TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intima-

tion from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Officer, whose claim to the same has been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, for his gallant conduct during the recent operations against the Malays in Perak, as recorded against his name, viz. :—

Corps.	Rank and Name.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
Bengal Staff Corps...	Captain (now Brevet-Major) George Nicholas Channer	For having, with the greatest gallantry, been the first to jump into the Enemy's Stockade, to which he had been dispatched with a small party of the 1st Ghoorkha Light Infantry, on the afternoon of the 20th December, 1875, by the Officer commanding the Malacca Column, to procure intelligence as to its strength, position, &c. Major Channer got completely in rear of the Enemy's position, and finding himself so close that he could hear the voices of the men inside, who were cooking at the time, and keeping no look out, he beckoned to his men, and the whole party stole quietly forward to within a few paces of the Stockade. On jumping in, he shot the first man dead with his revolver, and his party then came up, and entered the Stockade, which was of a most formidable nature, surrounded by a bamboo palisade; about seven yards within was a log-house, loop-holed, with two narrow entrances, and trees laid latitudinally, to the thickness of two feet. The Officer commanding reports that if Major Channer, by his foresight, coolness, and intrepidity, had not taken this Stockade, a great loss of life must have occurred, as from the fact of his being unable to bring guns to bear on it, from the steepness of the hill, and the density of the jungle, it must have been taken at the point of the bayonet.

N.W. buoy.—A black nun has been placed on the edge of the Brani Reef, off Brani Bay, in 5 fathoms, with the red beacon on the north shore bearing N. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. distant nearly 3 cables.

Meander Shoal.—S.E. red buoy has been moved East 20 yards.

N.W. red buoy has been moved N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 40 yards.

The channel between Tanjong Pagar and Timbaga Rocks has been named *North Channel*; and between the Timbaga Rocks and Brani Shoals, *Middle Channel*; and that between Brani Shoals and Brani Reef, *South Channel*.

(No. 37.)—CANADA—NEW BRUNSWICK—
PASSAMAQUODDY BAY.

(1.) *Fixed Light on Mijic Bluff.*

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada has given notice, that from the 1st April, 1876, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Mijic Bluff, entrance of Magadavic River, Passamaquoddy Bay.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 130 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 15 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric or by reflectors.

The tower, 29 feet high, is a square wooden building painted white. Position, lat. $45^{\circ} 7' N.$, long. $67^{\circ} 54' 30'' W.$

NOTE.—A shoal extends 250 yards at low water E.N.E. from the lighthouse.

ST. CROIX RIVER.

(2.) *Beacon Lights on Spruce and St. Mark Points.*

(No. 38.)—IRELAND—EAST COAST.

Alteration in the Buoyage of Burford, Kish, Codling, Ridge, and India Banks.

THE Commissioners of Irish Lights have given notice, that owing to the changes that have taken place in the formation of the Burford, Kish, Codling, Ridge, and India Banks, the following alterations and additions are about to be made in the buoyage thereof, viz. :—

Burford Bank.

North Buoy will be changed to a *conical* buoy chequered black and white, with staff and globe.

South Buoy will be moved half a cable to the westward and moored in 4 fathoms. The staff and globe will be removed.

Kish Bank.

The Kish, Bray, and Codling Banks will, in future, be considered as one danger.

North, or No. 1 Buoy.—A *black conical* buoy with *staff and globe* will mark the northern extremity of these banks ; it will be moored in 6 fathoms N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., one cable from its present position.

No. 2 Buoy.—A *black can* buoy will be moored E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., $4\frac{1}{4}$ cables from the position of the present buoy, with Bailey Lighthouse N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., and Mapas Obelisk N.W. by W.

No. 3 Buoy.—A *black can* buoy will be moored in 17 fathoms E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 6 cables from the

position of the buoy now marking the south end of the Kish Bank, and which buoy will be removed. The new buoy will have Mapas Obelisk bearing N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N., and Great Sugar-loaf W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

No. 4 Buoy.—A *black conical* buoy will be moored in about 8 fathoms S. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., 3 miles from No. 3 Buoy, with Great Sugar-loaf N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. westerly, and Wicklow Head S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. westerly.

The black and white vertical striped buoy now marking the east end of Codling Bank will be removed.

S.E., or No. 5 Buoy.—A *black conical* buoy will be moored on the south-eastern extremity of the Codling Bank S.S.W., $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from No. 4 Buoy, with Great Sugar-loaf N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., and Wicklow Head, S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.

S.W., or No. 6 Buoy.—A *conical* buoy, painted *black and white in vertical stripes*, will be moored in about 20 fathoms N.N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., $3\frac{2}{10}$ miles from No. 5 Buoy, with Great Sugar-loaf N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., and Wicklow Head S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S.

South Ridge and India Bank.

These banks will in future be considered as one danger.

Ridge North Buoy.—A *conical* buoy, painted with *black and white horizontal bands with staff and globe*, will be moored at the north end of the Ridge in about 8 fathoms, with Great Sugar-loaf N.W. by N. northerly, and Wicklow Head Light-house S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.

India Bank South Buoy.—The south end of the India Bank will be marked by a *conical* buoy, painted with *black and white horizontal bands*. No alteration in position.

These alterations are expected to be completed by the middle of June, 1876.
