NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 64.)—CHINA—HONG KONG ISLAND.

Fixed Light on Cape Collinson.

THE Colonial Government of Hong Kong has given notice, that from the 1st March, 1876, a light would be exhibited on Cape Collinson, Hong Kong Island.

The light is a *fixed red and white* light, showing white to the eastward between the bearings of N.N.W. and S.S.E., and red to the westward between S.S.E. and N.N.W. It is elevated 200 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the sixth order.

NOTE.—Vessels bound for Victoria Harbour from the northward and eastward, by keeping within the white sector of Cape Collinson light, will avoid the Bokhara and Tathong Rocks, also the rocks extending from the east point of Sywan Bay.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation, $0\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ Easterly in 1876.]
