

dividing the said parish of Carlton in Lindrick from the parish of Worksop aforesaid meets the boundary dividing the last-named parish from the new parish of Saint John Worksop in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence for a distance of about one mile and a quarter first south-westward and then southward along the last-described boundary (thereby following in part the course of the road leading from Blyth to Worksop and in part the course of Kilton-lane) to the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Manchester Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway over the last-named lane and extending thence south-eastward for a distance of nearly one mile along the middle of the said line of railway to the boundary which divides the townships of Worksop and Radford in the said parish of Worksop from the townships of Osberton, Scotton and Rayton in the same parish and extending thence first southward then north-eastward then south-eastward and then again north-eastward along the said township boundary for a distance of about three and a half miles to the point on the western side of the road commonly called or known as the Blyth-road which leads from Ollerton to Blyth at which point such township boundary joins the boundary which divides the said parish of Worksop from the parish of Babworth aforesaid and extending thence northward for a distance of about one mile and a half along the last-described boundary (thereby following for the most part the course of the last-described road) to a point in the middle of the Chesterfield Canal and extending thence that is from the said parish boundary for a distance of nearly half a mile first south-eastward then northward and then north-westward along the middle of the said canal to a point on the south-western side of the bridge which carries the road commonly called or known as the Blyth-road which leads from Ollerton to Blyth as aforesaid over the same canal and extending thence north-westward for a distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts along the south-western side of the last mentioned road to the boundary which divides the said parish of Babworth from the parish of Worksop as aforesaid and extending thence northward for a distance of about one mile and three quarters along the last described boundary and along the boundary which divides the said parish of Babworth from the parish of Blyth aforesaid (thereby continuing to follow the course of the road commonly called or known as the Blyth-road which leads from Ollerton to Blyth as aforesaid) to the point at the south-eastern angle of Law Hill Wood where the last mentioned boundary is joined by the boundary which divides the township or district of Bilby in the said parish of Blyth from the township or lordship of Hodsock in the same parish and extending thence westward for a distance of half a mile or thereabouts along the last mentioned boundary to a point in the middle of the River Ryton and extending thence for a distance of about one mile and a half first north-westward then northward and then again north-westward along the middle of the said river to the centre of the bridge called or known as Hodsock Dyke Bridge which carries the road leading from Blyth to Worksop as aforesaid over the same river and extending thence south-westward for a distance of about two miles and three quarters along the middle of the last mentioned road (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said parish of Blyth from the parish of Carlton in Lindrick aforesaid) to the first described point where the said last mentioned road is joined by Thieves Dale-lane and by Forest-lane as aforesaid

and where the boundary which divides the said parish of Carlton in Lindrick from the parish of Worksop aforesaid meets the boundary dividing the last named parish from the new parish of Saint John Worksop aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced All which territory so comprised within and bounded by the imaginary line above described is to a great extent though not altogether conterminous with the tract of land commonly called or known as the Osberton Estate."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul situate within the limits of the township of Helsby in the parish of Frodsham in the county of Chester and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul situate within the limits of the township of Helsby as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Frodsham which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the limits of the said township of Helsby all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Paul situate
