicke*, in which there was a Garrison of 300 Men, who surrendered upon condition to march out with their Arms and Baggage. By the taking of this place all the Country on that side will be put under Contribution. The Turks of *Rusim*, *Crup*, and *Uranagras*, in *Croatia*, having assembled and made an Excursion towards *Novi*, burning several Villages, the Governor of that place sallied out, and put them to flight, killing 30, and taking 25 Prisoners. There are two Deputies from the Prince and States of *Valachia* come as far as *Croistadt* in their way hither, with Proposals of Submission; but on several Pretences they delay their Journey, to see what the Turkish Embassy will produce. The Ambassadors from the Port do in the mean time press with great earnestness to be admitted to an Audience, which the Emperor will not grant till he has received the Answer of his Allies upon the late Communication that was given them of the Copies of the Grand Signior and Visier's Letters. An Express has brought the News of the Surrender of *Philipsburg*, upon which a great Council has been held here, and Couriers have been dispatched to divers Courts. We are told from the Camp commanded by General *Bethiani* in the Neighborhood of *Canisa*, That the said General having sent two Turkish Slaves, (the one taken at *Belgrade*, the other in *Bosnia*) with Letters to the Bassa and Garrison of *Canisa*, advising them of the present condition of their Affairs, and inviting them to Surrender upon Good Terms, they returned the next day with the Letters sealed as they had been delivered to them, and brought for answer, That the Bassa and Garrison thanked him for his kind Offers to them, but that they had by order in their publick Divan, that they would defend the place to the last Extremity.

And if any Commander in Chief shall fail therein, We do hereby declare Our Resolution, upon Complaint, to punish such Commander in Chief by Cassiering, or otherwise, and to cause such Injury to be redressed, and the Debt to be duly satisfied without delay.
