

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Middlesbrough, which is described in the schedule hereunder witten, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Peter, situate within the limits of such new parish as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Middlesbrough.'

"And with the like consent of the said William, Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Middlesbrough, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Middlesbrough, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York, wherein the present Incumbent of such new parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north-east by the county of Durham, or, in other words, by the River Tees; on the north-west by the parish or parochial chapelry of Middlesbrough, in the said county of York, and in the diocese of York aforesaid; on the west, partly by the said parish or parochial chapelry; and upon all other sides, that is to say, on the remaining part of the west, and on the south by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary, which divides the said parish or parochial chapelry of Middlesbrough from the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Middlesbrough aforesaid, at the point where the street or road called or known as Queen's-terrace, is joined by Bridge-street West and by Bridge-street East; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of the road which connects the said street or road, called or known as Queen's-terrace, with Albert-road, to the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Middlesbrough Dock Branch of the North Eastern Railway over the said connecting road; and extending thence, eastward, and in a direct line, along the middle of the said branch line of railway to a point on the western side of the Middlesbrough Dock, opposite to the middle of the western end of the lock which forms the eastern entrance to the said dock; and continuing thence, still eastward, and in a direct line, across

the same dock, and along the middle of the said lock, and along the middle of the canal or 'cutting,' which connects the said dock with the River Tees aforesaid, to the junction of the said canal or 'cutting,' with the said river; and continuing thence, still eastward, and in a direct line to the boundary in the middle of the said river Tees, which divides the said county of York from the county of Durham aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property in the parish of Easington, in the county of Durham, now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of an indenture, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, made or expressed to be made between Robert Pape, of Lichfield, in the county of Stafford, Collector of Inland Revenue, and Mary Ann Pape, his wife, of the one part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, the land and hereditaments described in the first part of the schedule hereunto annexed, became and are now vested in us.

"And whereas, under and by virtue of an indenture, bearing date the ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, made or expressed to be made between the Reverend Henry George Liddell, therein described as late of Easington aforesaid, but then of Charlton Kings, near Cheltenham, in the county of Gloucester, Clerk, and Charlotte, his wife, of the one part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments described in the second part of the said schedule hereunto annexed, became and are now vested in us.

"And whereas, under and by virtue of an indenture, bearing date the seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and made or expressed to be made between
