WHEREAS by Section 6 of "The Artizans and Labourers Dwellings Improvement Act, 1875," the Local Government Board are constituted the "Confirming Authority" for every Improvement Scheme made by an Urban Sanitary Authority in pursuance of that Act;

And whereas by Section 26 of the same Act it is enacted, that the Confirming Authority may from time to time, by Order, prescribe the forms of advertisements and notices under that Act; and that it shall not be obligatory on any persons to adopt such forms, but the same, when adopted, shall be deemed sufficient for all the purposes of that Act:

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 151.)—MEDITERRANEAN—ALGERIA.

(1.) *Alteration in Harbour Light at Bougie.*

THE French Government has given notice, that from the 15th October, 1875, the following alteration would be made in the harbour light at Bougie; viz. :—

A light would be exhibited from a small house on the extremity of Abd-el-Kader Pier.

The light is a *fixed red* light elevated 23 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 3 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric, or by reflectors.

Also, that on the exhibition of the above light, the light hitherto exhibited from Abd-el-Kader Fort would be discontinued.

(No. 152.)—GULF OF BOTHNIA.—SKAL GRUND ISLAND.

(1.) *Fixed and Flashing Light at Kaskö.*

THE Russian Government has given notice, that a light is now exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at Kaskö, Skal Grund Island.

The light is a *fixed and flashing red* light, the flash being seen *every thirty seconds*, it is elevated 103 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 16 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses, of the third order.

The lighthouse, 86 feet high, is round and painted white; the wall surrounding it is red. Position, lat. 62° 20' N., long. 21° 11' E.

(2.) *Beacon Vessel near Uleaborg.*

Also, that a beacon vessel has been moored in the channel between Karlö Island and the shoal of Veli Kelmi, in 4½ fathoms water, and W. ¾ N. from the lighthouse of Uleaborg. The vessel is painted red, and has the name *Portprick* (harbour beacon) on her sides. She has one mast, carries a small red ball at the masthead 38 feet high, and should be seen from a distance of about 7 miles.

By Night.—Vingorla Rocks Light must not be brought to bear to the southward of S.S.E., nor should a vessel approach the rock within a depth of 15 fathoms.

The Sandbach and Winsford Junction Railway.

Notice to Landowners and others having claims on the Sandbach and Winsford Junction Railway Company.

And whereas by the said Act of 1872 (section 35), it was enacted that the said sum of money deposited as aforesaid should be applicable, and after due notice in the London Gazette should be applied, towards compensating any landowners or other persons whose property might have been interfered with or otherwise rendered less valuable by the commencement, construction, or abandonment of the railway, or any portion thereof, or who might have been subjected to injury or loss in consequence of the compulsory powers of taking property conferred upon the Company by the now

reciting Act, and for which injury or loss no compensation or inadequate compensation should have been paid, and should be disturbed in satisfaction of such compensation as aforesaid, in such manner and in such proportions as to the Court of Chancery in England might seem fit; and if no such compensation should be payable, or if a portion of the said sum of money should have been found sufficient to satisfy all just claims in respect of such compensation, then the said sum of money, or such portion thereof as might not be required as aforesaid, should be paid to or on the application of the person or persons, or the majority of the persons, named in the warrant or order mentioned in the 34th section of the now reciting Act, or the survivor or survivors of them: provided that until the said sum of money should have been repaid to the depositors or should have become otherwise applicable as thereinbefore mentioned, any interest or dividends accruing thereon should from time to time, and as often as the same should become payable, be paid to or on the application of the person or persons, or the majority of the persons, named in such warrant or order as therein mentioned, or the survivors or survivor of them. And whereas the said Company were unable to raise the funds required for the making of the said railway, and by "The Sandbach and Winsford Junction Railway Abandonment Act, 1875, it was enacted that the Company might and should abandon the making of the said railway, and that on and after the passing of the Act now in recital, the said Company should, except only as by the Act now in recital otherwise expressly provided, be expressly freed from all obligation with respect to the making and maintaining of the said railway.
