Thomas Harford, wife, and 2 children	Alsop ...	1872. May 1 ...	1872. May 30 ...	Lost child in Rio in the hospital, and another at Cananea. Came in company of Mr. Alsop. Mr. Alsop said to this man that he himself could not live on the food of the colony, and he would not mind how soon he could get out of the country.
George Russell, wife, and 2 children	Ditto ...	May 1 ...	May 30 ...	All the family had the fever, and the children the small-pox. Mr. Alsop said to this man in the colony, if the Brazilian Government would not act well to them, he would make him send them back again to England; at his arrival at Rio from the colony he would see to all. Mr. Alsop was aware that the emigrants who came with him during his excursion to the colony of Assunguy were obliged to sell their clothes to buy food.
John Nottley, wife, and 2 children	Ditto ...	November 8	November 30	Lost 2 children in the colony. Mr. Alsop gave a speech on a waggon in the streets of Piddletown, Dorsetshire, in favour of emigration to Brazil, where he exposit (<i>sic</i>) for the best colony of the Empire being Cananea, where he has been during some time; giving also accounts of the rest of Brazil, and through this inducement Nottley has been engaged to Brazil.
John Gillingham, wife, and 2 children	Ditto ...	November 26	November 30	All the family have been very ill in the colony. When Mr. Alsop engaged this man, he said working three days in the week would be sufficient to live with his family, and he would do well in Brazil. He said, also, churches and chapels, and schools, were in the colony of Cananea.
Chas. Davies, wife, and 5 children	Yeats ...	November 23	November 30	Mr. Yeats said to his family all he could to engage them to decide to Brazil.
Henry Benson (single)	Alsop ...	November 24	November 30	Was induced by Mr. Alsop to emigrate to Brazil through false reports.
Elizabeth Hill (widow)	Yeats ...	November 24	November 30	Lost her husband in Cananea, where he has been 15 days ill, without assistance of the doctor, medicine, or any other one. Herself was for 15 days also very ill, and could not obtain any assistance of food or else; she was confined when she left the colony, and, if it had not been for a Brazilian lady, she had been obliged to be confined on the road.
George Osborn and wife	Alsop ...	November 5	November 29	Lost 2 children in the colony; his wife had the small-pox at the same time.
Thomas Shersby (single)	Ditto ...	October 11, 1871.	May 30 ...	Had 3 months' sickness in the colony; arrived in company of Mr. Alsop; lived in the same place with him in England; he states that Mr. Alsop said the food which was in the colony was not fit for an Englishman to live on, and he would go to England for never to come back any more.
John Daughy, wife, and child	Ditto ...	November 6	November 29	Lost 1 child in the emigration house in Rio.
