HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased to declare the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, Lord President of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and his Lordship, having taken the oaths of office, took his place at the Board accordingly.

Her Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Robert Lowe, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, he was this day, by Her Majesty's command, sworn one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State accordingly.

This day, William Patrick Adam, Esquire, was, by Her Majesty's command, sworn of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board, a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas in your Majesty's Order in Council of twenty-second of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, governing the promotion and retirement of Flag Officers and others of your Majesty's Fleet, clause six of section two appoints as follows :—

“Captains retired from that rank to be entitled to rise by seniority to the rank of Retired Rear-Admiral, if, before retirement, they had served the time to qualify them for promotion.” And

whereas we are of opinion that this condition may be modified, we humbly propose to your Majesty that the clause above recited be cancelled, and the following substituted :—

“Captains who have been, or who may in future be, retired from that rank under your Majesty's Order in Council of the twenty-second of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, to be entitled to rise by seniority to the rank of Retired Rear-Admiral if they have served three years as Captain in command of a ship-of-war at sea.” And whereas clause five of section two of your Majesty's said Order in Council is as follows :—“To qualify a Captain whose seniority brings him in turn for advancement to the Active List of Flag Officers, he must have completed six years' sea service as Captain, or its equivalent in harbour service, but the first three years of such period must be sea service in command of a ship-of-war at sea : such Officers as arrive at their turn for promotion, without having completed the qualifying service, to be retired.” And whereas in section five, which defines harbour service, clause two contains the following sub-clause :—

(a.) “Service in harbour ships or their tenders (with the exception of the harbour ships and tenders at Ascension, Port Royal, Hong Kong, and Rio de Janeiro, and at such other foreign ports as we may determine), and service in First Reserve (Coast Guard) ships, after the first three years of such service, such first three years to reckon as sea service.”

“And whereas we are of opinion that the above recited clauses may render it unduly difficult for Captains, who as Lieutenants qualified in harbour ships, as Gunnery Lieutenants, and also in some other special cases, to obtain the amount of service required to qualify them for promotion to Flag Rank.

“We therefore humbly propose to your Majesty that the sub-clause above recited of the second clause of the fifth section of your Majesty's said Order in Council be cancelled, and the following sub-clause substituted :

(a.) “Service of an Officer when borne on the books of any harbour ship, or of any First Reserve (Coast Guard) ship, subject to the following exceptions :—

1. “Three years served in any harbour ship or First Reserve (Coast Guard) ship, or in any tender to such ship, as Lieutenant or Commander, or in those ranks combined, shall count as sea-service, but not as sea service in a ship of war at sea.

2. "Three years served either before or after the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, or partly before and partly after that date, as Captain in command of any harbour ship or First Reserve (Coast Guard) ship, or any tender to such ship, shall count as sea service, but not as sea service in a ship of war at sea. This shall not apply to any Officer who retired before the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

3. "Service subsequent to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, in tenders to harbour ships and to First Reserve (Coast Guard) ships at home, and in harbour ships abroad, and their tenders, shall, in such cases as we may direct, count as service in a ship of war at sea."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to appoint Charles George Guy Perceval, Esq., now British Vice-Consul at Caen, to be Her Majesty's Vice-Consul at Port Said.

I do hereby give notice, that it hath been certified to me in writing, under the hands of two Members serving in this present Parliament, in the manner required by the said Act, that Frederic Charles Cavendish (commonly called Lord Frederic Charles Cavendish), late a Member serving in this present Parliament for the Northern Division of the West Riding of the county of York, hath accepted the office of one of the Commissioners for executing the office of Treasurer of the Exchequer of Great Britain and Ireland and Lord High Treasurer of Ireland, and has been gazetted thereto in the London Gazette, dated the 8th day of August, 1873, and has thereby vacated his seat; and that I shall issue my warrant to the Clerk of the Crown, to make out a new writ for the electing of a Member to serve in this present Parliament for the said Northern Division of the West Riding of the county of York, at the end of six days after the insertion of this notice in the London Gazette.

The Tramways Act, 1870.

NOTICE is hereby given that the following Bye-laws have been made by the Metropolitan Board of Works under the provisions of "The Tramways Act, 1870;" and that a copy of such Bye-laws has been sent to the Board of Trade, and has been delivered to the Tramway Companies in the metropolis, as required by the Act.

The Metropolitan Board of Works being by the above Act constituted the local authority for the metropolis (except the city of London and the liberties thereof), doth hereby make the following Bye-laws and Regulations to be observed by all Tramway Companies, and persons running carriages on the roads in which tramways are laid within the metropolis.

1. The rate of speed to be observed for tramway traffic shall in no case exceed eight miles an hour; nor shall it be less than six miles an hour, excepting on inclines.

2. No carriage using a tramway shall follow another carriage using the same tramway at a less distance from such other carriage than one hundred yards.

3. No carriage using a tramway shall stop, except at junctions or terminal stations, or when changing horses, or when required to take up or set down a passenger, and then no longer than than is absolutely necessary. Carriages using a tramway shall in no case stop abreast of one another.

4. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on a tramway.

5. No driver of an omnibus or other stage carriage, other than a carriage using a tramway, shall stop to take up or set down passengers except as close to the kerb as possible.

Any person infringing any of the foregoing Bye-laws shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each offence.

Borough of Birmingham.

BYE-LAWS

Made by the Corporation of the Borough of Birmingham, in respect of the Tramways constructed by them in the said Borough.

WHEREAS, by section 45 of the Tramways Act, 1870, the local authority of any district in which a tramway is laid down and the promoters of any tramway, are empowered, subject to the approval of the Board of Trade, to make regulations as to any tramway within their district, and for enforcing the observance of all or any of such regulations, to make bye-laws for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned, and from time to time repeal or alter such bye-laws, and make new bye-laws, provided that such bye-laws be not repugnant to the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the same are to have effect: And by section 47 of the same Act, it is enacted that any such bye-laws may impose reasonable penalties for offences against the same, not exceeding forty shillings for each offence, with or without further penalties for continuing offences, not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for every day during which the offence continues; but all bye-laws shall be so framed as to allow in every case part only of the maximum penalty being ordered to be paid:

And whereas, by the Tramways Orders Confir-

mation Act, 1872 (No. 3), the corporation of the said borough were authorized to construct certain tramways within the said borough; and, in pursuance of such authority, the said corporation have constructed a double line of tramway commencing in Monmouth-street, at its junction with Colmore-row and Livery-street, and passing thence along Monmouth-street into and along Snow-hill, Constitution-hill, Great Hampton-street, and Hockley-hill, and terminating in that street at the borough boundary:

Now, in pursuance of the powers given by the said Acts, and of every other power enabling them thereto, and subject to the approval of the Board of Trade, the corporation, as the local authority of the said borough, and promoters of the said tramway, make and ordain the following bye-laws:—

The expression "carriages" or "carriage" in these bye-laws shall respectively mean carriages, or a carriage with flange-wheels, or wheels suitable only to run on rails and used on the tramway.

1. The carriages shall be driven at a rate not less than six miles, and not more than eight miles, in the hour upon the average.

2. No carriage shall follow a preceding carriage at a less distance than 100 yards along any portion of the line of tramway. For any offence against this and the preceding bye-law, the driver of the carriage shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

3. Carriages for general traffic shall commence running not later than eight o'clock in the morning, and shall continue running until ten o'clock at night; and a carriage shall leave each terminus on the line of tramway at least once in every fifteen minutes between those hours.

4. The special carriages for the labouring classes shall be run as follows:—Two carriages each way every morning and evening (Sundays, Christmas Day, and Good Friday excepted), at such hours as may be fixed from time to time by the Council, and until further order, as follows:—One at half-past five o'clock and another at half-past six o'clock in the morning; one at half-past five o'clock in the afternoon, and one at half-past six o'clock in the evening.

5. Every carriage shall have painted or affixed upon some conspicuous place, at each end of the carriage, and both inside and outside thereof, on a plate or in some other manner to be approved by an officer of the Council duly authorized in this behalf, the number of the carriage; and also a list of the fares to be demanded and taken; and also the maximum number of inside and outside passengers which such carriage is constructed to carry; and in determining such maximum number there shall be allowed for each passenger a space of not less than eighteen inches. Whenever there shall be any passengers in or upon any carriage in excess of the number so painted on such carriage as aforesaid, the conductor thereof shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

6. No passenger shall enter or depart from any carriage while such carriage is in motion, nor shall any passenger enter or depart from any carriage by the front or driver's platform, except such carriage shall be standing still at a terminus of the tramway; and every passenger entering or departing from any carriage at any time, except as aforesaid, shall do so by the conductor's, or aft platform, and not otherwise. Any person offending against this bye-law is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

7. Any driver or conductor failing to stop the carriage when required so to do by any passenger desirous of leaving the carriage, or by any person desirous of travelling by the carriage, and for

whom there is room, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

8. Any person smoking in the interior of any carriage is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings; and any person offending against this bye-law, in addition to the above penalty, shall be summarily removed from the carriage.

9. Any person found in or upon any carriage in a state of intoxication; and any person swearing, or using obscene or offensive language; or wilfully interfering with the comfort of any passenger, or committing any nuisance in, or upon, or against any carriage; is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings; and shall be summarily removed from the carriage.

10. Any person who wilfully cuts, tears, or soils, the cushions, or the linings; or wilfully scratches or breaks any window of; or removes or defaces any number-plate, printed or other notice in or on, any carriage, or otherwise wilfully damages any carriage, is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

11. Any person whose dress or clothing is, in the opinion of the conductor of any carriage, likely to soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, shall not be at liberty to enter, travel, or remain in or upon any carriage; and any person who shall offend against this bye-law is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings; and the driver or conductor shall prevent any such persons travelling in or upon, or shall remove any such person so travelling from, any such carriage.

12. Every passenger shall upon demand of the conductor or other duly authorized officer of the lessees or licensees of the Council, pay to such officer the fare legally demandable from such passenger for the journey between the point at which he or she entered or got upon any carriage, and the point of destination of such passenger; and in default of such payment is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and may be summarily removed from the carriage.

13. Every passenger shall show his or her ticket to the conductor, or any other duly authorized servant of the lessees or licensees of the Council, whenever required by him to do so. Any passenger refusing to show or deliver up his or her ticket when required so to do, shall pay the fare from the place where the carriage first started, in or upon which such passenger may be, to the point at which such passenger leaves the carriage; and in default of payment thereof, he or she is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and may be summarily removed from the carriage.

14. Any passenger who shall not be an artisan mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and "The Birmingham (Corporation) Tramways Order, 1872," and who shall unlawfully claim or pretend to be an artisan, mechanic or daily labourer as aforesaid, or use or attempt to use a ticket intended for such artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers, is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

15. Every passenger having any personal luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers), shall, if so requested by the conductor or other duly authorized officer of the lessees or licensees of the Council, place such luggage on the driver's platform, and shall not take, put, or convey the same in the interior or on the roof of the carriage; and any person offending against this bye-law is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and shall be summarily removed from the carriage.

16. No passenger or other person, not being a servant of the Council or their lessees or licensees,

shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail of the roof of any carriage; and any person persisting in so doing after having been ordered to desist by the conductor or other duly authorized servant of the said lessees or licensees, is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and shall be summarily removed from the carriage.

17. Any person entering, or getting upon, or remaining in or on any carriage after having been informed by the conductor or other duly authorized servant of the lessees or licensees of the Council that he or she is in excess of the number of passengers which the carriage is constructed to carry, is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and if in or on the carriage shall be summarily removed therefrom.

18. Any person other than the conductor, holding or hanging on, by, or to any part of any carriage, is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

19. No dog or other animal shall be suffered to accompany any passenger in or upon any carriage, if objected to by any passenger, or if in the opinion of the conductor of the carriage, the conveyance of such dog or other animal is or will be offensive, or an annoyance to other passengers; and any person taking a dog or other animal into any carriage on the tramway after having been requested not to do so by the conductor or other duly authorized servant of the lessees or licensees of the Council; and any person who shall have taken any dog or other animal into any carriage, and shall not put the same out of the carriage upon being requested to do so by such conductor or servant as aforesaid, is hereby subjected to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and shall be summarily removed from any such carriage.

20. Any person travelling in or on any carriage with loaded fire-arms, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.
