THE Queen has been pleased to cause Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, constituting the Settlements on the Gold Coast and of Lagos into a separate Colony, to be called the Gold Coast Colony, and providing for the Government thereof.

Her Majesty has also been pleased to appoint Captain George Cumine Strahan, R.A., to be Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Gold Coast Colony.

Her Majesty has further been pleased to appoint Charles Cameron Lees, Esq., to be Administrator of the Government of the Settlement of Lagos.

Whitehall, July 30, 1874.

The Queen has been pleased to give and grant unto Richard Edwards, Esq., who has been for many years actually and entirely employed beyond Her Majesty's Dominions in the service of His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, Her Royal licence and authority that he may accept and wear the Insignia of the Third Class of the Imperial Orders of Osmanie and the Medjidie, which the Sultan has been pleased to confer upon him.

THIS day the Lords being met a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to provide for the exemption of the borough of Wenlock from the category of boroughs under the "Elementary Education Act, 1870."

An Act to render personation, with intent to deprive any person of real estate or other property, felony.

An Act to alter and amend the law as to appointments under powers not exclusive.

An Act to extend the Jurisdiction of Courts of the Colony of the Straits Settlements to certain crimes and offences committed out of the colony.

An Act to amend "The Colonial Attornies Relief Act."

An Act to amend the powers of the Board of Trade with respect to inquiries, arbitrations, appointments, and other matters under special Acts, and to amend the regulation of Railways Act, 1873, so far as regards the reference of differences to the Railway Commissioners in lieu of arbitrators.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Buenos Ayres, upon the subject of the Harbour of Eusenada, in the River Plate, which has lately been constituted a port of entry:

A translation of a Decree in the matter made by the National Government is subjoined:—

Buenos Aires, May 20, 1874.

THE Port of Eusenada being hereby constituted for the purposes of home and of foreign trade, and a comptroller's department having been provided for in the estimates, with a view to avoid the inconvenience to which commerce might be subjected owing to its vicinity to the port of Buenos Aires which involves the necessity of the presentation of documents in duplicate:

The President of the Republic determines and decrees—

ART. 1. The Comptroller's Department at Eusenada will commence its operations on and from the 1st June next.

ART. 2. The duties of the Comptroller's Department are restricted as regards such vessels as may carry on operations in the port of Buenos Aires and in that of Eusenada simultaneously, to mere prevention duties dependent on the custom-house of Buenos Aires.

ART. 3. Let this be promulgated, &c.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers given to us by the Post Office Acts, or any of them, and of all

other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, order and direct as follows:—

1. Any registered newspaper, or packet of registered newspapers, may be sent by post, with or without a supplement or supplements, from any place within the United Kingdom to any of the several places mentioned in the second column of the first schedule hereto, by the routes and means of conveyance described and set forth in the third column of the said schedule, at such rates of postage, for each newspaper, as are specified in the fourth column of the said schedule, subject to the regulations and conditions made and prescribed by a certain Treasury Warrant, dated 27th day of December, 1870.

2. No such newspaper or packet shall be forwarded by post the weight of which shall exceed five pounds, or (unless by special permission of the Postmaster-General), the dimensions of which shall exceed two feet in length, or one foot in breadth or depth.

3. If the postage chargeable under this Warrant, on any newspaper, or packet of newspapers, posted in the United Kingdom, is not prepaid in conformity with the condition prescribed in that behalf, such newspaper or packet shall (except in the cases hereafter in this clause mentioned), be detained and returned or given up to the sender; but if the postage chargeable under this Warrant on any such newspaper or packet posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to British India, Hong Kong, Ceylon, or the Straits Settle-

ments, be so prepaid to the extent of one penny for each newspaper, such newspaper or packet shall be forwarded charged with the deficient postage, and an additional rate of postage, in respect of each newspaper, of one penny.

4. If any registered newspaper, or packet of registered newspapers, is sent by post otherwise than in conformity with the conditions and regulations applicable thereto (except as hereinbefore mentioned), it shall be detained and returned or given up to the sender thereof.

5. The rates of postage fixed by this Warrant on registered newspapers and packets of registered newspapers, transmitted by the post as hereinbefore mentioned, shall be in lieu of those now chargeable thereon.

6.
