**H**ER Majesty in Council was this day pleased, on a representation of the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Council on Education, to appoint Robert Sankey Stevelly, Esquire, B.A., of Saint Peter's College, Cambridge, to be one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools.

**A**T the Court at *Windsor*, the 27th day of *November*, 1875.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 22nd of October, 1875, in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas by the fifth section of an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of your Majesty's reign, chapter eighty-nine, entitled ‘An Act to provide for the better government of Greenwich Hospital,’ it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for your Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council, to appoint such pensions as seem fit to Officers of your Majesty's Navy;

“And whereas we have had under our consideration the cases of those warrant officers who, as warrant officers or as seamen, contributed to the funds of Greenwich Hospital for full five years previous to the first day of January, 1830;

“And whereas we are humbly of opinion that they, as well as all other persons who so contributed, should participate in the benefits of the said Hospital, by being granted special pensions chargeable thereto;

“We do humbly submit that your Majesty will be graciously pleased by your Order in Council to sanction the grant, at our discretion, of special Greenwich Hospital pensions of three pounds and eight shillings a-year each to all warrant officers and other persons who, while serving in the Royal Navy or Marines, contributed to the funds of that institution for full five years previous to the first day of January, 1830, provided they are

not in receipt of any other pension chargeable to the said funds; are not maintained in any Hospital at the expense of Greenwich Hospital; and are not inmates of workhouses.

The pensions to commence from the date of your Majesty's Order in Council sanctioning the same, and to be irrespective of the limit of £20,000 a-year fixed for Greenwich Hospital special pensions by your Majesty's Order in Council of the 12th of December, 1874.”

Her Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, in the words following; that is to say :—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint George, situate within the limits of the district chapelry of Trinity

Portsea, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said district chapelry of Trinity, Portsea, and of the parish of Portsea, in the said county of Southampton, and in the said diocese of Winchester, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such district chapelry and parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said district chapelry of Trinity, Portsea, and of the said parish of Portsea, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint George, situate within the limits of the said district chapelry of Trinity, Portsea.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and with the consent of the Reverend John Vanderstegen Stewart, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Portsea, and as such the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said district chapelry of Trinity, Portsea (in testimony whereof they the said Bishop and the said John Vanderstegen Stewart have respectively signed and sealed this representation) and with the consent of the Warden and Scholars, Clerks of Saint Mary's College of Winchester, the patrons of the said vicarage of the parish of Portsea aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said warden and scholars have affixed their common or corporate seal to this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said district chapelry of Trinity, Portsea, and of the said parish of Portsea, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint George, situate within the limits of the district chapelry of Trinity, Portsea as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint George, Portsea.'

"We, therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint George, Portsea, being:—

"All that portion of the district chapelry of Trinity Portsea in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester and also all those two portions of the parish of Portsea in the same county and diocese which are detached from such parish but which are contiguous to the portion of the district chapelry of Trinity Portsea aforesaid, all which said portions of such district chapelry and of such parish are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point where Queen-street joins Union-street and where the boundary which divides the district chapelry of Saint John Portsea in the said county and diocese from the parish of Portsea aforesaid meets the boundary dividing the last named parish from the district chapelry

of Trinity Portsea aforesaid and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named street thereby following the last described boundary to the point where the same street is joined by Kent-street and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last named street to its junction with Saint James's-street with the roadway called or known as Saint George's-square and with Portland-street and extending thence southeastward along the middle of the last named street to its junction with the street or road called or known as Lion-terrace and extending thence southward for a distance of about eight and a half chains along the middle of the last-named street or road and along the middle of Milldam-road to the boundary which divides the said district chapelry of Trinity Portsea from the parish of Portsea aforesaid and extending thence for a distance of thirty-one chains or thereabouts first westward then southwestward and then again westward along the last described boundary thereby following for the most part the northern side of the Old Mill Dam to the point on the north-western side of the road leading from Portsmouth into Saint George's-square aforesaid where the same boundary joins the boundary dividing the said district chapelry of Trinity Portsea from the parish of Portsmouth in the county and diocese aforesaid, and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of one chain or thereabouts along the last mentioned boundary thereby following the said north-western side of the said last described road to the point on the southern side of the Elephant and Castle Inn where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary which divides the said parish of Portsmouth from the parish of Portsea aforesaid and extending thence for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts first north-westward then north-eastward and then again north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary thereby passing through the northern part of the premises called or known as the Old Gun Wharf to the point on the south-western side of the road called or known as Ordnance-row where the said last-mentioned boundary is joined by the boundary which divides the said parish of Portsmouth from the district chapelry of Trinity Portsea as aforesaid and continuing thence for a distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts first north-westward and then south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary thereby passing along the said south-western side of the road called or known as Ordnance-row aforesaid to the point upon high water mark where the said last-mentioned boundary is joined by the south-western boundary of the parish of Portsea aforesaid and extending thence generally north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary thereby following the said high water mark and including the Royal Albert Pier to the point on the southeastern wall of the Royal Dockyard where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Portsea from the district chapelry of Saint John Portsea aforesaid and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following in part the said dockyard wall and in part the middle of Queen-street aforesaid) to the first described point where the last named street is joined by Union-street as aforesaid and where the said last-mentioned boundary meets the boundary dividing the said parish of Portsea from the district chapelry of Trinity Portsea as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, there-

fore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications, viz. :—

MIDDLETON-IN-TEESDALE. — Forthwith wholly in the church, and in the churchyard after the 31st December, 1876, except for the burial of widowers, widows, and parents of those already interred therein.

KINGSBRIDE, in the parish of Churchstow, Devon.—Forthwith wholly in Kingsbridge church and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults, and except in reserved graves which can be opened without exposing coffins or disturbing remains; every coffin buried to be enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

ST. JAMES'S, SOUTHBROOM, in the parish of Cannings Episcopi, Wilts.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of St. James's, Southbroom, and that in the churchyard no coffin be buried within one foot of any other coffin, or less than four feet below the surface of the ground, unless in a vault or walled grave, in which each coffin shall be embedded and separately entombed in an airtight manner.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the fifth day of January, 1876:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said fifth day of January.

*Festiniog School Board.*

BYE-LAWS.

AT a Meeting of the School Board for the parish of Festiniog, duly convened and held on the 10th day of July, 1875, at which all the Members of the Board are present, the said Board do hereby, in pursuance of the powers to them given by the Elementary Education Acts of 1870 and 1873, and subject to the approval of the Lords of the Committee of Council on Education, repeal the Bye-laws made by the said Board on the 9th day of September, 1871, and sanctioned by an Order in Her Majesty's Council on the 21st day of December, 1871, and instead thereof do make and ordain the following Bye-laws:—

1. (a.) The term "Parish of Festiniog," or "Parish," means the whole parish of Festiniog.
- (b.) The term "School Board" or "Board" means the School Board of the district comprising the parish of Festiniog.
- (c.) The term "School" or "Public Elementary School," means a Public Elementary School as defined by the said Acts.
- (d.) The term "Parent" includes guardian and every person who is liable to maintain, or has actual custody of any child; and terms importing males includes females.

2. The parent of every child of not less than five years of age, nor more than twelve years of age, residing within the district of the said parish, is required to cause such child to attend school, unless there be some reasonable excuse for non-attendance.

3. The time during which every such child is required to attend school is the whole time for which the school selected shall be open for the instruction of children, not being less than twenty-five hours a-week, except on Sundays; and except also that nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance or instruction in religious subjects, or shall require any child to attend school or any day

exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his parent belongs.

4. A child of not less than ten years of age, who has obtained from one of Her Majesty's Inspectors a certificate that he has reached a standard equivalent to the fourth standard of the Government Code of 1875, shall be exempt from obligation to attend school.

5. The following shall be reasonable excuses for non-attendance of a child at school :—

(a.) That such child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.

(b.) That such child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.

(c.) That there is no Public Elementary School which such child can attend within three miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.

6. Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate these Bye-laws, or any of them, shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, including costs, for each offence.

7. These Bye-laws shall take effect from and after the day on which the same shall be sanctioned by Order in Council.

*Parish of Brampton, Cumberland.*

BYE-LAWS OF THE BRAMPTON SCHOOL BOARD.

I.—The parent of every child, of not less than five nor more than thirteen years of age, residing in the district of the School Board, is required to cause such child to attend school, unless there be some reasonable excuse for non-attendance.

II.—Subject to the provisions of these Bye-laws, the time during which every such child is required to attend school is the whole time for which the school shall be opened for the instruction of children, not being less than twenty-five hours a week, except on Sundays, and except also that nothing contained in these Bye-laws shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance or instruction in religious subjects, or shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his parent belongs, or shall be contrary to any thing contained in any act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

III.—A child of not less than ten years of age, who has obtained from one of Her Majesty's Inspectors a certificate that he has reached a standard equivalent to the fifth standard of the Government New Code of 1871, shall be altogether exempt from obligation to attend school.

IV.—In addition to the reasonable excuses for the non-attendance of a child at school mentioned in the Elementary Education Act, 1870, viz :—

(1) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.

(2) That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause ; it shall be

(3) A reasonable excuse for his non-attendance that there is no Public Elementary School open which such child can attend within three miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.

V.—Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect, or violate these Bye-laws or any of them, shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, including costs, for each offence.

**THE ELEMENTARY EDUCATION ACT,  
1870.**

**BYE-LAWS OF THE SCHOOL BOARD FOR THE  
DISTRICT OF THE PARISH OF BRIXHAM, DEVON.**

At a Meeting of the School Board of the parish of Brixham, in the county of Devon, duly convened and held at their offices in the New-road, in Brixham aforesaid, on Friday, the 6th day of August, 1875, the said Board do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in them by the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and subject to the approval of the Education Department, make and ordain the following Bye-laws:—

- 1.—(1) The term "School Board" or "Board" means the "School Board of the district comprising the parish of Brixham."
- (2) The term "School" means either a Public Elementary School, or any other school at which efficient elementary instruction is given.
- (3) The term "Parent" includes Guardian, and every person who is liable to maintain, or has the actual custody of any child or children.
- (4) Terms importing males include females.
- 2.—Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Acts, 1870, 1873, and of these Bye-laws, the parent of every child not less than five years of age, nor more than twelve years of age, and residing within the district of the said Board, shall cause such child (unless there is some reasonable excuse) to attend school.
- 3.—A child shall not be required to attend school—
  - (a.) If such child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
  - (b.) If such child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.
  - (c.) If there is no Public Elementary School open which such child can attend within three miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.
- 4.—The time during which every child shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age, but no child shall be required—
  - (a.) To attend on Sunday, Christmas Day, or Good Friday.
  - (b.) To attend school on any day fixed for the inspection of the school, or the examination of the scholars therein, in respect of religious subjects.
- 5.—Nothing in the present Bye-laws—
  - (a.) Shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance or instruction on religious subjects.
  - (b.) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his parent belongs.
  - (c.) Shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.
- 6.—In case one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools shall certify that any child between ten and twelve years of age has reached the fourth standard of education mentioned in the New Code of Regulations of the Education Department, dated the 5th day of April, 1875, such child shall be totally exempt from the obligation to attend school; and any child who has been so cer-

tified to have reached the third standard of such Code shall, for any reason which may appear satisfactory to the Board, be exempt from the obligation to attend school more than ten hours in any one week, such attendance shall be on two mornings and three afternoons in every week, during the time for which the school shall be open.

7.—If the parent of any child residing in the district of the Board satisfies the School Board that he is unable, from poverty, to pay the school fees of such child, the School Board, in the case of a school provided by the Board, shall remit, and in the case of any other Public Elementary School shall pay the whole or such part of the fees, as in the opinion of the Board the parent is unable to pay, for a renewable period, to be fixed by the Board, not exceeding six calendar months; but the amount of fees hereby undertaken to be so paid shall not exceed the ordinary payments at the schools provided by the Board.

8.—Any person committing a breach of these Bye-laws, or any of them, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding two shillings and six pence, provided that all breaches of these Bye-laws by a parent in one and the same week, shall be deemed one offence, and that no penalty imposed for the breach of any Bye-law shall exceed such a sum as with the costs will amount to five shillings for each offence.

9.—These Bye-laws shall take effect from and after the day on which the same shall be sanctioned by Her Majesty by Order in Council.

*Parish of Llanrhidian Higher.*

**BYE-LAWS OF THE LLANRHIDIAN HIGHER  
SCHOOL BOARD.**

WHEREAS in pursuance of a requisition sent

by the Education Department to the Clerk of the Guardians of the Gower Poor Law Union, a School Board for the parish of Llanrhidian Higher, in the county of Glamorgan, was duly elected on the 16th day of December, 1872.

Now at a Meeting of the School Board of the said parish of Llanrhidian Higher, held at the Board Room in the said parish of Llanrhidian Higher, on Monday, the 26th day of July, 1875, at which meeting a quorum of the members of such Board are present, the said Board do hereby, in pursuance of the powers given to them by Section 74 of the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and subject to the approval of the Education Department, make and ordain the following Bye-laws:—

*Interpretation of Terms.*

1. The term "Education Department" means "The Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education."

The term "Her Majesty's Inspectors" means "The Inspectors of Schools appointed by Her Majesty on the recommendation of the Education Department."

The term "School Board" or "Board" means "The School Board of the parish of Llanrhidian Higher."

The term "School" or "Public Elementary School," means a Public Elementary School, as defined by the said Act, and includes a Free School, but not an Industrial School.

The term "Parent" includes guardian, and every person who is liable to maintain or has the actual custody of any child, but does not include the mother of a child when the father is living, and is residing within the district.

*Requiring Parents to cause Children to attend School.*

2. Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Acts, 1870 and 1873, and of these Bye-laws, the parent of every child not less than five years of age, nor more than thirteen years of age, and residing within the Llanrhidian Higher School Board District, shall cause such child to attend a Public Elementary School unless there is some reasonable excuse. Any of the following reasons shall be a reasonable excuse, namely:—

*Reasonable Excuses for Non-attendance.*

(a.) If such child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.

(b.) If such child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.

(c.) If there is no Public Elementary School which such child can attend within three miles, measured according to the nearest road from the residence of such child.

*Determining Time during which Children shall attend School.*

3. The time during which every child is required to attend school is the whole time for which the school selected shall be opened for the instruction of children of similar age, not being less than twenty hours a-week (except Sunday), and except also, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child during the time or times in which any religious observance is practised, or instruction in religious subjects is given, and that no child shall be required—

(a.) To attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his or her parent belongs.

(b.) To attend school on Sunday, Christmas Day, Good Friday, or any day set apart for a day of Public Fast or Thanksgiving, or on Saturday after twelve o'clock at noon.

(c.) To attend school on any day fixed for the inspection of the school, or the examination of the scholars therein in respect of religious subjects.

*Proviso for Total or Partial Exemption from Attendance if Child has reached certain Standard.*

4. When a child shall have attained the age of ten years, and it shall be certified by one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools that such child has reached such a standard of education as would enable it to pass in the fourth standard of education mentioned in the Government New Code, dated the 5th April, 1875, such child shall be exempt from attending school more than one half of the whole time for which the school shall be opened.

5. Nothing in the present Bye-laws shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

*Providing for remission of School Fees in case of Poverty.*

6. Where the parent of any child shall satisfy the School Board that he is unable, from poverty, to pay the whole or any part of the school fees of such child, the School Board, in case of a school provided by the Board, will remit the whole or such part of the fees as, in the opinion of the Board, the parent is unable, from poverty, to pay, for a renewable period to be fixed by the Board, not exceeding six calendar months.

*Penalty for breach of Bye-laws.*

7. Any person committing a breach of these Bye-laws, or any of them, shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, including costs, provided that any breach of these Bye-laws by a parent in one and the same week shall be deemed one offence.

*Date on which Bye-laws shall come into operation.*

8. These Bye-laws shall take effect from and after the day on which the same shall be sanctioned by Order in Council.

BYE-LAWS OF THE SUTTON SCHOOL BOARD.

At a Meeting of the School Board for the District of Sutton (Extra Municipal), in the county of Chester, held at St. James' School, in the said district, on the 2nd day of August, 1875, the said Board, in pursuance of the powers given to them by the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and subject to the approval of the Education Department, hereby make the following Bye-laws:—

1. The parent of every child, of not less than five years nor more than thirteen years of age, residing within the school district of the said Board, shall cause such child to attend a Public Elementary School, unless there be a reasonable excuse for non-attendance. Any of the following reasons shall be deemed a reasonable excuse:—

- (a.) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
- (b.) That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness, or any unavoidable cause, or a cause that shall seem sufficient to the School Board.
- (c.) That there is no Public Elementary School open which such child can attend within three miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.

Provided always, that any child of the age of ten years at the least, who has been certified by one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools as having reached a standard of education which would enable it to pass the fourth standard of education of the Government Code for the time being existing, shall be totally exempt from the obligation to attend school; and that any child of the like age, who has been so certified as having reached the third standard of education of the said Code, shall be exempt from the obligation to attend school more than one-half of the meetings of the school in any one week.

2. Except as hereinbefore mentioned, the time during which every child shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age; but nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child during the time or times in which any religious observance is practised or instruction in religious subjects is given; and no child shall be required to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the parent of such child belongs, nor on Sunday, Christmas Day, Good Friday, or any day set apart for a day of Public Fast or Thanksgiving, nor on Saturdays after twelve o'clock at noon: Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be of any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour;

3. If the School Board be satisfied that the parent of any child is unable from poverty to pay the whole or any part of the school fees payable for such child, the Board in the case of a school provided by the Board shall remit, and in the case of any other Public Elementary School, shall pay the whole or such part of the said fees as, in the opinion of the Board, the parent is unable to pay, for a renewable period, to be fixed by the Board, not exceeding six calendar months.

4. Any parent committing a breach of these Bye-laws, or any of them, shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, including costs, for each offence, provided that all breaches of these Bye-laws by a parent in one and the same week shall be deemed one offence.

5. In these Bye-laws

The term "Education Department" means the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education.

The term "Her Majesty's Inspectors" means the Inspectors of Schools appointed by Her Majesty, on the recommendation of the Education Department.

The term "School Board" or "Board" means the School Board for the school district of Sutton, Extra Municipal, in the county of Chester.

The term "Child" means a child residing in the said school district of Sutton.

The term "School" or "Public Elementary School" means a Public Elementary School as defined by the Education Act, 1870.

The term "Parent" includes guardian, and every person who is liable to maintain, or has the actual custody of any child.

*Recital of Election of School Board.*

The term "School," or "Public Elementary School," means a Public Elementary School as defined by the Elementary Education Act 1870, and includes a Free School but not an Industrial School.

The term "Parent" includes guardian and every person who is liable to maintain, or has the actual custody of any child, but does not include the mother of a child when the father is living and is residing within the parish.

Terms importing males include females.

*Requiring Parents to cause Children to attend School.*

2.—Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and of these Bye-laws, the parent of every child not less than five years of age, nor more than thirteen years of age, residing within the district of the School Board, shall cause such child to attend school unless there be some reasonable excuse for non-attendance.

*Determining Time during which Children shall attend School.*

3. The time during which every child shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age, provided :

- (a.) That nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance, or instruction in religious subjects.
- (b.) That no child shall be required to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his or her parent belongs, or on any day fixed for the inspection of the school, or the examination of the scholars therein in respect of religious subjects.

- (c.) That no child shall be required to attend school on Sunday, Christmas Day, Good Friday, or on any day set apart for a day of Public Fast or Thanksgiving, or on Saturday, after twelve o'clock at noon.

*Proviso for Total or Partial Exemption from Attendance if Child has reached certain Standard.*

4. In case one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools shall certify that any child between ten and thirteen years of age, has reached such a standard of education as would enable it to pass in the fifth standard of education mentioned in the New Code of Regulations of the Education Department of the 5th April, 1875, such child shall be totally exempt from the obligation to attend school; and any such child who has been so certified to have passed in the fourth standard of education mentioned in the said Code, shall be exempt from the obligation to attend school more than one-half of the school meetings in any one week.

*Defining reasonable Excuses for Non-attendance.*

5. A child shall be excused from attending school

- (a.) If such child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
- (b.) If such child has been or is prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.

(c.) If there be no Public Elementary School which such child can attend within two miles measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.

6. Nothing in the present Bye-laws shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

*Penalty for breach of Bye-laws.*

7. Any parent committing a breach of these Bye-laws, shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding two shillings and sixpence, provided that all breaches of these Bye-laws by a parent in one and the same week shall be deemed one offence, and that no penalty imposed for the breach of any Bye-law shall exceed such a sum, as with costs, will amount to five shillings for each offence.

*When Bye-Laws come in force.*

8. These Bye-laws shall take effect from and after the day on which the same shall be sanctioned by Her Majesty by Order in Council.

(a.) A child not less than ten years of age, who has obtained a certificate from one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools, that he or she has reached a standard, equivalent to the third standard of the Government New Code of 1875, shall be altogether exempt from obligation to attend school.

(b.) A child not less than ten years of age, who shows to the satisfaction of the Board, that he or she is beneficially and necessarily at work, shall be exempt from obligation to attend school during the whole time for which such school shall be opened; but every such child is required to attend school for such part of the time, during which the school shall be opened as aforesaid, as the Board shall, under the circumstances, deem suited to the case; one hour in each day being the least time.

3.—Nothing in the present Bye-laws shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

4.—In addition to the reasonable excuses for non-attendance of a child at school, mentioned in the 74th section of the said Elementary Education Act, 1870, videlicet,—

(a.) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.

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(b.) That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.

It shall be a reasonable excuse for his or her non-attendance,

(c.) That there is no Public Elementary School open which such child can attend within two miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.

5.—Every parent who shall not observe, or who shall neglect or violate these Bye-laws, or any or either of them, shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding such a sum as with the costs, will amount to five shillings for each offence.

In case one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools shall certify that any child, being not less than ten years of age, has reached a standard of education which would enable it to pass an examination in the fourth standard of education mentioned in the Code of the Education Department in force at the date of such certificate, such child shall be totally exempt from the obligation to attend school, and any such child who has been certified to have reached a standard of education which would enable it to pass an examination in the third standard of education mentioned in the Code aforesaid, or who is shown to the satisfaction of the Board to be beneficially employed when not at school, shall be exempt from the obligation to attend school either for more than five mornings or three whole days in any one week.

4. A child shall not be required to attend school:—

- (a.) If such child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
- (b.) If such child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.
- (c.) If there is no Public Elementary School which such child can attend within two miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.

5. Provided always, that if and whenever the present Bye-laws, or any of them, shall be contrary to or inconsistent with the regulations affecting any child subject thereto contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour, the said regulations shall prevail, and the said Bye-laws shall affect such child only to such extent as they are consistent with the said regulations.

6. When the parent of any child residing in the district of the School Board satisfies the Board that he is unable from poverty to pay the whole or some part of the school fees of such child, the Board, in the case of a school provided by the Board, will remit, and in the case of any other Public Elementary School will pay, the whole or such part of the fees as, in the opinion of the Board, the parent is unable to pay, for a renewable period to be fixed by the Board, not exceeding six calendar months, provided that the Board do not hereby undertake to pay in any case more than three pence per week per child.

7. Any person committing a breach of these Bye-laws, or any of them, shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding two shillings and sixpence, provided that all breaches of these Bye-laws by a parent in one and the same week shall be deemed one offence, and that no penalty imposed for the breach of any Bye-laws shall exceed such a sum as with the costs will amount to five shillings for each offence.

8. All Bye-laws heretofore made by the School Board, under Section 74 of the Elementary Education Act, 1870, are hereby wholly revoked as from the day hereinafter specified in Bye-law 9.

9. These Bye-laws shall take effect from and after the day on which the same shall be sanctioned by Her Majesty by Order in Council.

2. The parent of every child residing within the school district of the township of Luddington, shall cause such child, not being less than five nor more than thirteen years of age, to attend a Public Elementary School, unless there is some reasonable excuse for non-attendance.

*Reasonable Excuses for Non-attendance.*

Any of the following reasons shall be a reasonable excuse, viz. :—

- (a.) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
- (b.) That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.
- (c.) That there is no Public Elementary School open which the child can attend within one and a half miles (measured according to the nearest road) from the residence of such child.
- (d.) That the child having attained the age of eleven years, has been certified by one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools to have passed the fifth standard of the New Code, 1871, of the Education Department, or can pass such standard of examination to the satisfaction of the Board, and any such child having attained the age of ten years, who has been so certified to have reached such a standard of education as would enable it to pass the fourth standard of the said Code, or can pass such standard to the satisfaction of the Board, shall be exempt from the obligation to attend more than one-half of the meetings of the school in any one week.

*As to Time of Attendance, &c.*

3. The time during which every child shall attend school shall (subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Acts, 1870, 1873, and of these Bye-laws) be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.

4. Nothing in the present Bye-laws
  - (1.) Shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance, or instruction or inspection in religious subjects ;
  - (2.) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his parent belongs ; or
  - (3.) Shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

*Penalty for Breach of Bye-laws.*

5. Any parent who shall commit a breach of any of these Bye-laws shall for every such offence, be subject to a penalty, including costs, not exceeding five shillings.

## BYE-LAWS OF THE BUXTON SCHOOL BOARD.

I.—*Interpretation of Terms.*

In these Bye-laws terms importing Males include Females.

The definition of terms contained in 3rd Section of the Elementary Education Act of 1870, shall apply to these Bye-laws.

The term school means either a Public Elementary School as defined by the Elementary Education Act, 1870, or any other school at which efficient elementary instruction is given.

The term "Board" or "School Board" means the School Board of the township of Buxton.

II.—*Requiring Parents to cause Children to attend School.*

The parent of every child of not less than five years nor more than thirteen years of age residing within the District of the School Board shall cause such child to attend school unless there be some reasonable excuse for non-attendance.

Any of the following reasons shall be deemed a reasonable excuse :—

- (a.) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
- (b.) That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause ; or any cause which by the School Board shall be deemed satisfactory.
- (c.) That there is no Public Elementary School open which the child can attend within three miles measured by the nearest road from the residence of such child.

III.—*Time of Attendance.*

The time during which children subject to these Bye-laws shall attend school shall be the whole time during which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of the same sex, age, and class ; provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance or instruction in religious subjects ; or shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his parent belongs.

IV.—*Remission of Fees.*

If the parent of any child satisfies the School Board that he is unable from poverty to pay the school fees of such child, the School Board will in the case of a school provided by the Board, remit the whole or such part of the school fees as

in the opinion of the Board, the parent is unable from poverty to pay for a renewable period to be fixed by the Board, not exceeding six calendar months.

*V.—Provision for Total or Partial Exemption from Attendance.*

Any child between ten and thirteen years of age who has been certified by one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools to have reached the fifth standard of education mentioned in the Government New Code of 1875, shall be totally exempt from the obligation to attend school; and any such child who has been so certified to have passed the third standard mentioned in the said Code shall, during the five months from the 1st day of May to the 30th day of September inclusive in each year, be exempt from the obligation to attend school more than ten hours in any one week on the written request of the parents.

**VI.**

Nothing in the present Bye-laws shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

*VII.—Penalty for Breach of Bye-laws.*

Every parent committing a breach of these Bye-laws or any of them, shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings with the costs for each offence; provided that all breaches of the Bye-laws committed by a parent in one and the same week shall be deemed one offence.

**BYE-LAWS OF THE SCHOOL BOARD FOR FELTHAM,  
IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX.**

KNOW all men by these presents that—

At a Meeting of the School Board for Feltham, in the county of Middlesex, duly convened and held at the National Schools, Feltham aforesaid, on Saturday, the 8th day of May, 1875, at which Meeting a quorum of the Members are present, the said Board, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers to them given by the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and subject to the approval of the Lords of the Committee of Council on Education, make and ordain the following Bye-laws:—

**1. In these Bye-laws**

Terms importing males include females.

The term "School," means either a Public Elementary School, or any other school at which efficient elementary instruction is given.

The term "Public Elementary School," means a school, or department of a school, at which elementary education is the principal part of the education given, and at which the ordinary payments, in respect of instruction, do not exceed nine pence a week, and which is conducted in accordance with the Regulations contained in the 7th section of the Elementary Education Act, 1870.

The term "Board" or "School Board," means the School Board for Feltham, in the county of Middlesex.

**2. The parent of every child of not less than five years, nor more than thirteen years of age, residing in the district of the School Board, is required to cause such child to attend school, unless there be some reasonable excuse for non-attendance. Any of the following reasons shall be a reasonable excuse; namely—**

- (1.) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
- (2.) That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.
- (3.) That there is no Public Elementary School open which the child can attend within three miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.

**3. Except as hereinafter provided, the time during which every such child is required to attend school is the whole time for which the school selected shall be opened for the instruction of children, not being less than twenty-five hours a week, except on Sundays, and except also that nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of every child from any religious observance or instruction in religious subjects, or shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his parent belongs.**

**4. (1.) A child of not less than ten years of age, who has obtained from one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools a certificate that he has reached a standard equivalent to the fourth standard of the Government New Code of 1875, shall be altogether exempt from obligation to attend school, and**

**(2.) A child of not less than ten years of age, who shows to the satisfaction of the Board that he is beneficially and necessarily at work, shall be exempt from the obligation to attend school during**

the whole time for which the school shall be opened as aforesaid, but every such child is required to attend school for at least ten hours in every week in which the school is opened as aforesaid, and in computing for the purposes of this section the time during which the child has attended any school there shall not be included any time during which such child has attended either

- (a.) In excess of three hours at any one time, or in excess of five hours in any one day, or  
(b.) On Sundays.

5. Provided always, that if and whenever Bye-laws 3 and 4, or either of them, shall be contrary to or inconsistent with the regulations affecting any child subject thereto, contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour, the said regulations shall prevail, and the said Bye-laws shall affect such child only to such extent as they are consistent with such regulations.

6. Every parent who shall not observe or shall neglect or violate these Bye-laws, or any of them, shall upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, including costs, for each offence.

7. If the parent of any child satisfies the Board that the reason that his child does not attend school is that he is unable, from poverty, to pay the school fees of such child, the Board will, at schools provided by the Board, remit the whole or such part of the school fees, as, in the opinion of the Board, the parent is unable to pay, for a renewable period, to be fixed by the Board, not exceeding six calendar months.

BYE-LAWS OF THE EYNESHAM SCHOOL BOARD.

AT a Meeting of the School Board of the Eynsham District, held at the Vicarage this 13th day of April, 1875, all the Members of the Board being present, the following Bye-laws are by the said Board made and ordained, in pursuance of the powers given under the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and subject to the approval of the Education Department:—

*Definition of Terms.*

1. The definition of all terms contained in the Elementary Education Act, 1870, shall be deemed to apply to these Bye-laws.

*Attendance at School and Exemptions therefrom.*

2. Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and of these Bye-laws, the parent of every child not less than five nor more than thirteen years of age, residing within the Eynsham School District, shall, in default of reasonable excuse, cause such child to attend an efficient Elementary School.

3. Any of the following shall be deemed a reasonable excuse:—

- (a). Efficient instruction of the child in some other manner.  
(b). Sickness or any unavoidable cause of absence.  
(c). There being no Public Elementary School within two miles, measured by the nearest road, from the child's residence.

4. Provided that if one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools shall certify that any child, between ten and thirteen years of age, has reached the fifth standard of education mentioned in the new Code of regulations of the Education Department of the 6th of Februrary, 1872, such child shall be totally exempt from obligation to attend school, and that any such child so certified to have reached the fourth standard mentioned in the said Code, shall be exempt from obligation to attend school more than 15 hours in any one week.

5. The time during which every child shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age; but no child shall be required to attend school, if withdrawn by the parent, on Sunday, Christmas Day, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Ascension Day, or on any day set apart for a day of Public Fast or Thanksgiving, or on a Saturday.

And nothing in the present Bye-laws

- (1) Shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance or instruction in religious subjects.  
(2) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his parent belongs, or  
(3) Shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

*Remission or Payment of School Fees.*

6. If the parent of any child residing within the district shall satisfy the School Board that he or she is unable, from poverty, to pay the school fees for

such child, the School Board shall, in the case of a school provided by the Board, remit, and, in the case of any other Public Elementary School, pay the whole or such part of the fees as, in the opinion of the Board, the parent is unable to pay, for a renewable period to be fixed by the Board, not exceeding six calendar months.

Provided that this Bye-law shall not apply in the case of any child between the ages of five and thirteen years, who is, or whose parent is, in receipt of relief out of the workhouse, given by the guardians, or by their order, by way of weekly or other continuing allowance.

*Penalty for Breach of Bye-laws.*

7. Any person offending against these Bye-laws shall for every such offence be subject to a penalty not exceeding five shillings inclusive of costs.

*Date at which these Bye-laws come into operation.*

8. These Bye-laws shall take effect on and after the day on which the same shall be sanctioned by Her Majesty, by Order in Council.

BYE-LAWS OF THE EAST STONEHOUSE SCHOOL  
BOARD.

THE School Board for the parish of East Stonehouse, at a Meeting held at the Public Office in the said parish, on the 18th day of August, 1875, in pursuance of the powers to them given by the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and subject to the approval of the Education Department, do hereby make and enact the following Bye-laws:—

*Interpretation of Terms.*

1. In these Bye-laws—

The term "Education Department" means the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education.

The term "Her Majesty's Inspectors" means the Inspectors of Schools appointed by Her Majesty on the recommendation of the Education Department.

The term "School Board" or "Board" means the School Board of the district comprising the parish of East Stonehouse.

The terms implying males include females, except where otherwise defined.

The term "School," or "Public Elementary School," means a Public Elementary School as defined by the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and includes a Free School, but not an Industrial School.

The term "Parent" includes Guardian and every person who is liable to maintain or has the actual custody of any child, but does not include the mother of a child when the father is living and residing within the district.

*Parents shall cause Children between Five and Thirteen years of Age to attend School.*

2. Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, 1870, and of these Bye-laws, the parent of every child residing within the parish of East Stonehouse, and not less than five nor more than thirteen years of age, shall cause such child to attend a Public Elementary School, unless there be some reasonable excuse for the non-attendance of such child.

*Reasonable Excuses.*

Any of the following shall be considered to be reasonable excuses:—

1. That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
2. That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.
3. That there is no Public Elementary School open which the child can attend within one mile, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.
4. That the child is employed in labour, and receiving instruction in conformity with any Act of Parliament for regulating the education of children employed in labour.
5. That the child, having attained the age of ten years, has reached a standard of education which would enable it to pass a public examination according to the fifth standard of the Code of Regulations of the Education Department for the time being in force, and has obtained a certificate to that effect from one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools.

The Board retains the power to exempt a child from attendance at school for such period as they may think fit, if illness in the family or other urgent reason shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Board to exist.

*Child to attend whole Time of Ordinary Instruction, except Religious Instruction, and on certain Holidays.*

3. Except as aforesaid, the time during which every child shall attend school shall be the whole time in which the ordinary instruction of the school is given; provided that nothing contained in these Bye-laws shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance or instruction in religious subjects, or shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set

apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the parent of such child belongs, or shall require the attendance at school of any child on such days as are set apart by the Managers of the school for inspection in religious subjects, or on any of the following days, namely,—On Sunday, Christmas Day, Good Friday, or any day set apart for a day of Public Fast or Thanksgiving, or on Saturday after twelve o'clock at noon; or shall be of any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

*Penalty for Breach of Bye-laws.*

4. Any person committing a breach of these Bye-laws, or of any of them, shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding two shilling and six pence for the first offence, and for every subsequent offence not exceeding five shillings, provided that all breaches of these Bye-laws by a parent in one and the same week, shall be deemed one offence; and that no penalty imposed for the breach of any Bye-law shall exceed such a sum as, with the costs, will amount to five shillings for each offence.

*Bye-laws to take Effect.*

5. These Bye-laws shall take effect from and after the day on which the same shall be sanctioned by Her Majesty by Order in Council.

BYE-LAWS OF THE SUTTON AND STONEFERRY  
(EXTRA-MUNICIPAL) SCHOOL BOARD.

1. In these Bye-laws the term "School," or "Public Elementary School," means a Public

Elementary School as defined by the Elementary Education Act, 1870.

The term "Board" means the School Board for Sutton and Stoneferry (Extra-Municipal).

The term "Parent" means a guardian, and every person who is liable to maintain or has the actual custody of any child.

Terms importing males include females.

2. The parent of every child not less than five years nor more than thirteen years of age, and residing in the School Board district, is required to cause such child to attend school, unless there be some reasonable excuse for non-attendance.

3. Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Acts, 1870, 1873, and of these Bye-laws, the time during which every such child is required to attend school is the whole time for which the school shall be opened for the instruction of children, provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child during the time or times in which any religious observance is practised, or instruction in religious subjects is given; or shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his parent belongs.

4. In addition to the reasonable excuses for non-attendance of a child at school, mentioned in the Elementary Education Act, 1870, viz. :—

(1) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.

(2) That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness, or any unavoidable cause.

It shall be

(3) A reasonable excuse for his non-attendance that there is no Public Elementary School open which such child can attend within two miles, measured according to the nearest road from the residence of such child.

5. A child of not less than ten years of age, who has obtained from one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools a certificate that he has reached a standard equivalent to the fifth standard of the Government Code in force at the date of such certificate, shall be altogether exempt from obligation to attend school.

6. A child of not less than ten years of age, who shows to the satisfaction of the Board that he is beneficially and necessarily at work, shall be exempt from the obligation to attend school during the whole time for which the school shall be open as aforesaid, but every such child is required to attend school for at least ten hours in every week in which the school is opened as aforesaid, and in computing for the purpose of this section the time during which a child has attended any school, there shall not be included any time during which such child has attended either—

(a.) In excess of three hours at any one time, or in excess of five hours on any one day or

(b.) On Sundays.

7. Nothing in the present Bye-laws shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

8. If the parent of any child satisfies the School Board that the reason that his child does not attend school is that he is unable from poverty to pay the school fees of such child, the School Board will, at a school provided by the Board, remit the whole or such part of the school fees as, in the opinion of the Board, the parent is unable to pay, for a renewable period to be fixed by the Board not exceeding six calendar months.

9. Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate these Bye-laws, or any of them, shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings including costs for each offence.

1. In these Bye-laws the term "School," or "Public Elementary School," means a Public Elementary School as defined by the Elementary Education Act, 1870.

The term "Board," or "School Board," means the School Board for the parish of Wollaston.

The word "Parent" means a parent as defined by the Elementary Education Act, 1870.

Words in the singular include words in the plural number, and words of the masculine include those of the feminine gender.

2. The parent of every child of not less than five nor more than thirteen years of age, residing within the parish of Wollaston, shall cause such child to attend school unless there be a reasonable excuse

for non-attendance. Any of the following reasons shall be a reasonable excuse, namely:—

- (a.) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
- (b.) That the child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause, or a cause that the School Board shall deem sufficient.
- (c.) That there is no Public Elementary School open which the child can attend, within three miles, measured according to the nearest road, from the residence of such child.

3. The time during which every such child shall attend school, shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age: Provided that nothing herein contained, shall prevent the withdrawal of any child from any religious observance or instruction in religious subject; or shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the parent of such child belongs.

4. In case one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools shall certify that any child between ten and thirteen years of age has reached the fourth standard of education, as prescribed by the Minutes of the Education Department for the time being in force, with respect to the Parliamentary Grant, such child shall be totally exempt from the obligation to attend school.

5. A child of not less than ten years of age, who shows to the satisfaction of the Board that he or she is beneficially and necessarily at work, shall not be under the obligation to attend school during the whole time for which the school shall be opened as aforesaid; but every such child is required to attend school for at least ten hours in every week in which the school is opened as aforesaid; and in computing for the purpose of this section the time during which a child has attended any school, there shall not be included any time during which such child has attended either:—

- (a.) In excess of three hours at any one time, or in excess of five hours in any one day, or
- (b.) On Sundays.

6. Nothing in the present Bye-laws shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

7. Every parent committing a breach of these Bye-laws or any of them, shall upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding, with the costs, 5s, for each offence: provided that all breaches of these Bye-laws by a parent in one and the same week shall be deemed to be one offence.

And whereas all the conditions in regard to the said Bye-laws, which are required to be fulfilled by the said Act, have been fulfilled, and the said Bye-laws have been submitted for the sanction of Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said Bye-laws (copy whereof is hereunto annexed) into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, and doth hereby declare, Her sanction of the same.

*Parish of Mold.*

BYE-LAWS OF THE MOLD SCHOOL BOARD.

*Recital of Election of School Board.*

WHEREAS in pursuance of a requisition sent by the Education Department to the Clerk of the Guardians of the Holywell Poor Law Union, in the county of Flint, a School Board for the District of the said parish of Mold, in the said county of Flint, was duly elected on the 19th day of December, 1874.

Now, at a Meeting of the School Board of the said parish of Mold, held at the County Hall, in Mold, in the said parish of Mold, on the 13th day of September, 1875, at which Meeting a quorum of the Members of such Board are present, the said Board do hereby, subject to the approval of the Education Department, make and ordain the following Bye-laws:—

*Interpretation of Terms.*

1. The term "Education Department" or "Department" means the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education.

The term "Her Majesty's Inspectors" means the Inspectors of Schools appointed by Her Majesty on the recommendation of the Education Department.

The term "Parish of Mold" or "Parish," means the parish of Mold, for which a separate poor rate is, or can for the time being be, made.

The term "School Board" or "Board," means the School Board for the District comprising the parish of Mold.

The term "School," or "Public Elementary School," means a Public Elementary School as defined by the 7th section of the Elementary Education Act, 1870.

The term "Parent" includes Guardian, and every person who is liable to maintain or has the actual custody of any child, but does not include the mother of a child when the father is living, and is residing within the parish or any adjoining parish or township.

*Requiring Parents to cause Children to Attend School.*

2. Subject to the provisions of the Elementary Education Acts, 1870 and 1873, and of these Bye-laws, the parent of every child not less than five years of age, nor more than thirteen years of age, residing within the district of the School Board,

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shall cause such child to attend school unless there be some reasonable excuse for non-attendance.

*Defining Reasonable Excuses for Non-Attendance.*

3. A child shall not be required to attend school:—

(a.) If such child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.

(b.) If such child has been prevented from attending school by sickness or any unavoidable cause.

(c.) If there is no Public Elementary School open which such child can attend within a reasonable distance measured according to the nearest road from the residence of such child, and the following scale of distances shall be held to be reasonable distances,

For children between five and seven years of age, 1½ miles.

For children between seven and nine years of age, 2 miles.

For children between nine and thirteen years of age, 3 miles.

*Determining Time during which Children shall attend School.*

4. The time during which every child shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age, provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the withdrawal of any child during the time or times in which any religious observance is practised, or instruction in religious subjects is given, and that no child shall be required—

(a.) To attend school any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which his or her parent belongs.

(b.) To attend school on Sunday, Christmas Day, or Good Friday, or any day set apart for a day of Public Fast or Thanksgiving, or on Saturday after twelve o'clock at noon,

(c.) To attend school on any day fixed for the inspection of the school, or the examination of the scholars therein, in respect of religious subjects.

*Proviso for Total or Partial Exemption from Attendance if Child has reached Certain Standard.*

5. In case one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools shall certify that any child between ten and thirteen years of age has reached the fifth standard of education mentioned in the New Code of Regulations of the Education Department, made on the 26th day of February, 1875, such child shall be totally exempt from the obligation to attend school, and any such child, who has been so certified to have reached the fourth standard of education mentioned in the said Code, shall be exempt from the obligation to attend school more than fifteen hours in any one week.

*Children employed in Labour.*

6. Nothing in the present Bye-laws shall have any force or effect in so far as it may be contrary to anything contained in any Act for regulating the education of children employed in labour.

*Penalty for Breach of Bye-laws.*

7. Any person committing a breach of these Bye-laws, or any of them, shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding two shillings and six pence, provided that all breaches of these Bye-laws by a parent in one and the same week, shall be deemed one offence, and that no penalty imposed for the breach of any Bye-law, shall exceed such a sum

as with the costs will amount to five shillings for each offence.

*Date on which Bye-laws shall come into Operation.*

8. These Bye-laws shall take effect from and after the day on which the same shall be sanctioned by Order in Council.

(1.) On all letters posted in the several countries and places mentioned or referred to in

the first column of the Schedule hereunder written and addressed to the respective countries and places mentioned or referred to in the second column of the said Schedule, and conveyed between the United Kingdom and Brazil, either direct by British Packet-boat or via France, and by French Packet-boat, the respective rates of postage shall be those specified in the third and fourth columns of the said Schedule.

On every newspaper either with or without a supplement or supplements posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Brazil, and transmitted direct by British Packet-boat, the rate of postage shall be the sum of one penny for every four ounces in weight, or any fractional part of four ounces over and above the first or any additional four ounces, or if such newspaper be transmitted via France and by French Packet-boat, the rate of postage thereof shall be the sum of two pence for every four ounces or fractional part of four ounces in weight thereof as aforesaid.
- (3.) On every book packet, and also on every pattern or sample packet posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Brazil and transmitted either direct by British Packet-boat, or via France and by French Packet-boat, the rate of postage shall be the sum of one penny for every two ounces in weight, or for any fractional part of two ounces over and above the first or any additional two ounces in weight thereof.
- (4.) The additional sum to be charged for the registration of any postal packet, hereinbefore mentioned, posted in the United Kingdom and addressed to Brazil shall be the sum of four pence, provided that all rates of postage chargeable on such packet, together with the said additional sum for the registration thereof, be fully prepaid.
2. All such postal packets as are hereinbefore mentioned, shall be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered under, and subject to, the several regulations, conditions, prohibitions, and restrictions applicable thereto respectively, and hereunder written, that is to say :

*General Regulations and Conditions.*

- (1.) There shall not be conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post any postal packet which shall contain either gold or silver money, any jewel or precious article, or any other article liable to Customs' duties, and any such packet shall, if posted, be detained and returned, or given up to the sender thereof.
- (2.) There shall not be conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post any newspaper, packet of newspapers, or book packet exceeding two pounds in weight, nor any pattern, or sample packet, exceeding one half of a pound in weight, and any such newspaper or packet shall, if posted, be detained and returned, or given up to the sender thereof.
- (3.) There shall not be conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post (unless by the special permission in any case, or class of cases, of the Postmaster-General) any postal packet, the dimensions of which shall exceed two feet in length, or one foot in breadth or depth, and any such packet shall, if posted, be detained and returned, or given up to the sender thereof.
- (4.) There shall not be conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post any postal packet which shall contain anything which might, by pressure or otherwise, be rendered injurious, either to the officers of the Post Office or to the contents of the mail bags, nor any book packet or pattern or sample packet which shall not be securely packed and guarded in such manner as to furnish complete protection against injury to the officers of the Post Office and to the contents of the mail bags, and any such packet shall, if posted, be detained and returned, or given up to the sender thereof.

- (5.) There shall not be conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book, or card, or any other indecent or obscene article, or any letter, newspaper, supplement, publication, packet, or card having thereon, or on the cover thereof, any words, marks or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character, and if anything shall be posted which shall *primâ facie* fall within the aforesaid prohibition, it shall be stopped and submitted at the General Post Office, in London, to the inspection of an officer duly authorised in that behalf by the Postmaster-General.
- (6.) The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he shall consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage made payable by any regulation contained in this Warrant.
- (7.) In this Warrant the expression "United Kingdom" means the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man.

*As to Newspapers.*

- (8.) The regulations and conditions made and prescribed by a Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, dated the twenty-seventh day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, shall in all respects apply to newspapers conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post, as mentioned and described in this Warrant.
- (9.) If any newspaper or package of newspapers be posted without the postage chargeable thereon being fully prepaid, it shall be detained and returned, or given up to the sender thereof.

*As to Book Packets.*

- (10.) In this Warrant the expression "book packet" shall mean and comprise not only books, but also all packets consisting of articles of the following kinds not being trade patterns or samples of merchandize, that is to say :—
- a. Paper or any other substance in ordinary use for writing or printing, whether such paper or other substance be plain or with anything (except a letter or communication in the nature of a letter) written, printed, or otherwise impressed thereon, and whether the same be in the form of books or in any other form.
  - b. Printed, engraved, or lithographed circulars, notwithstanding that such circulars may be letters or communications in the nature of a letter.
  - c. Photographs and other things of a like kind, when not on glass or in frames, containing glass or any brittle substance of a like kind.
  - d. Anything usually attached, or appurtenant to any of the before-mentioned articles, in the way of binding, mounting, or otherwise, and anything convenient for their safe transmission by post, which shall be contained in the same packet.
- (11.) Every book packet shall be posted either without a cover or in an open cover, and so that the same can be easily removed for the purpose of examination.
- (12.) No book packet shall be posted which shall contain anything sealed or otherwise

closed against inspection, or which shall contain any letter, or any communication in the nature of a letter, written on any part of the packet or the cover thereof (although the same may be open to inspection), or which shall contain any separate letter or communication in the nature of a letter, not being a circular within the meaning of these regulations; but any circular may bear the written signature and address of the sender, with his trade or profession and the date.

- (13.) If any book packet comprising printed papers, such as circulars, notices, and documents of a like kind be posted without the postage chargeable thereon being fully prepaid, it shall be detained and returned, or given up to the sender thereof.
- (14.) If any book packet comprising printed papers, such as circulars, notices, and documents of a like kind be sent by post otherwise than in conformity with the regulations hereinbefore contained, numbered respectively (10), (11), and (12), it shall be detained and returned, or given up to the sender thereof.
- (15.) If any book packet (except any packet comprising printed papers, such as circulars, notices, and documents of a like kind) be sent by post otherwise than in conformity with the regulations hereinbefore contained, numbered respectively (10), (11), and (12), it shall be dealt with and charged in all respects as an unpaid letter.

*As to Pattern and Sample Packets.*

- (16.) In this Warrant the expression "pattern or sample packet" shall comprise such articles only as consist wholly of trade patterns or samples of merchandize.
- (17.) No patterns or samples shall be of any intrinsic value, or consist of articles or things of a saleable nature, or having a value of their own apart from their mere use as patterns or samples.
- (18.) Patterns or samples shall, when practicable, be posted in covers open at both ends, and so that the same may be easily removed for the purpose of examination. Nevertheless, samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles as cannot be posted in open covers, may be posted enclosed in boxes, or in bags of linen or other material fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened so as to enable the officers of the Post Office readily to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.
- (19.) There shall be no writing upon any pattern or sample packet, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the name and the trade or profession of the sender thereof, a manufacturer's or trade mark or number, and the price of the articles, patterns or samples of which are contained therein, nor shall there be any writing or other thing enclosed in any such packet, except the name and the trade or profession of the sender thereof, a manufacturer's or trade mark or number, and the price of the articles, patterns, or samples of which are contained therein, and any such permitted writing in any such packet may be on labels attached to the patterns or samples.
- (20.) If there shall be posted any packet containing a pattern or sample of any intrinsic value, or of a saleable nature, or having a value of its own apart from its mere use as a pattern or sample, such packet shall be de-

tained and returned, or given up to the sender thereof.

- (21.) If any pattern or sample packet be sent by post otherwise than in conformity with the regulations hereinbefore contained, numbered respectively (18) and (19), it shall be dealt with and charged in all respects as an unpaid letter.

3. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five.

The application must be authenticated by the signature of the applicant, and his name should be affixed in the presence of the clergyman, or one of the churchwardens of the parish, or a Justice of the Peace; the applicant's address, with the name of the post town, must also be clearly stated. No personal application can receive attention.

Further lists will from time to time be published, and therefore it will facilitate the applicant's inquiries to give the number and date of the notice in which the deceased soldier's name appeared.—EFFECTS, 1873-4.
