THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Note addressed by the Turkish Minister for Foreign Affairs to Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople, announcing the adoption, in the Ottoman Empire, of the following Passport Regulations:—

All travellers, without distinction of nationality, and whatever may be the locality whence they come, will be immediately required, on arriving by sea or rail at any point of the Empire, to deliver their passports or permits to the captain of the ship or to the agents of the railway. The captain, as soon as he has obtained pratique will hand these passports to the Officer of Health who will have them registered at the proper office. The same course will be pursued by the railway employes. Foreigners who wish to travel in the interior should obtain *teskérés* from the Passport Office; they must in any case register at the same office the residence-permits (*permis de séjour*) with which they are furnished each year by their respective consulates.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn this fifteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, before the Queen's Remembrancer, at Goldsmith's Hall, in the city of London, have made the Assays and Trials of Her Majesty's Gold and Silver Coins in the Pyx of the Mint, and which, according to accounts produced by the officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Mint from the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins, both of gold and silver, in each packet produced to us, corresponded with the number which the officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took a coin or coins from each of such packets of Gold coins, making altogether seven sovereigns or twenty shilling pieces, and eleven half-sovereigns or ten shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, so as to ascertain whether they were within the remedy prescribed in the First Schedule of the Coinage Act, 1870. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule of the said Act was minus twenty-seven thousandths of an ounce (or .027) on the whole of such coins, and that, therefore, they were within the prescribed remedy as to weight. We then melted the said Gold coins so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the Standard Gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was minus four ten-thousandths (or .0004), and, therefore, that the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to

fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue three sovereigns and two half-sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respectively:—the first 123.204 grains, the second 123.274 grains, and the third 123.174 grains; and that such half-sovereigns weighed respectively:—the first 61.707 grains, and the second 61.707 grains. We then assayed the said three sovereigns and two half-sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be 916.2, 916.7, and 916.6, respectively, and the millesimal fineness of such half-sovereigns to be 916.3 and 916.3, respectively. We also took a coin from each of such packets of Silver coins, making altogether ten half-crowns, thirty-four florins, twenty-seven shillings, twenty-one sixpences, and of Maundy monies, one fourpence and twenty threepences, and weighed each of the said Silver coins separately, so as to ascertain whether they were within the remedy of the said First Schedule of the said Coinage Act, 1870. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule of the said Act was minus eight-thousandths of an ounce (or .008) on the whole of such coins, and that, therefore, they were within the prescribed remedy as to weight. We then melted the said Silver coins, so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the Standard Silver Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act, was plus two ten-thousandths (or .0002), and therefore, that the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Silver coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue two half-crowns, two florins, one shilling, and one sixpence, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such half-crowns weighed, respectively, 218.361 and 218.331 grains, and that such florins weighed, respectively, 174.245 and 174.895 grains, and that such shilling weighed 87.362 grains, and that such sixpence weighed 43.696 grains. We then assayed the said two half-crowns, the said two florins, the said one shilling, and the said one sixpence separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such half-crowns to be 925.2 and 925.0, respectively, of such florins to be 924.2 and 926.6, respectively, of such shilling to be 925.7, and of such sixpence to be 924.8.

(No. 90.)—MEDITERRANEAN—SALONIKI BAY.

Shoal Bank off Cape Kara.

INFORMATION has been received from H.M. Consul at Saloniki of the existence of shoal ground, said to have grown up, of late years, near Cape Kara, east side of the entrance of Saloniki Bay, and on which the steam ship "Vespasian" grounded on the 3rd June, 1874.

The shoal (*Vespasian Shoal*) has 14 feet on it and deeper water around. The following bearings taken from the vessel while on the shoal, viz., Cape Kara Lighthouse, N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and Touzla Point S. by E., place the danger nearly 9 cables from the lighthouse and half a mile from the shore.

NOTE.—Vessels entering or leaving Saloniki Bay should not round Cape Kara, nor approach the coast between that Cape and Touzla Point, within one mile, nor stand into less than 10 fathoms water.

(No. 91.)—HINDOSTAN—WEST COAST.

Rocks off the Coast of Southern Konkan.

INFORMATION has been received through Rear-Admiral Arthur Cumming, C.B., Commander-in-Chief, East India station, of the existence of the following dangers on the coast of Southern Konkan, between Malwan and Vingorla, viz. :—

Malwan Rock.—This rock has 8 feet water on it at low water springs. It lies south-westward of Malwan and W. by S. $\frac{3}{4}$ S. $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the south end of Sindudroog. Position, lat. $16^{\circ} 1' 30''$ N., long. $73^{\circ} 25' 30''$ E.

Chaldea Rock, awash at low water springs, is off Nuti and near the south end of the Karli Foul Ground, north side of Karil Kachál Channel ; the rock lies N.N.E. $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the centre of Karil Islet, and from it Nuti Point bears E. by S. $\frac{3}{4}$ S. distant $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Position, lat. $15^{\circ} 57' N.$, long. $73^{\circ} 27' 40'' E.$

Vingorla Anchorage.—S.W. Point Rock has 6 feet on it at low water springs. It lies S.W. 3 cables from the lighthouse on the N.W. point of Vingorla Anchorages.

South and East Rocks have 16 and 11 feet respectively on them at low water springs. These rocks are near each other ; the westernmost (South Rock) lies south from Vingorla Lighthouse, distant half a mile ; East Rock being half a mile from the adjacent shore, with from 5 to 3 fathoms inside it.

Fixed and Flashing Light on North Mole.

THE Italian Government has given notice, that from the 10th day of July, 1874, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at the extremity of the north mole of Port Malamocco.

The light will be a *fixed white light*, varied by a *red flash every minute*, elevated 38 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of about 9 miles.

Hewett Channel and Cockle Gateway.

The Trinity House, London, has given notice of further alterations having taken place in the sands about the southern entrance into Yarmouth Roads :—

Hewett Channel has decreased in breadth to one cable, with a depth of 24 feet.

A channel 3 cables wide has opened out in a north and south direction through the N.E. end

of the Corton Sand. This channel being better adapted for navigation than Hewett Channel will be buoyed; and, together with an alteration in the position of the St. Nicholas and Corton Light-Vessels, and the general buoyage of the locality, will be carried into effect about the middle of July.

A shoal of 23 feet having grown up to the northward of the Cockle Light-Vessel, a can buoy painted in *black and white rings* will be laid to the northward of the same.

Intended Light on South-West Prong.

THE Government of Bombay has given notice, that on the 1st November, 1874, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on South-West Prong, entrance of Bombay Harbour.

The light will be a *revolving* white light, showing a flash at an interval of *ten seconds*, elevated 140 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 18 miles.

The illuminating apparatus will be dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.

The new lighthouse bears S.W. by S., distant $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the Colaba Point Light, about to be discontinued. It is painted with white, red, white, and black horizontal bands. Position, lat. $18^{\circ} 52' 40''$ N., long. $72^{\circ} 47' 30''$ E.

Leading Lights in South Channel.

WITH reference to Notices to Mariners, Nos. 31 and 114, dated respectively 29th March, 1873, and 11th November, 1873, on the leading lights for the South Channel, Port Phillip:—

The Colonial Government has given further notice, that the following lights would be exhibited from the 1st June, 1874, viz.:—

Eastern Light, immediately under Arthur's Seat, is a *fixed* light, showing *red* between the bearings S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. and S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and *white* between S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. and E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., elevated 80 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather the white light should be seen from a distance of 14 miles.

South Channel Pile Light at the eastern end of the channel, in the position formerly occupied by No. 10 buoy, is a *fixed* light showing *red* between the bearings W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. through north to N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., and *white* between N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. and S.S.E.; between S.S.E. and W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. the light is obscured; it is elevated 27 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather the white light should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus of both lights is dioptric or by lenses, of the fourth order.

Directions.—Vessels entering the South Channel from seaward, should steer in with the lights in line, showing white, bearing E. $\frac{3}{4}$ S., but vessels of large draught should, on approaching within a quarter of a mile of the South Channel Pile Lighthouse, open the Eastern Light well to the northward of the Pile Light in order to avoid the 20 feet patches recently discovered. After passing the Pile Lighthouse steer about East and into the red colour of the Pile Light before reaching No. 13 buoy. When the Eastern Light shows red, the vessel will be clear of the east end of the middle ground, and may steer for Melbourne or Geelong.

Vessels leaving for sea by the South Channel, having made the Eastern Light, red, should steer for it until the Pile Light is seen, red, bearing W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., when a course may be shaped for the latter so as to pass on the north side, and when passed the leading lights in one, with the course W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N., will lead through the channel.

When to the northward and in the vicinity of the Middle Ground and Great Sand, sailing vessels working down will know they are standing into danger when either the South Channel Pile Light or the Eastern Light shows white; they will also know their proximity to the eastern shore when the Eastern Light ceases to be visible.

Anchorage.—Vessels may find safe anchorage in Capel Sound with the Pile Light showing red. [All bearings are magnetic. Variation $8\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ easterly in 1874.]
