Board of Trade, Whitehall Gardens, July 31, 1873.

THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Berlin, announcing the passing of a Bill through the German Reichstag effecting the following alterations in the Zollverein Customs' Tariff:—

On and after the 1st October next, pig iron, old broken iron of all kinds, sea-going ships with their anchors, chains, boilers, steam-engines, &c., steam engines and boilers to be used in the building of sea-going steam ships, raw steel by sea from the Russian frontier to the mouths of the Vistula imported by permission for steel manufacturers,

unripe green unpeeled oranges, and unripe yellow peeled oranges in brine, will be admitted free. Manufactured iron other than as above specified, railway carriages, fishing nets, soda, and straw hats or bonnets will be admitted after the same date at duties reduced to the extent of about two-thirds of the previous rates. Manufactured iron, starch, powder (meal), and arrowroot will be admitted free after the 1st January, 1877. The export duty on rags and waste for the manufacture of paper will be abolished on the 1st October next.
