THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Monte Video, stating that in consequence of cases of yellow fever having been reported in the Brazilian ports, all vessels arriving from or having called at a Brazilian port have at Monte Video a quarantine of twelve days, counting from the day of sailing, imposed upon them.

Also that many fatal cases of cholera having occurred in the quarantine ground at Buenos Aires, and one or two within that city, a quarantine of twelve days has been imposed at Monte

Video on persons and goods arriving from the former place; and should the malady assume a more serious appearance, the communication will again be entirely suspended between the ports, except by means of the ocean packets.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS (Supplementary to the General Regulations issued 8th April, 1872; and amended by Notices in the London Gazette of the 24th January, 1873, and 21st November, 1873), respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Receiver and Examiner of Job Printing in Her Majesty's Stationery Office.

N.B.—*These Regulations are liable to alteration.*

I. The examination will consist of two parts, and will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

PART I.—PRELIMINARY.

1. Handwriting.
2. Orthography.
3. Arithmetic (to Vulgar and Decimal Fractions).
4. English Composition.

NOTE.—Candidates will be required to show what preliminary training or technical education they have undergone to qualify themselves for a situation of this nature, and they must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they possess the special qualifications necessary for the office. They must have served the usual apprenticeship to the trade of Printing, and must have been recently and for a sufficient time in actual employment.

** No Candidate who fails to show satisfactory proficiency in any of the subjects specified above will be admitted to the competitive part of the examination.

PART II.—COMPETITIVE.

1. Knowledge of Printing.
(Candidates must have a thorough knowledge of good work, both as to the composition and presswork. They should be able readily to detect literal errors and defective execution of any sort, and to count the number of copies of each job with facility.)
2. Estimating.

(Candidates must be able readily to calculate the quantity of paper required for any job, and to cast up accounts with ease.)

The competition will be decided partly by the number of marks given for answers, written or oral, to questions on the above-mentioned subjects, and partly by such testimony as the Commissioners may obtain from persons of practical experience as to the relative fitness of the Candidates.

II. A fee of 5s. will be required from each Candidate attending the preliminary part of the examination, and a further fee of 10s. from each Candidate who may be admitted to the competitive part.

III. No Candidate will be eligible whose age on the first day of the competitive examination is less than 23 or more than 30.

IV. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made at such times and in such manner as the Commissioners may appoint.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice, that an Open Competitive Examination for one situation of Receiver and Examiner of Job Printing in Her Majesty's Stationery Office will be held in London, under the above Regulations, on Tuesday, the 3rd of March, 1874, and following days.

A Preliminary Examination will be held on Tuesday, the 24th of February.

BYE-LAWS made by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Birmingham, in the county of Warwick, in respect of Tramways constructed by them in the said borough.

WHEREAS, by Section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870, the Local Authority of any district in which a tramway is laid down and the promoters of any tramway are empowered to make regulations as to any tramway within their district, and for enforcing the observance of all or any of such regulations, to make bye-laws for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned, and from time to time repeal or alter such bye-laws and make new bye-laws, provided that such bye-laws be not repugnant to the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the same are to have effect; and by section 47 of the same Act it is enacted that any such bye-laws may impose reasonable penalties for offences against the same not exceeding forty shillings for each offence, with or without further penalties for continuing offences, not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for every day during which the offence continues; but all bye-laws shall be so framed as to allow in every case part only of the maximum penalty being ordered to be paid.

And whereas by the Birmingham Corporation Tramways Order, 1872, confirmed by the Tramways Orders Confirmation Act, 1872 (No. 3) the mayor, aldermen and burgesses of the said borough (hereinafter called the Corporation) were authorised to construct certain tramways within the said borough, and in pursuance of such authority the said Corporation have constructed a double line of tramway, commencing in Monmouth-street at its junction with Colmore-row and Livery-street, and passing thence along Monmouth-street into and along Snow-hill, Constitution-hill, Great Hampton-street, and Hockley-hill, and terminating in that street at the borough boundary.

And whereas, on the 29th day of July, 1873, the Corporation, in pursuance of the powers given to them by the Tramways Act, 1870, made certain bye-laws in respect of the tramways so laid down by them, and a true copy of which Bye-laws was duly sent to the Board of Trade, who have not disallowed the same or any of them, and such bye-laws are now in force.

And whereas the Corporation are desirous of

repealing the bye-law numbered 5, and of making other provisions in lieu thereof, and in respect of other matters relating to the said tramways.

Now, in pursuance of the powers given by the Tramways Act, 1870, and of every other power enabling them thereto, the Corporation, as the Local Authority of the said borough, and promoters of the said tramways, do repeal the bye-law numbered 5, being one of the Bye-laws so-made by the Corporation on the 29th day of July, 1873; and in pursuance of the powers aforesaid the Corporation do make and ordain the following bye-laws, that is to say;—

The expression "carriages" or "carriage" in these bye-laws shall respectively mean carriages or a carriage with flange wheels, or wheels suitable only to run on rails, and used on the tramways; and the expression "Company" shall mean "The Birmingham and District Tramways Company Limited," or other the lessees for the time being of the said tramways.

1. Every carriage shall have painted or affixed upon some conspicuous place, at each end of the carriage, and both inside and outside thereof, on a plate or in some other manner to be approved by an officer of the Corporation duly authorised in this behalf, the number of the carriage, and also a list of the fares to be demanded and taken, and also the maximum number of inside and outside passengers which such carriage is constructed to carry; and in determining such maximum number there shall be allowed for each passenger a space of not less than sixteen inches. Whenever there shall be any passengers in or upon any carriage in excess of the number so painted on such carriages as aforesaid, the conductor thereof shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

2. The conductor of each carriage shall carry with him a copy of the bye-laws for the time being in force in respect of the tramways, and shall, on request of any passenger, produce the same to, and shall permit the same to be perused by such passenger, and the Company shall affix and keep affixed in each of their offices and waiting rooms within the borough, a printed copy of such bye-laws for the use of the public. In default the conductor or Company shall respectively be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and with respect to the latter offence the Company shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten shillings for every day during which such default continues.

3. The Company shall provide and keep such artificial light both inside and outside the carriages, and during such hours as the Corporation may from time to time determine as necessary for the efficient lighting of the carriages, and in default the Company shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and to a further penalty not exceeding ten shillings for every day during which such default continues.
