TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is

Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. With respect to the places of landing for animals at the Bristol Docks, at Bristol, in the county of Gloucester, and the places adjacent thereto, the mode of the cleansing and disinfection thereof is, with reference to Articles 20 and 24 of The Animals Order of 1875, hereby prescribed, and the same shall be cleansed and disinfected in the mode following:

- (1.) By the sweeping thereof, and the effectual removal therefrom of all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter:
- (2.) Then by the thorough washing, with water, of the floors of the pens, and of the walls or fences of the pens, and of all other parts above the surface of the floors of the pens:
- (3.) Then by the application to the surface of the ground and floors of the pens of a mixture of water and commercial carbolic acid in the proportion of one-fifth of a pint of carbolic acid to a gallon of water:

(4.) Then by the application to the walls and fences and all other parts above the surface of the ground or floors of the pens with which animals or their droppings have come in contact, of a coating of limewash made of good freshly burnt lime and water, and containing in each gallon of limewash one-fifth of a pint of commercial carbolic acid, the limewash being prepared immediately before use.

2. The sweepings of the places of landing and places adjacent thereto shall be well mixed with quicklime, and shall be effectually removed from contact with animals.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six; and words in this Order have the same meaning as in The Animals Order of 1875.

The Ryde and Newport Railway Company.

Certificate of the Board of Trade for raising Additional Capital.

WHEREAS the Ryde and Newport Railway Company have complied with the requirements of "The Railway Companies Powers Act, 1864."

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade do by this their Certificate, in pursuance of the said Act, as amended by "The Railways Powers and Construction Acts, 1864, Amendment Act, 1870," and by virtue and in exercise of the powers thereby in them vested, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, certify as follows:—

Power to raise Additional Capital.

1. The Ryde and Newport Railway Company, hereinafter called the Company, are hereby authorized to raise for the purposes of their undertaking, in addition to the capital which they are already authorized to raised, any further sum not exceeding in the whole the sum of £30,000, by the issue of new ordinary or new preference shares or stock of the Company; and the shares or stock created under this certificate shall form part of the general capital of the Company.

New Stock to be offered to Proprietors.

2. The shares or stock to be issued under this Certificate shall be offered in the first instance to the proprietors of shares or stock in the Company, and so much (if any) of the shares or stock so to be issued as shall not be taken by such proprietors, shall be issued, sold, or disposed of, in such manner, at such time or times, with such rights and priorities, and on such terms and conditions as may be determined by a special meeting of the proprietors of the said Company to be duly convened for this purpose.

Companies Act, 1867, to apply.

3. In respect of new shares or new stock to be issued under this Certificate, Section 21 of "The Companies Clauses Act, 1863," shall be read and have effect as provided with respect to a Special Act by Section 27 of "The Railway Companies Act, 1867."

Power to issue Debentures.

4. The Company, in addition to the sum already authorized to be borrowed by them, may also borrow on mortgage from time to time any additional money not exceeding in the whole the sum of £10,000, on such terms and conditions as may be approved as aforesaid, and in manner following, and not otherwise, that is to say:— When one-third of the new capital of £30,000 by this Certificate authorized to be raised has been raised, £3,300, part of the sum of £10,000, may be borrowed when two-thirds of the new capital has been raised, then a further sum of £3,300 may be borrowed, and when the whole of the new capital has been raised the remainder of the sum of £10,000 may be borrowed.

Proprietors in New Shares or Stock to have same rights as Proprietors of original Shares or Stock of the Company.

5. Save as herein or in the Acts incorporated herewith otherwise provided, the proprietors of any new shares or new stock issued under this Certificate shall be entitled to the like rights and privileges and be subject to the like liabilities as the proprietors of similar shares or stock, ordinary or preference, as the case may be, in the existing capital of the Company.

Power to issue Debenture Stock.

6. In respect of any money hereby authorized to be raised by mortgage, the Company may create and issue debenture stock, subject to the provisions of Part III of "The Companies Clauses Act, 1863," but notwithstanding anything therein contained, the interest of all debenture stock at any time after this Certificate comes into operation, created and issued by the Company, shall rank *pari passu* with the interest of all mortgages, at any time after this Certificate comes into operation, granted by the Company, and shall have priority over all principal money secured by such mortgages.

Priority of existing Mortgages.

7. Every mortgage granted by the Company, under the powers of any Act of Parliament, or Certificate, and in force at the commencement of the operation of this Certificate, shall have priority over all mortgages granted under this Certificate.

Companies Act of 1867, as to Loan Capital, Incorporated.
