PRESENT,

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, chapter seventy-eight, it is, amongst other things, enacted "that it shall and may be lawful for the Lords and others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, to make such Order as they shall see necessary and expedient upon any unforeseen emergency, or in any particular case or cases, with respect to any vessel arriving and having any infectious disease or distemper on board, or on board of which any infectious disease, or distemper may have appeared in the course of the voyage, or arriving under any other alarming or suspicious circumstances as to infection, although such vessel shall not have come from any place from which His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, may have adjudged and declared it probable that the Plague, or any such infectious disease or distemper may be brought, and also with respect to the persons, goods, wares, and merchandize, and other articles, as aforesaid, on board the same; and in case of any infectious disease or distemper appearing or breaking out in the United Kingdom or the islands aforesaid, to make such Orders and give such direction, in order to cut off all communication between any persons infected with any such disease or distemper, and the rest of His Majesty's subjects, as shall appear to the Lords or others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, to be necessary and expedient for that purpose, and likewise to make such Orders as they shall see fit, for shortening the time of quarantine to be performed by particular vessels or particular persons, goods, wares, merchandize, or any other articles, or for absolutely or conditionally releasing them, or any of them, from quarantine; and all such Orders so made by the Lords or others of the Privy Council, or any two or more of them, as aforesaid, shall be as good, valid, and effectual, to all intents and purposes, as well with respect to the Commander, Master, or

other person, having the charge of any vessel, and all other persons on-board the same, as with respect to any other persons having any intercourse or communication with them, and to the penalties, forfeitures, and punishments to which they may respectively become liable, as any Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, concerning quarantine notified by Proclamation or published in the London Gazette."

And whereas by "The Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1867," it is (among other things) enacted (section fifty-six) as follows:—

"Every ship having on board any person affected with a dangerous or infectious disorder shall be deemed to be within the provisions of the Act of the sixth year of King George the Fourth, chapter seventy-eight, intituled 'An Act to repeal the several laws relating to Quarantine, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof,' although such ship has not commenced the voyage, or has come from or is bound for some place in the United Kingdom; and nothing in this Act contained shall interfere with or prevent the execution of any orders, regulations, or restrictions to be made by the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council pursuant to the said Act; and any expenses incurred by any Local Authority in carrying into effect such orders, regulations, or restrictions, shall be deemed to be expenses incurred by them in carrying into effect this Act; and all penalties imposed by the said Act of the sixth year of King George the Fourth, chapter seventy-eight, may be reduced by the Justices or Court having jurisdiction in respect of such penalties, to such sum as the Justices or Court think just."

And whereas the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by two Orders, bearing date the third day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, did make certain rules, orders, and regulations, and by another Order, bearing date the fifth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, did make further regulations:

And whereas cholera is now prevalent in certain parts of Continental Europe with which this country has communication, and it is expedient that the said rules, orders, and regulations should be rescinded, and other rules, orders, and regulations substituted in their place:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue of the

powers in this behalf by the recited enactments, or otherwise, in them vested, do hereby rescind all such rules, orders, and regulations in the above recited Orders contained, which apply to Scotland, and except in so far as they may apply to any proceedings now pending, and they do hereby order as follows:—

Definitions.

ART. 1. In this Order:—

The term "Ship" includes vessel or boat;

The term "Officer of Customs" includes any person having authority from the Commissioners of Customs;

The term "Master" includes the officer or person for the time being in charge or command of a ship;

The term "Cholera" includes Choleraic Diarrhoea;

The term "Local Authority" has the same meaning as in "The Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1867";

The term "Clothing and Bedding" includes all clothing and bedding in actual use and worn or used by the person attacked, at the time of or during the attack of cholera.

For the purposes of this Order, every ship shall be deemed infected with cholera, in which there is or has been during the voyage or during the stay of such ship in a foreign port in the course of such voyage, any case of cholera.

I.—Regulations as to Customs Inspection.

ART. 2. If any Officer of Customs, on the arrival within the limits of any port in Scotland of any ship, ascertains from the master of such ship or otherwise, or has reason to suspect, that the ship is infected with cholera, he may detain such ship; and order the master forthwith to moor or anchor the same; and thereupon the master shall forthwith moor or anchor the ship in such position as such Officer of Customs shall direct.

ART. 3. Whilst such ship shall be so detained, no person shall leave the same.

ART. 4. The Officer of Customs detaining any ship as aforesaid, shall forthwith give notice thereof, and of the cause of such detention, to the Local Authority of the District within which the ship shall be detained.

ART. 5. Such detention by the Officer of Customs shall cease as soon as the said ship shall have been duly visited and examined by the proper Officer of the Local Authority; or, if the ship shall, upon such examination, be found to be infected with cholera, as soon as the same shall be anchored or moored in pursuance of Art. 9 of this Order.

Provided, that if the examination be not commenced within twelve hours after notice given as aforesaid, the ship shall, on the expiration of the said twelve hours, be released from detention.

II.—Regulations as to Local Authorities.

ART. 6. The Local Authority at every port shall, as speedily as practicable, with the approval of the Chief Officer of Customs of such port, fix some place or places within the said port where any ship may be detained, moored, or anchored, for the purpose of these regulations.

ART. 7. Any officer appointed by such Local Authority to see to the carrying out of this Order, if he have reason to believe that any ship arriving within the district of such Authority, whether examined by the Officer of Customs or not, is infected with cholera, or shall have come from a

place infected with cholera, may visit and examine such ship, for the purpose of ascertaining whether it is so infected; and the master of such ship shall suffer the same to be so visited and examined.

ART. 8. The Local Authority, on notice being given to them by an Officer of Customs, under this Order, shall forthwith cause the ship in regard to which such notice shall have been given, to be visited and examined by their Medical Officer, or some other legally qualified medical practitioner, for the purpose of ascertaining whether it is infected with cholera.

ART. 9. The master of every ship which is infected with cholera shall, after any such examination as aforesaid, as long as the ship is within the district of a Local Authority, moor or anchor her in such position as from time to time the said Authority shall direct.

ART. 10. No person shall leave any such ship until the examination hereinafter mentioned shall have been made.

ART. 11. The Local Authority shall, as soon as possible after the arrival of any such ship, cause all persons on board of the same to be examined by their Medical Officer, or some other legally qualified medical practitioner, and shall permit all persons who shall not be certified by him, as hereafter mentioned, to land immediately.

ART. 12. Every person certified by the Medical Officer or medical practitioner making such examination, to be suffering from cholera, shall be dealt with under any rules that may have been made by the Local Authority under the 55th section of the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1867, or, where no such rules shall have been made, shall be removed, if the condition of the patient admit of it, to some hospital or place previously appointed for such purpose by the said Authority; and no person so removed shall leave such hospital or place until the Medical Officer of the Local Authority, or some other legally qualified medical practitioner appointed by them, shall have certified that such person is free from the said disease.

If any person suffering from cholera cannot be removed, the ship shall remain subject, for the purposes of this Order, to the control of the Medical Officer, or some other legally qualified medical practitioner appointed by the said Authority; and in such case no person shall be removed from or leave the ship, except with the consent in writing of the said Medical Officer or other medical practitioner.

ART. 13. Such Medical Officer or medical practitioner shall give directions, and take such steps as may appear to him to be necessary, for preventing the spread of the infection, and the master of the said ship shall forthwith carry into execution such directions as shall be given to him by such officer or practitioner.

ART. 14. Any person certified by such Medical Officer or medical practitioner as aforesaid to be suffering from any diarrhoeal or other illness which he may suspect to be cholera, may either be detained on board the ship or taken to some hospital or other previously appointed place, and detained there, for any period not exceeding two days, until it be ascertained whether the illness is or is not cholera.

Any such person who, while so detained, shall be certified by the said Medical Officer or medical practitioner to be suffering from cholera, shall be dealt with as in the above article relating to patients suffering from that disease.

ART. 15. In the event of any death from cholera taking place on board of such vessel while so detained, the master shall cause the dead body

to be taken out to sea, and committed to the deep, properly loaded to prevent its rising.

ART. 16. The master shall cause the clothing and bedding of every person who may have suffered from cholera on board such vessel, or who, having at any time been on board such vessel, shall have suffered from cholera during the stay of such vessel in a foreign port, to be destroyed; and if the master shall have neglected to do so before the ship arrives in port, he shall forthwith, or upon the direction of the said Authority, cause the same to be destroyed at the sight, and under the direction, of the Medical Officer; and if the said master neglect to comply with such direction, the Local Authority shall cause the same to be carried into execution.

ART. 17. The master shall cause every part of the ship, and every article therein, other than those last described, which may probably be infected with cholera, to be disinfected or destroyed, when required to do so by the said Authority, or by their Medical Officer, at the sight and under the direction of the said Medical Officer.

ART. 18. Every person obstructing the Local Authority in carrying this Order into effect, or otherwise offending against this Order, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

WHEREAS an Act was passed in the thirtieth and thirty-first years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend the law relating to the Public Health in Scotland;" and by the thirty-first section of the said Act it is enacted, that "whenever any part of the United Kingdom appears to be threatened with, or is affected by, any formidable epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them, (the Lord President of the Council or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State being one), may, by Order or Orders by them from time to time made, direct that the provisions for the prevention of diseases, contained in Part III hereof, be put in force in Scotland, or in such parts thereof, or in such places therein, as in such Order or Orders may be expressed, and may from time to time, as to all or any of the parts or places to which any such Order or Orders extend, and in like manner, revoke or renew any such Order; and, subject to revocation and renewal as aforesaid, every such Order shall be in force for six calendar months, or for such shorter period as in such Order shall be expressed; and every such Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any Members thereof as aforesaid, shall be certified under the hand of the Clerk in Ordinary of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and shall be published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and such publication shall be conclusive evidence of such Order."

And whereas the United Kingdom appears to be threatened with a certain epidemic disease, that is to say, the Asiatic Cholera; and whereas it is expedient to make provision thereanent:—

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the above recited section of the said recited Act, the Lords of the Council do order, and it is hereby ordered, that the provisions for the prevention of diseases, contained in Part III of the Act thirty and thirty-first Victoria, chapter one hundred and one, be put in force in Scotland, for the space of six calendar months, after the publication of this Order in the Edinburgh Gazette.

An Act to raise the sum of one million six hundred thousand pounds sterling, by Exchequer Bonds, for the service of the year ending on the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four.

An Act for the relief of widows and children of intestates where the personal estate is of small value.

An Act to amend the Law relating to the superannuation of prison officers in Ireland.

An Act to make better provision respecting certain sums payable to schoolmasters of Highland schools under the Act of the session of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter eighty-seven, intituled "An Act to facilitate the foundation and endowment of additional Schools in Scotland."

An Act to amend the Medical Acts, so far as relates to the University of London.

An Act to reduce the limit of the available balance of the Treasury Chest Fund.

An Act to make provision for the redemption of divers permanent charges on the Consolidated Fund and on the Votes of Parliament.

An Act for making provision for facilitating the manœuvres of troops to be assembled during the ensuing autumn.

An Act to abandon the Mumbles Extension of the Swansea and Carmarthen Railway Company, and to extend the time for the compulsory purchase of land and completion of railway of the Company at Carmarthen, to confer powers upon the Company with reference to the undertakings of other Companies; and for other purposes.

An Act for authorising the sale and transfer of the undertakings of the Metropolitan Street Tramways Company and the Pimlico, Peckham, and Greenwich Street Tramways Company to the London Tramways Company Limited; and for other purposes.

An Act for granting further powers to the Nottingham Gas Light and Coke Company.

An Act for supplying with water certain parishes and places in the county of Edinburgh.

An Act to authorise the construction of a railway from Bala to Festiniog, in the county of Merioneth; and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Great Northern Railway Company to extend their railway from Melton Mowbray to Leicester; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the North British Railway Company to make several railways, and to purchase additional station lands, to abandon certain railways, to extend the time for sale of certain superfluous lands, to authorise agreements with the North Monkland Railway Company, and with the Corporation of Burntisland, purchase of the Broxburn Railway and amalgamation with the Glasgow

 - (B.) The theory of the prism.
 - (C.) Chromatic dispersion and the spectrum.
 - (D.) The formation of images by plane mirrors and simple lenses.
 - (E.) The theory of the eye.
6. Chemistry, Photography, and Spectroscopy. Candidates will be required to show a competent knowledge of each of these subjects.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn this seventeenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, before the Queen's Remembrancer, at Goldsmith's Hall, in the city of London, have made the Assays and Trials of Her Majesty's Gold and Silver Coins in the Pyx of the Mint, and which, according to accounts produced by the officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Mint from the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins, both of gold and silver, in each packet produced to us, corresponded with the number which the officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took a coin or coins from each of such packets of Gold coins, making altogether sixty-two sovereigns or twenty shilling pieces, and thirty-five half-sovereigns or ten shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, so as to ascertain whether they were within the remedy prescribed in the First Schedule of the Coinage Act, 1870. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule of the said Act was minus one-thousandth of an ounce (or 0·001) on the whole of such coins, and that, therefore, they were within the prescribed remedy as to weight. We then melted the said Gold coins so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the Standard Gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was one ten-thousandth part (or 0·0001), and, therefore, that the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue six sovereigns and three half-sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respectively:—the first 123·372 grains, the second 123·302 grains, the third 123·122 grains, the fourth 123·292 grains, the fifth 123·242 grains, and the sixth 123·242 grains; and that such half-sovereigns weighed respectively:—the first 61·586 grains, the second 61·686 grains, and the third 61·636 grains. We then assayed the said six sovereigns and three half-sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be 916·6, 916·6, 916·6, 916·5, 916·7, 916·75, respectively, and the millesimal fineness of such half-sovereigns to be 916·5, 916·65, and 916·6, respectively. We also took a coin from each of such packets of Silver coins, making altogether one hundred and four florins, ninety-six shillings, forty-four sixpences, and of Maundy monies, one fourpenny piece and

twenty-eight threepences, and weighed each of the said Silver coins separately, so as to ascertain whether they were within the remedy of the said First Schedule of the said Coinage Act, 1870. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule of the said Act was minus four-thousandth of an ounce (or 0·004) on the whole of such coins, and that, therefore, they were within the prescribed remedy as to weight. We then melted the said Silver coins, so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the Standard Silver Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act, was nil, and that the said metal was exactly Standard, and, therefore, within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Silver coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue two florins, two shillings, and one sixpence, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such florins weighed, respectively, the first 174·345 grains, and the second 174·495 grains, and that such shillings weighed, respectively, the first 87·142 grains, and the second 87·352 grains, and that such sixpence weighed 43·586 grains. We then assayed the said two florins, the said two shillings, and the said sixpence separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such florins to be 924·6 and 925·5 respectively, of such shillings to be 925·8 and 924·1 respectively, and of such sixpence to be 926·4.
