THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Galveston, transmitting a copy of the following Proclamation

made by the Governor of Texas, declaring quarantine for the Coast of that State:—

PROCLAMATION

by the Governor of the State of Texas.

To all to whom these presents shall come.

I, Richard Coke, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in me by a Law of the Legislature of the State of Texas, approved June 10th, 1870, entitled "An Act authorizing quarantine on the coast of Texas, and elsewhere within the State," do hereby declare quarantine on the coast of Texas, and direct the authorities of every corporate town on the coast to carry out the provisions of the said Act.

Quarantine to extend to all vessels sailing from or touching at any seaport, or coast south of north latitude 25 degrees, to wit:

The western coast of Africa, the West India Islands, the eastern coast of South America, of Central America, and of Mexico, and from Key West, Florida.

It is further directed, that the Health Officers at the respective ports, shall as soon as they are reliably informed of the existence of infectious or contagious diseases at any other port, city, town, or village, not herein specially included within this State, or out of it, declare vessels arriving from such places subject to quarantine, and to all regulations established for the enforcement of same.

This quarantine to commence on the first day of June, and continue until the first day of November next, unless sooner suspended.

Vessels sailing from, or touching at any port, or any coast above-mentioned, and entering any port on the coast of Texas, during the continuance of quarantine of such port, if free from disease, may be disinfected and relieved from detention or detained for a term that will make twenty days, from her departure, from the above-named infected ports or districts, at the discretion of the Health Officer. Vessels upon which contagious or infectious diseases appear, shall be detained for twenty-five days after all disease has disappeared from such vessel or vessels, and then allowed to pass.

Health Officers are directed also to provide and enforce such regulations as will prevent all communication with vessels in quarantine.

These officers will also provide for the thorough disinfection of all vessels on which there has been any contagious or infectious disease before they

are allowed to leave quarantine, all expenses necessary to such disinfection to be paid by the vessel.

Quarantine stations for enforcement of this proclamation are hereby established at Sabine Pass, Galveston Pass, Pass Cavallo, Aransas Pass, and Brazos Santiago.

The quarantine station shall be established by the proper Health Officers at each of these passes, as near the outer bar as possible, looking to safety of vessels lying at anchor, and convenience in boarding same.

The Health Officer of Brazos Santiago shall also supervise vessels entering at the mouth of the Rio Grande.

The Health Officer to be appointed by the corporate authorities of Galveston, is charged with the enforcement of this proclamation at Galveston Pass; the one to be appointed at Indianola, for Pass Cavallo; the one to be appointed, at Brazos Santiago and the mouth of the Rio Grande; Dr. James Saunders at Sabine Pass; and the one to be appointed at Corpus Christi for Aransas Pass.

The county authorities on the Rio Grande are authorized and directed, until this quarantine is suspended, to establish such regulations as will prevent the importation of disease into this State by land.

The authorities of all seaport towns are referred to the Acts of the Legislature, approved June 10th, 1870, August 13th, 1870, and May 4th, 1874, for such other information as they may require for their guidance.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State to be affixed, at the city of Austin, this 25th day of May, 1874, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the ninety-eighth, and Texas the thirty-ninth.

(No. 70.)—MEDITERRANEAN—ADRIATIC SEA.
Alteration in Lights marking the Breakwater at Fiume.

THE Austrian Government has given notice, that from the 1st June, 1874, the following alteration would be made in the lights marking the breakwater at Fiume :—

A red and white striped beacon buoy with mast, on which will be exhibited two red lights vertically placed, respectively 20 feet and 15 feet above the sea, would be moored at a distance of 440 yards

from the end of the breakwater, to mark the extension of the works. These lights should be seen from a distance of 2 miles.

On the exhibition of the above red lights, the light on the head of the breakwater would be discontinued.

CAUTION.—Vessels should not attempt to pass between the floating beacon lights and the end of the breakwater.

Bank in Aguada Roads.

THE French Government has given notice of the existence of a shoal mud-bank in Aguada Roads.

The bank was examined by the boats of the frigate *La Clorinde*, and found to be composed of mud about 3 cables in extent, with from 12 to 24 feet over it at low water springs. From the shoalest part,—

Aguada Point Lighthouse bears N.E. by N., northerly, $1\frac{4}{10}$ miles.

The Monastery E.S.E. $1\frac{7}{10}$ miles.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation $0^{\circ} 45'$ Easterly in 1874.]
