#### By Her Majesty's Command.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, before twelve o'cloch, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

It is not expected that Gentleman will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will observe the same regulations as are in force, for Her Majesty's Levees.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the nineteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in the words and figures following, viz.:—
"Whereas your Majesty was graciously pleased,

"Whereas your Majesty was graciously pleased, by your Order in Council, dated the seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixtynine, to establish certain regulations for the admission of Seamen and Marines to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital, under the provisions of the third and fourth and fifth Sections of "The Greenwich Hospital Act, 1869"; and

"Whereas, we are humbly of opinion, from the experience which we have had of the working of the said regulations, that it would be expedient to limit the benefits of Greenwich Hospital to such men as have served not less than five years in your Majesty's Navy or Royal Marines, and have, within five years of their discharge, applied for the benefits of Greenwich Hospital; exception being made in the cases of men who do not fiulfil those conditions, but whose existing disability arises from the effects of wounds, or disease, clearly attributable to the service; and of men who con-

tributed to the funds of Greenwich Hospital, before the first day of January, one thousand eight

hundred and thirty.

"We do, therefore, beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be graciously pleased, by your Order in Council, to repeal the Rules numbered 3 and 4, in your Majesty's said Order in Council, of the seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and to substitute the

following, namely:

"3. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who, having served for not less than five years, have, within five years of their application, been discharged or invalided from your Majesty's service on account of disease or wounds contracted or received in or by the service of the Crown, and who are infirm and helpless, or permanently or temporarily unable to maintain themselves, from disability clearly the result of such disease or wounds.

"4. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who, having served for less than five years, have, within five years of their application, been discharged or invalided from your Majesty's service on account of disease or wounds clearly attributable to the service of the Crown, and who are infirm and helpless, or permanently or temporarily unable to maintain themselves, from disability clearly the result of such disease or wounds.

"The following classes of men to be specially considered under Rule 5 of your Majesty's said Order in Council of the seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who, having served for less than ten years, have been, at any date, discharged or invalided from your Majesty's service on account of disease or wounds clearly attributable to the service of the Crown, who are infirm and helpless, or permanently or temporarily unable to maintain themselves, from disability clearly the result of such disease or wounds.

"Men who contributed to the funds of Greenwich Hospital before the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirty, if infirm and helpless, or permanently or temporarily

unable to maintain themselves.

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that Her Majesty may, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time reduce all or any of the dues for the time being payable in respect of existing or future lighthouses, buoys, or beacons for the time being under the manangement of the General Lighthouse Authorities therein mentioned (that is to say), the Corporation of Trinity House | their voyage out or on their voyage home :

of Deptford Strond, the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, and the Port of Dublin Corporation, now called the Commissioners of Irish Lights; and may also, by and with the like advice, from to time increase or vary any of such dues, so that no dues payable in respect of any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon existing at the time when the said Act came into operation should be made to exceed the amount which had at any period previous to such time been received in respect thereof, or to which the said dues might during any part of such period as last aforesaid lawfully have been raised:

And whereas by Order in Council, dated the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy (which came into operation on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy), Her Majesty was pleased to approve certain revised and amended New Consolidated Tables of Light Duties (Oversea Section) levied by the said General Lighthouse Authorities respectively in the form thereunto annexed, together with the several reductions, variations, abatements, regulations, and exemptions therein contained:

And whereas by Order in Council, dated the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, Her Majesty was pleased to approve certain New Consolidated Tables of Light Duties Coast Section) levied as aforesaid in the form thereunto annexed, together with the several reductions, variations, abatements, regulations, and

exceptions therein contained:

"And whereas by Order in Council, dated the ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two. Her Majesty was pleased to direct that, on and after the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventytwo, the duties for all general passing lights, under the management of the said three General Lighthouse Authorities should be payable by coasting vessels once only for the whole voyage, out and home, subject, however, to the abatement or discount thereinafter mentioned; and also, that on and after the said first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, the abatement or discount to be allowed upon the amount of light duties should be fifty-five per centum and no more:

And whereas by various Orders in Council since made in pursuance of the said Act, in respect of certain new lights, certain tolls have been directed to be paid for oversea vessels, and for coasting vessels respectively, subject to the abatement or discount of fifty-five per centum, and the regulations and exemptions mentioned in the said New Consolidated Table of Light Duties, and the said Order in Council of the ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventytwo:

And whereas, among the regulations and exemptions in the Oversea Section of the said New Consolidated Tables of Light Duties, it is provided that all vessels trading between ports in the United Kingdom and ports in Europe (excepting ports in the Mediterranean) should, in respect of every light passed on the whole voyage, out and at home, be liable to only one payment of dues for each general passing light:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that it is expedient that all coasting vessels, and all vessels trading between ports in the United Kingdom and ports in Europe (excepting ports in the Mediterranean should, instead of making one payment of dues for the voyage out and home, pay a moiety of dues for each light they pass or from which they derive benefit, whether on

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that it is expedient that the said abatement or discount of fifty-five per centum on the amount of tolls hereinbefore referred to should be varied in manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is

pleased to direct as follows, viz. :-

1. That on and after the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, all coasting vessels, and all vessels trading between ports in the United Kingdom and ports in Europe (excepting ports in the Mediterranean) shall, in respect of every light passed or from which benefit may be derived, either on the voyage out or on the voyage home, be liable to one moiety of the duties of Light Duties for each general passing light and for each local light under the management of the said General Lighthouse Authorities, subject, however, to the abatement or discount hereinufter mentioned.

2. That on and after the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, the abatement or discount to be allowed upon the amount of tolls specified in the said New Consolidated Tables of Light Duties mentioned in the said Orders in Council of the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and upon the amount of tolls specified in the said other Orders in Council hereinbefore referred to and in this Order in Council, shall, in the case of every oversea vessel and of every coasting vessel, be sixty per centum and no more.

HEREAS by the three hundred and thirty-third section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for every Pilotage Authority, by bye-laws made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to do within its district all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section:

And whereas the Pilot Commissioners of the Port of King's Lynn, being the Pilotage Authority for the Port of King's Lynn within the meaning of the said Act, have, in exercise of the powers in them vested by that Act, made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty various bye-laws and regulations which have been approved by two Orders in Council, dated respectively the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and the fourteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine:

And whereas the said Pilot Commissioners have made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty, certain alterations of, and additions to, the existing bye-laws and regulations of the Pilot Commissioners with respect to Pilots, Pilotage, and Pilotage Dues within their district and under their jurisdiction (a copy whereof as altered is set forth in the schedulc hereunto annexed):

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said bye-laws and regulations so set forth as aforesaid are reasonable and proper, and that the rates therein set forth do not exceed the rates specified in an Act of Parliament (13 George III, c. 30), intituled "An Act for the "better Regulation and Government of the Pilots "conducting Ships and Vessels to and out of the "Port of King's Lynn, and of the Bridgemen "conducting gangs of lighters or barges to and "from the same; and for laying down moorings in the Harbour of the said Port, and for prevent-"ing mischiefs by Fire therein."

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said Mcrchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and signify Her consent to the said bye-laws and regulations of the said Pilot Commissioners with respect to Pilotage within their district and under their jurisdiction, in lieu of the existing bye laws

and regulations.

#### SCHEDULE.

BYE-LAWS FOR THE REGULATION OF PILOTS AND PILOTAGE AT THE PORT OF KING'S LYNN.

#### Duties of Headsman.

- 1. The Headsman shall have the whole control of the pilotage in the channel, subject to the Merchant Shipping Acts, the Local Act of Parliament, the bye-laws, and the Board of Commissioners.
- 2. He shall attend at the Pilot Office at all reasonable hours, and shall always meet the person in charge of the pilot cutter or the tender whenever either vessel comes up. He is to provide for the inward and outward service in the most efficient manner, taking especial care that the roadstead is lest without pilots as seldom as possible. He will be held responsible for the due carrying out of Rule 32, and it shall be his duty to report, in writing, to the Clerk of the Commissioners any case in which the pilot cutter shall be absent from the roads without sufficient cause.

3. He shall keep proper books and entries of pilot earnings, and distribute the same monthly,

as directed by the Commissioners.

4. He shall keep a register of all ships arriving at and leaving the port, and a journal, in which shall be entered all accidents to vessels (however occurring) while in charge of a pilot, and lay them before the Board of Commissioners at every meeting.

5. He shall report to the Commissioners any case of misconduct or insubordination on the part

of the pilots

6. He shall every fortnight appoint a qualified pilot to take the command of the pilot cutter for the ensuing fortnight, and shall see that the rules regulating the turns of vessels for pilots are strictly carried out.

7. He shall, whenever necessary, cause signals to be displayed by flags at the Pilot Office to indicate the number of pilots required to go down

with the pilot cutter or tender.

8. He shall personally survey the channel at least once in every month, and at such other times as he may consider necessary, keeping a record of such surveys for the information of the Commissioners, to be laid before them at every meeting.

9. He shall, on the first notice of any vessel or vessels being on shore and in distress within the port (in preference to all other things), send all the assistance in his power to such vessel or vessels. And all pilots having knowledge of such matters whilst in the channel, shall do their

utmost to relieve such vessel or vessels without first coming up to town for the Headsman's orders for that purpose, but no proceedings shall be taken in the Admiralty Court or otherwise by the pilots for recovery of salvage without the consent of the Commissioners being first had and ob-

10. He shall, in all cases where it shall appear to him that keels or barges coming up the channel can get into town the same tide, and do not proceed thither, discharge the pilot or pilots from the said keels or barges, unless sufficient cause be assigned to him for the delay.

#### Duties of the Master of the Pilot Cutter.

11. The Master of the Pilot Cutter for the time being shall, whenever the cutter comes up to town, report himself to the Headsman at the Pilot Office for instructions, and strictly adhere to them, as well as to any other orders he may from time to time receive from that officer by letter or otherwise.

12. He shall be responsible for the due performance of Rule 32, so far as relates to the cutter, for the orderly conduct of the pilots while on board the cutter, and for the proper boarding of vessels. He shall see that the requisite signals are hoisted, a proper watch kept, and generally that the bye-laws are enforced so far as relates to matters in the channel.

13. He shall report any instance of improper conduct on the part of any of the pilots to the Headsman.

14. He shall not leave the pilot cutter while down the channel except in cases of urgent necessity, and then only to take charge of a

#### Duties of Mates.

15. The Mates of the Pilot Cutter shall be appointed by, and hold office during the pleasure of, the Commissioners, and they must have served at sea at least three years immediately preceding their appointment. They must have attained the age of 18 years and must not exceed 25 years.

16. They shall carry out the instructions from time to time received from the Headsman and the Master of the Pilot Cutter, and shall take charge of the cutter in the absence of the master.

#### Duties of Pilots.

17. The Pilots shall strictly conform to the instructions of the Headsman while on shore, and when on board the pilot cutter or tender, of the pilot in command.

18. They shall severally report any accident occurring to any vessel in their charge to the Headsman immediately on their arrival at Lynn.

- 19. They shall always, on arrival at Lynn, report immediately to the Headsman what ship they have been on board, and where they have left her.
- 20. They shall take their regular turns in piloting ships or vessels either down or up the channel, as the Headsman or the Master of the Pilot Cutter for the time being shall direct.
- 21. They shall attend every day at the Pilot Office, when not employed in piloting, from the beginning of flood until high water, and at such other times of the day as are necessary, there to receive the orders and directions of their Heads-
- 22. The pilot who shall have the charge of any ship or vessel lying in the roads, or at any place between the roads and the town, either inward or outward bound, shall not leave such ship or vessel,

and go on shore, without first obtaining permission from the master of such ship or vessel.

23. Pilots appointed to pilot ships or vessels down the channel, shall on no account whatever, except by permission of the masters of such ships or vessels, leave or quit them (by allowing themselves to be put ashore), before their arrival at the Bell Buoy.

24. When any pilot shall, by accident or otherwise, lay any ship or vessel aground which he shall have in charge, such pilot shall not of his own accord, under any pretence whatever, leave the ship until she shall be affoat and in rafety.

25. The pilots shall at all times board ships and vessels bound to Lynn, in preference to boarding vessels (being strangers) which may be in the roads, bound to any other port; and they shall, if on board any vessel not bound to Lynn, quit such vessel immediately on the arrival in the roads of any vessel wanting a pilot bound to Lynn.

26. They shall not on any account anchor Humber keels or other vessels so as to obstruct the free navigation of ships or vessels going up

and down the channel.

27. Whenever any buoy or beacon shall be lost or out of its place, the pilots shall forthwith acquaint the Headsman with the circumstance, in order that it may be replaced with as little delay as possible.

28. All the pilots, but especially the Master of the Pilot Cutter for the time being, shall observe particularly any alteration which may take place in the channel, and report from time to time such

alteration to the Headsman.

29. Each pilot shall be allowed a fortnight's leave of absence in every year at the discretion of the Headsman as to time; such leave, however, shall not be granted between the 1st October and 31st May, and any pilot having leave granted other than as above, shall pay to the earnings account 3s. 6d. per day during his absence.

30. If any pilot when in charge of any ship, by wilful breach of duty, or by neglect of duty, or by reason of drunkenness, does any act tending to the immediate loss, destruction, or serious damage of such ship, or tending immediately to endanger the life or limb of any person on board such ship; or if any pilot, by wilful breach of duty or by neglect of duty, or by reason of drunkenness, refuses or omits to do any lawful act proper and requisite to be done by him for preserving such ship from loss, destruction, or serious damage, or for preserving any person belonging to or on board of such ship from danger to life or limb, the pilot so offending shall, for each such offence, be liable to suspension or dismissal by the Commissioners.

#### The Pilot Vessels.

31. The pilot cutter and her tender shall always be at the disposal of the Headsman for the purpose of carrying on the pilot service generally, and for buoying, beaconing, and surveying in the channel, subject to the special orders of the Commissioners.

32. The pilot cutter, when in the roads, shall be either cruising or at anchor as near the Roadstead Buoy as circumstances will allow, the conveyance of the pilots not having vessels in their charge between the roadstead and the town, and vice versâ, being performed under the direction of the Headsman by the cutter and tender conjointly. The cutter shall never be absent from the roads longer than is absolutely necessary, and she shall on no account leave the roads when any inward bound vessels shall be in sight with a probability of getting to Lynn on that tide without first providing them with pilots.

33. The pilot cutter shall be distinguished by the characteristics and signals following, that is to say:—

(a.) A black colour painted or tarred outside, with the exception of such names and numbers

as are hereinafter mentioned.

(%) On her stern the name of the owner thereof, and the port to which she belongs painted in white letters, at least one inch broad and three inches long, and on each bow the number of the license of such boat or ship.

(c.) When affoat a flag at the mast head or on a spit, or staff, or in some other equally conspicuous situation, such flag to be of large dimensions compared with the size of the vessel carrying the same, and to be of two colours, the upper horizontal half white, and the lower horizontal half red.

(d.) From sunset to sunrise a white light at the masthead visible all round the horizon, and a flare up light exhibited every fifteen minutes.

- (e.) In the daytime one black ball at the masthead in the place of the ordinary signal, to indicate that all the pilots have been boarded and a second black ball that more are required.
- 34. The pilot cutter and tender shall at all times when in town lie afloat, if possible, on the west side of the channel.

#### The Superannuation of Pilots.

- 35. Each pilot when superannuated shall receive twenty pounds per annum, to be paid by the Headsman of the pilots out of the aggregate earnings of the pilots in twelve equal monthly instalments.
- 36. No pilot licensed after the 1st day of March, 1864, shall be entitled to superannuation until he shall have served twenty-five years as working pilot.

General Regulations.

- 37. The pilots hereafter licensed shall be divided into second and first class pilots, but all the present pilots shall be of the first class.
  - (a.) A candidate for the office of a pilot of the second class must have been employed for two years immediately preceding his appointment as mate of the pilot cutter, or five years at sea, two of which he must have served in the capacity of able seaman and chiefly on board vessels trading to this port. He must have attained the age of 21 years, and must not exceed 30 years.
  - (b.) He will have to pass an examination before the Commissioners, and, if approved, he will be recommended to the Town Council as a proper person to become a licensed pilot.
  - (c.) On receiving his license the Headsman may authorize him to conduct any vessels, not exceeding ten feet draft of water, into and out of this port.

(d.) He will be entitled to participate in the monthly net earning of the pilots to the extent of two-thirds of the share of a first class

pilot.

(e.) A candidate for the office of a pilot of the first class must have been a second class pilot for two years, during which time his conduct must have been in all respects satisfactory. He will be required to pass a further examination before the Commissioners, and if approved will be admitted as a first class pilot, and authorized to conduct vessels of every description into and out of this port, and will be entitled to receive monthly a full share of the net carnings of the pilots.

38. The Headsman shall not excuse any pilot from the exercise of his duty on account of, or under any pretence of, illness, unless such illness shall be certified in writing under the hand of some known physician, surgeon, or apothecary.

39. Any pilot being excused as above, shall produce a similar certificate monthly, and at the end of three months from the date of the first certicate he shall, if still unable to discharge his ordinary duty, be put upon half-pay, and at the end of six months he shall, if eligible, be put on

superannuation allowance.

40. If the pilot be not eligible to superannuation allowance, he shall remain on half-pay for twelve months, after which his pay shall cease, and if he shall be unable to resume his duties within two years after the date of his first certificate his name shall then be erased, and he shall cease to be a pilot of the port, but in any case in which the incapacity arises from injuries or illness sustained in the exercise of his duty as pilot, it shall be at the discretion of the Commissioners to award him any sum not exceeding £15 per annum.

4!. Not more than one pilot shall be put on board any foreign or other ship or vessel, unless such ship or vessel shall have a signal of distress

flying.

42. All masters of ships and vessels wanting pilots shall apply to the Headsman, at the Pilot Office, and there pay what shall be due for their pilotage both inward and outward, and for tidesworks previous to a pilot being appointed to such ship or vessel.

43. Every master of a ship or vessel wanting pilot shall produce to the Headsman the meter's or other officer's certificate of clearance or discharge of the ship or vessel for which he applies for a pilot, and unless such certificate be produced to the Headsman, or he is otherwise satisfied that the ship or vessel has discharged her cargo, he is not to appoint a pilot to such ship or vessel; and the turns of outward bound vessels shall be regulated by the time of the inward cargo being discharge, or of their arrival if in refuge or ballast, no preference being given to any description of vessel.

44. The pilots shall (unless impracticable) board inward bound vessels at the Bell Buoy. The first ship or vessel arriving at the Bell Buoy (such buoy bearing north-west), shall be entitled to the first pilot, and every ship or vessel so arriving, and which cannot from her large burden or other unavoidable cause proceed up the channel immediately, shall be boarded in her turn, and the pilot shall remain on boad till the vessel can proceed to town.

45. All vessels, whether inward or outward bound to or from Lynn, shall be free from the payment of pilotage in the event of such vessels not being able to obtain the services of a pilot, and in the event of any vessel inward bound arriving without a pilot within the Marsh Cut Banks, the employment of a pilot shall be entirely optional with the master of the vessel so arriving.

46. The shipowners of this port are requested to give strict charge to their several masters of ships or vessels to make a true report to the pilot, when boarded, of the time of their arrival at the Bell Buoy (such buoy bearing north-west), in order that the proper turns of their several vessels may be attended to.

47. When any ships or vessels are coming up the channel into town, and there are others in the harbour outward bound, wanting pilots, the first ship or vessel in turn shall claim the first pilot coming into town, and so on in turn as pilots may afterwards come in with ships and vessels.

48. All letters required to be delivered by the pilots on board ships in the roads shall be sent to the Pilot Office, and the Headsman shall provide a proper bag for the same to be kept under lock and key, and shall be answerable for the custody of such bag, and for proper steps being taken to secure the correct delivery of all letters placed in his charge; and a register shall be kept at the Pilot Office of all letters received by the Headsman, the date of receipt, and the date and mode of their delivery. In case of the non-delivery of any such letters within a reasonable time the cause shall be stated in the register, and the Headsman shall not communicate to any person (other than the pilots), the address of any letter received by him.

49. A map of the channel, showing all the buoys, with a reference describing the size of each buoy, shall be kept at the Pilot Office for the service of the Corporation and Commissioners.

50. Every pilot offending against any of the foregoing bye laws, rules, and regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, or to be reduced to the rank of a second class pilot, or to be suspended from his office of a pilot during the pleasure of the Commissioners, or to have his license cancelled, and the Commissioners are hereby empowered to cancel such license accordingly.

51. All fines to be imposed as aforesaid shall be deducted by the Headsman from the share of the earnings of the offending pilot, and shall be paid to the Treasurer of the said Commissioners on account of the Mooring Dues Fund.

52. Every pilot shall be furnished with a copy of the bye-laws, and a copy shall always be kept on board the cutter, and at the Pilot Office, and shall be given on application to the slipowners.

#### Additional Rates,

The sum of ten shillings per day shall be paid for every day after the first day a pilot is detained in the channel on board an inward bound vessel referred to in Rule 44.

The sum of one shilling shall be paid by the master of every inward bound vessel to any pilot who shall render any assistance beyond the pilot service, and the further sum of two shillings and sixpence, if, at the master's request, the pilot stay to moor the vessel.

The sum of two shillings and sixpence shall be paid to any pilot who shall attend an outward bound vessel one or more tides provided such vessel subsequently proceeds without a pilot.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the fourth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and minth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-two; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Charing Heath, in the parish of Charing, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Charing, and of the parish of Lenham, in the said county of Kent, and in the said diocese of Canterbury, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective

parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Charing, and of the said parish of Lenham, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Charing Heath as aforesaid.

" Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Archibald Campbell, Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul, in the city and diocese of London, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Charing (in testimony of which consent they the said Dean and Chapter have affixed their common or corporate seal to this representation), and with the consent of Aretas Akers, of Hayes Common, Beckenham, in the said county of Kent, and of Malling Abbey, in the same county, Esq., the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Lenham (in testimony whereof he, the said Aretas Akers, has signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Charing, and of the said parish of Lenham, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Charing Heath as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Charing Heath.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy

Trinity, Charing Heath, being: -"All those two contiguous portions of the parish of Charing, and of the parish of Lenham, both in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Canterbury, which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the parish of Pluckley, in the said county and diocese, from the parish of Charing aforesaid, at a point near the western side of Park Wood, at the centre of the bridge which carries Park Houseroad over the River Stour; and extending thence, north-eastward, for a distance of about thirtythree chains along the middle of the said road to its junction with Hurst-road; and extending thence for a distance of about fifty chains, first north-westward and then northward, along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with Windhill-lane, and continuing thence for a distance of fifteen chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said lane to its junction, at or near to the house called or known as Windhill, with Tile Lodge-road; and extending thence, northeastward, for a distance of twelve chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road to its junction, at or near to Tile Lodge Cottage, with the occupation road leading to the homestead called or known as Burleigh; and extending thence, north-westward, along the fence forming the north-eastern side of the said occupation road to the junction of such fence on the eastern side of the last-named homestead with the fence which divides the close numbered 299 upon the map of the ordnance survey of the said parish of Charing, published in the year 1871, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the homestead called or known as Burleigh aforesaid, and numbered 312 upon the same maps, at or near to which said point of junction a boundary stone, inscribed 'C. H., H. T. C. C., 1873, No. 1,' has been placed on the north-eastern side of the same occupation road; and extending thence, first northward and then westward, along the lost-described fence to its junction with the fence which divides the close numbered 84 upon the said maps from the closes numbered respectively 311, 310, 298, 83, and 69, upon the same maps; and continuing thence, first westward and then north-westward and then north-eastward, along the last-described fence to the boundary which divides the said parish of Charing from that detached portion of the parish of Wichling, in the county and diocese aforesaid, wherein Cobham Wood is situate; and extending thence, north-westward, along the lastdescribed boundary to the point in the middle of the bridle road or footpath which leads from Cobham Farm past the south-eastern side of Cobham Wood aforesaid towards Charing Heath, where the said last-described boundary is joined by the boundary which divides the above-described detached portion of the said parish of Wichling from the parish of Lenham aforesaid; and extending thence, north-eastward, for a distance of sixty links, or thereabouts, along the last-described boundary to the north-eastern end of the fence which divides the close numbered 1061 upon the map of the ordnance survey of the said parish of Lenham, published in the year 1871, and upon

the map hereunto annexed as aforesaid, from the closes numbered respectively 1066 and 1064 upon the same maps; and extending thence. first south-westward and then generally northwestward, along the last-described fence, and continuing, still north-westward, along the fence which divides the close numbered 1060 upon the last-described maps from the close numbered 1062 upon the same maps, to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. H., H. T. C. C., 1873, No. 2, and placed at the north-western end of the lastdescribed fence, on the eastern side of the road or footpath leading from Burnt House to Old Shelve; and extending thence, generally westward, across the last-described road or footpath, to and along the line of fences which divide the closes numbered respectively 1051, 1048, 1042, 1037, and 1034, upon the said last-described maps, from the closes numbered respectively 1059, 1006, 1050, 1049, 1047, 1045, 1038, and 1036, upon the same maps, to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. H.. H. T. C. C., 1873, No. 3,' and placed at the western end of the fence which divides the said close numbered 1034 from the close numbered 1036, as aforesaid, upon the eastern side of the road which leads from Lenham Forstal to New Shelve; and entinuing thence, still westward, to a point in the middle of the last-described road; and extending thence, south-westward, for a distance of two chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of . the same road, to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. H., H. T. C. C., 1873, No. 4, and placed on the western'side of the same road, at the eastern end of the fence which divides the close numbered 1029 upon the said last-described maps from the closes numbered respectively 1032 and 1027 upon the same maps; and extending thence, westward, to such last-described boundary stone, and along the last-described fence; and continuing then, generally north-westward, along the line of fences which divide the closes numbered respectively 993, 992, 991, 988, 986, 977, and 972, upon the said last-described maps, from the closes numbered respectively 1027, as aforesaid, 1025, 1023, 1024, and 1022, upon the same maps, to a boundary stone inscribed C. H., H. T. C. C., 1873, No. 5, and placed at the western end of the same line of fences, on the eastern side of Chapel-lane; and continuing thence, still northwestward, to a point in the middle of the lastnamed lane; and extending thence, south-westward, for a distance of thirty-three chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the same lane, to its junction with Sandway-road; and extending thence, north-westward, for a distance of twelve and a-half chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road, to the boundary on the north-eastern side of Chilston Park, which Loundary divides the said parish of Lenham from the parish of Boughton Malherbe, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence, generally southward, along the last-described boundary, to its junction, near Water-street, with the boundary which divides the said parish of Lenham from the parish or chapelry of Egerton, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and continuing thence, first southward and then eastward, along the lastdescribed boundary (thereby following in part the course of the said River Stour), to the junction of the said last-described boundary with the boundary which divides the said parish or chapelry of Egerton from the parish of Charing aforesaid; and extending thence, first southward, and then generally southeastward, along the last-described boundary (thereby following, in one part, the course of the road leading from Turner's Hill past Stonebridge Green and Field Mill, to Charing Heath, and in

another part the course of the River Stour aforesaid), to the junction of the same boundary, at or near to Pain-street, with the boundary which divides the said parish of Charing from the parish of Pluckley aforesaid; and extending thence, eastward, along the last-described boundary, thereby following in part the course of the River Stour aforesaid, to the first-described point, near the western side of Park Wood aforesaid, at the centre of the bridge which carries Park House-road over the River Stour, as aforesaid, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury.

Whereas, under and by virtue of a certain indenture, bearing date the thirtieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and made or expressed to be made between the Reverend William Hill, Clerk, Vicar of the Vicarage of Saint John the Baptist, in Peterborough, in the county of Northampton, of

the first part, us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the second part, the Right Reverend Francis, Lord Bishop of Peterborough, patron of the said vicarage, of the third part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the fourth part, the lands and hereditaments described in the schedule hereto annexed, situate in the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, became and are now vested in us. "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district, for spiritual purposes, out of the new parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, sometime part of the parish of Christ Church with Holdenhurst, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portion of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district, for spiritual purposes, in the manner liereinafter

recommended and proposed.

"And whereas a sum of two thousand five hundred pounds of Four Pounds per centum Debenture Stock of the London and North-Western Railway Company has been contributed by certain persons, and transferred to our name, in the books of the said Company, to be held in trust by us, as and for a permanent endowment for the incumbent for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, upon the understanding that the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sum of stock shall be receivable by the said incumbent for the time being, when he shall have been duly licensed, and upon the further understanding that we should pay, out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-named Act, to the said incumbent for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, when such incumbent shall have been duly licensed as before mentioned, the annual sum

of fifty pounds, and upon the further understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid, by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that all that pertion of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named the district of Saint Michael, Bournemouth.

"And we further recommend and propose that the right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to, and he absolutely vested in, and shall and may, from time to time, be exercised alternately by Maria Helen Wanklyn, of Cheam, in the county of Surrey, Widow, and her heirs and assigns, and George Durrant, of the city of Norwich, Esquire, and his heirs and assigns, for ever, the first and every other alternate turn of nomination being vested in the said Maria Helen Wanklyn, and her heirs and assigns, and the remaining turns of nomination being vested in the said George Durrant, and his heirs and assigns.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

THE ELEMENTARY EDUCATION ACT, 1870.

BYE-LAWS OF THE GILDERSOME SCHOOL BOARD.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of a requisition sent by the Education Department, to the Returning Officer for the parish of Gildersome, in the county of York, a School Board for the District of the said parish, was duly elected on the 29th day of March, 1871.

Now, at a meeting of the School Board of the said parish of Gildersome, duly convened and held at the Board Room at the Working Men's Club, in the said parish of Gildersome, on Wednesday, the 15th of October, 1873, at which meeting a quorum of the members of such Board are present, the said Board do hereby, in pursuance of the aforesaid powers, and subject to the approval of the Education Department, make and ordain the following Bye-laws.

#### Definition of Terms.

In the following Bye-laws-

The term "Education Department" means the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council on Education.

The term "Her Majesty's Inspectors" means the Inspectors of Schools appointed by Her Majesty on the recommendation of the Education Department.

The term "School Board" or "Board," means the School Board of the District comprising the parish of Gildersome.

Terms importing males include females.

The term "Public Elementary School" means a Public Elementary School as defined by the Elementary Education Act, 1970.

Elementary Education Act, 1970.

The term "Parent" includes Guardian, and every person who is liable to maintain, or has the actual custody of any child.

#### BYE-LAWS.

1. Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and of these Bye-laws, the parent of every child residing within the Gildersome School Board District, shall cause such child, being not less than five nor more than thirteen years of age, to attend a Public Elementary School, unless there be some reasonable excuse for the non-attendance of such child.

2. Any one of the following shall be deemed a reasonable excuse within the meaning of Byc-law

(a.) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.

(b.) That the child has been or is prevented from attending school by sickness or some other unavoidable cause.

(c.) That there is no Public Elementary School open which the child can attend within two miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.

3. The Board shall have power to exempt a child from attendance at school for such period as they may think fit, if sickness in the family, or other urgent reason shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Board to exist.

4. If any child between the ages of ten and thirteen be certified by one of Her Majesty's Inspectors to have reached a standard of education which would enable it to pass an examination according to Standard IV of the Government Code of February, 1871, such child shall be exempted from the obligation to attend more than six of the meetings of a school in any one week: if any child between the ages of ten and thirteen be so certified to have reached a standard of education which would enable it to pass an examination, according to Standard VI of the said Code, such child shall be exempted from the obligation to attend any school.

5. Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and of these Bye-Laws, the time during which every child shall attend school shall be the whole time in which the ordinary instruction of the school is given, provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance or instruction in religious subjects, or shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the parent of such child belongs, or shall require the attendance at school of any child on such days as are set apart by the managers of the school for inspection in religious subjects; or shall require the attendance of any child if such requirement would be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

district of the School Board, satisfies the School Board that he is unable from poverty to pay the school fees of such child, the School Board will remit, in the schools provided by the said Board, for a renewable period to be fixed by the Board, not exceeding six calendar months, the whole or such part of the said fees as in their opinion the parent is unable to pay.

7. If the parent shall satisfy the Board that the income of himself and his family does not (on the

average) exceed the following scale, he shall be deemed unable, through poverty, to pay the school

A parent and one child ... 7s. 6d. per week. Two parents and one child 10s. Od.

1s. 3d. per week being added for each additional child above one year old.

8. Any person convicted of a breach of these Bye-laws before two Justices of the Peace shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, including costs.

THE ELEMENTARY EDUCATION ACT. 1870.

BYE-LAWS OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF THE BOROUGH OF SOUTHAMPTON.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of a requisition sent by the Education Department to the Mayor of the borough of Southampton, a School Board for the district of the said borough was duly elected on the 16th day of March, 1871. And, whereas, Bye-laws were duly made by the said School Board on 7th day of September, 1871, and the said School Board are desirous of revoking the same and of making new Bye-Laws in lieu thereof. Now at a meeting of the School Board for the said district, duly convened and held at the offices of the said Board, in the said borough of Southampton, on Thursday, the 6th day of November, 1873, at which meeting a quorum of the members of the Board are present, the said Board do hereby, in pursuance of the powers given to them by the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and subject to the approval of the Lords of the

Committee of the Privy Council on Education, make and ordain the following Bye-laws:-

I. The said Bye-laws, made on the 7th day of September, 1871, are hereby revoked and cancelled, as from the day on which these Bye-laws shall be sanctioned by Her Majesty in Council.

II. In these Bye-laws-

Terms importing males include females.

The term "School" means either a Public Elementary School or any other school at which efficient elementary instruction is given.

The term "Public Elementary School" means a school or department of a school at which elementary instruction is the principal part of the education given, and at which the ordinary payments in respect of instruction given do not exceed nine-pence a week, and which is conducted in accordance with the 7th section of the Elementary Education Act, 1870.

The term "Parent" includes guardian and every person who is liable to maintain or has the

actual custody of any child.

The term "Board" means the School Board

of the borough of Southampton.

III. The purent of every child of not less than five nor more than thirteen years of age is required to cause such child to attend school, unless there be some reasonable excuse for non-attendance.

IV. In addition to the reasonable excuses for non-attendance mentioned in the Act, viz.,-

- (1.) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner;
- (2.) That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness, or any unavoidable cause;
- It shall be a reasonable excuse for nonattendance-
  - (3.) That there is no Public Elementary School open which such child can attend within one mile, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.
- V. Except, as hereinafter provided, the time during which every such child is required to attend school is the whole time for which the school selected shall be open for the instruction of children, not being less than twenty-five hours a week, except on Sundays, and except also that nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance. or instruction in religious subjects, or shall require any child to attend on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his parent may belong.

VI. When the parent of any child attending any school provided by the Board satisfies the Board that he is unable from poverty to pay the school fees, the Board will remit the whole or such part of the fees as, in their opinion, he is unable to pay; for a renewable period not ex-

ceeding three months at a time.

VII. A child of not less than ten years of age who has been certified by one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools to have reached the fourth standard of Education according to the Code of Regulations issued by the Education Department for 1873, shall be altogether exempted from

obligation to attend school.

VIII. Provided always, that if, and whenever, Bye-laws V and VII, or either of them, shall be inconsistent with the regulations affecting any child subject thereto, contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour, the said regulations shall prevail, and the said Bye-laws shall affect such children only to such extent as they are consistent with the said regulations.

IX. Every parent who shall not observe or shall violate these Bye-laws, or any of them, shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, including costs, for each offence.

And whereas the said Statutes have been submitted to and approved by the Special Commissioners appointed by the said Act, and have been this day laid before Her Majesty in Council, the same are published in the London Gazette, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act.

And notice is hereby given, that it is lawful for the bodies or persons authorized so to do, in that Act, within two months from the date of the publication of this notification, to petition Her Majesty in Council to withhold Her approval from the whole or any part of such Statutes.

### STATUTES for the Government of Shrewsbury School.

WHEREAS by "The Public Schools Act, 1868," and the Acts amending or affecting the same, the Governing body of any school to which the Acts apply may make Statutes as therein mentioned, and may consolidate and amend any existing Statutes or regulations relating to such school, and may repeal any Statutes or regulations which have in the opinion of that Body become obsolete, or which have become incapable of observance by reason of changes authorized to be made under the said Acts:

And whereas Shrewsbury Free Grammar School is a school to which the said Acts apply:

And whereas in the exercise of their powers the Governing Body have determined to amend the existing Statutes and Regulations, and to consolidate with the amendments to be so made all such parts of the existing Statutes and Regulations as are not deemed by them to have become obsolete or as are not repugnant to the said amendments, and to repeal all the other parts of the said Statutes and Regulations which, being so deemed to be obsolete or being repugnant, it is not thought fit to retain in force:

Be it enacted as follows:---

#### I. THE HEAD MASTER.

1. The Head Master shall be appointed by and hold his office at the pleasure of the Governing Body.

2. He shall be a Master of Arts in the University of Oxford or of Cambridge, or of some equal or superior degree in the same.

No. 24068.

3. He shall be resident during the whole of each school-term, unless for some grave cause to be signified by him in writing to the Governing

4. He shall be charged with the general discipline and management of the school, and shall superintend the instruction of all boys admitted to

the school.

5. He shall have authority to punish any boy on the Foundation who shall misconduct himself either at the school or elsewhere by dismissal from the school or otherwise, provided that in any such cases of dismissal an appeal shall be allowed from the sentence of the Head Master to the Governing Body, whose decision thereon shall be final.

6. He shall have a residence within the precincts of the school, rent free. Such residence shall be kept in substantial repair, and all rates and taxes in respect thereof shall be paid out of the income of the property of the school. Each Head Master on assuming office shall also be entitled to have his residence put into a sufficient state of habitable and decorative repair out of the income of the property of the school, but he shall thenceforth do what are usually known as tenants' repairs to so much of the house as is occupied by himself and his family at his own expense. The expense of all repairs of every description to the part occupied by boarders shall be defrayed out of the income of the property of the school.

7. He shall not hold any ecclesiastical or other office to which any emolument is attached without the consent of the Governing Body, nor shall he without the like consent undertake any other duties than those of the Head Mastership.

8. The Head Master shall not resign his office without giving to the Governing Body at least three months' notice of his intended resignation, and such resignation shall take effect only at the end of a school-term, except with the express consent of the Governing Body.

#### II. ASSISTANT MASTERS.

1. The number, position, emoluments, and rank in the school of the Assistant Masters shall be subject of the directions of the Governing Body from time to time.

2. All the Assistant Masters shall be appointed by, and hold their offices at the pleasure of, the Head Master; but in case he dismiss a Master, he shall forthwith notify the fact and the reason for it to the Governing Body.

#### III. THE FOUNDATION.

1. Subject to the rights of persons being burgesses of Shrewsbury at the time of the passing of "The Public Schools Act, 1868," to send their children to the school, the Foundation shall consist of such number of boys to be elected according to the results of a Competitive Examination as the Governing Body, having regard to the income of the property of the school at their disposal, shall from time to time determine. The sons of burgesses of Shrewsbury attending the school pursuant to the rights so reserved by the said Act are hereinafter called Free Boys.

2. Elections to vacancies on the Foundation under the preceding clause shall take place at such times as the Governing Body may determine, but no election shall be held until the number of Free Boys on the Foundation shall be less than twenty-four, and only such vacancies shall then be filled up by election as may not be filled up by the ad-

mission of properly qualified Free Boys.

3. Thirty days before every election, the Governing Body shall cause notice thereof to be given in such manner as they may deem best adapted to ensure publicity.

4. The Examiners shall be appointed by th Governing Body, and the examination shall be in such subjects as shall be determined by regulation.

5. Any boy may be a Candidate for election on the Foundation who has not passed his fifteenth birthday on the day of election, whether he may have already attended the school or not, and any boy on the Foundation may attend the school either as a day-boy or as a boarder.

6. All boys on the Foundation shall have the

instruction of the school free of charge.

7. If a boy on the Foundation attain the age of 19 between 1st January and the end of the summer term he shall leave the school at the end of the summer term; if he attain that age between the end of the summer term and the 31st December, he shall leave the school at the end of the winter term unless he obtain the express permission of the Head Master to remain at the school until the end of the following summer term.

8. Boys on the Foundation shall leave the school at an earlier age than 19, who have not in the judgment of the Governing Body attained a place in the school which shall be proportionate to

their age.

#### IV. BOARDERS.

No person, other than a Master of the school approved by the Governing Body, shall be entitled to take boys to board and lodge in his house, in order that they may attend the school, without having previously obtained the express sanction of the Governing Body.

#### V. YEARLY EXAMINATION.

The boys in the school shall be examined yearly in such subjects, at such time and by such persons or person as the Governing Body may from time to time appoint, and the results of the Examination, as regards all the boys in the school, shall be

reported to the Governing Body.

At the same time there shall be an Examination of the boys who may be Candidates for any Exhibitions then vacant, or about to become vacant, and after the Examination the Examiner or Examiners shall place the names of all Candidates who may be duly qualified to hold the several Exhibitions in the order of merit according to the proficiency shown by them in such Examination, and shall report the same to the governing Body.

#### VI. EXHIBITIONS.

1. The Scholarships or Exhibitions founded by Dr. John Millington for boys proceeding from Shrewsbury School to the University shall no longer be limited to such boys only as may be admitted and continue to be members of Magdalen College, in the University of Cambridge, but shall be tenable by boys from Shrewsbury School proceeding to any College or Hall in the University of Oxford or of Cambridge, or otherwise becoming Members of either of those Universities.

2. The Scholarship or Exhibition founded by Mr. James Millington, for a boy proceeding from Shrewsbury School to the University, shall no longer be limited to a boy who may be admitted and continue to be a member of Magdalen College, in the University of Cambridge, but shall be tenable by a boy from Shrewsbury School proceeding to any College or Hall in the University of Oxford or of Cambridge, or otherwise becoming a Member

of either of those Universities.

3. The two Scholarships or Exhibitions founded by Deed, dated 27th September, 1656, and in respect of which the yearly sum of £70 has been heretofore paid from the funds of the school to the Master, Fellows, and Scholars of St. John's College, in the University of Cambridge, shall no longer be limited to such boys only as may be

admitted and continue to be members of the said College, but shall be tenable by boys from Shrewsbury School proceeding to any College or Hall in the University of Oxford or of Cambridge, or otherwise becoming Members of either of those Universities. The Governing Body may, if they think fit, consolidate the said two Scholarships or Exhibitions, and make them into one Exhibition, of the yearly value of £70, tenable for four years.

4. The two Exhibitions founded by the Reve-

4. The two Exhibitions founded by the Reverend Oswald Smyth shall be open to the competition of all boys who have been or shall have been at the school for two years, any restrictions or limitations imposed by the Founder to the contrary notwithstanding. The Exhibitions shall be

tenable for four years.

5. All Scholarships, Exhibitions, and Emoluments, tenable after quitting the school by boys educated thereat, shall be conferred according to the result of the Examination provided by Statute V.

6. The Exhibition founded by the Rev. John Taylor, D.D., and regulated by his will, shall be open to the competition of all boys who shall have

been at the school for two years.

- 7. In all future elections to Scholarships or Exhibitions tenable by boys proceeding from Shrewsbury School to the University of Oxford or of Cambridge, no regard shall be paid to the place of birth or to the parentage or lineage of any candidate, but every such Scholarship or Exhibition shall be tenable by any boy proceeding to either of the said Universities, provided that he has been at the school for two years immediately preceding the end of the school term in which the Election takes place, and provided that he shall have obtained from the Head Master a certificate of good morals and behaviour; and provided also that in all Elections to the Exhibitions founded by the aforesaid Dr. John Millington nothing herein contained shall in any way affect the preference which may be claimed by the sons of Mrs. Laura Seraphina Beddoes as descendants of the said Dr. Millington.
- 8. Every such Scholarship or Exhibition shall be open to all boys in the school, whether on the Foundation or not, and the subjects of Examination in the case of any Scholarship or Exhibition shall be defined or varied by regulation, provided that not less than six months' notice be given of any variation.

9. The Governing Body may from time to time vary the length of time during which any Exhibition may be tenable, and the time at which the Election to any Scholarship or Exhibition shall

take place.

- 10. The Governing Body shall require from time to time from every Exhibitioner prior to the payment of his stipend as Exhibitioner satisfactory certificates of the necessary residence at the University, of good behaviour, and of due application to his studies.
- 11. The foregoing rules shall apply as well to the Exhibitions or Scholarships mentioned above as to all Exhibitions or Scholarships which may be established by means of any accumulation of money arising from any fund or benefaction in which the school is interested.
- 12. The foregoing rules shall not apply to the Exhibitions and the Prize on the Foundation of Mr. Edward Careswell, or any accumulation thereon, nor to the Scholarship or Exhibition founded under the will of the Rev. Henry Usher Matthews, nor to the Exhibition founded by the Rev. R. B. Podmore, nor to the Exhibition founded by Mrs. Noneley.
- 13. The Exhibitions and the Prize on the Foundation of Mr. Edward Careswell shall remain and

be administered as by the several instruments creating or regulating the trusts thereof respectively provided, and shall not be affected in any

way by these Statutes.
14. The Scholarship or Exhibition founded under the will of the Rev. Henry Usher Matthews, for a boy proceeding from Shrewsbury School to the University, shall no longer be limited to a boy who may be admitted and continue a member of Lincoln College, in the University of Oxford, but shall be tenable by a boy from Shrewsbury School proceeding to any College or Hall in the University of Oxford or of Cambridge, or otherwise becoming a member of either of those Universities.

15. The Exhibition founded by the Rev. R. B.

Podmore shall remain under the limitations prescribed by the Founder, and shall not be affected

in any way by these Statutes.

16. The Exhibition founded by Mrs. Noneley shall remain under the limitations prescribed by her, and shall not be affected in any way by these

17. No boy shall be elected to more than one Scholarship or Exhibition from the school.

#### VII. MEETINGS OF THE GOVERNING BODY.

1. There shall be at least two Meetings of the Governing Body in every year, at such times as the Governing Body may from time to time

2. The Chairman of the Governing Body, or any three members of the same, may summon a Special Meeting whenever an occasion may arise which shall appear to them to require such a

Meeting to be convened.

3. If the Head Master shall at any time be of opinion that a Special Meeting of the Governing Body should be held for any urgent question of discipline, or for any business materially affecting the welfare of the school, he shall notify such opinion in writing to the Chairman for the time being of the Governing Body, or to any three members of the Governing Body, whereupon the Chairman or any such three members shall summon a Special Meeting of the Governing Body to be held not earlier than seven days and not later than fourteen days from the receipt of the notification.

#### VIII. Application of Income of the Property OF THE SCHOOL

The income of the property of the school after the payment of all charges and liabilities shall be applied by the Governing Body in manner follow-

ing, that is to say:

First, in keeping in repair the School, School House, Chapel and Library, the Houses, Buildings and Appurtenances belonging to the same, including such repairs as aforesaid to the Head Master's residence, and the payment of all Rates and Taxes payable in respect of such Houses and Buildings.

Secondly, in payment of such sums of money as have been heretofore paid to any Master of the School appointed to his office before the passing of

"The Public Schools Act; 1864."

And also of such sum of money as may be thought to be a suitable remuneration for the

Examiner or Examiners of the School.

Thirdly, in payment of the Salaries of a Secretary or Clerk of the Governing Body and of any other officer who may be appointed for duties connected with the school, and in payment of Wages of Servants and of any exceptional expenses which may be incurred by the Governing Body for the benefit of the school.

Fourthly, in payment of such sums of money as the Governing Body may from time to time deem expedient either towards a fund to be employed in

the purchase of a new site for the School and Masters' Houses, and for a suitable play ground for the boys, or in providing suitable School Buildings and Masters' Houses, together with a Chapel and Library and any other building that may be deemed necessary or expedient to be erected for the use of the school.

Fifthly, in providing for any Exhibitions which the Governing Body may think fit to maintain either at the school or at either of the Universities

of Oxford and Cambridge.

Sixthly, in providing Books, Instruments, and other things for the use of the school and for suitable Rewards and Prizes for the boys.

Seventhly, in providing and paying Rent and incidental charges for a suitable piece of land to be used as a play-ground for all the scholars in the school until a proper piece of land shall have been

purchased for that purpose.

Eighthly, in providing and keeping up a suitable Reserved Fund, to be applied from time to time as occasion may require to the enlargement and repair of the buildings of the school, and to any special expenses incurred in maintaining and managing the estates and property of the school.

Ninthly, in providing, if the Governing Body think fit, for a Superannuation Fund for Retired

Mästers.

The Governing Body may at the close of any financial year invest any residue of the income of the property of the school, and any income resulting from any such investment, in any of the securities that may from time to time be authorized by the Court of Chancery for the investment of cash under the control of that Court, and may apply any such investment and any income resulting therefrom, to the like purposes and in like manner as income of the property of the school.

Provided that until a suitable provision has been made both for a convenient site and for adequate buildings for the use of the school, it shall be competent to the Governing Body to suspend or vary at their discretion all payments authorized to be

made under the last five heads.

#### IX. COMMON SEAL.

1. The Governing Body shall from time to time make rules for the safe custody of the Common

2. The Common Seal shall not be affixed to any writing or document except by order of the Governing Body, and in the presence of at least two members of the Governing Body.

3. No document or writing shall be sealed with the Common Seal until a true certified copy of the same has been entered in a register to be kept for

that purpose.

#### X. Accounts and Minute Book.

1. The Governing Body shall cause full accounts to be kept, in such manner as they shall from time to time direct, of all receipts and expenditure for and on account of the school.

2. The Governing Body shall cause a sufficient abstract of accounts to be drawn up each year, such

abstract to include-

(1) A balance-sheet of all receipts and expendi-

ture for the year last past.

- (2) A statement of the property belonging to, or held in trust for, the school, and of all dealings therewith, or acquisitions thereto, during the year last past.
- 3. The abstract of accounts for each financial year shall be examined and, if found correct, passed by the Governing Body at the beginning of the next financial year; and every member of the Governing Body present at such meeting shall sign the said abstract of accounts, when passed, or make

a statement in writing at the foot of the same, giving his reasons for withholding his signature. A printed copy of such abstract of accounts, when passed, shall be forwarded to each member of the Governing Body.

4. The residuary receipts in every year shall be stated at the passing of the yearly accounts as unapplied surplus, and, save as to the income of the property of the school, any such surplus may be invested upon such securities as the Governing Body may from time to time determine.

5. A Minute Book and proper books of account shall be provided, and kept in some convenient and secure place of deposit appointed by the

Governing Body for that purpose.

6. Minutes of all proceedings of the Governing Body, and also the names of all the members present at each meeting, shall be entered in the Minute Book, and signed by the Chairman at the next meeting. In the same book there shall be recorded the entry into office of every new member of the Governing Body.

#### XI. Ecclesiastical Benefices.

The claim or right of preference of the several persons and classes of persons set forth in the 28th section of the Act of Parliament passed in the 38th year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter 68, to be presented or nominated to the Vicarage of Chirhury, and to the respective Curacies of St. Mary's, Clive and Astley shall henceforth be abolished; and it shall be competent to any person or persons who may be legally entitled to exercise the right of presenting or nominating to the said vicarage and curacies to present or nominate any Clerk in Holy Orders of the Church of England duly qualified to hold, possess, and enjoy any or either of the said benefices, freed and discharged from all preferential claims whatsoever.

#### XII. Repeal of Existing Statutes.

All Statutes, Rules, and Orders relating to Shrewsbury School by whatsoever authority enacted which were in force at the time of the passing of "The Public Schools Act, 1868," are hereby repealed, as to any matters provided for by these Statutes.

The Common Seal was hereunto affixed by the order of the Governing Body of Shrewsbury Free Grammar School this fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four.

water could be found.

Cape de Gata Rock (Escóllo,) was also examined, and found to lie S. 5° E. 6 ths of a mile from the lighthouse on Cape de Gata. This rock has 9 feet water on it, with 6½ and 7 fathoms between it and the shore (the nearest part of which is a short half mile distant), and 8 to 10 fathoms close to seaward.

From Cape de Gata Rock, Testa Tower is seen just open east of Cape de Gata Lighthouse bearing N. ½ W.; and Vela Blanca Tower over the white patch on the shore E. by N. ½ N.
