In the Matter of the Abandonment of Railways Act, 1850, the Railway Companies Act, 1867, and the Bodmin Railway Company.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Board of Trade by a Warrant bearing date the 30th day of March, 1876, and made in pursuance of the Abandonment of Railways Act, and the Railway Companies Act, 1857, have ordered and

declared that the railways by the Bodmin Railway Acts, 1864, 1865, and 1867, authorized to be made shall be abandoned by the said Company, viz. :—

By the Act of 1864.

“A railway commencing in the parish of Saint Winnow, in the county of Cornwall, by a junction with the Cornwall Railway, at or near to the Bodmin Road Station of that railway, and terminating in the borough and parish of Bodmin, in the county of Cornwall, in a field belonging to John Marshall, in the occupation of William Oliver, adjoining the turnpike-road leading from Bodmin to Lostwithiel.”

By the Act of 1865.
