

“the burial of the dead in the Metropolis,” made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty’s Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications, viz. :—

**CILYCWYM, LLANDOVERY.**—Forthwith wholly in the church of Cilycwm, Llandoverly; and in the churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, except in now completed vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in other graves for the burial of widowers or widows of those previously buried in the churchyard; and that, in the meantime, no earthen grave be opened that has been buried in during the preceding ten years.

**WINLATON.**—Wholly in the church and churchyard of Winlaton after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

**SUTTERTON.**—Forthwith wholly in the church and churchyard of Sutterton.

**CROFT WITH SOUTHWORTH.**—Forthwith wholly in the burial-ground of St. Lewis Roman Catholic Chapel, in the parish of Croft with Southworth.

**LITTLEBOROUGH, LANCASHIRE.**—Forthwith wholly in the church of Littleborough, Lancashire; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stonework and brickwork properly cemented, and except also in existing family graves, which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.

**TADCASTER.**—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Tadcaster; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves to be used only for the burial of the widowers or widows of those already buried in the churchyard.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty’s Most Honourable Privy Council on the eighth day of August next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said eighth day of August.
