EAST GRINSTEAD FAIR.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 95.)—SPAIN—NORTH COAST.

Leading Harbour Lights at Port Passages.

THE Spanish Government has given notice, that three leading harbour lights are now provisionally exhibited to facilitate the navigation of the Port of Passages, viz.:

1. A *fixed red* light on the north wall of Santa Isabel Castle.

2. A *fixed white* light above the fortifications on the south side of the castle.

3. The illuminating apparatus of both lights is catoptric or by reflectors, and in clear weather they should be seen from a distance of 3 miles.

3. A *red* light in the supplementary dockyard. This light is intended as a guide to vessels after having passed Cruces Point.

NOTE.—Vessels entering Port Passages should keep the leading lights in Santa Isabel Castle in line until Great Arando Point is passed, and

then steer half a point to the eastward to avoid the shoal water off Cruces Point.

(No. 69.)—FRANCE—WEST COAST.

Temporary Alteration in Lights, Gironde River.

THE French Government has given notice, that from the 3rd July, 1875, the following alteration will be made in the lights near the entrance of the Gironde River, viz. :—

Le Grand Banc Light-vessel will be removed for one month, and the light-vessel of the Tallais Bank will be moored in her place, but this latter vessel having only one mast and one light, a light will be suspended from the forestay, 26 feet above sea, so that the character of the lights exhibited will not be materially changed.

Tallais Bank Light-vessel will at the same time be replaced by the light-vessel of Tour de By for two months.

Tour de By. A small sloop will be placed in the position of the Tour de By Light-vessel (removed), from which a light will be exhibited 26 feet above the sea. This light will be seen from a distance of six miles, but in bad weather it will be liable to be extinction.

Any interest, dividends, or other annual payment, payable out of or in respect of the stocks, funds, or shares of any foreign or colonial company, society, adventure, or concern

to any persons, corporations, companies, or societies in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or acting therein as agents, or in any other character, shall, without further notice or demand thereof, deliver or cause to be delivered into the Head Office for Inland Revenue, an account, in writing, containing their names and residences, and a description of the annuities, pensions, or other annual sums, dividends, shares, or interest entrusted to them for payment, within one calendar month after the same shall have been required by public notice in the London Gazette, in order that an assessment may be made thereon, at the rate of duty prescribed by the Act of the present session of Parliament, 38 Victoria, chap. 23: Her Majesty's Commissioners of Inland Revenue do hereby give notice to all persons entrusted with the payment of any such annuities, pensions, or other annual sums, dividends, shares of annuities, or interest as aforesaid, that the accounts of the said annuities, &c., required by the said Acts, are to be delivered, in writing, into the Head Office for Inland Revenue, at Somerset House, in the county of Middlesex, addressed to the Secretary of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, within the space of one calendar month from the date hereof; and that any person who shall neglect or refuse to deliver such account, is, by the said Acts, made subject to the forfeiture of one hundred pounds, over and above the duty chargeable on such annuities, shares, dividends, or interest.

INCOME TAX.

RHEEA, OR CHINA GRASS FIBRE.

THE Secretary of State for India in Council has decided, in the event of a sufficient number of competitors coming forward, to make arrangements for a series of trials to take place in this country early in November next, with the object of ascertaining the best methods for the preparation of the Rhea Fibre, from either the fresh or the dried plant, by mechanical, chemical, or other means.

The necessary space, motive power, water, and other facilities will be supplied by the Government, but competitors will have to arrange for the working of their machines or processes under their own supervision or that of their representatives. The utmost care will be taken to secure reliable results, and to make public the whole of the details connected with the experiments, but it is not intended that any prize shall be awarded on the occasion.

Forms of application for taking part in the proposed competition, together with samples of the Rhea, in its dried state, may now be obtained from the undersigned. Samples of fresh Rhea will probably be also available for distribution in the course of a few weeks.

BYE-LAWS and Regulations made by the Southport Tramways Company Limited under the powers conferred on the Company by the Tramways Act, 1870:—

1. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Company, and to all places with respect to which the Company have power to make bye-laws and regulations.

2. No passenger shall enter into or depart from a carriage except by the hindermost or conductor's platform.

3. No passenger shall smoke inside, or on the platform of, any carriage.

4. No passenger or other person shall, while riding in or upon any carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

5. No person in a state of intoxication shall be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage may be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions, curtains, linings, straps, or oilcloths, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, or break or scratch any lamp or window of, in, or upon any carriage, or in any manner wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall, in addition to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations, be liable to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. Any person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or who might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any carriage, and may be prevented from entering in or upon any carriage, and shall not enter in or upon any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found in or upon any carriage shall, on the request of the conductor, leave such carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned or tendered.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Company, the fare legally demandable for the journey, and take in return from the conductor (if offered), a ticket perforated for the distance paid for.

10. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do, to the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Company, and shall also when required so to do either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

11. No passenger shall for any purpose make use of a perforated ticket issued to any other passenger, or a perforated ticket issued during a previous journey, or ride upon any carriage further than the distance for which the fare has been paid.

12. No person shall place upon any carriage of the Company, any luggage (other than personal

luggage, not exceeding 28 pounds in weight) without the permission of the conductor.

13. Personal luggage, and other luggage allowed to be conveyed upon the carriages of the Company, shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

14. No passenger shall travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage.

15. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage or travel therein, otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

16. No person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any carriage when warned by the conductor that such carriage contains the full number of passengers, which it is authorized and constructed to contain.

17. When a carriage contains the full authorized number of passengers, a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a conspicuous position on the carriage.

18. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the authorized number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

19. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave any carriage whilst in motion.

20. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage, except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. 22. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty, upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company.

23. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce these bye-laws and regulations to the best of his ability.

24. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these bye-laws and regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

25. The expression "conductor" shall include any servant in the employment of the Company and having charge of a carriage.

26. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these bye-laws and regulations.

27. These bye-laws shall come into force on the 13th day of September, 1875.
