The Queen, taking into Her Royal consideration, that upon the decease of Richard Pigot, Viscount Molesworth, in that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, unmarried, on the 20th day of June last, the title and dignity of Viscount Molesworth devolved upon his nephew and heir male, Samuel Molesworth, Clerk, now Viscount Molesworth, as the only surviving son and heir of John Molesworth, Esquire, Captain in the Royal Navy, deceased, who at the time of his death was the next surviving brother of the said Richard Pigot, Viscount Molesworth, and that according to the ordinary rules of honour the sisters of the said Samuel, Viscount Molesworth, cannot enjoy that place and precedence which would have been due to them had their father, the said John Molesworth, survived his said elder brother, Richard Pigot, Viscount Molesworth, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Viscount Molesworth, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Margaret Letitia, wife of Charles Richard de Havilland, Clerk, Master of Arts, and Mary Louisa Molesworth, Spinster, the sisters of the said Samuel, now Viscount Molesworth, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, place, pre-eminence, and precedence as if their late father, the said John Molesworth, had survived his brother, the said Richard Pigot, Viscount Molesworth, and had thereby succeeded to the dignity of Viscount Molesworth:

And to command that the said Royal order and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

By virtue of an Act passed in the twenty-fourth year of the reign of His Majesty, King George III, intituled "An Act to repeal so much of two Acts, made in the tenth and fifteenth years of the reign of His present Majesty, as authorizes the Speaker of the House of Commons to issue his Warrant to the Clerk of the Crown for making out writs for the election of Members to serve in Parliament, in the manner therein mentioned, and for substituting other provisions for the like purposes;" and of an Act passed in the twenty-sixth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled an "An Act to further limit and define the time for proceeding to Election during the Recess:"
