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Stockholm, January 30.

THE King is gone to *Schenon*, to take a Review of his Forces quartered on that side, which will make an Army of above 25000 fighting Men. The Transporting of several Regiments to *Germany* so soon as the Season will permit it, is spoken of as a thing that's certain; and some add, that his Majesty will go with them in Person. In the meantime Preparations are making for the meeting of the States of this Kingdom.

Vienna, Jan. 27. On Monday last arrived here a Turkish Officer of the Garison of *Siget*, with the Capitulation agreed on betwixt the Bassa of that Fortress and the Commander of the Imperial Forces that formed the Blockade. The next day he had Audience of the Count de *Staremberg*, Vice-President of the Council of War; and having since received his Dispatches, and the Emperors Ratification of the said Capitulation, he will part from hence to-morrow, on his return to *Siget*, with the same Convoy that brought him hither. The Imperial Troops that are now before *Siget* are Ordered to march towards *Canisa*, to re-inforce the Blockade of that Place, which cannot possibly hold out much longer. The Emperor has finally resolved to give Audience this week to the Turkish Ambassadors; after which the Imperial Commissioners, with the Ministers that are here on the part of the Allies, will forthwith enter into Conference with them, to hear their Proposals. In the mean time the Preparations for the War are continued with all possible diligence and application, especially towards *Germany*, where the Emperor will have a very considerable Army under the Command of the Duke of *Lorraine*. The King of *Hungary* has the Small-Pox, but they being come out very well, it's hoped he is out of all danger.

Exancfort, Febr. 7. We have an Account from the *Palatinate*, that the French had drawn together from *Philipsburg*, *Hydelburg*, *Spire*, and *Manheim*, to the number of 2000 Men under the Command of Monsieur de *Melac*, with a design to sack the Garison in *Dielsburg*, which was besieged by a Detachment of the Troops of *Saxony*; but, that the *Saxons*, having timely notice thereof, gave them such a Reception, that they were forced to retire with the loss of many of their Men killed and wounded; Monsieur de *Melac* being himself of the number of the latter. The French are hard at work at *Hydelburg* to undermine the Castle, and will have all their Mines ready in 7 or 8 days to blow it up. They are doing the like at *Manheim*, which Place they seem resolved to reduce to a heap of Ruines. We are told from *Sweynfurt*, that the Elector of *Saxony* parted from thence last Sunday on his return to *Dresden*, leaving his Troops to act with

with those of the other Allies, for the Defence and Security of the Empire.

Hydelberg, Febr. 9. The 4th Instant marched from hence a Detachment of 1000 Men, who having joined with some other Troops from *Spire* and *Manheim*, advanced towards *Hydelburg*, to relieve that Place which was besieged by the *Saxons*; but they returned hither this morning in great disorder, and with considerable loss. To revenge this Disgrace, they marched out again last night with 2000 Men of this Garison, and that of *Manheim*, but this Expedition succeeded no better than the former, the *Saxons* being 1000 their Guard, and obliging them to make a hasty retreat, with the loss of divers Men, and part of their Baggage. It's believed the French will quit this Place in a day or two; They have already sent away the best of the Cannon, and are now undermining the Castle. The Soldiers threaten to plunder the Town when they leave it.

Cologne, Febr. 15. The French have begun to burn several Villages in the Dutchies of *Fuliers* and *Cleves*. General *Schoning* has caused 2000 *Brandenburgers* to pass the *Rhine*, to secure the Country on that side, being himself posted with some other Troops to hinder these Incendiaries from destroying the Parts about *Wesel*. The Elector of *Bavaria* is returned to *Munich*.

Hague, Febr. 18. Her Royal Highness the Princess of *Orange* being on her departure for *England*; The States General, the States of *Holland*, the Council of State, the Courts of Justice, and all the other Colleges, have either in Body, or by their Deputies, made their Compliments to her Royal Highness on this occasion. The like has been done by the Foreign Ministers, and all other Persons of Quality, and by our Magistrates; who desired that the Burghers of this Place might attend her Royal Highness in Arms at her leaving it, which her Royal Highness excused. The States of *Holland* have appointed three of their Body to wait upon her Royal Highness to the Place of her Embarking; And Orders have been sent to the Sieur d'*Allemonde*, and the Ships under his Command, to join with Admiral *Herbert*, who is come with a Squadron of Men of War, and several Yachts from *England*, to attend and Conduct her Royal Highness thither. The States have resolved to fit out a great Fleet against the Spring; and have given out Commissions for the raising 3000 Horse and 8000 Foot. They have sent Instructions to their Minister at *Vienna*, to make a new Alliance with the Emperor against *France*. And the Sieur de *Hechezen* is going on the same Errand to the Prince of *Luxembourg*.

Brussels, Febr. 18. Our Governor General took this day a Review of the Dragoons of *Agwero*. This is the seventh new raised Regiment that has already passed Muster; There are six more raising, which will be compleat in a short time.

time: Besides these new Levies, his Excellency has resolved to re-inforce all the old Bodies. The French Troops continue to Assemble between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*. They write from *Nuremberg* of the 11th Instant, that the Elector of *Bavaria*, who was returning to *Munick*, was, upon some fresh Advice he had received of the motion of the French, gone back to his Forces. The Duke of *Lorraine* is to Command the Imperial Army on the *Rhine*, which will be composed of 30000 Germans, 6000 of the Circles, and 4000 Hungarians. The Elector of *Bavaria* will Command his own Troops, with those of the Circles of *Bavaria*, *Suabia*, *Franconia*, and the *Upper Rhine*, which together will amount to 32000, without reckoning the Troops of *Saxony*, *Brandenburg*, *Lunenbourg*, and the other Allies. The French are going to quit the *Palatinate*; They have laid in Ashes 18 Bourgs and Villages between *Hyaelberg* and the *Rhine*.

Whitehall, Febr. 12. Her Royal Highness the Princess of *Orange* arrived here this Afternoon; The welcome News whereof was received with Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy.

Whitehall, Febr. 13. This morning the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons being Assembled at *Westminster*, and having agreed upon an Instrument, in Writing, for Declaring the Prince and Princess of *Orange*, King and Queen of *England*, *France*, and *Ireland*, with all the Dominions and Territories thereunto belonging, and presented the same to their Highnesses in the Banqueting Houfe, and Received their Consent thereto: The said Lords and Commons about Eleven of the Clock came down to *Whitehall-Gate*, where the Officers of Arms, Sergeants at Arms, Trumpets, and other Persons concerned in the Solemnity, being Assembled, by Order from the Duke of *Norfolk*, Earl Marshal of *England*: Sir *Tho. St. George* Kt. Garter Principal King of Arms, having received a Proclamation, and the said Officers of Arms being Ordered by the House of Lords forthwith to Proclaim the same, *York Herald* (after the Trumpets had thrice sounded) Proclaimed it at *Whitehall-Gate* accordingly (the said Garter Reading it to him by Periods) in the presence of the said Lords and Commons and Multitudes of People there Assembled, who concluded the same with repeated Acclamations of Joy. From whence they proceeded in this manner. First, the Head Bailiff of *Westminster* with his Men; Next, the Knight Marshals Men, then a Class of Trumpets, followed by the Sergeant Trumpeter; Then an Officer of Arms singly, followed by six other, each accompanied with a Sergeant at Arms; Then Garter King of Arms with the Proclamation, accompanied by the Usher of the Black Rod; Then the Lord Marquis of *Halsfax*, who Executes the Place of Speaker in the House of Lords, in his Coach, attended by Sir *Roger Hawket*, Eldest Sergeant at Arms, with his Mace; Then *Henry Powle* Esq; Speaker of the House of Commons, in his Coach, attended by Sergeant *Topham*, with his Mace; Then the Duke of *Norfolk*, Earl Marshal of *England*, in his Coach, followed by the rest of the Peers in Order, all in Coaches; Lastly, the Members of the House of Commons in their Coaches. Thus they Proceeded to *Temple-Bar*, where the Gates being shut, two of the Officers of Arms (attended by a Sergeant at Arms and two Trumpets) knocking thereto, the Sheriffs of *London* and *Middlesex* coming to the Gate, and being informed of the Occasion of their Coming, Or-

dered the Gates to be opened, and the Whole Proceeding entred (except the Bailiff of *Westminster* and his Men who went off there) and the Lord Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen receiving them in their Formalties, a second Proclamation was made between the two *Temple Gates*; and the said Aldermen, Sheriff and Lord Mayor falling into the Proceeding, at *Woodstreet* end in *Cheapside* Their Majesties were Proclaimed a Third time; and so at the *Royal Exchange* in *Cornhill* a Fourth time; each Proclamation being echoed with Universal Acclamations of Joy by the Multitudes of People which crowded the Streets, Windows and Balconies; the Streets all the way from *Temple Bar* to the *Royal Exchange* being lined with four Regiments of the City Militia. Thus the Ceremony ended, and the night was concluded with Bonfires, ringing of Bells, and all other Expressions of Duty and Affection to Their Majesties, King *WILLIAM*, and Queen *MARY*, with hearty Wishes for Their Long and Happy Reign.
