## REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

It is not expected that Gentleman will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will observe the same regulations as are in force, for Her Majesty's Levees.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

## PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial ground or places of burial should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town,

or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Robert Lowe, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twelfth day of December last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-eighth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows: viz. :—

**ANNESLEY.**—Forthwith wholly in the church and churchyard.

**OVING, SUSSEX.**—Forthwith wholly in the church; and in the parish churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed in stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, to be used only for the burial of widowers or widows of those already buried therein: and also, that in the additional churchyard burials be conducted according to the regulations for new burial-grounds.

**ADLINGTON, LANCASHIRE.**—Forthwith wholly in the church; and in the churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, except in now existing family vaults and graves, not less than four feet deep, which can be buried in without baling out water.

**LAUGHTON, LINCOLNSHIRE.**—Forthwith wholly in the parish church and in the old part of the churchyard.

**WARWICK, ST. NICHOLAS.**—Forthwith wholly in the church, and in the churchyard except in now existing vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or disturbance of remains.

**GATESHEAD, ST. CUTHBERT, BENSHAM.**—Forthwith wholly in the church, and in the churchyard except in now existing vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

**DONISTHORPE, DERBYSHIRE.**—Forthwith wholly in the church, and wholly in the churchyard, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four.

**LACEBY, LINCOLNSHIRE.**—Forthwith wholly in the church; and, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in the churchyard, except for the burial of members of the families of those already buried therein in vaults or in graves, not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of undecayed bones.

**ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE, ST. GEORGE'S, MOSSLEY.**—After the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in the churchyard and in the Methodist New Connexion Burial-ground in the same place, except in family vaults in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in family graves not less than four feet deep which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains,—and that burial in the parish church, and in the Methodist New Connexion Chapel in the same parish, be forthwith wholly discontinued.

**WHEREAS** by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas an Order in Council has been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Order; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyard be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty by and with the

advice aforesaid is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyard be postponed as follows, viz.:—

In the new churchyard of Saint Catherine's, Northampton, to the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four.

And whereas all the conditions in regard to the said Bye-laws, which are required to be fulfilled by the said Act, have been fulfilled, and the said Bye-laws have been submitted for the sanction of Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said Bye-laws (copy whereof is hereunto annexed) into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, and doth hereby declare, Her sanction of the same.

# THE ELEMENTARY EDUCATION ACT, 1870.

## BYE-LAWS OF THE LEICESTER SCHOOL BOARD.

THE School Board for the borough of Leicester, at a meeting held at the Public Office in the said borough, on the 16th day of December, 1872, in pursuance of the powers to them given by the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and subject to the approval of the Education Department, do hereby make and enact the following Bye-laws:—

### *Interpretation of Terms.*

1. In these Bye-laws—

The term "Borough of Leicester" or "Borough" means the municipal and parliamentary borough of Leicester.

The term "Education Department" means the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education.

The term "Her Majesty's Inspectors" means the Inspectors of Schools appointed by Her Majesty on the recommendation of the Education Department.

The term "School Board" or "Board" means the School Board of the district comprising the borough of Leicester, and any addition which may hereafter be made to such district.

The terms implying males include females, except where otherwise defined.

The term "School" or "Public Elementary School," means a Public Elementary School, as defined by the Elementary Education Act, 1870,

and includes a free school, but not an Industrial School.

The term "Managers" includes all persons who have the management of any Elementary School, whether the legal interest in the school-house is or is not vested in them.

The term "Officer" means an officer appointed by the Board, pursuant to the 36th section of the said Act.

The term "Parent" includes guardian and every person who is liable to maintain or has the actual custody of any child, but does not include the mother of a child, when the father is living and residing within the district.

*Parents shall cause Children between Five and Thirteen Years of Age to attend School.*

2. Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and of these Bye-laws, the parent of every child residing within the borough of Leicester, and not less than five nor more than thirteen years of age, shall cause such child to attend a Public Elementary School, unless there be some reasonable excuse for the non-attendance of such child.

### *Reasonable Excuses.*

Any of the following shall be considered to be reasonable excuses:—

1. That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
2. That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.
3. That there is no Public Elementary School open which the child can attend within one mile, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.
4. That the child is employed in labour, and receiving instruction in conformity with any Act of Parliament for regulating the education of children employed in labour.
5. That the child having attained the age of ten years, has passed a public examination according to the fifth standard of the Revised Code of Regulations of the Education Department of 1872, and has obtained a certificate to that effect from one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools.

The Board retains the power to exempt a child from attendance at school for such period as they may think fit, if illness in the family or other urgent reason shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Board to exist.

*Child to attend whole Time of ordinary Instruction, except Religious Instruction, and on certain Holidays.*

3. Except as aforesaid, the time during which every child shall attend school shall be the whole time in which the ordinary instruction of the school is given; provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance, or instruction in religious subjects, or shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the parents of such child belong, or shall require the attendance at school of any child on such days as are set apart by the Managers of the school for inspection in religious subjects, or on any of the following days, namely:—

On Sunday, Christmas Day, Good Friday, or any day set apart for a day of Public Fast or Thanksgiving, or on Saturday, after twelve o'clock at noon.

*Notices to be given to Parents requiring them to send their Children to School.*

4. An officer of the Board may visit the parent of any child, who, according to his information and belief, is not attending school or under efficient instruction, and may serve upon such parent a notice in the form or to the effect prescribed in the schedule to these Bye-laws. The said notice may be served by delivering the same to the parent, or by leaving the same for such parent at his place of abode.

*Particulars of such Notice to be recorded.*

5. The particulars of every notice served upon a parent shall be recorded by the officer serving the same in a book, to be provided by the Board, which shall be laid before the Board at each ordinary meeting.

*Officer not to disclose fact of such Notice having been served, except to a Member or Officer of Board or Principal Teacher.*

6. The officer shall not (except in case of legal proceedings) disclose the fact of service of any such notice or give any information relating thereto, to any person not a member or officer of the Board, or a manager or principal teacher of a school.

*Penalty for Breach of Bye-laws.*

7. Any person committing a breach of these Bye-laws, or of any of them, shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding 2s. 6d., including costs, for the first offence, and for any subsequent offence, not exceeding 5s., including costs, provided that all breaches of these Bye-laws by a parent, in one and the same week, shall be deemed one offence.

*No Proceeding to be taken until Parent has had opportunity of stating reasons for not complying with Notice.*

8. No proceeding against any parent for breach of any of these Bye-laws shall be taken until such parent has had an opportunity of attending a meeting of the Board, or of a Committee thereof, or of the managers of a school, to state his or her reasons for not complying with the said notice; and no such proceeding shall be taken, except by an officer of the Board, or otherwise by authority of the Board.

*Power for Board to alter or revoke Bye-laws.*

9. The Board may, from time to time, with the approval of the Education Department, and in pursuance of the 74th section of the Elementary Education Act, add to, revoke, or alter any of the foregoing or any other Bye-laws that may be hereafter made.

*Bye-laws to take effect.*

10. These Bye-laws shall take effect from and after the day on which the same shall be sanctioned by Her Majesty in Council.

The officer will not disclose the fact of your having been served with this notice, or give any information about it to any person other than a member or officer of the Board, or a school manager, or the principal teacher of a school, unless it shall be necessary to take legal proceedings.

If you do not comply with this notice, and if you wish to give any reason or explanation why legal proceedings should not be taken against you, you are invited to attend a meeting of the School Board, or of a Committee of the Board, or of school managers appointed by the Board, to be held in the

#### European Society Arbitration.

*Saturday, the 21st day of January, 1874.*

In the Matter of the European Assurance Society Arbitration Acts, 1872 and 1873, and in the Matter of the Wellington Reversionary Annuity and Life Assurance Society.

THE Right Honourable John, Baron Romilly, the Arbitrator appointed under the above-mentioned Acts, do declare and order as follows:

1. A claim by the holder of a policy, originally issued by the Wellington Reversionary Annuity and Life Assurance Society (in this Order called the Wellington Society), shall be received subject to the further directions of this Order against the Wellington Society, or against the British Nation Life Assurance Association (in this Order called the British Nation Association), or against the

European Assurance Society (in this Order called the European Society), if the claim is delivered to the Joint Official Liquidator acting in this Arbitration, before or on 28th February, 1874, but not later.

2. Each claim so received shall, subject and according to my directions, be allowed against the Wellington Society, or against the British Nation Association, or against the European Society, or be otherwise dealt with in this Arbitration.

3. Each policy on which a claim is allowed against the Wellington Society shall be valued as on 8th April, 1873, being the day of the date of the Order to wind up that Society.

4. Each policy on which a claim is allowed against the British Nation Association shall be valued as on 18th January, 1872, being deemed to be the day of the date of the Order to wind up that Association.

5. Each policy on which a claim is allowed against the European Society shall be valued as on 12th January, 1872, being the day of the date of the Order to wind up that Society.

6. A claim shall not be received against the Wellington Society, unless the claimant first pays every premium which fell due and became payable in respect thereof before 8th April, 1873.

7. A claim shall not be received against the British Nation Association, unless the claimant first pays every premium which fell due and became payable in respect thereof before 18th January, 1872.

8. A claim shall not be received against the European Society, unless the claimant first pays every premium which fell due and became payable in respect thereof before 12th January, 1872.

9. Where any such premium as aforesaid was

payable by half-yearly, quarterly, or other instalments, and the year of payment began to run before 8th April, 1873, or 18th January, 1872, or 12th January, 1872 (as the case may be), the aggregate amount of the instalments for that year, or so much thereof as remains unpaid, shall be deducted from any dividend that may become payable on the policy.

10. Where under this Order premiums are paid up to 8th April, 1873, but the claim is not allowed against the Wellington Society, and is allowed against the British Nation Association, or against the European Society, any premium paid under this Order which fell due on or after 12th January, 1872, or on or after 18th January, 1872, as the case may be, and before 8th April, 1873, shall be returned without deduction to the person by whom the same was paid.

11. Where any person pays a premium under this Order, any premium previously paid by him under the Orders of the Court of Chancery and not afterwards repaid to him shall be allowed for; but any premium previously paid by him under those Orders and afterwards repaid to him shall be regarded as not having been paid by him.

12. If any person holding a policy originally issued by the Wellington Society, desires that any premium paid by him under the Orders of the Court of Chancery and not afterwards returned to him should now be returned to him, the same shall be returned to him, but in that case he shall be deemed to have abandoned the right to prove on the policy, against either the Wellington Society, or the British Nation Association, or the European Society, or otherwise in this Arbitration.
