QUARANTINE REGULATIONS.

RULES AND REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED IN THE PERFORMANCE OF QUARANTINE.

Duties of Health Officer.

1. Every vessel arriving in the colony from a foreign port shall be visited by the Health Officer, who shall put such questions to the Captain or Surgeon of such vessel relating to the health of the passengers and crew as are contained in Schedule I hereto annexed; and a paper containing these questions printed or written thereon shall be handed to the Captain or Surgeon of such vessel, who shall affix, in writing, his replies and signature thereto, and return it to the Health Officer; and if there be no infectious or contagious disease on board, and if none shall have existed during the voyage, and if she shall not have touched at any port or place where any infectious or contagious disease shall have prevailed, or shall not have communicated with any other vessel on board of which any such infectious or contagious disease shall have existed, such vessel shall be at once admitted to pratique: Provided that not more than fifty passengers, being statute adults, shall have arrived by her.

2. Every vessel arriving with more than fifty passengers from a foreign port shall be visited by the Health Officer, who shall put such questions to the Surgeon-Superintendent as are referred to in the previous clause; and if there be no infectious or contagious disease on board, and if none shall have existed during the voyage, and if she shall not have touched at any port or place where any infectious or contagious disease shall have prevailed, or shall not have communicated with any other vessel on board of which any such infectious or contagious disease shall have existed, such vessel shall be at once admitted to pratique, unless it shall be considered necessary to temporarily withhold pratique for the purpose of carrying out the sanitary regulation hereinafter provided.

3. Before any ship arriving in the colony from a foreign port with more than fifty passengers shall be admitted to pratique, the Health Officer shall, if he think fit, direct that the passengers and

crew of such vessel shall be landed at a sanitary station, to be appointed by the Government, for a period of two or more days, for the purpose of affording all the passengers and crew an opportunity of bathing, and of washing and airing all linen, clothing, bedding, &c., that may have been worn or used during the voyage; and so soon as the Surgeon-Superintendent of such ship shall certify, in writing, to the Health Officer that this regulation has been faithfully carried out, and that all linen, clothing, bedding, &c., has been thoroughly cleansed and aired, the Health Officer shall then admit such ship and passengers to pratique.

4. Should there be any infectious or contagious disease amongst the passengers or crew of any vessel arriving from a foreign port, the Health Officer shall not go on board such vessel, but shall direct the Captain or person in charge of such vessel to hoist the quarantine signals specified in the 11th section of the Quarantine Act (27 Vic., No. 9), and to proceed with the ship and passengers to the place duly appointed for the performance of quarantine.

5. Should any vessel arriving in the colony from a foreign port (notwithstanding that there may be no infectious or contagious disease on board such vessel) have touched at any port or place during the voyage where any such infectious or contagious disease shall have been prevailing, or shall have communicated with any other vessel on board of which any such disease may have existed, the Health Officer shall not admit such vessel to pratique, but shall at once communicate with the Colonial Secretary upon the subject, in order that such steps may be taken as may be considered necessary for continuing such vessel in quarantine, or the release thereof, as may be judged expedient.

6. Should any Health Officer have reasonable cause for supposing that the public health would be endangered by the immediate admission to pratique of any vessel arriving from a foreign port, he will not hesitate to refuse such pratique; but he must report at once to the Colonial Secretary his having done so, and his reasons for doing so, in order that further measures may be taken for the continuance in, or the release of, such vessel from the performance of quarantine.

7. The Health Officer for the port of Brisbane shall, as soon as practicable, report to the Colonial Secretary the sanitary condition of every vessel arriving in Moreton Bay from a foreign port. The Health Officers at the other ports of the colony shall furnish similar reports to the Police Magistrates, or, in their absence, the Sub-Collectors of Customs at such ports, to be by them forwarded on to the Colonial Secretary.

Duties of Masters of Vessels in Quarantine.

8. The master of any vessel ordered into quarantine shall proceed with all possible despatch to the anchorage at the quarantine station.

9. He shall afford every facility to the Resident Superintendent of Quarantine for landing the passengers and their luggage, together with such provision and cooking utensils as may be required for use on shore; the provisions to be placed in charge of the Resident Superintendent or the purser of the vessel, who shall, if required, be landed with the passengers.

10. As soon as practicable after the disembarkation of the passengers and their luggage, he will cause all bunk fittings in the 'tween decks to be burnt, and the 'tween decks and other parts of the vessel to be thoroughly purified by ventilation and the frequent use of a swing stove, and the vessel

throughout to be daily sprinkled with carbolic acid or such other disinfectant as the Surgeon-Superintendent shall direct.

11. He will also cause the fore-castle to be subjected to the same process of disinfection, and the whole of the clothes worn by the crew and those remaining in their chests or bags to be thoroughly washed and to be aired daily.

12. Before application shall be made by the master of any vessel to be released from quarantine (which under any circumstances must not be less than twenty-one clear days from the time the passengers disembarked), the Resident Superintendent and Surgeon-Superintendent shall inspect the whole of the crew of the vessel, and, if they shall be satisfied that the officers and crew of the vessel are in good health, and that the instructions embodied in the two preceding clauses of these regulations have been faithfully carried out, they shall forward to the Health Officer a certificate to that effect, and a release will then be granted by the Governor in Council, which release shall be signified in writing by the Colonial Secretary to the Resident Superintendent.

Duties of Surgeon-Superintendent or Medical Officer in charge of Quarantine.

13. On the arrival of the vessel at the place appointed for the performance of quarantine, the Surgeon-Superintendent will, as soon as practicable, cause the sick to be landed and removed to the place set apart as a hospital, together with such attendants as may be required, and, if he shall think fit, cause all clothes, bedding, &c., belonging to the sick to be burnt.

14. The healthy people shall then be landed with their luggage, and shall occupy the buildings or tents erected for their reception; the single females, being placed in charge of the matron, shall, if possible, be located close to the Surgeon's or Resident Superintendent's quarters; the married people next to the single girls' quarters, and the single men next to the married people, but at some distance away.

15. The Surgeon-Superintendent, with the assistance of the Resident Superintendent, will, as soon as convenient after landing, divide the passengers into messes of fourteen in each, and shall select two out of each mess in turn, who shall receive and prepare the provisions for cooking.

16. He will select from the passengers three of the men to cook the provisions for the single females, married people, and single men, during quarantine, who will, for the faithful discharge of such duties, each receive such gratuity as he may think fit to award, not exceeding five pounds; and he will see that the meals are cooked in a proper manner, and served at regular hours.

17. The Surgeon-Superintendent will, as soon as practicable, see that all the clothes that have been worn by the passengers during the voyage and those remaining in the boxes are properly cleansed, washed, and periodically aired.

18. He will not permit any communication whatever to take place between the patients, or their attendants in the hospital, and the healthy portion of the passengers; and in the event of any fresh case breaking out, the patient shall be at once removed to the hospital, and, if necessary, his clothes and bedding burnt.

19. He will see that the matron discharges her duties as on board the vessel towards those who are entrusted to her care, and that the female compartment is carefully secured before retiring for the night; and he will not permit any communication to take place between the single girls and other passengers without his permission.

20. The Surgeon-Superintendent will see that the constables enforce the same discipline as is required to be observed by the passengers on board ships, and he will report to the Immigration Agent any person guilty of misconduct, or who shall wilfully destroy or purloin any property belonging to the Government, or who shall commit any breach of these regulations.

21. He will not permit any one to land, or to have any communication with the quarantine ground, except under such restrictions as he may impose; and he will see that all letters from passengers to friends are properly fumigated before being delivered. All parcels sent by friends to the passengers shall be carefully examined, and any spirituous liquor discovered in them shall be removed and handed over to the charge of the Resident Superintendent.

22. He shall keep a diary and a medical case book, both of which must be written up daily; and he will report to the Health Officer, or Immigration Agent, as often as an opportunity presents itself, in the form of Schedule 2 hereto annexed.

23. Before the release of the passengers from quarantine the Surgeon-Superintendent will cause the whole of the buildings to be thoroughly cleansed, and the tents, cooking utensils, and other articles which may have been used, to be carefully stowed away, to the satisfaction of the Resident Superintendent.

24. After the necessary quarantine shall have been performed, and if the Surgeon-Superintendent shall consider that the passengers are free from further infection, and may with safety be released, he shall forward to the Health Officer, or Immigration Agent, a certificate in the form of Schedule 3 appended hereto, which certificate must be countersigned by the Resident Superintendent, and if approved by the Governor in Council a release will then be granted, which approval must be signified in writing by the Colonial Secretary, addressed to the Resident Superintendent.

25. Notwithstanding anything contained in the previous clause, it shall be competent for the Governor in Council to release from quarantine any portion of the passengers of any vessel who shall be duly certified by the Surgeon and Resident Superintendent to be in a healthy condition and to be entirely free from infection, and amongst whom no case of infectious or contagious disease shall have shown itself for at least ten days prior to the date of such certificate, and who shall not in any way have communicated with any of the other passengers who may be suffering from any infectious or contagious disease within the above-mentioned period of ten days.

Duties of Resident Superintendent of Quarantine.

26. The Resident Superintendent of the quarantine station, and his assistants, will be required to aid the Surgeon in maintaining order, discipline, and morality, amongst the passengers; he will not permit any riotous conduct, quarreling, or fighting to take place, and he will report to the Surgeon-Superintendent any persons so offending.

27. He will not permit any communication whatever to take place between persons from the mainland and the passengers in quarantine, unless he is personally present with the Surgeon-Superintendent; and he will see that all letters from passengers to friends are properly fumigated before being delivered.

28. He will, in the absence of the ship's purser, be required to take charge of all provisions and medical comforts supplied for the use of the passengers, and see that none but of good quality are

received; and that they are issued daily at regular hours, and in the proper quantity, to the different messes.

29. He will on no account permit any spirits or other strong liquors to be landed on the quarantine ground, except as medical comforts; and he will not permit any of such to be issued from the store without the written order of the Surgeon-Superintendent.

30. He will not permit any communication to take place between the single females and other passengers, except with the concurrence of the Surgeon-Superintendent, and he will see that this regulation is strictly enforced.

31. He will be required to keep a diary, in which every occurrence shall be carefully noted. He shall also keep a register of births and deaths that may occur in quarantine, the diary to be transmitted to the Colonial Secretary, and the register to the Registrar-General, on release of the passengers from quarantine.

The Pilot.

32. The Pilot who shall have boarded any vessel in which any infectious or contagious disease shall be found to exist, or any vessel liable to the performance of quarantine, shall not quit such vessel without the permission of the Health Officer, but shall proceed with the vessel to the quarantine station.

33. He shall, if required by the Health Officer or Resident Superintendent of Quarantine, land at the quarantine station or such other place as the Health Officer shall direct. He shall not be located with the passengers, but at some distance away, nor shall he in any way mix or communicate with them.

34. He shall remain in quarantine for at least ten days after leaving the ship, during which time he shall thoroughly wash all his clothes and bedding, and air them daily; and upon the Resident Superintendent and Surgeon in charge forwarding to the Health Officer or Immigration Agent a certificate that such has been done, and that he has not in any way communicated with the passengers, and that he is free from all infection, he may, by permission of the Colonial Secretary, be released from the performance of further quarantine, which permission must be communicated in writing to the Health Officer.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

35. All passengers other than those prevented by sickness or other sufficient cause, to be determined by the Surgeon-Superintendent, shall rise not later than 5.30 A.M. in summer, and 6.30 A.M. in winter, and retire to bed at 9 A.M.

36. Breakfast shall be prepared by 8 A.M., dinner at 1 P.M., and tea at 6 P.M.

37. All fires shall be extinguished at 7 P.M., unless otherwise ordered by the Surgeon-Superintendent. No smoking will on any account be permitted in the wards.

38. All beds, bedding, and bed-boards shall, weather permitting, be aired daily, and the bed-boards dry scrubbed at least three times a week.

39. All firearms and other offensive weapons, as well as gunpowder belonging to the passengers, shall, on landing, be handed over to the Resident Superintendent for safe keeping. Should any of these articles be found in possession of any of the passengers, it shall be taken away by the constables, and handed over to the Resident Superintendent.

40. The following shall be the scale of rations to be issued to passengers (not being saloon or

second cabin passengers) in quarantine, and it must be distinctly understood that luxuries, such as coffee, butter, preserves, &c., cannot be demanded, nor will they be supplied, unless certified as necessary by the Surgeon and Resident Superintendent.

For each adult daily—

- Flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ lb.
- Meat, 1 lb.
- Tea, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz.
- Sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz.
- Salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.
- Soap, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.
- Vegetables, 1 lb.

41. Any passenger in quarantine guilty of the following offences, viz., riotous conduct, fighting, making use of profane or obscene language, disobeying the orders of the Surgeon or Resident Superintendent, obstructing the Surgeon or Resident Superintendent, or his assistants, or the constables in the discharge of their duties, or of any other offence not herein mentioned, shall, on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, and, in default of immediate payment, shall be imprisoned for any period not exceeding six calendar months.

CHAIN CABLES AND ANCHORS.

Draft of Order referred to in the foregoing Notice.

Breaking Strain and Tensile Strain.

"WHEREAS it is provided by the Chain Cable and Anchor Act, 1871, Section 6, that 'It shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time, by Order in Council, to alter the tensile strain or the breaking strain to which, under the principal Act and this Act, chain cables and anchors are to be subjected by the tester, and to revoke or alter any such Order previously made. Before any such alteration is made, the Board of Trade shall give six months' notice thereof by advertisement in the Gazette, or in such other way as they may think best for making the same known to the parties interested.'

"And whereas it is provided by the Chain Cable and Anchor Act, 1864, Section 7, that 'Every tester shall, with all reasonable despatch, subject every chain cable or anchor that shall be brought to the proving establishment of such tester for the purpose of being proved, and (unless the parties interested may otherwise agree) in the order in which such chain cables and anchors respectively shall be so brought, to the same tensile strain as that to which chain cables and anchors respectively of similar size, weight, or description are or shall be subjected before being received for the use of Her Majesty's naval service, and shall stamp every five fathoms in length of every such chain cable, and also every such anchor, with a stamp or die to be provided for that purpose by the tester, and approved by the Board of Trade, denoting that such chain cable or anchor has been "proved," and which shall bear the mark of the tester.'

"And whereas the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have, since the passing of the said Chain Cable and Anchor Act of 1864, issued an extended scale showing the tensile strains to which chain cables are subjected before being received for the use of Her Majesty's naval service.

"And whereas the second schedule to the Chain Cable and Anchor Act, 1871, contains certain typographical errors which it is desirable to rectify.

"And whereas the Board of Trade have been applied to to define the breaking and tensile strains to be applied to chain cables made of iron of sizes intermediate between the sizes named in the said second schedule.

"And whereas the said second schedule to the said Act of 1871 does not contain any notification of the tensile and breaking strains to be applied to chain cables known as short link chains.

"And whereas the Board of Trade have been applied to to make provision for publishing the breaking and tensile strains for chain cables consisting of short link chains.

"And whereas the Board of Trade are fully advised and satisfied that such provision ought to be made.

"Now, therefore, in exercise of the said recited Chain Cable and Anchor Act of 1871, it is hereby ordered and directed that the schedule set forth at the foot hereof shall be substituted for the second schedule appended to the said last-mentioned Act."

REGULATIONS FOR THE REGISTRATION OF POST LETTERS.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-six, for the regulation of the duties of postage, it was enacted, by section thirty-nine (after reciting that it might be expedient that certain post letters should be registered), that in case the Postmaster-General should at any time deem it expedient that all or any post letters should be registered by the Post Office, the Postmaster-General might, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, forward letters so registered without charging any additional rate for the registration thereof, or he might charge for any letters so registered such rate of postage, in addition to any other rates payable under the Post Office Acts, as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, should from time to time direct (but such registration should not render the Postmaster-General or the Post Office Revenue in any manner liable for the loss of any such post letters, or the contents thereof), and that all registered letters should be delivered to the Post Office, and also be delivered by the Post Office, at or between such hours in the day, and under all such regulations in every respect, as the Postmaster-General should from time to time appoint; and that the Postmaster-General might therein require such registration rate to be paid on the letter being put into the Post Office. And by section sixty, it was further enacted, that in all cases in which the postage of any unstamped letter should not have been paid by the sender, it should be paid by the person to whom the letter is addressed, on the delivery thereof to him; but that if the letter should be refused, or the party to whom it is addressed should be dead, or could not be found, the writer or sender should pay the postage; and that the now reciting enactment should apply to every packet, newspaper, and thing whatsoever chargeable with postage, which should be transmitted by the post. And by section sixty-three, it was also enacted, that all post letters should be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered under and subject to all such orders, directions, and regulations, and under and subject to all such conditions, limitations, and restrictions as to the form, size, dimensions, enclosures, or otherwise, as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, should from time to time direct.

And whereas by a certain other Act of Parliament, made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-five, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office, after reciting the said hereinbefore recited Act, it was enacted by section ten, that it should be lawful for the Postmaster-General, and any officer of the Post Office, to detain any letters which should be posted or sent by the post contrary to the regulations of the said now recited Act, or the said hereinbefore recited Act, or contrary to any regulations made under the authority of the said now reciting Act, or the said hereinbefore recited Act, or contrary to the regulations of any Treasury Warrant which should be issued under or by virtue of the said now recited Act, or which had been or should be issued under or by virtue of the said hereinbefore recited Act, and to forward such letters to the places of their destination, charged with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury should from time to time direct.

And whereas, by the said two hereinbefore recited Acts respectively, it was provided that, whenever the order, consent, authority, or direction of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, was prescribed by the said Acts, such order, consent, authority, or direction (not being by Warrant), might be signified, either under the hands of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any three of them, or under the hand of one of their Secretaries or Assistant-Secretaries.

And whereas, in pursuance of the said recited Acts, a system of registration has been established with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, whereby the public have been and are entitled to forward letters by the post at a certain charge or registration rate of postage, in addition to the other rates payable thereon, and it is expedient that such system of registration should be altered in manner and according to the regulations hereinafter mentioned and contained, and that certain orders, directions, and regulations for that purpose heretofore made, should be rescinded, revoked, repealed, and annulled.

Now I, William Monsell, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, by and with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, signified under the hand of one of their Secretaries, whose name is hereunto set, do hereby rescind, revoke, repeal, and annul certain orders, directions, and regulations heretofore made by Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, and bearing date the 3rd day of June, 1873, except so far as the same shall have rescinded, revoked, repealed, or annulled any other orders, directions, or regulations theretofore made, and except as to all matters and things which shall have been made or done previous to the coming into operation of these orders, directions, and regulations, as to which the said orders, directions, and regulations, bearing date the 3rd day of June, 1873, shall be and remain in full force and effect, notwithstanding the repeal thereof, which is only to operate as from the day on which these orders, directions, and regulations shall come into operation, and I do hereby, by and with such consent as aforesaid, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. The registration rate of postage payable at any Post Office in the United Kingdom on inland letters, registered during the ordinary hours appointed for the registration thereof at such Post

Office, shall be four pence, and such registration rate shall be payable in stamps, but this regulation shall not extend to the registration rates chargeable and payable on colonial or foreign letters.

2. All letters, whether inland, colonial, or foreign, may be registered at the Metropolitan Chief Post Offices, or at the London District Post Offices (including the Lombard-street and Charing-cross Branch Post Offices), or at any Provincial Head Post Office in the United Kingdom, after the ordinary hours appointed for the registration thereof at any such Post Office, until the closing of the letter box for each despatch, or until such Post Office is closed for the night, upon payment of a late registration rate of postage of four pence, which shall be payable in stamps, in addition to the ordinary registration rate, and to any other rates chargeable or payable thereon.

3. All letters containing coin, jewellery, or watches, and all letters which shall have written or put thereon the word "registered," or any other word or words of the like meaning or to the like effect when posted, whether the same shall have or contain therein coin, jewellery, or watches, or not, posted in any town or place in the United Kingdom, addressed to any person, town, or place in the United Kingdom, shall be delivered to the Post Office for registration, and shall be registered by the Post Office at the time of the same being posted, and a rate of postage of four pence for every letter so registered shall be charged for the registration thereof, in addition to any other rates of postage payable thereon, or which may become chargeable thereon under the regulations hereinbefore in the second clause mentioned, and every such registration rate shall be paid in stamps at the time of such letters being posted.

4. If any such letters as are hereinbefore in the third clause mentioned shall be put into the Post Office without being registered by the Post Office, and without the registration rate or rates chargeable thereon being paid in stamps, as hereinbefore in the third clause is mentioned and directed, such letters shall be registered by any Post Office through which they may pass in course of transmission thereof by the post, and shall be forwarded so registered to their destination, and shall be charged with double the ordinary registration rate of postage of four pence, in addition to any other rates of postage chargeable or payable thereon, with a deduction, nevertheless, equal to the amount of any stamps which may have been affixed to such letters in payment or part payment of the registration rate chargeable thereon.

5. Any such letters as are hereinbefore in the fourth clause mentioned, may be detained for the purpose of being registered by any Post Office through which they may pass in course of transmission thereof by the post, until the next ordinary despatch to that by which they would have been forwarded, conveyed, and delivered, if they had been registered by the Post Office according to the directions hereinbefore in the third clause mentioned.

6. These regulations shall come into operation on and from the day of the date hereof.
