

of the said particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew, situate at Minley as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Minley.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Minley, being:

"All that portion of the particular district of Cove, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, which is bounded on the south-west by the consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Fleet, on the west by the parish of Elvetham, on the north by the parish or parochial chapelry of Yateley, on the north-east by the particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon all other sides, that is to say: on the south-east and on the south by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, from the particular district of Cove aforesaid, at the point where the road leading from Cove through Minley to Yateley is joined by a certain occupation road, numbered 359 upon the map of the ordnance survey of the said parish of Yateley, published in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, and upon the map hereunto annexed; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said occupation road to its south-western end; and continuing thence still generally south-westward to and along the fence which divides the closes numbered respectively 358, 346, and 345 upon the said maps, from the close numbered 361 upon the same maps, to the source of the stream or watercourse which flows past the northern side of Brooke House towards Elvetham; and extending thence westward for a distance of one mile and thirty-one and a half chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said stream (thereby passing along the northern side of Brooke House aforesaid) to the boundary at the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from Fleet to Elvetham over the same stream or watercourse, which boundary divides the said particular district of Cove from the consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Fleet, aforesaid.

"And also all that contiguous portion of the particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hawley, aforesaid, which is situate on the north-eastern side of the road leading from Cove through Minley to Yateley as aforesaid, opposite to the church of Saint Andrew, at Minley, and which said portion of such particular district is comprised within, and is co-extensive with, the limits of the several closes numbered respectively 66, 67, 272, 273, 271, and 295, upon the before-mentioned maps."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the

same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the nineteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the parish of Little Chester, in the county of Derby, and now vested in us.

"Whereas, under and by virtue of a certain indenture, bearing date the ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and made or expressed to be made between the the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Derby, of the first part, Henry Whitmore, Esquire, and Sir Graham Graham Montgomery, Baronet, two of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, of the second part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part, a certain piece or parcel of land, situate in the parish of Little Chester, in the county of Derby, particularly described in the first schedule annexed to the said indenture, and therein called the New Close, containing seven acres one rood and thirty-eight perches, became with its appurtenances and is now vested in us.

"And whereas the said land is not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but is now in our possession; but some portion thereof, on account of its character and situation, is unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas, with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said land, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time, and from time to time, think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly, that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such land, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments, in writing, duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any
