PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE LEVEE AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the

cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

ADDRESSES.

War Office, February 29, 1876.

THE following Despatches and Enclosures have been received at the War Office from the Major-General Commanding Her Majesty's Forces in China and the Straits Settlements:—

Camp Srimananti,

SIR, December 25, 1875.

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of Major-General Colborne, C.B., that I left Terrachee at 10 A.M. yesterday, having previously detailed a party of the same strength as detailed in my report of 24th instant, under Lieutenant-Colonel Hill, of my regiment. I passed Parit about 10.30, and halted there for some little time, the guides' information being so conflicting; at last I determined on marching through the hills as instructed by the Lieutenant-Governor of Penang, and arrived within sight of Srimananti at 4 P.M.

I discovered several of the Malays running away, and one shot was fired on our advance guard, who immediately replied and they knocked over one man.

My attention was then called to what appeared to be a strong redoubt on a small hill, I detached a party under Captain Channer and another under Captain Rankin to take the enemy in flank, while with the guns and part of the 10th Foot, I tried to find a range for the guns; this was difficult as it was all rice swamp in front.

I then proceeded along the side, covered by the jungle, and soon found myself in rear of the earth-work. I sent to warn Captains Rankin and Channer of my position and to keep out of the line of fire. I expended five rounds and sounded the advance. Two men had been observed on the position, but when the Goorkhas charged it there were none; I bivouacked for the night.

2. To-day I took possession of the enemy's guns, &c., numbering six, two that were burst already, and a lot of small arms, powder, &c.

3. Lieutenant-Colonel Hill reports that he "started from Terrachee on the 24th, at 9.30 A.M., and perceived the Malays on the hills, detached a

flanking party to them, and about sixty of the enemy retired over the hills. Fired two 24-pounder rockets at them. Proceeded at 11.15 A.M., burning Gumatie on the way; arrived at Dato Moar's house at 1.15 noon, which he skirmished up to with the Goorkhas; a few shots were fired at the Malays, and they ran away; halted at Dato Moars for the night, distance from Terrachee about six miles, and on 25th December (to-day) I started at 7.30 A.M., arriving and forming a junction with Lieutenant-Colonel Clay; no opposition, and several Malays came in with white flags to sue for peace."

Camp Terrachee,

December 24, 1875.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of Major-General Colborne, C.B., that I marched the whole force under my command from Rassa on the 18th instant, having previously detached the columns, as per margin*, under command of Lieutenant-Colonel Clay, and Lieutenant-Colonel Hill.

2. Lieutenant-Colonel Hill with his party marched as far as Datu Klana's house, distant from Rassa three miles; there the road branched off to Pantay; he halted that night and proceeded the next morning. A copy of his report is annexed.

3. I was detained the whole of that day at Datu Sultan's house (distant from Rassa 3½ miles) for want of coolies, and here I may mention that is the only difficulty I have experienced throughout during the whole of these arrangements, although I have been most ably assisted by Captain Murray, "Rassa," and by Mr. Kinnersly; but I am of opinion that had a properly organized transport corps been formed, all would have worked smoothly.

4. On the 20th I marched from Datu Sultan's to the foot of the Bukit Putas Pass, and the same afternoon I detailed a party of 50 men under Captain Channer as a reconnoitring party, Lieutenant North, Royal Engineers, accompanying.

After a delay of three hours Captain Channer wrote to me, that from the density of the jungle it was impossible to discover the correct position of the stockade; I then directed him to proceed as close as possible to the stockade as he could, and ascertain as to its whereabouts, and report if a range could be found for my guns and rockets. About five o'clock I heard some smart firing opened from where Captain Channer's party should be. I at once ordered the detachment, 10th Regiment, accompanied by Lieutenants Hinxman and Peyton, to fall in, and proceeded myself at their head up the pass, to within 40 yards of the stockade; but I found the road

so blocked up by felled trees and bamboo brush-wood that it was impenetrable. Here I must say that the party for a few moments were thrown into confusion by the Arah contingent firing a volley in our rear. I went back and enquired the cause, and learnt that they had not fired into the 10th, but into a party of Goorkhas who were above them, on the left; I then turned up to the left, up a very steep side of the hill, where I found the party of Goorkhas in support of Captain Channer's detachment, and found Captain Channer and his party had taken one stockade, and opened fire on others a little below them: copy of Captain Channer's report is annexed. Here I must mention the gallant conduct of Captain Channer: he proceeded cautiously with a party of 25 Goorkhas, as if he were on a sporting expedition; he advanced himself to within a few yards of the stockade, the enemy had kept no look out, they were cooking at the time, Captain Channer seized the opportunity, and followed immediately by two men named in the margin,* was the first to jump into the stockade; he found it occupied by 25 or 30 men: the first man Captain Channer, shot dead with his revolver, and the two Goorkhas each shot his man, they were soon followed by the rest of Captain Channer's party; having expelled the Malays, Captain Channer opened a smart fire on the other two (2) stockades, and soon emptied them. In this affair 6 were killed in the stockade, and doubtless some were wounded from that and the other stockades, but the Malays always carry off their dead and wounded (if they have time), but they must have suffered, as proved by the track of blood left behind.

All this was not accomplished without some small loss on our side; and I have to report the death of Nague Bukit Sing Raie, and Sepoy Duljeet Thappa dangerously wounded in the neck, and two sepoy wounded in the foot by native ranjons.

Of Captain Channer's gallantry, coolness, and intrepidity I cannot sufficiently express my approval; and a separate report will be submitted for the favourable consideration of Major-General Colborne, C.B. The conduct of his men was equally good; and I trust the Major-General may be urged to express his approval of their behaviour.

By the taking of these stockades most serious obstacles have been overcome, and great saving of life.

5. 21st December, 1875.—Marched to Bandole, distance $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles, which was reported to be strongly stockaded. Coming out of the pass. I burnt two stockades, evidently just erected, but spared houses that were not fortified, or where no offensive weapons were found.

6. 23rd December, 1875. Terrachee, distant 7 miles, crossing a stream several times through rice cultivation and swamp, effected a junction with Lieutenant-Colonel Hill's party all well.

7. In conclusion I must record my thanks to all officers and men for the cheerful and willing manner all have worked, being half rationed part of the time and wet through every day. To the 1st Goorkhas specially my thanks are due, for having borne the brunt of the hard work.

To Lieutenant-Colonel Hill and his party my earnest thanks are due, for although they met with no active opposition, still they were not to be deterred, and made a flank march via Pantay, under most unfavourable circumstances, meeting with the Moar River (which they crossed seventeen times), swamps, and the most dense jungle, there

is but little doubt that their march has had a good moral effect.

8. I forgot to mention that Captain Channer took an iron gun, about a 4-pounder, in the stockade which he attacked.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report that in accordance with orders received I started from the Datu Klana's house near Rassa, on 19th December, at 10.30 a.m., with instructions to make a flank march on Tertutchie, via Pantay, with a force as per margin.*

1. The force reached a small mountain stream called Sunjie Ramie (leaving Pantay on the left), the last water on this side of the range at 2.50 p.m., about seven miles, a fair jungle track with several streams to cross, made a clearing in the wood to encamp, rear guard arriving at 5 p.m.

On 20th started at 9 A.M., crossed the dividing range about 140 feet above level of sea, arriving at Moar River flowing east at 3 p.m.—distance about 7 miles; very bad jungle track; rear guard arriving at 6 o'clock.

On 21st started at 7.30 A.M., made 5 miles, arriving valley Teratchie; crossing and re-crossing Moar River, an almost imperceptible jungle track. At 10 A.M. found a steep hill obstructed with felled trees, the bed of the Moar River being staked with ranjons; with great difficulty and labour circumvented these difficulties; at 12 noon came across a stockade or kubo, skirmished up to it, taking it in rear with the Goorkhas, and bringing the 7-pounder gun to bear upon it a few Malays occupied the place but evacuated without firing a shot; entered the Teratchie valley at 3 p.m., several of the enemy retreating eastward toward Sriminanti, where I am informed there are two stockades; cleared the valley and force took up position for night, before doing so I sent out a force under Captain Stirling, R.N., to reconnoitre towards Bukit Putas, and cut off the enemy who were said to be retreating, but he was unable to interrupt them as they took to the jungle on the hills bounding valley.

On 22nd formed junction with column under Colonel Clay, marching out at 7 a.m., returning to position at 10 a.m.

2. I have the honour to state that the conduct of the troops under my command was most excellent under circumstances the most trying any force could have encountered, progressing through an almost imperceptible jungle track over high hills, crossing and recrossing mountain streams and swampy dense forest under torrents of rain, and having every night to clear dense jungle to enable the troops to bivouac.

3. I am indebted to Mr. Daly, Survey Department, for information regarding distances noted by him at the time.

The march would have been impossible without the intelligence obtained from Malay scouts by

Captain Murray, Resident at Rassa, who accompanied the force, and to this officer's indefatigable exertions with regard to the Chinese coolies who formed our transport, and one of our greatest difficulties, we are entirely indebted for the success of this harassing march. To Captain Stirling and officers R.N., Captain Mercer, Goorkhas, and Lieutenant Henriques, R.A., I owe hearty thanks for their assistance and aid rendered to me at all times.

Camp, Terrachee,
December 22, 1875.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report that agreeably to orders received on 20th December, 1875, from officer commanding Malacca column, I reconnoitred the ground towards Bukit Pass, with the view of ascertaining the practicability of a good position for guns and the situation of enemy's stockades. I was accompanied by Lieutenant North, R.E., and A Company 1st Goorkhas, numbering fifty rank and file. I started from Camp, Dato Pando, at 10 A.M., and after proceeding a mile towards pass turned up to left and proceeded up a mountain side and along ridge through dense tree jungle for three miles; as the guides with me evidently knew nothing of the position of the enemy I returned and then proceeded straight up towards the pass. At 4 P.M. after marching a mile along the bed of a torrent, I found the road completely blocked up by felled trees; I threw out flanking parties, and leaving a rear guard with Lieutenant North to cut through the tree jungle, I saw one of the enemy's log stockades, a palisade enclosed it, and the ground was covered with ranjons (crows' feet of sharp bamboos) I jumped over and heard the Malays talking inside, and taking the opportunity of their careless look out, I rushed in with two or three men, and took the stockade, which was held by 25 or 30 Malays: a fire was at once opened on me from a lower stockade 80 yards off, and from one on my right 160 yards across the pass; getting the men under cover, I kept up a steady fire on both stockades. The enemy, after half an hour's firing, evacuated the lower stockade, and shortly afterwards the one on the right. Reinforcements from camp and my rear guard came up at sunset, when the lower stockade was occupied (the enemy lost five killed), four in the first stockade taken. Of the first Goorkhas, one Naick was killed, and one Sepoy severely wounded, two others slightly with ranjons; it was impossible to ascertain the number of the enemy killed or wounded in the other stockades.

The stockades were strongly built of logs, loop-holed, and the jungle between each was almost impassable. All these commanded the entrance to the pass. I have to thank Lieutenant North, R.E., for the assistance he afforded throughout. The Goorkhas behaved steadily and well.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twentieth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty chapter forty-nine, of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Margaret situate at Birmingham within the limits of the new parish of Saint John Ladywood Birmingham in the county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Margaret situate at Birmingham as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint John Ladywood, Birmingham which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Margaret situate at Birmingham as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Margaret Birmingham.'

"And with the like consent of the said Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages baptisms churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Margaret situate at Birmingham as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend John Leech Porter the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John Ladywood, Birmingham, shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization, or performance at the said church of Saint Margaret situate at Birmingham as aforesaid shall be paid over to the said John Leech Porter and

provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Margaret, Birmingham, being :—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint John Ladywood, Birmingham, in the county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester, which is bounded on the north-east partly by the new parish of Saint Mark Birmingham and partly by the new parish of Saint Barnabas Birmingham on the south-east by the last-named new parish on the south-west by the particular district of Saint George Edgbaston all in the county and diocese aforesaid, and on the remaining side that is to say, on the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of Saint George Edgbaston from the new parish of Saint John Ladywood Birmingham aforesaid at the point where Ladywood-road is joined by Saint Vincent-street, and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of two hundred and thirty-seven yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with Johnston-street, and extending thence north-westward for a distance of one hundred and thirty-eight yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street to its intersection by Alstone-street and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of two hundred and two yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street to its junction at Saint Margaret's Church with Great Tindal-street and with Ledsam-street and extending thence eastward for a distance of fifteen yards or thereabouts along the middle of Great Tindal-street aforesaid to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. M. D. C. 1875, No. 1' and placed at the southern end of the wall which forms the western boundary of the premises called or known as the Victoria Works and now in the occupation of Thomas Chatwin of Birmingham Tool Manufacturer, and extending thence northward to the said boundary stone and continuing thence still northward for a distance of one hundred and twenty-four yards or thereabouts along the said wall to another boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. M. D. C. 1875, No. 2,' and placed at the northern end of the same wall upon the southern side of the towing path on the southern side of the Birmingham and Wolverhampton Canal and continuing thence still in the same direction and in a straight line to the boundary in the middle of the said canal which divides the said new parish of Saint John Ladywood, Birmingham from the new parish of Saint Mark Birmingham aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts ; and

Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Worcester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twentieth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, in the words following, that is to say ;

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter thirty-nine have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the church and cure (which said church and cure are hereinafter called the said benefice) of Saint Paul in the borough and town of Bedford in the county of Bedford and in the diocese of Ely.

"Whereas the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Saint Paul, Bedford, is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession in the Venerable Frederick Bathurst, Clerk in Holy Orders Archdeacon of the Archdeaconry of Bedford and vicar of the parish of Biggleswade in the said county of Bedford, and his heirs and assigns.

"And whereas the said Frederick Bathurst is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Saint Paul, Bedford, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop of the said diocese of Ely for the time being or other the Bishop of the diocese within which the said benefice of Saint Paul, Bedford may from time to time be situate.
