Exporters of Stock are hereby informed that the Proclamation issued by the Administrator of the Government of Tasmania, under date the 10th day of April, 1874, prohibiting the importation into Tasmania of Cattle, Sheep, and Pigs from every port and place save and except such as appertain and belong to the respective Colonies of Victoria, New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, and Western Australia, continues of force and effect until the same shall be duly rescinded.

Croydon Union.—Hamlet of Penge.

To the Overseers of the Poor of the Hamlet of Penge, in the County of Surrey;—
And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the hamlet of Penge, in the county of Surrey, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons:

And whereas at a Meeting of the Vestry of the said hamlet, held at the parochial offices, Penge, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Thursday, the 9th day of March, 1876, it was resolved,—

“That the Local Government Board be requested to issue an Order under their Seal of Office, directing that the Act passed on the 5th August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vict., c. 57), entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the Appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ shall be applied to and put in force within this Hamlet as regards the whole of its provisions.”

And whereas the Overseers of the Poor of the said hamlet have made application in writing to the Local Government Board, pursuant to the above resolution:

Now therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given by the several Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:

ARTICLE I.—The whole of the Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the Appointment of Vestry Clerks,” shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said hamlet of Penge.

ARTICLE II.—The Overseers of the Poor of the said hamlet shall pay to the person for the time being appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk, under the authority of this Order, a salary at the rate of one hundred pounds per annum, or such other remuneration for the performance of the duties of that office as the Local Government Board may from time to time direct or approve.

ARTICLE III.—Such remuneration, in the case of an annual salary, shall be considered as accruing from day to day, and be apportionable in respect of time accordingly, in pursuance of the provisions of “The Apportionment Act, 1870,” and shall be paid quarterly on the 24th day of June, the 29th day of September, the 25th day of December, and the 25th day of March, in each year.

ARTICLE IV.—The Vestry Clerk for the time being appointed under the authority of the Statutes in that behalf and of this Order, in addition to the duties set forth in the said Act, and the duties which are or may be imposed upon Vestry Clerks by any Act or Acts of Parliament, shall discharge, as regards the said hamlet, the following duties:—

He shall conduct all applications, by or on behalf of the Overseers or Vestry, to any Justice or Justices at Petty or Special Sessions or out of Sessions; and shall perform and execute, without charge for anything beyond disbursements, all legal business connected with the Hamlet, or in which the Overseers or Vestry shall be engaged, except prosecutions at the Assizes or the Central Criminal Court, and prosecutions or other proceedings at the Quarter or General Sessions, and actions, suits, or other proceedings in the Superior Courts, and Parliamentary business.

ARTICLE V.—A copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
