BRITISH EMIGRANTS TO BRAZIL.

THE following Despatch has been received by Earl Granville, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Mr. George Buckley Mathew, Her Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary at Rio de Janeiro:—

FURTHER REPORT respecting the Condition of British Emigrants in Brazil.

Mr. Mathew to Earl Granville.

MY LORD, *Rio de Janeiro, May 25, 1873.*

AS I was aware of the intention of Mr. Phipps to visit a gentleman residing near Mendez before his departure for England, I requested him to communicate with me respecting the British emigrants who are still at that place; and I have the honour to inclose a report which he has addressed to me, both with regard to them and to others who have lately arrived at Rio de Janeiro from the same Colony, Cananea.

I regret to be obliged to confirm Mr. Phipps's opinion of the present Ministry of Agriculture, by stating that my representations, public and private, have hitherto failed to obtain from that Department any reply to my notes of the 8th and 23rd of March, copies of which were inclosed in my despatches of the 11th and 25th of that month.

If, as I apprehend is beyond question, the persons by whose extravagant statements and promises these unfortunate persons were induced to emigrate, were the paid agents of the Brazilian Consular functionaries in Liverpool or elsewhere, I cannot feel but convinced that the Brazilian Government are both legally and morally responsible for their losses and sufferings, and that any expenditure that may be ultimately inevitable for their return to England should be borne by that Government.

The charity of the British residents in the capital has been largely called upon, and can scarcely be further available.

Mr. Phipps to Mr. Mathew.

SIR, *Rio de Janeiro, May 20, 1873.*

Before starting for England, I am anxious to address to you a brief report as to the present

condition of the British immigrants in Brazil, embodying the information which I have obtained during the last few days, and affording a proof of the utter collapse of the Brazilian State Colonization Scheme.

I took advantage, as you wished, of a visit to the neighbourhood of Mendez, to see the emigrants still remaining at that place, who had been brought back from the Colony of Cananea four months ago.

The Minister of Agriculture sent to the United States, in accordance with the promise made to me by Dr. Galvao, a party of these returned emigrants, thirty-eight in number, on the 25th of February last, and it was his intention to have forwarded to the same destination certain other of these emigrants so far as accommodation could be found for them on board the American steamers, but the representations of persons interested in the future promotion of British immigration, induced the Ministry of Agriculture to reconsider that decision. A second party was even sent down to Rio Janeiro *en route* for the United States on the 24th March, but as there was no room for them on board the steamer at the last moment, they were sent back to Mendez, where they have since remained with the rest, apparently as an additional proof of the vacillation and indecision which has characterized the whole scheme of British colonization in this country.

The Brazilian Government has imported a raw material which it is unable to utilize, of which it cannot rid itself, except at a great expense and with much discredit, and the housing of which involves a constant outlay from which it can expect no return.

The emigrants at Mendez are now 104 in number, of whom about half are adults; 18 of the whole number have passed nearly a year in Brazil, between Cananea and Mendez, the remainder having arrived in December. They are, after their enforced idleness during several months, utterly demoralized, and express even greater determination than when I visited them in February, not to proceed to another State Colony, as they declare that their experiences of Cananea were such as to destroy their confidence in the promises of the Government. To the offers made to them by English residents and other persons of employment as day labourers on railways, or in the city they reply that they left England to enjoy the advantages offered to them in the State Colonies as independent cultivators.

They paid no attention to my proposition, made according to your suggestion, that some person might be sent with them to superintend their proper settlement, and declare their belief that no promises would be kept. The Ministry of Agriculture has, in the course of the last four months, offered them a settlement at Assunguy Colony or in Santa Catarina, or in Rio Grande, but, with its customary indecision, without imposing any alternative in the event of non-compliance.

On my expressing to them my belief that they would now, after a fixed term, be left to provide for themselves, the heads of families declared that they would work their own way to England, and that the Brazilian Government, or the charity of British residents, would not allow their families to be destitute. There is, therefore, every chance that the charity of the British residents, which has already been so severely taxed by the large number of immigrants who have arrived from different parts of the Brazil in a state of destitution, will be subjected to further demands.

M. Galvao stated to me yesterday his belief that, had the emigrants, who had experienced the greatest hardships, been all sent, according to his agreement with me, to the United States, the rest would have accepted other offers.

Turning now to the Province of Parana, I am informed that out of nearly 300 British colonists, who went to the Colony of Assunguy in January last, nearly 50 died in the course of the first seven or eight weeks of various disorders, brought on by the change of climate, food, overcrowding, or epidemics. The climate of that Province has, however, always been considered to be healthy.

Nearly all of the above, who really went on to Assunguy, have left that colony in disgust at the want of resources and of preparation evidenced there, and are now huddled together in such accommodation as can be obtained for them by the authorities—who have done their best for them—in the neighbourhood of Curitiba, the capital of the Province.

The same fate has attended the party who were sent to Assunguy in spite, as I reported to you, of my remonstrances, in the month of February last. They have never been able even to go to Assunguy, and are, with the last-mentioned party, receiving such rations as the Government officials are able to give them. They are, for the most part, without work. From 25 to 30 of the 150, or so, who got to Curitiba, have died; but many refused to go beyond the seaport, Antonina, and have made their way to either this capital or the south.

I finally visited this morning, in the Emigrants' Asylum, in the suburbs of this capital, eighty-one British colonists who have been brought back recently from Cananea, and who arrived in Rio yesterday. They state that they did not leave at the same time as the party now at Mendez, and they "wished to give the place a chance." Most of them are, now at any rate, in good health, but in rags and barefoot. They complain, like their predecessors, of bad land, bad roads, high prices, food insufficient and of bad quality, even the food of the country offered to them being, they declare, often rotten. They add that the climate is unsuitable, that the houses afforded little or no shelter, and that the mortality has been very great. I annex a statement which I directed them to draw up, with date of engagement, name of engager,

and other remarks. All demand to return to England.

I am informed that only from fifteen to twenty English families still remain in that ill-fated settlement, which I observe, by recent letters in the "Times," has been so highly eulogized by Mr. Alsop and others.

With regard to the Brazilian Consul-General at Liverpool, and to Mr. Alsop (who endeavours to exculpate himself from his share in this disastrous affair), I may mention that, in a letter addressed by the latter to the former, as I am informed, in November last, he is said to have shown by the full details of his visit to Brazil, that he was fully aware of all the causes which rendered any further dispatch of these unfortunate and credulous human beings an act of the greatest inhumanity; and yet it was subsequent to that date that the largest expeditions took place.

In a letter published in the "Times," of 14th April, Mr. Alsop "emphatically denies" having said that he had been "greatly deceived;" but it is my conviction, from the information which I have received from the authorities here, that he was one of the principal instigators of this miserable scheme, and, if he can evade his responsibility with regard to the first expedition in May last, it is clear that the emigrants whom he engaged subsequent to his returns from Brazil in the autumn, were deceived by promises which he knew the authorities here were not in a position to keep. The inclosed letter from the director of the Emigrants' Asylum in Rio proves under what impression he returned from Cananea; and the fact of his being, as well as Messrs. Yates and Haynes, in the pay of the Consul-General, can alone account for their propagandist efforts.

Mr. Fritsch to Mr. Phipps.

SIR, *Rio Janeiro, May 21, 1873.*

Yesterday, when you visited the emigrants returned back from Cananea two days ago, and actually at the Emigration House, you desired of me to tell you my opinion of Cananea after the return from it of Mr. Alsop in September last year.

When Mr. Alsop returned from Cananea to Rio he was not satisfied at all; he went to see the Emperor and the Minister of Agriculture, to make statements about the Colony, as he said, but he did not dare to give any opinion at all about the going on of Cananea; but only two days before, to leave Rio for England, he said to me he did not believe in the prosperity of the Colony Cananea at all; my opinion was then, of the conversation by Mr. Alsop held with me, that he would stop English emigration for Cananea. How was I surprised, when I saw vessels come from Liverpool loaded with emigrants for Cananea engaged by Mr. Alsop. I believe, Sir, I have nothing else to add to this to let you know my opinion about Cananea.

(No. 103.)—UNITED STATES—LAKE MICHIGAN.

(1.) Fixed Red Light on St. Helena Island.

THE United States Government has given notice, that from the 20th day of September, 1873, a light would be exhibited from a red brick tower on the south-east point of St. Helena Island, Lake Michigan.

The light is a *fixed red* light elevated 71 feet above the lake, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 15 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the third order.
