Felmouth Mar. 1.

Efterday came in here a Dutch Merchant fhip from St. Maloes, laden with Fifth, in her way the was met by an Oftend Privateer, who took from her leveral Goods to a confiderable value.

Weymouth, Mar. 4. The fecond inftant arrived here the John of this place from *Croifick*, informing us that upon their departure thence, they were buily imprefing feamen for the fervice of their Fleer, which in end to be early out at Ses. They are on thefe as well as other coalls of *France* much prejudiced by the multinude of Privateers, who by their conflant cruifing before the Ports, exceedingly obfruct and ruine their Trade.

Here is now put into this Port, a Durch fhip from Zealand laden with Oyls and bound for Morlaix, the Mafter of h r fent fick to the finoar.

Two French Bankers yeverday riding in this Road, upon the appearance of a Bilcay man of wat of 10 Guns and 50% men, were forced for their fecurity to haften into this Port.

Genona, Feb. 21. Several of the Dutch Convoy lately atrived at *t* egorn, may be in little time expected here, having aboard them a very confiderable fum of moneys for this place. A Februa arriving from Legorn informs us, that in the Gulf of Lyons, the Iaid Convoy was met by fix French Men of War, who piffed by them without any di-Purbance, onely enquiring if any Genoue e flips we eamongft them, which its feared they intend to fearch, if they meter with them

The last week arrived here the Abbot le Tellier, conducted hither by a Gally sent by this Republick to attend him at Legorn: the 15th instant he departed hence by the way of Jurin with a Guard of H rse, sent by the Governour of Pignerolle for his Convoy.

The Pope being fully intent upon the defence of *Candia*, has lately fent hither, to defire that fome Gallies might be fitted up to joyn with a Squadron of his intended for that Service; but the Republick is not as yet come to a Refolution in this point, it being thought necellary to keep a more than shal Guard upon the Coalts for fecurity of our Trade a gainft the Corfairs of Barbary, who have 18 flout flips eruising about thole Seas, and intend (predily to fend out 10 others of confiderable force, befides Gallies and Brigantines.

From Turin we are advertifed that the Duke of Savoy has ordered a Lift to be taken of all fuch inhabitants of the Citics and Villages in Piedmont, who are able to bear Armes, commanding them to be in readiness to chey fuch Orders as shall be fent to them. He is lately returned from visiting his most confiderable Towns and Forts, and has left in Verceil a Garrison of 2500 flout Men and 400 Pioneers; and ordered proportionable quantities of Ammunition to be fent into all Places & for their Necessia Y Supply.

Hambourgh, March 2. The young Prince of Tuscany is now giving a Visit to General Wrangle at Staadt, and is in few dayes expered there, where the Magistrates intended to have received him publickly with extraordinary Honour and Ceremony; but have changed their Resolution at the Defire of the Prince; he intending to visit this place as he has. done Bremen and other 1 owns, incognito. Queen Chri fina 'tis faid, coutinues her resolution of going to Rome this Spring.

From Philipsbourgs we are rold, that the French have made a Bridge over the Rhine, which does not a little aliarm the adjacent Countreys: From Vienna we are informed, that the 23th paft, in the Morning, there happened a Fire in the Emperours New Palace, which continued for 13 hours with much violence, burning down all the Empress and the two Imperial Princefles Lodgings to the ground, with the greatest part of the Furniture and Goods, the Empress with some difficulty faving her felf: fince which accident the Emperour is removed to Ebersdorp, and the Emp es, with the two Princeffes to Favoritz.

There is now negotiating a Treaty of Marriage between the Eldeft Son of the Great Duke of Moscowy, and the Eldeft Daughter of the Duke of Curland; and the Count de Venhoft employed by his Highness the Elector of Brandenbourgh, to treat on the beha f of the said Princels.

From Warfaw they tell u, that the difmiffion of the French Ambaffador is not yet refolved, and that 'is much doubted leaft the Dier may break up without that happy iffue which was expected ; they inform us, that an Army of a sooo Mufcovites were marched into Ukrania, to reduce the Tartars and different confacts to obedience: that the Turks fome while fince made an Incurfion into that Country, but were defeated by the Coffacks, and all the Cattle and Plunder which they had taken, happily redeemed.

From Hungary they write, that the Turks have flighted the Fort de Ghefes, and that a Body of 13000 Tartars are got together at Debres, and 'tis feared may give fome diflurbance to that Countrey by their Incurtions: that the Bifla of Offen continues his feverity against the Chrissians which dwell under his power, and that neer fifteen hundred Turks i are been lately feen t gether about Newhaufell, but for what Employment defigned was not known.

Amfterdam, March 8. A Vefiel late'y come in, informs us, that the Corfaires of Algier have t ken the Elizabeth hither bound from Lisbon, and a Portuguez Caravell, with above forty men aboard he.

The East-In lia Company are advised by Letters arriving by the way of Smirna, that the Perfon deputed from Batavia into Persia, to mana'e their Affairs relating to Trade, is dead, but as yet no other fent to succeed him in that Employment: and that the Great Mogul had declared War a+ gains the Sophy of Persia, for which great preparations were making on each fide.

They likewife advife us that the Portuguele about Goa, were drawing up all the Forces they were able to make 3 with an intention to attempt upon Conchin or Conanor; but that thole places were fo well fortified, and the Garrifons in Arong, that it was not believed they would be able to effect what they had defigned 3 and that the Trade of thole Countries was of late much interrupted by the War, which fill continues in Baffard.

The fifth inftant went out from the Texel a confiderable Fleet of Merchant Ships, fome intended for Bilboa, under the Convoy of Captain Breeder Van Edam ; fomo for Fra-ce, under the Protection of Captain Peter Van Middelant; and others for England, under Captain Kuylemburgh ; but by contrary winds, the greatest part of them were the next day forced back again.

Hague Mar. 9. Here has been lately brought in to the States Genera's a project for the forming of a flying Army, confifting of 25 Ragiments, each of them of eight Companies, but nothing yet refolved. 'Tis also faid that Orders will be speed y given out for the flrong fortifying of Wefel, Maesiricht, Hassels, steenwick Ersuart, Gro Land fome other Towns; and that three Regiments of Fort, and one of Horie, that be fuddenly tent to Matifrichs for the fecurity of that place, and the Country adjoyning. They have already refolved upon the fortification of Nacrden, where many hands will speedily be set to work.

Don Juan being in little tim: exp fted in the Spanish Neatherlands, has sent his Letter di ected to the States of these Provinces as follows :

Right Reverend Fathers in God, Right Dear and Wellbeloved Lords and Gentlemen, 60.

) Eing ready (as indeed I am) by Order from the Queen my Mistris, to set forwards for Flaunders, with all the Succors of Men and Moneys as we have been able to raife here , I thought fit to give your Lordships no-"tice thereof, being highly fenfible of the good inclination y'n bave alwayes shown for the Service of the King my Mafter, especially lince this late surprising and unjust in-vation of France; assuring you that these Motives, together with the Gare and full Refolution of His Majefly, to use all means possible for the Defence and Reflauration of the State, have induced me heartily to accept of this occafion of demonstrating my Affection to you, with the hagard of my Blood and Life ; which I should think very well employed in fo just a Caufe : being also well assured of your Zeal to fee nd my Care, and the Love you bear to your Countrey, now threatned with intollerable Oppression : and fince the leafon is already far advanced, it will be needful to use the greater circ in our preparation for the next Campagne, for the Escablisbing our Army, and putting our Romans jato a Posture of Defence, which cannot be done withous a fafficient Stock of Moneys, and Regruiz of Men, Actillery, and Ammunition. 'anil a timely I doubt 1 not of your realiness to raise for confiderabie a fumme (with what I shall take case to fend) that the Mar-quifs de Castel Rodrigo may, during my absence, make convenient provision, and put things into a good posture, which I cannot doubt of upon the knowledge I have of his great yeal and diligence to the end, that by the bleffing of God, upon my arrival with the fuccors Isha l bring, an happy end may be put to that Great work. I shall only add, that befides your zeal for the publick good I Shall much rely upon your gool inclinations in taking care of my particular Concernments, for which I shall own my felf to be much obliged to you, befeeching God to take you into his Divine protection. Paris, March 10. Here is lately arrived from Lisbon the Sieur de Chierry , Camp-Master to our Forces employ'd in the King of Portugal's Service, affuring us that the Peace to long treated on between Spain and that Kingdom, was fully concluded the 10th of the laft Moneth, figned the 11th, and published the 12th, to the general fatisfaction of that people .: The News whereof has altered His Majeflies Resolution of employing the Duke of Orleans in the Command of the Forces deligned for Catalonis; the Count de Schombergh being now defigned for that Service : on whom His Majefty intends to confer the honour of creating him Marefhall of France. A Mellenger has been alfo dispatched with all possible speed, to ove take the Sieur de Verjus, before his Imbarcation for Portugal, for the alteration of the Orders given him before the arrival of this News. Several thips are also commanded to fet fail for Lisbon, to bring over those French Forces which were employed in the War with Spain.

The Marquils de Crequy is newly atrived at the Courr.

On Wedne day about Noon, Strived here a Courrier Extraordinary from Bruffells, Sent from the Marquifs de Caslel. Rodrigo, to the Here Van Beuninghen, Ambaffadour from the Stater Generall of the Rhited Provinces, bringing with him the laid Marquifs's Content and Agreement, on the behalt of Spain, to the Athernative, as formerly projet acd by His Majefty.

*Tis confidently faid, that His Majefty is refolved (in cale the Tr, sty fhall not have that Effect which is defired y so march this Spring involte Nearberlands with three Armiles, the first commanded by His Majefty, and under Hims by the Marefhall de Turenne; the fecond by Monfieur the Duke of Orleans, and under him, by the Marefhall du Pleffis Praflin; and the third by Monfieur the Prince of Condes to be employed about Luxenbourgh: to which Armies His Majefty has been pleafed to nominate these Lieutenant Generals: First, In His own Five, viz, the Dukes de Requelaure, and de Resannes, and the Sieurs de Bellefonds, de Duras, and de Pradell. In that of the Duke of Orleans, two, viz the Marquifles de Crequy and d' Humieres; andas many in that of the Prince of Conde, viz the Duke of Luxembourgh and the Sieur Fauce Is, which last is to be tent for lome from Cata'onia; and the Sieur de Paffage to commond in his pace till the attival of the Cours de Schomberg.

His Majefty is now telolved to raile 8000 men in the New Conquered County of Burgundy, to which he is the rather encouraged by the happy allcovery of 25000 Pillels infone of the Towres of Dole, formerly laid up by the States of that County, and intended to have been employed for their defence; but now defigned for these Levies, in which His Majefty intends to beftow Commands upon several Gentlemen of the Country.

On the 22th of this Moneth is to be folomnized the Baptifme of the Dauphin with extraordinary Ceremony; where, Ca dinal Antonio is to affift as Chief Almoner, and Cardin nal de Vendofme as Legate à Latere from the Pope, the Ceremony to be performed in the Court of the Caftle at St. Germaines, which is to be covered for that purpole; in the mean time fome difficulties are to be determined for Pace between fereral of the Princes and Princefiles, who are to affift there.

T's e next Week His Majefly is expected here with all his Houshold and Guards; where a solemn Day of Thankfgiving is to be observed for his late happy success in Franche Conte, for which Te Deum is to be solemnly sung in the Church de Nostre Dame.

We are with much confidence informed that the Court of Spain has ordered the return of 1200 thouland Crowns to Antworpfor the railing of Forces and payment of their Army, and that Don Juan with a Body of 6000 Spaniards taken outof the Army employed agoinft Porsugat, is luddenly to pass into Flandors, the reft of the Army being to be lene into Catalonia; but that none of the Moneys returned, are to be disposed of till his arrival.

From Franche Comte wo are informed that the Sieur de Maupeau is with a party of about 1500 men gone to beliege the 1 ort St. Laurence de la Rocke near Biaterans; the Governour thereof having refaled to accept of such terms as were offered him.

Portsmouth, Mar. 5. Sir Thomas Allen wich the ships under his Command lie still at spitthead, expecting a fair wind. The Revenge is this day to go out to him.
