The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, in pursuance of the provisions contained in the fourth and eighth sections of the twenty-first and twenty-second Victoria, chapter ninety, to appoint Joseph Lister, Esquire, F.R.S., Regius Professor of Clinical Surgery in the University of Edinburgh, to be, for five years, a Member for Scotland, of the General Council of Medical Education and Registration in the United Kingdom, in the place of Dr. James Warburton Begbie, deceased.

AT the Court at *Windsor*, the 24th day of *March*, 1876.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the bishop of any

diocese shall represent to the said archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such archbishop, or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Lincoln hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words and figures following that is to say:—

"To the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend Christopher Lord Bishop of Lincoln do hereby represent to your Grace—

"That there is in the county of Nottingham and my diocese of Lincoln the vicarage and parish church of Littleborough.

"That the population of the said parish of Littleborough according to the census of 1871 amounts to 70 persons.

"That there is one church in the said parish of Littleborough affording accommodation for 63 persons or thereabouts.

"That the annual value of the said vicarage of Littleborough amounts to £105, arising from glebe lands, rent-charge, grant from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and grant from Queen Anne's Bounty.

"That the said vicarage of Littleborough is in the patronage of Francis John Savile Foljambe of Osberton in the said county Esquire M.P.

"That there is in the said county and diocese the vicarage and parish church of South Leverton with Cottam Chapelry.

"That the population of the parish of South Leverton exclusive of the hamlet of Cottam according to the census of 1871 amounts to 488 persons.

"That the population of Cottam according to the same census amounts to 90 persons.

"That there are two churches in the parish of South Leverton one being situated in the middle of the village of South Leverton affording accommodation for 355 persons or thereabouts and another situated in the middle of the village of Cottam and usually called Cottam Church affording accommodation for 77 persons or thereabouts and distant from the church of South Leverton  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

"That for all ecclesiastical purposes there is no legal distinction or boundary between the parishes of South Leverton and Cottam the whole forming one parish.

"That by usage the village of Cottam with a certain portion of land adjoining or in the neighbourhood has become a separate and distinct parish for all civil purposes electing its own churchwardens overseers of the poor and other parish officers and the inhabitants resort to the said church or chapel of Cottam exclusively for public worship and for baptisms churchings marriages and burials of their dead which have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized and performed therein although the said church or chapel of Cottam with the burial ground in which it stands is not within the boundary of the said civil parish of Cottam.

"That the said church or chapel of Cottam is distant from the aforesaid church of Littleborough  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

"That the annual value of the said vicarage of South Leverton with Cottam is £310 arising from glebe land rent-charge surplice fees and grant from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

"That the said vicarage of South Leverton with Cottam is in my patronage by virtue of my bishopric.

"That there is in the said county and diocese the vicarage and parish church of North Leverton with the perpetual curacy of Apesthorne annexed.

"That the population of the said parish of North Leverton with Apesthorne according to the census of 1871 amounts to 397 persons.

"That there is one church in the said parish of North Leverton with Apesthorne affording accommodation for 183 persons or thereabouts.

"That the annual value of the said vicarage of North Leverton with the perpetual curacy of Apesthorne amounts to £300 arising from glebe land rent-charge and grant from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

"That the said vicarage of North Leverton with Apesthorne is in the patronage of the Lord Bishop of Manchester by virtue of his bishopric.

"That a portion of the said parish of North Leverton with Apesthorne consisting of four houses containing a population of about 20 persons is situated at a distance of  $2\frac{1}{4}$  miles from the church of North Leverton aforesaid three quarters of a mile from the church or chapel of Cottam aforesaid and three quarters of a mile from the church of Littleborough aforesaid.

"That the inhabitants of the said four houses usually resort to the church or chapel of Cottam for public worship and for baptisms and churchings and have occasionally buried their dead in the burial ground belonging to the said church or chapel.

"That there is in the said county and diocese the rectory and parish church of Treswell.

"That the population of the said parish of Treswell according to the census of 1871 amounts to 266 persons.

"That there is one church in the said parish of Treswell affording accommodation for 196 persons or thereabouts.

"That the annual value of the said rectory of Treswell amounts to £350 arising from tithes glebe land and Three per cent. Consols.

"That the said rectory of Treswell is in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of York.

"That a portion of the said parish of Treswell consisting of six houses containing a population of about 30 persons is situated at a distance of  $2\frac{1}{4}$  miles from the church of Treswell aforesaid.

"That the said six houses of the parish of Treswell are within quarter of a mile of the church or chapel of Cottam aforesaid and very closely adjoining the village of Cottam and that the inhabitants of the said six houses usually resort to Cottam church for public worship and for baptisms and churchings and have frequently buried their dead in the burial ground belonging to the said church.

"That it appears to me that a portion of the parish of South Leverton with Cottam including the village of Cottam and the church or chapel of Cottam with the burial ground thereto belonging as shown upon the plan hereunto appended the said portion of the said parish being coloured round with brown and the main portion of the said parish being coloured round with blue may under the provisions of the Act of the first and second years of Her present Majesty c. 106 be advantageously separated from the said parish and parish church of South Leverton and that the portion before referred to of the said parish of North Leverton with Apesthorne which is shown upon the plan aforesaid by a yellow colour the main portion of the said parish of North Leverton with Apesthorne being coloured round with pink may under the provisions of the same Act be advantageously separated from the said parish and parish church of North Leverton and that the portion before referred to of the said parish of Treswell which is shown upon the same plan by a violet colour the main portion of the said parish being coloured round with pink may under the provisions of the same Act be advantageously separated from the said parish and parish church of Treswell and that the three portions so proposed to be separated may be together annexed and united to the aforesaid parish of Littleborough so as to form together a separate and distinct parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That upon such separation and union being effected the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England are prepared to make to the said vicarage of Littleborough a grant of £50 per annum to meet a benefaction from other sources of £600 and 12a. 3r. 36p. of land proposed to be separated from the endowments of the said vicarage of

South Leverton and annexed to the endowments of the said benefice of Littleborough such land being of the present annual value of £30 or thereabouts.

"That in view of the scheme hereby proposed the said sum of £600 has been paid to the account of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the 26th section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consent in writing of me the said Christopher Lord Bishop of Lincoln the patron in right of my said bishopric of the said vicarage of South Leverton with Cottam and of the Reverend Edward Cayley Clerk the vicar of the said vicarage of South Leverton with Cottam and of Francis John Savile Foljambe of Osberton Manor in the said county Esquire M.P. the patron and the Reverend Isaac Williams the vicar of the said vicarage of Littleborough and of the Lord Bishop of Manchester in right of his bishopric the patron and the Reverend Thomas Tickell the vicar of the said vicarage of North Leverton with Apesthorpe and of the Dean and Chapter of York the patrons and the Reverend Henry Townley Daniel the rector of the said rectory of Treswell to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the scheme certify the same and such consents to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the scheme and consents in the said representation are in the words and figures following:—

*"Scheme.*

"That the portion of the said parish of South Leverton with Cottam including the village of Cottam with the church or chapel and the burial ground of Cottam which is shown in the plan hereto annexed by the colour brown be separated from the said vicarage and parish church of South Leverton.

"That the portion of the parish of North Leverton with Apesthorpe which is shown in the plan by the colour yellow be separated from the said vicarage and parish church of North Leverton with Apesthorpe.

"That the portion of the parish of Treswell which is shown on the said plan by the colour violet be separated from the said rectory and parish church of Treswell.

"That the three portions of the parishes of North Leverton with Apesthorpe of South Leverton with Cottam and of Treswell so to be separated be together annexed and united to the aforesaid parish of Littleborough so as to form together a separate and distinct parish or benefice for ecclesiastical purposes by the name or style of the vicarage of Littleborough with Cottam.

"That the vicar of Littleborough shall have exclusive cure of the souls within the limits of the said proposed parish and benefice.

"That the baptisms churchings marriages and burials in respect of the inhabitants of the said portions of the parishes of North Leverton with Apesthorpe South Leverton with Cottam and Treswell so to be annexed to the parish of Littleborough shall be performed and celebrated and shall take place in the church or chapel of

Cottam and that the fees for all such and other ecclesiastical offices and all ecclesiastical dues and offerings arising from or in respect of the said portions of the said parishes and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong and be paid to the incumbent of the said parish and benefice of Littleborough with Cottam.

"That the inhabitants of the same portions of the said parishes of North Leverton with Apesthorpe of South Leverton with Cottam and of Treswell shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish churches of North Leverton South Leverton and Treswell respectively or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said parishes but shall be liable subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act 1868' to repair the said church or chapel of Cottam and to maintain the fence of the burial ground thereof.

"That the said inhabitants of the said portions of North Leverton with Apesthorpe of South Leverton with Cottam and Treswell shall be entitled to resort to and attend the said church or chapel of Cottam as their parish church and to be accommodated with sittings therein but shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the parish churches of North Leverton South Leverton and Treswell or Littleborough.

"That the inhabitants of the said portions of North Leverton with Apesthorpe of South Leverton with Cottam and Treswell shall be entitled to elect their own churchwarden for the said church or chapel of Cottam.

"That all that close or parcel of pasture land situate and being in the parish of South Leverton being part of the glebe land heretofore belonging to the vicarage of South Leverton and commonly called or known by the name of the Marsh and Horse Pasture and numbered 370 on the parish map annexed to the award made on the enclosure of the said parish containing 12A. 3R. 36P. or thereabouts and now in the occupation of William Fairbanks as tenant thereof shall henceforth be transferred to and be and become the property of the vicar of Littleborough with Cottam and his successors for ever.

"That notwithstanding the separation from the parish and benefices of North Leverton with Apesthorpe of the aforesaid portion thereof the annual payment or sum of £30 under the will of Elizabeth Palmer bearing date the 4th day of August 1726 and which payment is charged upon all her messuages lands tenements and hereditaments in the town and precincts of Coates in the parish of North Leverton and Applethorpe in the county of Nottingham as by the said will more fully appears shall continue to belong exclusively to the vicar of North Leverton with Apesthorpe and his successors and also the right of distribution of the sum of £20 among the poorest widows and orphans in Coates under the same will shall continue to belong to the vicar and churchwardens of North Leverton and Apesthorpe and their successors.

"And that in all other respects the lands revenues incomes and endowments of the said several benefices shall henceforth remain continue and be as they now are the several and respective endowments attached and belonging to the several and respective benefices aforesaid except surplice fees as aforesaid and the aforesaid 12A. 3R. 36P. of land so to be separated from the endowments of the said vicarage of South Leverton and annexed to those of the said benefice of Littleborough as aforesaid.

"That nothing herein contained shall affect or be construed to affect the rights of patronage to either of the said benefices of South Leverton

North Leverton and Treswell but that the same shall remain continue and be as they are now.

"That the patronage of the said proposed parish or benefice of Littleborough with Cottam shall be vested in Francis John Savile Foljambe of Osberton Manor in the county of Nottingham Esquire M.P. and his heirs and assigns for ever.

"Given under my hand this twenty-sixth day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five.

"I the Right Reverend Christopher Lord Bishop of Lincoln in right of my bishopric the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of South Leverton with Cottam in case the same were now vacant I the Reverend Edward Cayley the vicar of the said vicarage of South Leverton with Cottam I Francis John Savile Foljambe of Osberton Manor in the county of Nottingham, Esquire M.P. the patron entitled to present to the vicarage of Littleborough in case the same were now vacant I the Reverend Isaac Williams the vicar of the said vicarage of Littleborough I the Right Reverend James Lord Bishop of Manchester in right of my bishopric the patron entitled to present to the vicarage of North Leverton with Apesthorpe in case the same were now vacant I the Reverend Thomas Tickell the vicar of the said vicarage of North Leverton with Apesthorpe we the very Reverend the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of St. Peter of York the patrons entitled to present to the rectory of Treswell in case the same were now vacant I the Reverend Henry Townley Daniel the rector of the said rectory of Treswell do hereby severally and respectively signify our consent to the scheme above proposed and to every matter and thing therein contained.

Witness our hands and the seal of the said Dean and Chapter of York the twenty-sixth day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five.

And whereas the said Lord Bishop hath transmitted the said scheme to the said Lord Archbishop together with the said consents.

And whereas the said Lord Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme hath certified the same and such consents as aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council by his report in writing dated the twenty-sixth day of November one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five to the intent that Her Majesty in Council might in case Her Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make an order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered that the said scheme be carried into effect.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish: And whereas by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas by Orders in Council, bearing date the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and the fourteenth of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, burials were directed to be discontinued in the churchyard of, and in other places in, the parish of Leamington, as set forth in the said Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the

said Orders be varied to the extent hereinafter specified in respect of burials in Leamington :

And whereas the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the modifications hereinafter specified :

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fifth day of February last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twentieth day of March one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows, viz. :—

**ST. PAUL'S, PUDSEY, CALVERLEY.**—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of St. Paul's, Pudsey; and that in the churchyard the Official Regulations for new Burial Grounds, omitting the third, be observed.

**CLEE.**—In the parish churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, except in now existing vaults, and walled graves in which each coffin shall be enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented; and except in earthen graves to be used only for the burial of the parents, widows, or widowers, of those previously buried in the churchyard.

**LEES, ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE.**—In St. John the Baptist's churchyard, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, except in now existing vaults and walled graves which are free from water, and that each coffin buried in such vaults and walled graves shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and in the additional churchyard of St. John the Baptist, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, with the like exception, and except also in earthen graves in which no coffin shall be buried within a foot of any other coffin or less than four feet below the surface of the ground.

**LEAMINGTON.**—Forthwith in the additional churchyard, in New-street, Leamington, except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed.

That the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in respect of interments in the burial-ground of Spencer-street Chapel, Leamington be varied as follows: That burials shall be forthwith discontinued in Spencer-street Chapel, Leamington, and in

the burial-ground thereof except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed.

That the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the fourteenth of January one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, in respect of interments in the old cemetery or additional churchyard of Leamington be varied by the addition of the following words; no earthen graves to be re-opened except to bury other members of the families of those already buried therein.

That the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in respect of interments in the burial-grounds of the Roman Catholic, Lady Huntingdon, and Warwick-street Chapels, be varied as follows; that burials shall be forthwith discontinued in the Roman Catholic Chapel, George-street, the Lady Huntingdon's Chapel, Mill-street, and the Warwick-street Chapel, and in the burial-grounds of the said chapels, except in walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed.

**WHEREAS** by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to order such acts to be done by or under the directions of the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish: Provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates;

And whereas the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the churchwardens or other persons or person having the care of the parish churchyard of Dwygyfylchi, in the county of Carnarvon, has made a representation, stating that, for the purpose of preventing the said churchyard from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order,

and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens of Dwygyfylchi do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures, viz. :

That the parish churchyard of Dwygyfylchi, in the county of Carnarvon, be so drained that water shall not accumulate in any grave therein.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 35.)—CHINA—FORMOSA STRAIT

*Sunken Rock near Turnabout Island.*

THE following information relating to the existence of a sunken rock lying north of Turnabout Island is derived from the report of a Marine Court of Inquiry, held at Hong Kong, on the 23rd and 25th November, 1875.

The Peninsula and Oriental Company's steamship *Sunda*, whilst on her voyage from Hong Kong to Yokohama, on the forenoon of the 14th September, 1875, having occasion to run for shelter under Haitan Island, struck on a sunken rock lying to the northward of Turnabout Island, sustaining such damage as to necessitate the vessel being beached in the south-east entrance of Haitan Strait.

Commander E. M. Edmond, of the *Sunda*, estimated that the rock on which that vessel struck was situated at a distance of from one mile to one and a half miles north of Turnabout Island, and no further information of the position of the danger is afforded.

NOTE.—At a distance of 2 miles northward of Turnabout Island, the depth is 25 fathoms, and, until the locality is more thoroughly examined, Mariners should not approach nearer than that distance.
