

middle of the last-named road to its junction at or near to the house called or known as Kurnella, with Queen's-road; and extending thence, north-eastward, for a distance of about a quarter of a mile, along the middle of the last-named road, to the centre of Queen's Bridge, which carries the same road over the stream called or known as the Bourne; and extending thence, south-eastward, for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the said stream, to the centre of Astney Bridge, which carries Cambridge-road over the same stream; and extending thence, south-westward, for a distance of three chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with Crescent-road; and extending thence, generally south-eastward, for a distance of twenty-chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road to its junction on the eastern side of the houses called or known as Branksome-chambers, with the Commercial-road; and extending thence, south-westward, for a distance of three chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with Victoria-road; and extending thence, for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts, first south-eastward, then southward, and then eastward, along the middle of the last-named road to its junction at or near to the house called or known as Ottershaw, with the footpath which leads past the western side of the last-named house, and past the eastern side of the house called or known as 'The Beacon,' into the occupation road leading from the last-named house into the Exeter-road; and extending thence, south-eastward, for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the said footpath, to its junction with the occupation road aforesaid, and continuing thence, still south-eastward, and in a direct line across the last-named road, and over the cliff, to the southern boundary of the said new parish of Saint Peter Bournemouth, upon the seashore as aforesaid."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the cure out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her

Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of certain benefices, that is to say, an exchange of the patronage of two benefices, namely, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Dewsbury, situate in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, and the benefice (being a rectory) of Middleham, situate in the said county of York, and in the said diocese of Ripon, for the patronage of two other benefices, namely, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Rampton, situate in the county of Nottingham, and in the diocese of Lincoln, and the benefice (being a rectory) of Waltham, situate in the county of Lincoln, and in the said diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of the said two benefices of Dewsbury and Middleham, and the churches thereof, respectively belongs to the Crown, and is exercised on behalf of your Majesty by the First Lord Commissioner of your Majesty's Treasury, for the time being, in virtue of his office.

"And whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of the said two benefices of Rampton and Waltham belongs to, and is exercised by, the Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon in right of his see.

"And whereas the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone, a member of the Commons House of Parliament, now the First Lord Commissioner of your Majesty's Treasury, acting as such Commissioner; and the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, acting as such bishop, have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said two benefices of Dewsbury and Middleham, and of the churches thereof respectively, and the patronage of the said two benefices of Rampton and Waltham, and of the churches thereof respectively, may be re-arranged by way of exchange in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said several benefices, and of the patronage thereof respectively, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that the circumstances and present values of the said benefices respectively, are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William Ewart Gladstone, acting as such First Lord Commissioner of your Majesty's Treasury as aforesaid, on behalf of your Majesty, and with the consent of the said Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, acting as such bishop (in testimony whereof to this scheme the said William Ewart Gladstone, and the said Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, have respectively affixed their hands and seals), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme,
