THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Lisbon, enclosing copy of a Royal Decree making certain alterations and amendments in the quarantine system at ports in the Portuguese Dominions. A translation of the Decree is appended.

From the Official Journal "Diario do Governo" of June 15th, 1874.

LAW.

Don Lewis, by the Grace of God, King of Portugal and of the Algarves, &c.

We make known to all our subjects, that the General Cortes have decreed, and that we sanction, the following Law:—

ART. 1. At the Health Station at Belem there shall be three Chief Health Officers (Guardas-móres), of whom one is to be the chief officer of the station, with the respective salaries of mil

reis 1,000 for the Chief of the Station, and of 800 mil reis for each of the other two.

ART. 2. Another Scrivener and Interpreter is to be appointed to the Health Station at Belem, with a salary of mil reis 500. The same amount of salary shall be given to each of the other Scriveners and Interpreters belonging to the List of Employés of that station.

ART. 3. The post of Inspector of the Lisbon Lazaretto is re-established, with a salary of mil reis 1,000.

ART. 4. The Medical Officer of the Lisbon Lazaretto shall receive a salary of mil reis 1,000; and it shall be his duty, in addition to those imposed upon him by the regulations, to afford medical assistance gratuitously to any sick persons in quarantine, and to the lazaretto officials, at which place he will permanently reside.

ART. 5. The number of Health Guards for service at the Health Station at Belem and in the Lisbon Lazaretto is increased to 24—8 of the 1st Class, and 16 of the 2nd Class, at the same rate of wages paid to the Custom-house Guards of the corresponding classes.

SEC. These Guards shall be distributed between the station and the lazaretto by the Government, according to the exigencies of the public service.

ART. 6: The schedules of fees annexed to this Law, and which form an integral part thereof, are to be substituted for those annexed to the Law of 28th of December, 1870, which are accordingly altered.

SEC. Passengers of the 3rd Class coming from the Brazils, with passages paid by the Portuguese Charitable Institutions in that Empire, shall be exempt from the payment of the tax referred to in those schedules.

ART. 7. The Government is hereby authorized to establish and impose in the Maritime Health Regulations which it may decree pecuniary fines up to the sum of mil reis 300, on account of the non-presentation of, or irregularity in, the bills of health of any ships bound to and entering any Portuguese ports; and the imposition and recovery of these fines may be carried out according to the mode of procedure adopted for the imposition and recovery of the fines which are laid down in the fiscal regulations.

ART. 8. The salary of the Chief Health Officer of the Port of Funchal is raised to 800 mil reis

that of the Chief Health Officer of the Port of St. Ubes to 500 mil reis, and that of the Chief Health Officer of the Port of Horta to 600 mil reis.

ART. 9. All legislation to the contrary is hereby revoked.

We commend, &c.

The Ministers and Secretaries of State for the Home and Finance Departments shall cause the same to be printed, published, and circulated.

All merchandize undergoing quarantine in lighters, or in any other boats for unloading cargo, shall pay one-fourth of the dues mentioned in this schedule.

Children of less than seven years of age shall pay no dues. No tax shall also be paid for animals.

In addition to the dues above-mentioned all passengers, and the owners and consignees of merchandize, shall pay to the Company of Custom-house Porters the wages mentioned in the respective schedules for the landing and shipment of luggage and merchandize.

Children up to the age of seven years shall pay nothing.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Alexandria, reporting that in consequence of the famine existing in India, and the danger resulting to public health, the Egyptian authorities have since the 19th ultimo, subjected all vessels arriving at Suez from India, and not provided with a proper bill of health to three days' quarantine of observation without disembarkation or disinfection. It is stated that arrangements have been made with the postal administration in order to prevent any delay of the mails which would be prejudicial to commerce.

Seaton and Beer Railway Company.

Certificate of the Board of Trade for Authorizing the Company to make and maintain a Road Bridge over the River Axe, and to raise Additional Capital.

WHEREAS, by "The Seaton and Beer Railway Act, 1863," the Seaton and Beer Railway Company were incorporated with a capital of 36,000*l.* in shares, and power to borrow 12,000*l.*, and were authorized to make and maintain a railway (some time since constructed and opened for traffic), and also a road bridge over the River Axe with approaches, commencing in the parish of Seaton, otherwise Seaton-with-Beer, and terminating in the parish of Axmouth, both in the county of Devon, and to take at the toll gates and bars upon, across, or on the sides of the said bridge and approaches, tolls not exceeding those specified in that Act (being the same as are specified in the Schedule to this Certificate):

And whereas, by "The Seaton and Beer Railway (Additional Capital) Certificate, 1866," the Company were authorized to raise 12,000*l.* more by the creation of additional shares or stock (which they did by the creation of stock bearing a preferential dividend at the rate of 5 per centum per annum), and 4,000*l.* more by borrowing on mortgage:

And whereas no steps have been taken towards the construction of the said road bridge, and the time by that Act (section 46) limited for the completion thereof has expired, and the Company have raised and expended all the money which they were by that Act, and the before-recited Certificate authorized to raise by shares, stock, or loan:

And whereas the Seaton and Beer Railway Company have contracted for the purchase of the lands required for the said bridge and approaches, and also (at the instance of the owner of those lands) for the purchase of the ferry tolls over the Axe, at or near the proposed site of the said bridge, and have complied with the requirements of "The Railways Construction Facilities Act, 1864," "The Railways (Powers and Construction) Acts, 1864, Amendment Act, 1870," and "The Railway Companies Powers Act, 1864.":

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade do, by this their Certificate, in pursuance of the said Acts, and by virtue of the powers thereby in them vested, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, certify as follows:

1. The Seaton and Beer Railway Company (hereinafter called "the Company") are hereby authorized to make and maintain, in the line and situation and according to the levels shown on the plan and sections deposited with reference to this Certificate, the bridge and approaches authorized by this Certificate.

2. The bridge and approaches authorized by this Certificate are—

A road bridge over the River Axe, with approaches commencing in the parish of Seaton, otherwise Seaton-with-Beer, in the county of Devon, and terminating in the parish of Axmouth, in the same county.

Regulating Dimensions, &c., of Bridge over Axe.

3. The bridge across the River Axe shall be constructed of such dimensions, with a span or spans, with such headway and waterway, and according to such plans, as may have been previously approved of by the Board of Trade; such approval to be signified in writing, under the hand of a secretary or assistant-secretary of the Board.

Provision for Requiring Lights to be Exhibited during and after Construction of Works according to directions of Board of Trade.

4. During the construction of the bridge across the River Axe and works connected therewith, the Company shall exhibit every night from sunset to sunrise a light or lights, to be kept burning by and at the expense of the Company for the guidance of vessels; and after the completion of the bridge the Company shall exhibit upon the bridge every night from sunset to sunrise a light or lights, to be kept burning by and at the expense of the Company for the guidance of vessels, which lights shall be from time to time altered by the Company in such manner, and be of such description, and be so used and placed, as the Board of Trade by writing, under the hand of a secretary or assistant-secretary of the Board, directs or approves; and, in case the Company shall neglect to exhibit and keep any such light burning as aforesaid, they shall, for every such neglect, be liable to a penalty not exceeding 10*l.*

Provision for requiring deposit of Working Drawings and approval of Board of Trade.

5. Before commencing the bridge across the River Axe or the works connected therewith, the Company shall deposit at the office of the Board of Trade plans, sections, and working drawings of the said bridge and works for the approval of the Board of Trade (such approval to be signified in writing under the hand of a Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board); and such bridge and works shall be constructed only in accordance with such approval; and after the construction of such bridge and works the Company shall not at any time alter or extend the same without first obtaining the like approval; and if the Company acts in any respect contrary to the provisions of the present section in relation to any work, the Board of Trade may abate and remove the same, or any part thereof, and restore the site thereof to its former condition at the expense of the Company, and the amount of such expense shall be a debt due from the Company to the Crown, and be recoverable accordingly with costs, or may be recovered with costs as a penalty is or may be recoverable from the Company.

Provision for Local Survey of Works by Board of Trade when requisite.

6. If at any time it is deemed expedient by the Board of Trade to order a local survey and examination of any works of the Company in, over, or affecting any tidal or navigable water or river, or of the intended site thereof the Company shall defray the costs of every such local survey and examination, and the amount thereof shall be a debt due from the Company to the Crown, and be recoverable accordingly with costs, or may be recovered with costs as a penalty is, or may be recoverable from the Company.

Provision for abatement by Board of Trade of Work abandoned or delayed.

7. If any work to be constructed by the Company, in, under, over, through, or across any tidal or navigable water or river, or if any portion of any work which affects or may affect any such water or river, or access thereto, shall be abandoned or suffered to fall into disuse or decay, the Board of Trade may abate and remove the same or any part thereof, and restore the site thereof to its former condition at the expense of the Company; and the amount of such expense shall be a debt due from the Company to the Crown, and be recoverable accordingly with costs, or may be recovered with costs as a penalty is or may be recoverable from the Company.

Company may erect Toll-gates on Bridge.

8. The Company may erect and maintain in, upon, or across the bridge over the River Axe, and the approaches thereto hereby authorized to be constructed, or on the sides thereof, any toll-gates or bars, and may from time to time remove the same, or any of them, and erect other toll-gates or bars in lieu thereof.

Certificate of completion of Bridge.

9. For the purposes of this Certificate, a certificate under the hand of the Chairman of Quarter Sessions for the county of Devon shall be conclusive evidence that the said bridge and approaches are completed and fit for the passage of traffic; and such Chairman shall sign such certificate on satisfactory proof being adduced to him of such completion and fitness.

Power to take Tolls on Bridge.

10. Upon completion of the said bridge and approaches, and at all times thereafter, the Company may demand and take at the several and respective toll-gates and bars which shall by virtue of this certificate be upon, across, or on the sides of the said bridge and approaches, such tolls as the Company shall from time to time direct, not exceeding the sums specified in the schedule to this certificate, and with and subject to the provisions and regulations contained in that schedule.

Extending provisions of general Turnpike Acts to Bridge.

11. The said tolls shall be subject to all such and the same exemptions as the tolls taken on any turnpike road in England are or from time to time may be by virtue of the Public General Acts relating to turnpike roads in England for the time being in force, and all the clauses and provisions of those Acts relating respectively to tolls and exemptions from tolls, to the letting of tolls, to the ascertaining and recovery of tolls, to the settlement of disputes, to the evasion of tolls, to the prevention and punishment of offenders, to the protection, government, and punishment of collectors, and other officers and servants, to the ascertaining, recovery, and application of penalties, and all other the clauses and provisions of those Acts so far as the same can be made applicable, and in all particulars not in this Certificate otherwise provided for, shall extend and apply to the said bridge and approaches, to the said tolls, to the Company and their lessees, and their respective collectors and servants as fully and effectually as if the said bridge and approaches were a turnpike road in England; and for the purposes of those clauses and provisions the Company shall be deemed to be the trustees or commissioners of the said bridge and approaches, and the secretary of the Company shall be deemed to be the clerk to the trustees or commissioners.

Bridge made a separate Undertaking.

12. The undertaking by this Certificate authorized, and the lands and property from time to time vested in the Company for the purposes of the same, are hereby constituted a separate undertaking of the Company, distinct and apart from all other their undertaking, railway, lands, and works, and shall be called "The Axmouth Bridge Undertaking."

Management thereof.

13. Provided always that the Directors of the Company shall have the management and superintendence of the affairs of the Axminster Bridge Undertaking, and they and any Committees appointed by them for the purposes of that undertaking, shall have and may exercise all such and the same powers with respect thereto as they have, or might have or exercise, with respect to any other undertaking of the Company.

Power to raise additional Capital.

14. The Company are hereby authorized to raise for the purposes of their Axmouth Bridge Undertaking under this Certificate in addition to the capital already authorized to be raised by them, any further sums not exceeding in the whole three thousand pounds by the issue of new shares or new stock, either ordinary or preference, or partly ordinary and partly preference, at the option of the Company, and to be called Axmouth Bridge shares or stock.

Privileges, &c., of the Holders of New Capital.

15. Save as herein or by or under the authority of the Acts incorporated herewith otherwise provided, the holders of shares or stock in the additional capital hereby authorized to be raised, shall be entitled to the like rights and privileges and be subject to the like liabilities as the holders of shares or stock in the existing ordinary capital of the Company.

Separate Accounts.

16. The Company shall keep separate accounts of all receipts, credits, payments, and liabilities from, for, or on account of the Axmouth Bridge Undertaking.

Divisible Profits defined.

17. The balance of those receipts (excluding money called or paid up on Axmouth Bridge shares or stock, and money borrowed on mortgage of the Axmouth Bridge Undertaking), after deducting for expenses of working and management such a proportion (not exceeding the rate of fifty per centum per annum) of such receipts (excluding money so called or paid up and borrowed) as shall be determined by any meeting of the Company, and also after deducting all rates, rents, and taxes payable on or in respect of the Axmouth Bridge Undertaking, and also after deducting all interest on money borrowed under this Certificate, shall be the divisible profits of the Axmouth Bridge Undertaking.

Application of those Profits.

18. The divisible profits from time to time of the Axmouth Bridge Undertaking shall be applied wholly in payment of interest or dividend on the Axmouth Bridge shares or any stock substituted for the same (in this Certificate called "Axmouth Bridge Stock") and the Axmouth Bridge shares and Axmouth Bridge stock shall not take or be entitled to interest or dividend out of any other profits, nor shall the holders of any Axmouth Bridge shares or Axmouth Bridge stock be entitled in respect thereof to vote or interfere at any meeting of the Company on any question or proceeding

not directly affecting the Axmouth Bridge Undertaking.

Power to borrow.

19. The Company may raise, by borrowing on mortgage, for the purposes of their undertaking, under this Certificate, any sums in addition to the money they are already authorized to borrow, not exceeding in the whole the sum of one thousand pounds.

Rights of Mortgagees.

20. The mortgages from time to time granted by the Company under this Certificate shall only comprise and affect, and the mortgages and bonds granted or to be granted by the Company under the recited Act, or the "Seaton and Beer Railway (Additional Capital) Certificate, 1866," shall not comprise or affect, the Axmouth Bridge Undertaking, and the revenue of the Company arising under this Certificate.

Arrears may be enforced by appointment of a Receiver.

21. The mortgagees under this Certificate may enforce the payment of the arrears of principal and interest due on any such mortgages by the appointment of a receiver; and in order to authorize the appointment of a receiver, in the event of the principal moneys due on such mortgages not being duly paid, the amount owing to the mortgagees by whom the application for such receiver shall be made shall be not less than one hundred pounds.

Power to issue Debenture Stock.

22. In respect of any part of the money by this Certificate authorized to be raised by mortgage, the Company may create and issue debenture stock, but that stock shall be a charge only upon the Axmouth Bridge Undertaking.

Short Title.

23. This Certificate may be cited as "The Seaton and Beer Railway (Axmouth Bridge) Certificate, 1874."

SCHEDULE.

For every horse or other beast drawing any omnibus, coach, stage coach, van, caravan, sociable, berlin, landau, chariot, vis-à-vis, barouche, phaeton, chaise-marin, calash, curriole, chair, gig, whiskey, hearse, litter, chaise, or other such like carriage, carrying passengers or goods for hire, any sum not exceeding ninepence; and if not carrying passengers or goods for hire, any sum not exceeding sixpence.

For every horse or other beast drawing any waggon, wain, cart, or other such like vehicle, any sum not exceeding sixpence.

For every horse or mule (not drawing), laden or unladen, any sum not exceeding twopence.

For every ass, laden or unladen (not drawing), any sum not exceeding one penny.

For every drove of oxen or neat cattle, any sum not exceeding tenpence per score, and so in proportion for any greater or less number.

For every drove of calves, swine, sheep, or lambs, any sum not exceeding fivepence per score, and so in proportion for any greater or less number.

For every locomotive, and for every waggon, wain, cart, or carriage, drawn or propelled by any locomotive, any tolls not exceeding the tolls limited by "The Locomotive Act, 1861."

For every foot-passenger or person on foot (except the person or persons, not exceeding two in number, actually driving and accompanying any carriage, waggon, wain, cart, or other vehicle liable to toll), any sum not exceeding one penny.

And for every person who shall ride in or upon any waggon or wain, or any cart or other such like vehicle (not being a cart or carriage usually employed for the conveyance of passengers for hire), or who shall ride upon any horse or beast drawing any such waggon, wain, cart, or other such like vehicle, any sum not exceeding one penny.

PROVISIONS AND REGULATIONS.

The said tolls shall be taken before any horse, mule, beast, or other cattle, or carriage liable to toll shall be permitted to pass through any toll-gate or bar which shall be by virtue of this Certificate upon or across the said bridge or approaches, or on the sides thereof.

If and whenever there shall be a fraction of a halfpenny in the amount of the tolls authorized to be taken at such toll-gates and bars as aforesaid a halfpenny may be taken instead of such fraction.

The Company may from time to time lessen and reduce or advance and raise all or any of the said tolls, but so that the same shall not in any case exceed the rates by this Certificate granted.

No more than one full toll shall be taken for passing and re-passing once only on the same day (to be computed from twelve of the clock at night to twelve of the clock in the next succeeding night) with the same horses, beasts, cattle, or other animal or thing liable to the tolls through all the toll-gates or bars to be erected on the said bridge and approaches, except as hereinafter otherwise provided.

The tolls shall be paid for all horses or cattle drawing any postchaise, hackney coach, fi. y, jaunting car, or other carriage travelling for hire as often as any new hiring shall take place, and for all horses or cattle drawing any omnibus, caravan, stage-coach, stage-wagon, or other stage carriage or cart, as often as they shall pass over the said bridge or approaches, in the same manner as if no previous payment of toll in respect of such horses, animal, or cattle had been made for the same day.
